OVERVIEW

A. Office of Hawaiian Affairs Background and Mission

1. Background

Upon statehood in 1959, Section 5(f) of the Admission Act directed the State to hold lands in trust for five purposes, one of which was "the betterment of the conditions of Native Hawaiians," as defined in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920. In 1978, a Constitutional Convention reviewed and revised the responsibilities of Hawai'i's government. Among the provisions incorporated into the new state constitution was the establishment of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs ("OHA"), as a public trust with mandates to better the conditions of Native Hawaiians and the Native Hawaiian community in general. In 1979, the legislature enacted Chapter 10 of the Hawai'i Revised Statues ("HRS") which further defined OHA as a semi-autonomous self-governing body to address the needs of the aboriginal class of people of Hawai'i.

Hawai'i is an ethnically-diverse state. Currently, approximately one in five (21.67%) people in our Island population identify and define themselves as Native Hawaiian. Native Hawaiian households typically consist of larger multi-generational families with more children yet have less income per person than other populations residing in the State of Hawai'i (American Community Survey, U.S. Census Bureau, 2015). Native Hawaiians live in each county, with greater density in rural areas than metro cities.

OHA's Board of Trustees ("BOT", "Board" or "Trustees") is composed of nine elected trustees, five of whom represent specific island districts and four at-large positions. OHA's key administrators include a Chief Executive Officer, Chief Operating Officer, Chief Financial Officer and General Counsel, in addition to Division Directors.

2. Mission

OHA's mission is to mālama (protect) Hawai'i's people, environmental resources and assets, toward ensuring the perpetuation of the culture, the enhancement of lifestyle and the protection of entitlements of Native Hawaiians, while enabling the building of a strong and healthy Hawaiian people and lāhui, recognized nationally and internationally. According to Hawai'i Revised Statutes Chapter 10, OHA is the principal public agency in the State of Hawai'i responsible for:

- o Betterment of conditions of Native Hawaiians;
- Performance, development and coordination of programs and activities relating to Native Hawaiians;
- Assessing the policies and practices of other agencies impacting Native Hawaiians;
- o Conducting advocacy efforts for Native Hawaiians; and
- Serving as a receptacle for reparations.

OHA carries out its mission through the strategic allocation of its resources. Consistent with best practices among foundations and endowments and with the purpose of ensuring the continued viability of its Native Hawaiian Trust Fund ("NHTF"), OHA's Board of Trustees adopted its first Spending Policy in 2003 and last amended it in 2021. The Spending Policy limits OHA's annual

spending up to 5% of the rolling 20 quarter average of the NHTF to ensure sufficient resources are available each year and in perpetuity by not diminishing the corpus.

3. Strategic Objectives, Goals and Performance Metrics

In September 2020, OHA Board of Trustees approved the 2020-2035 Strategic Plan called Mana i Mauli Ola (MiMO). OHA's Strategic Plan establishes three Strategic Foundations of 'Ohana (Family), Mo'omeheu (Culture) and Āina (Land and Water) that will serve as the lens through which decisions, planning, activities, initiatives, policies, processes, procedures and practices are made. The Strategic Plan also identifies the following Strategic Directions: Educational Pathways, Health Outcomes, Quality Housing and Economic Stability. Each of our strategic directions have two strategies with identified outcomes.

OHA is currently refining tactics to effectively implement the strategies identified in MiMO while addressing and adapting to board, administrative and environmental changes. To measure our effectiveness, we are currently developing both strategic indicators and tactical metrics. The strategic plan and measures will continue to guide us over the next decade. You may find additional information about our strategic plan in the attached Appendix A.

B. Current State-Wide Conditions & Notable Performance

1. Current State-Wide Conditions

The Economic Research Organization at the University of Hawai'i's (UHERO) December 2023 global outlook and forecast² for Hawai'i showed a resilience despite global challenges. The impact of the Maui wildfires on the economy is uncertain and rebuilding will be a long process.

- Maui Wildfires August 2023. On August 8, 2023, a massive wildfire broke out in Maui, causing significant damage and loss of life. More than 2,000 homes were destroyed along with hundreds of businesses estimated to have more than \$2.7 million in revenue per day. The Board of Trustees approved \$5 million to support Native Hawaiians affected by the 2023 Maui wildfires. OHA is working to assess the beneficiaries' needs and ensure that the funds provide the greatest possible assistance for disaster recovery.
- United States Congress. Mixed control of Congress following the midterm elections will
 mean no major policy changes. The biggest risk is of temporary government shutdowns
 resulting from disputes over budget extensions and the federal debt ceiling.
- Hawai'i Visitor Numbers. Hawai'i witnessed a remarkable increase in visitor numbers in 2023, with more than 8.8 million people visiting our islands, marking a 5% increase from 2022. Although the visitor count still falls below pre-pandemic levels, the rise in the number of visitors from Japan in 2023 was an improvement despite the drop in value of the yen. All the major islands experienced a surge in visitor numbers and spending except for Maui, which reopened parts of west Maui on November 1st and continues its recovery efforts from the August 2023 wildfires.
- **Hawai'i Inflation.** Consumer inflation has decreased from its peak of 7.5% in March 2022. Inflation is expected to remain in the range of 3-3.5% for the next year due to higher housing costs, before slowly decreasing again.
- Hawai'i Labor Market. Hawai'i's labor market has stabilized with excess jobs retreating to 13,000. Employment has normalized and the unemployment rate is low at 2% across O'ahu, Kaua'i and Hawai'i Island. There remain uncertainties around Maui County's recovery including outmigration by residents.
- Housing. Hawai'i's housing market has been greatly impacted by high interest mortgage
 rates. The number of new mortgage originations has dropped, and home transactions
 have fallen nearly 50%. Despite the decline in housing demand, resale prices have not
 fallen significantly. The housing market is expected to continue operating with few
 transactions and low inventory until interest rates decrease significantly. Rents increased

dramatically during the pandemic, but the rate of increase has been falling recently. Addressing the housing shortage on Maui remains a critical challenge for local policymakers.

2. Notable Performance, Results and Expected Outcomes

- Managing Native Hawaiian Trust and Public Land Trust Funds. A major source of funding to support OHA's programs in Advocacy, Legacy Lands, Beneficiary Services, Communication, Research, Compliance, and its support services come from withdrawals from the Native Hawaii Trust Fund ("NHTF") and are limited by the Native Hawaiian Trust Fund Spending Policy. This policy limits the withdrawal to five (5) percent of the NHTF's twenty-quarter (20-quarter) rolling average market value to ensure that resources held within the trust are available for future spending. Public Land Trust ("PLT") Revenues received by the State of Hawaii established \$21,500,000 as the interim annual share of income and proceeds of the PLT beginning in FY23. Thus, the FB24/25 amount is \$43,000,000. OHA's beneficiary and community investments (which includes grants) budget for the same biennial period is \$38,900,000. Additionally, the Board of Trustees took action following the Maui fires to provide \$5,000,000 in grants in addition to what is previously budgeted. That said, the total PLT revenues for FB24/25 are earmarked to our beneficiaries. Examples of beneficiary and community investments are \$6,000,000 to charter schools for per pupil and facilities funding, \$6,000,000 to DHHL for an infrastructure loan, community grants for health, education, housing, economic stability, iwi kūpuna repatriation & reinternment, cultural, and event grants.
- Increasing Commercial Property Activities. OHA currently has four commercial properties it uses to carry out its administrative functions as well as generate revenue. As December 2023, OHA continues to manage its Iwilei properties, which include, 1) Harbor Shops at 500 N. Nimitz Hwy, a retail property with three national retail chain tenants; 2) Iwilei Business Center at 501 Sumner Street, an industrial property; and 3) Nā Lama Kukui at 560 N. Nimitz property, the site of OHA's headquarters and commercial office space. These are approximately 99% leased. 4) The Hakuone properties, formerly known as Kaka'ako Makai, are currently being leased at newly established markets rates to maximize the income generated for the betterment of Native Hawaiians, while considering the balance between commerce and culture. All revenue that these properties generate that go beyond the financial resources needed for repair and maintenance are invested back into the Native Hawaiian Trust Fund.
- Act 226 (SLH 2022). In June 2022, Governor Ige signed into law Act 226 which enacted the following three key elements from SB2021 SD1 HD2 CD1: 1) Established \$21,500,000 as OHA's interim annual share of the income and proceeds of the public land trust beginning in fiscal year 2022-2023 (see Appendix G); 2) Appropriated \$64,000,000; and 3) Established a working group to determine the pro rata share of income and proceeds from the public land trust annually to the OHA. OHA first convened the Public Land Trust Working Group on September 5, 2023. The working group includes members from OHA, Department of Land and Natural Resources, Department of Budget and Finance and the Attorney General's Office. The working group continues to meet regularly since

September, most recently transmitting a letter to all state agencies asking them to provide information related to all ceded lands they may hold title to, maintain, control or use.

• Continuing Beneficiary Disparities. Due to many factors, Hawai'i continues to experience increases to costs of living (i.e., housing and food) that exceed increases in wage and income. This has exacerbated Native Hawaiians' housing instability, high rates of homelessness and higher rates of poverty. Additionally, although Native Hawaiians participate in the labor force at higher rates than the state average (66.7% versus 65.3%), Native Hawaiian per capita income is substantially lower than the state population, \$24,188 compared to \$33,882 (U.S. Census Bureau, 2018; U.S. Census Bureau, 2018). The most striking statistic showing the disparate impact of beneficiary disparities is the 2020 Census data released in 2023, which found that there are more Hawaiians living outside of the state of Hawai'i than in it (53% living in other states and 47% living in Hawai'i).

Since 2019, OHA's Board of Trustees, has been strengthening the organization from within via governance and policy-related work, complemented by Administration's operational infrastructure related work (e.g., focusing on beneficiaries and communities, strengthening organizational capacity, activating enabling technologies, creating operating efficiencies). Governance, policy and operations combine to strengthen the OHA to enable its fiduciary responsibilities to the Lāhui. In the final quarter of calendar year 2023, the Board of Trustees selected Stacy Ferreira as OHA's CEO. Ka Pouhana (CEO) Ferreira began with the organization on November 1, 2023.

We have attached a copy of OHA's 2023 annual report as appendix C for reference and additional information on OHA's activities and achievements in calendar year 2023.

FEDERAL FUNDS

C. Lost or at Risk of Losing Federal Funds

OHA currently administers two programs that use federally appropriated funds. These programs are:

 Hālawa Luluku Interpretive Development (CFDA No. 20.205) – approximately \$220,000

This project is a pass-through from the State Department of Transportation (HDOT). Its three basic goals are compliance, mitigation and community support relating to the adverse impacts because of construction of Interstate Highway H-3. This project, as managed by OHA, will be dissolved once Phase 3 (construction/implementation) is completed and the closeout process has been affirmed as finished by both OHA and HDOT. Once closed, all kuleana related to the Luluku and Hālawa Valley project areas will be managed solely by HDOT. The anticipated end of the Phase 3 and the project is summer 2024 though it may get extended into fiscal year 2025.

- Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund (CFDA No. 93.612) approximately \$847,000 The Mālama Loan Program (also known as the Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund, or NHRLF) is designed to help provide all people of Native Hawaiian ancestry better access to credit, capital, and financial services and skills as part of a larger effort to create jobs, wealth, and economic and social well-being for all the people of Hawai'i. This program is directly funded by federal appropriations. It has not lost federal funds, and we do not foresee it being at risk to lose funds in the next year.
- Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument

Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument is administered jointly by four cotrustees – the Department of Commerce, the Department of the Interior, the State of Hawai'i, and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. OHA receives federal funds from the U.S. Department of Commerce. OHA uses those funds in administering its coordination and management responsibilities as a co-administrator.

OHA has also received one-time federal grants to support ongoing functions of the organization. As these are one-time funding opportunities, OHA does not anticipate any communications activities necessary following the expenditure of these grant monies.

 Wao Kele O Puna (WKOP) Deer Fence Project at Pu'u Hei (CFDA No. 15.657) – approximately \$230,000

Wao Kele o Puna is a 25,856-acre property that OHA owns on Hawai'i Island. For OHA, the property reflects the weighted importance of 'āina and its connection to Native Hawaiian culture and people. OHA received a federal award to protect endangered plant species found in the crater through the installation of a 17-acre ungulate fence exclosure. The project period is expected to run from October 2022 until September 2027.

• 'Ōlelo Hawai'i Community Research Grant (CFDA No. 93.612) — approximately \$300,000

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 allocated approximately \$20 million in grant

funding to 210 recipients – one of which was OHA. It was the first ANA grant awarded to OHA and the first time that OHA has served as a grant administrator of ANA funds (\$300,000 was awarded) to distribute monies to support programming and lead research in 'ōlelo Hawai'i. The grant award enabled OHA in FY2023 to provide funding to four solicited nonprofit organizations from across the State of Hawai'i that are actively perpetuating Hawaiian language revitalization: 'Aha Pūnana Leo, Hui o Hanohano, Ke Kula 'o Pi'ilani, and Papahana Kuaola.

E. Budget Development Process and Priority Requests

1. Budget Development Process

Our OHA's FY 2024-FY 2025 biennium budget development began with the Strategic Plan. The budget is a financial expression of operating plans and activities that OHA intends to undertake in the next two fiscal years. These activities are guided by the Strategic Plan and reflect tactical and operational plans and activities. The budget construction starts with all the funding sources available, i.e., a percentage of OHA's Investment Portfolio, Public Land Trust amount, General Funds appropriations and Commercial Property revenue. These funding sources create the ceiling for budget expenditures. Personnel and non-personnel related budgets are constructed with related assumptions. For non-personnel budgets, beneficiary and community investments are established, after which recurring expenses, which account for normal on-going operations, are accounted for. Any remaining identified funds at this stage are to be considered, managed and deployed by the Office of Strategy Management aligned to OHA's Strategic Plan, under the direction of CEO and ultimately, the board of trustees.

2. Priority Requests

OHA is grateful that the 2023 State Legislature granted our full FY 2024 and FY 2025 biennium budget when it passed Act 71 (Appendix A). OHA will not make any supplemental budget requests in the 2024 Legislative Session. We recognize that the State Legislature must balance a budget with a less than favorable economic outlook. We also support the Legislature's focus on supporting and rebuilding Maui after the August 2023 fires. OHA will continue to implement the budget as was appropriated.

F. Significant Budget Adjustments and Related Outcomes

No significant budget adjustments are contemplated at this time for either FY 2024 or FY 2025.

According to mo'olelo, the god Kū fell in love with a human woman. He married her and together they raised a family until a time of terrible famine. Driven by love for his 'ohana, Kū transformed himself into an 'ulu tree so they would not starve. That was the first 'ulu tree; all 'ulu trees are descended from Kū.



Mo'omeheu | Palapalai

In the time before, our kūpuna had no written language. The 'ike and mo'olelo of our people were passed from one generation to the next through oli and hula. Palapalai was one of the plants kapu to Laka, the goddess of hula. Palapalai is often worn by dancers or used to adorn the hula kuahu (altar). Because of this connection, it has been chosen to represent culture.



'Āina | Kalo

According to tradition, Wākea and Hoʻohōkūkalani had a stillborn son they named Hāloa. The grieving parents buried their child and from that spot the first kalo plant began to grow. They later had another, healthy boy, who they also named Hāloa. He became the first Hawaiian, and thus, kalo is considered the older brother of the Hawaiian people. Today, Kalo has become a modern symbol of mālama 'āina.

Educational Pathways | Kukui

In traditional times, the oily kernal of the kukui nut was used for lamps. Indeed, "kukui" also means lamp, light or torch, and because of this, the kukui tree has long been a symbol of enlightenment. Education is a path towards enlightenment; acquiring 'ike (knowledge) and no'eau (wisdom), learning to think critically and to apply what is learned – these skills are critical to moving our lāhui forward.



Health Outcomes | Noni

Noni is a "canoe plant" brought to Hawai'i from the South Pacific by the earliest Hawaiian voyagers specifically for its numerous medicinal properties. While its taste and smell are rather unpleasant, noni was known to boost the immune system and to purify the blood. It was used to treat diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, and as a poultice to treat various skin diseases.



Quality Housing | 'Ōhia

As beautiful as they are strong, 'ōhia lehua are the first trees able to grow on barren lava fields and re-claim the land. It is a dominant tree of the Hawaiian rainforest, and considered a manifestation of the god, Kū. While the tree's delicate blossoms and liko (leaf buds) are used to fashion lei, 'ōhia wood is exceptionally hard and was used traditionally for many purposes, such as framing houses.



Economic Stability | Wai

Pure, fresh water (wai) is the essence and source of all life. The word "wai" also means to retain, leave or earn, while "waiwai" means wealth, emphasizing the value of water. Our kūpuna understood that this precious resource was a gift to be carefully managed and shared. Wai flowed down from upland rainforests, nourishing the lands below which led to abudance and prosperity that enriched the entire community.

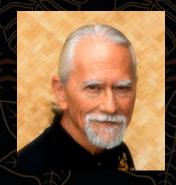

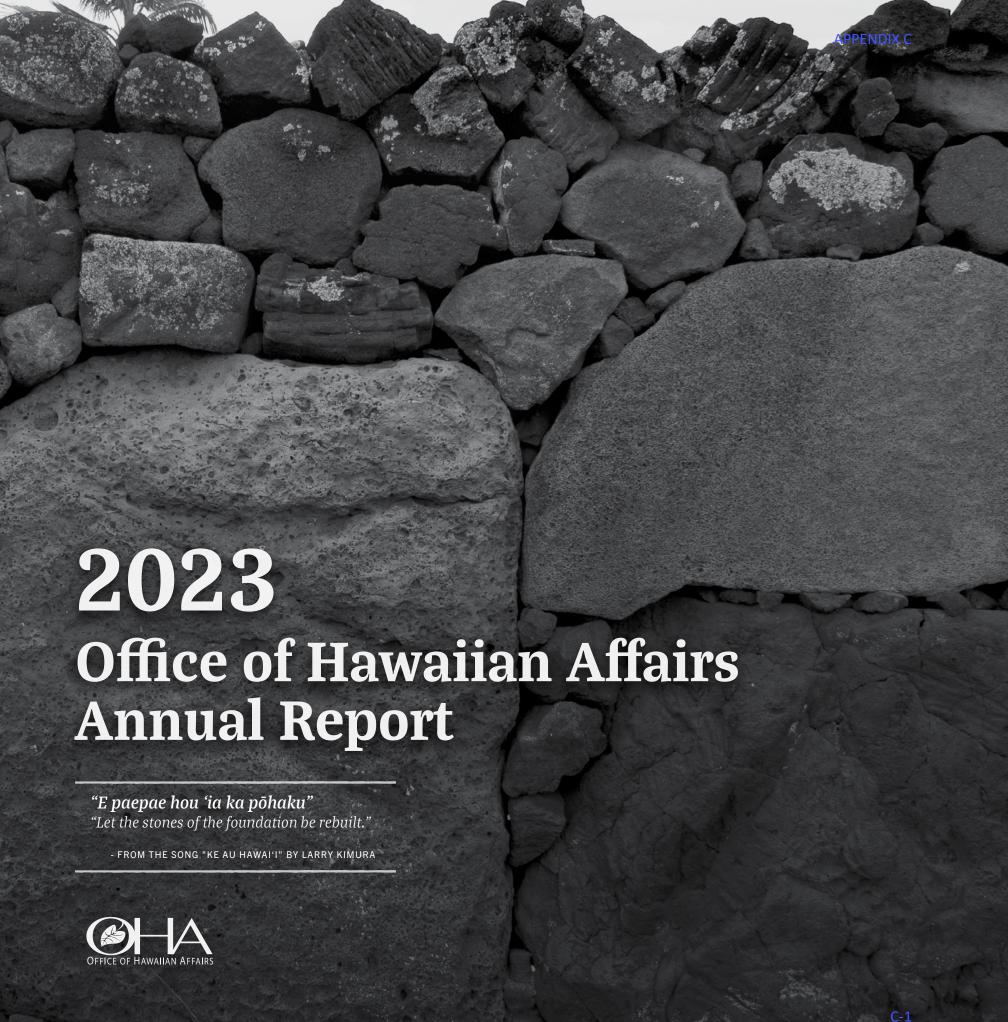

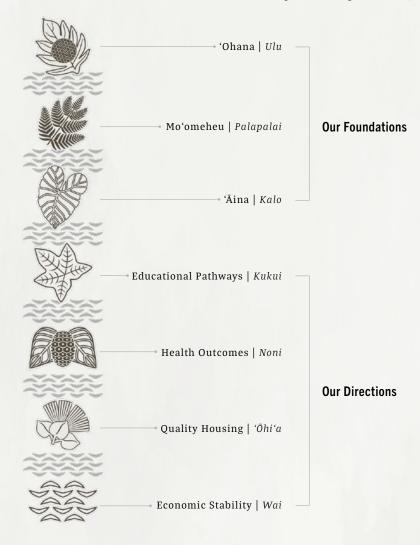

As we continued our work to better the lives of Native Hawaiians, it was a year of working diligently to set

foundations that the organization can build upon for decades to come.

We are justifiably proud that we have ushered in a new era of accountability and financial transparency that has positioned OHA to serve its beneficiaries better than ever before after a thorough overhaul of our policies, procedures and practices.

We have established a governance and policy framework for the Board with updated bylaws, implemented technology upgrades for grants, accounting and contract management, and approved policy amendments to improve fiscal management in budget preparation, format and reporting requirements.

We mahalo and aloha cultural practitioner Kumu Cy Bridges for his thoughtful selection of the name Hakuone to represent our 30-acre property formerly known as Kaka'ako Makai. Hakuone wil represent the history and cultural significance of the area for generations to come, and we will perservere in our dream of building residential housing at Hakuone.

Our Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund program introduced a new program during the fiscal year to support Native Hawaiian farmers across the pae 'āina. The Mahi 'Ai Agricultural Loan Program is now another way that OHA is meeting the business needs of Native Hawaiians – in this case, those who are starting a farm or expanding an existing one.

I am gratified by the achievements highlighted in this annual report.

Our organization has remained pa'a (firm), guided by the true dedication of our wonderful team members, the support of our community partners, and the trust bestowed upon us by our beneficiaries. We have proved that our greatest strengths are in unity and lōkahi.

Aloha mai kākou,

OHA is unique in the world; an independent branch of the Hawai'i State government created in 1978 by a constitutional amendment to change the status quo of Hawaiians by "bettering their conditions." That was, and continues to be, the principle that calls us to service and guides our operations.

OHA's actions are grounded in our love and connection to our 'āina, 'ohana, and culture. We continue to focus our efforts on building and supporting education, health, housing, and economic development programs for Hawaiians that increase our

wellbeing and foster a strong sense of Hawaiian identity.

Our trustees recommitted themselves to working together in service to our lāhui as they emerged from the shadow of the COVID-19 pandemic and publicly took their oaths of office together for the first time in many years. Our trustees' diverse perspectives will guide OHA's efforts moving forward.

OHA advanced its stewardship of its Kakaʻako Makai lands, now known as Hakuone, with a view towards creating a place where Hawaiians may live, work, play, and celebrate Hawaiian culture together.

In the not-too-distant past, Kaka'ako was disrespected, neglected, and used as a city dump; today these lands are a symbol of hope, wellbeing, and relevance as OHA begins to plan a vibrant one-of-a-kind community in the heart of Honolulu. OHA is now actively engaged in conducting its due diligence and planning how best to use these lands to serve our beneficiaries.

The forced assimilation of Hawaiians by the United States in the aftermath of the armed overthrow of our constitutional monarchy in 1893 has left deep scars on the identity, health, and wellbeing of Hawaiians.

The outlawing of the Hawaiian language as a medium of instruction in the territorial years through the first two decades of statehood has been addressed by tenacious language advocates who have been instrumental in revitalizing our language over the past 40 years.

This year, OHA received its first federal language grant of \$312,000 from the Administration for Native Americans (ANA) and re-distributed these funds to four local nonprofits working to re-establish 'ōlelo Hawai'i. This represents progress toward ensuring that our language thrives for generations to come, that the harmful effects of forced assimilation are overcome, and that a strong sense of Hawaiian identity is fostered.

We Hawaiians have a deep connection to our 'āina, and it is our kuleana to steward and care for these precious resources. Thus, OHA is working with the community to develop comprehensive management plans to mālama 'āina – heal and sustain our planet – through the development of pono ocean policies.

OHA exists to respond to challenges such as these. We look forward to the day when the conditions of Hawaiians, and our 'āina, are as they should be, and there is no longer a need for an Office of Hawaiian Affairs to exist.

Until that day, we will stay the course and work together to serve our lāhui. Mālama pono.

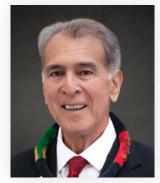

A New Era of Accountability

In November of 2022, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Board Chair Carmen "Hulu" Lindsey detailed the steps that the organization has taken over the last three years to improve overall organizational accountability.

"OHA is now positioned to serve its beneficiaries better than ever before after a thorough overhaul of its policies, procedures and practices," Lindsey said.

In September 2018, OHA engaged a top 10 national accounting firm – Clifton-LarsonAllen LLP (CLA) – to conduct a detailed review of a sample of OHA and limited liability company (LLC) contracts and disbursements from five fiscal years (2012-2016).

While OHA was not required to take this extraordinary step, the Board of Trustees opted to do so despite OHA undergoing regular state audits and receiving clean annual independent financial audits for 14 consecutive years (now 18 years).

CLA presented the results of their engagement in December 2019, including 73 OHA, 30 LLC and six general oversight and governance recommendations.

Better stewardship through tighter systems and controls

Lindsey highlighted the improvement steps taken by OHA since December 2019 to better align policies, procedures and practices, through Administration's Recommendations Implementation Plan which addressed CLA recommendations, including but not limited to:

- Implemented three major technology systems for grants management, accounting and contract management.
- Established a governance and policy framework for the BOT with updated bylaws.
- Approved policy amendments to improve fiscal management and transparency in budget preparation, format, and reporting requirements.
- Established contract monitoring as the responsibility of the operating unit with oversight by the business line executive.
- Subjected all grants and sponsorships to approval by the Board of Trustees
- Eliminated CEO-initiated sponsorships and the CEO management override practice.
- Required that employee-related events be compliant with OHA policies.
- Established a financial transparency website that includes 18 years of financial statements and independent auditors' opinions, Trustee Protocol Allowance and Annual Reports.

A Symbolic Investiture

In December 2022, Office of Hawaiian Affairs' trustees elected that year were inducted into their terms of office at an investiture ceremony held at Kawaiaha'o Church.

Newly elected At-Large Trustees Brickwood Galuteria and Keoni Souza, At-Large Trustee John Waihe'e, Hawai'i Island Trustee Mililani Trask, Maui Island Trustee Carmen "Hulu" Lindsey and Oʻahu Trustee Kalei Akaka won election this year. Kaua'i Island Trustee Dan Ahuna, Moloka'i and Lāna'i Island Trustee Luana Alapa and At-Large Trustee Keli'i Akina won election in 2020, however, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, OHA's 2020 investiture ceremony was cancelled.

In a symbolic show of unity, the ceremony marked the first investiture where all nine trustees were inducted together since the first OHA board was established in 1981.

With a theme of "Ho'oulu Lāhui Aloha - To Raise a Beloved Lāhui," the ceremony was attended by the Royal Benevolent Societies, ali'i trusts, state and county officials, OHA staff, and beneficiaries. Each of the trustees was presented with a lei hulu and received a special blessing from Kahu Ken Makuakāne to prepare for the important work ahead of them.

"As one who has preached the value of working together in a spirit of lōkahi since first being elected as chair of this board two years ago, I see a symbolism in all of us receiving Ke Akua's blessing together today," Board Chair Lindsey said. "May we continue to work in unity as one 'ohana as we move forward with the mission of this institution."

Hakuone: Reimagining Kaka'ako Makai

In 2012, the State of Hawai'i transferred approximately 30 acres of land in urban Honolulu to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs in lieu of three decades of unpaid pro-rata shares of income and proceeds from the Public Land Trust (PLT) owed to Native Hawaiians.

The land is comprised of 10 separate parcels and located at Kakaʻako Makai, a man-made peninsula in the heart of Honolulu adjacent to Kewalo Basin.

In November 2022, OHA rebranded its lands as "Hakuone," which refers to a small land division cultivated for a chief – it is a name of cultural significance with layers of meaning that was gifted by respected Kumu Cy Bridges.

To ensure that OHA's vision for Hakuone was pono, a series of eight community meetings and virtual townhalls attended by hundreds of participants were scheduled between November 2022 and January 2023.

OHA's vision for its property is first and foremost to mālama 'āina (care for the land) by cleaning and restoring life to

Hakuone to make it safe and productive once again.

In terms of development, OHA wants to balance commerce and culture; to ensure that the land will be developed in such a way that it not only generates revenue for Native Hawaiians, but also creates a Hawaiian "sense of place." It is a vision of community – a place where people can live, work and play – so housing has always been part of the equation.

Given Hawai'i's affordable housing crisis, and the effect this has had on Native Hawaiians in particular, during the 2023 legislative session OHA again pursued a repeal of the restriction on residential development at Kaka'ako Makai which prevents the organization from developing affordable housing on its property.

It was deeply disappointing that this effort failed - a bitter pill to swallow in light of the preponderance of luxury condominiums being developed just across the street on the ma uka side of Ala Moana Boulevard.

Introducing the new Mahi 'Ai Loan

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund introduced a new program in May 2023 to support Native Hawaiian farmers across the pae 'āina.

The Mahi 'Ai Agricultural Loan Program is another way that OHA is meeting the business needs of Native Hawaiians who are starting a farm or expanding an existing one.

The program has unique features that keep the needs of mahi 'ai in mind. In addition to the low-interest rates, new borrowers have the option of deferring their loan payments for the first six months without incurring additional interest.

"We recognize that it takes time for crops to grow, or livestock to reach a certain stage, before they can generate revenue for farmers, and we've taken that into consideration to help ensure our loan recipients are off to a good start," said Aikū'ē Kalima, OHA's Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan manager. "These loans will not only help Native Hawaiians build strong businesses working in harmony with the land to support their families and provide jobs for others in the community, but also support food security to help Hawai'i become more resilient."

Creating Postive Change for Native Hawaiians

Desiree Kanae Loperfido and her husband, Chef Donato Loperfido, operate Flavors of Italy LLC, a licensed importer and distributor of alcohol and spirits specializing in a wide range of wines and cheese. In September 2022, they received a \$250,000 Hua Kanu loan through OHA's Mālama Loans Program.

"I spoke with my husband, and we decided to reach out to OHA and see if they could help us because we needed that extra money to expand our business. The interest rates are great, and we are very appreciative of what OHA and its Mālama Loans program does for the Hawaiian community. We're grateful for the help because we really needed it."

Supporting Language Revitalization

Language is the foundation of any culture. For Indigenous peoples, our languages reflect our unique world-views, our values and even our histories.

Over the past four decades, ' $\"{o}$ lelo Hawai'i advocates have revitalized the Hawaiian language and increased the number of speakers from just a few hundred (mostly kūpuna) to some 20,000 individuals, most of whom are younger than 40.

Nevertheless, the Hawaiian language remains vulnerable and sustained effort is required to perpetuate and transmit 'ōlelo Hawai'i to upcoming generations.

Recognizing that many Indigenous languages spoken in America are endangered, the federal government's Administration for Native Americans (ANA) has established American Rescue Plan (ARP) grant funding to support federally and state-recognized Tribes and Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander community organizations that are trying to ensure the survival and continuing vitality of their native languages.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 allocated approximately \$20 million in grant funding to 210 recipients – one of which was OHA. It was the first ANA grant awarded to OHA and the first time that OHA has served as a grant administrator of ANA funds (\$300,000 was awarded) to distribute monies to support programming and lead research in 'ōlelo Hawai'i.

The grant application was a joint effort of OHA's Research Department, Office of Strategy Management, and Grants Program. The grant award enabled OHA in FY2023 to provide funding to four solicited nonprofit organizations from across the State of Hawai'i that are actively perpetuating Hawaiian language revitalization: 'Aha Pūnana Leo, Hui o Hanohano, Ke Kula 'o Pi'ilani, and Papahana Kuaola.

Ideally, this grant administration model – of passing through federal monies directly to smaller nonprofits in Hawaiʻi – will serve as a foundational model for OHA and other large Native Hawaiian-serving organizations to provide valuable financial resources directly to the communities we collectively serve.





Major OHA Research Collaborations

July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023

Major external collaborations of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Research Department (RD) and Office of Strategy Management (OSM) with other Native Hawaiian-serving organizations and agencies.

Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) Work Group

BRFSS is the nation's premier system of health-related telephone surveys that collect state data about residents' health-related risk behaviors, chronic health conditions, and use of preventive services. OHA collaborates with the Hawai'i State Department of Health (DOH) and and other government agencies to develop community surveys for Hawai'i.

Bishop Museum & Awaiaulu

OHA RD, Bishop Museum, and Awaiaulu are collaborating to plan the intake and complete rescan of Hawaiian language newspapers to either accompany or replace the collection currently housed in OHA's Papakilo Database.

Census Information Center (CIC)

OHA serves as a U.S. CIC to support local and community access, training and technical assistance on census data for research, planning and decision-making for underserved communities. This was a collaboration with the Hawai'i State Data Center, led by the Department of Business and Economic Development and Tourism's Research & Economic Analysis Divison.

Culturally Relevant Assessment (CRA)

OHA is partnering with Hawaiian-focused charter schools and Kamehameha Schools to develop tools and assessments to communicate the breadth of student learning. Existing standardized assessments do not adequately assess student learning that is grounded in Hawaiian language and culture.

Culturally Responsive Evaluation and Assessment-Hawaiʻi (CREA-HI)

OHA is a participant of CREA-HI, along with numerous other Hawai'i agencies. The group is working on a culturally sustaining evaluation through a Native Hawaiian lens and has developed and disseminated the Evaluation with Aloha Framework.

Hawai'i Board of Geographic Names

OHA's RD sits on the Hawai'i Board of Geographic Names (HBGN) to support the maintenance and updating of Hawai'i Geographic Names by providing research support in the areas of Hawaiian culture, land tenure, and ethnohistory.

Hawai'i Data Exchange

OHA partners with the Hawai'i Department of Education (DOE) to support access, utilization, and dissemination of data related to student performance in the Hawai'i Data Exchange (DXP)

'Imi Pono Survey

An ongoing collaboration between OHA's RD and OSM with Kamehameha Schools, Lili'u-okalani Trust, Papa Ola Lōkahi, and Marzano Research to develop, implement, analyze, and report findings of the 'Imi Pono Survey.

Kūkulu Kumuhana

This collaboration includes OHA, Lili'uokalani Trust, Kamehameha Schools, Papa Ola Lōkahi, and Consuelo Foundation and seeks to change how the wellbeing of Native Hawaiians is defined, measured, and ultimately reported. The Kūkulu Kumuhana framework is championed as a model to use in practice, research, and evaluation.

Legislature Burial Sites Working Group

OHA's RD provides administrative support to supplement OHA's participation on the Burial Sites Working Group.

Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to Share

OHA, Lili'uokalani Trust, Kamehameha Schools, Papa Ola Lōkahi and the Hawai'i State Department of Human Services (DHS) entered into an MOA to share data on Native Hawaiians in Adult Protective Services, Childcare, Child Protective Services, Foster Care, MedQUEST, TANF, and SNAP programs to determine if there are COVID-19 impacts on these services. The MOA will result in a series of research briefs to be disseminated publicly.

Murdered and Missing Native Hawaiian Women and Girls (MMNHWG) Task Force

OHA co-leads the MMNHWG Task Force with the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women. The task force includes service providers, police representatives, survivors, and other agency participants.

Nā Kama a Hāloa

OHA is a member of Nā Kama a Hāloa, a network of state and community partners seeking to improve the outcomes of keiki in the foster care system.

Native Hawaiian Education Council (NHEC)

In 1994, the Native Hawaiian Education Act established the NHEC to coordinate, assess, report, and make recommendations on the effectiveness of existing programs, and the state of Native Hawaiian education. OHA is represented on the NHEC, along with multiple state departments.

Native Hawaiian Research Hui (NHRH)

This is a collaboration between OHA, Lili u-okalani Trust, Kamehameha Schools, and Papa Ola Lōkahi. NHRH has produced several publications using data from the NH Business Survey, Native Hawaiian Wellbeing Survey (now known as 'Imi Pono) and continues to support other research initiatives that impact NH wellbeing.

Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund (NHRLF) Board of Directors

RD serves as a member of the NHRLF Board of Directors with kuleana to review, process, and approve NHRLF loan applications and monitor NHRLF program activities.

NHPI COVID-19 Response, Recovery, and Resilience (NHPI-3R)

OHA's RD and OSM serve on the NHPI-3R's Data & Research Committee that seeks to ensure the timely, accurate, and appropriate disaggregation of Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander data with regard to testing, cases, vaccinations, hospitalizations, and deaths. The group is a network of agencies, health organizations, nonprofits, and others.

Partners in Care

OHA's RD and OSM provides research support to PIC in the form of committee participation, report review, and editing of the PIC Native Hawaiian Sub-Report.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 5 (SCR5) Data Governance Task Force

The task force was focused on understanding how Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander data is collected, managed, and reported. The task force supported the development and implementation of a survey to gather data. OHA was both a participant and facilitator of the task force. The required report was submitted in January 2023, and the task force was then disbanded.

UH Mānoa Center for Indigenous Innovation and Health Equity (CIIHE)

CIIHE aims to advance Indigenous innovation (the application of traditional Indigenous knowledge, practices, and methodologies to contemporary problems) as a tool for health equity in NHPI populations. OHA participated in a collaboration with CIIHE to disseminate their Health Equity Analysis Survey.

US Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Listening Session

The OMB led a formal review process for national statistical standards for collecting race and ethnicity data. OHA convened local and Native Hawaiian-serving organizations to coordinate a formal response and authored a letter providing recommendations and feedback to the proposed changes to the current guidelines.

Youth Risk Behavioral Survey (YRBS)

OHA collaborates with the state DOH and DOE to coordinate and report on the YRBS which is designed to provide detailed information on the health and wellbeing of Native Hawaiian middle and high school public school students.

Developing OHA's Ocean Policy

OHA's sphere of advocacy includes international, federal, state and county governments as it pertains to Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices and associated rights from the near shore to the high seas.

This includes everything from protecting traditional aquaculture to advocating for protections against highly extractive activities such as the commercial aquarium fish trade, excessive tourism, industrial commercial fishing, and deep-sea mining.

For these reasons, OHA is in the process of developing innovative and effective ocean policies reflective of Hawaiian and Oceanic cultural values and traditions that meet or exceed global standards of practice.

In October and November 2022, OHA hosted a series of nine in-person Ocean Policy development meetings throughout the islands, as well as an online meeting via Zoom and, in addition, created a web survey to gather mana'o from the community.

Several hundred people participated in the meetings which were intended to enhance, develop and integrate 'ike kūpuna (ancestral knowledge) with western science to inform OHA's Ocean Policy and advocacy and to support sustainable, intergenerational protection and management of our ocean ecosystems.

The meetings were conducted by OHA's "ocean team" comprised of staff from its advocacy, communications, community engagement, research and public policy divisions as well as administrators and trustees.

These gatherings brought together Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners, fishers, divers, and other ocean people, along with Native Hawaiians and others who are already working to steward our marine ecosystems and ocean realms.

By meeting together, we have identified opportunities to build upon our collective strength to address the ongoing challenges to our Moananuiākea (Pacific Ocean) moving forward.

FY 2023 Budget Summary

The Approved Budget and Spending Limit for the fiscal year are shared below and are based on a biennium cycle of budgeting. To prudently manage its budget over a biennium period, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs executes budget realignments as needed. The figures below reflect the budget realignment approved June 29, 2023.

Approved Budget

Total: \$54,295,646

A - Grants (\$15,203,500)

Includes grants and sponsorships. This total does not equal the total on pages 8-9 as those totals include prior year appropriations.

B - **Property** (\$12,642,656)

Includes operational costs of OHA properties at Hakuone, Nā Lama Kukui, 500 North Nimitz, 501 Sumner, the Palauea Cultural Preserve, and Wao Kele O Puna.

C - **Core Personnel** (\$12,198,672)

Includes salary and fringe, student helpers, workers' compensation and other personnel costs. Does not include personnel costs for certain programs with designated sources and funding.

D - Other OHA Programs (\$1,229,419)

Reflects budgets for programs funded through non-trust funding sources, such as federal funds.

E - **Program Services** (\$2,514,362)

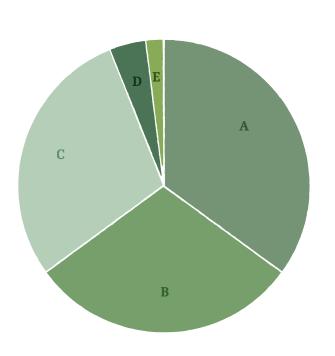
Program services include costs directly related to program activities such as printing, advertising, bulk mail and other costs.

F - **Overhead** (\$5,001,866)

Includes facility-related expenses such as utilities, rent, and maintenance of OHA's offices, and other expenses such as equipment costs.

G - Contracts (\$5,505,171)

Includes expenditures directly related to implementing program activities, services-on-a-fee and legal services.



Spending Limit

Total: \$62,004,435

A - Public Land Trust Revenue (\$21,500,000)

By state law, OHA is entitled to 20% of receipts from the use or sale of the Public Land Trust. In 2006, the legislature authorized an interim amount of \$15.1 million per year. In 2022, that amount was increased to \$21.5 million.

B - **5% of the NHTF Portfolio** (\$18,615,394)

The Native Hawaiian Trust Fund (NHTF) includes OHA's investment portfolio. Spending limit is calculated at 5% of a 20-quarter rolling average market value to ensure resources are available for future spending.

C - **Property** (\$18,277,533)

Includes expenditures directly related to implementing program activities, services-on-a-fee and legal services.

D - State of Hawai'i General Funds (\$2,254,400)

General Fund appropriations by the State Legislature.

E - **Other OHA Programs** (\$1,357,108)

Includes federal funding for specific projects (including the Hālawa Luluku Interpretive Development Project and the Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund Program), and other miscellaneous income.

Intended Purpose:

To account for OHA's portion of revenues dervied from the public land trust as defined in Section 10-2, HRS. To provide budget for continuous management, maintenance and repair of the Palauea Cultural Preserve of culturally and achaelologically significant sites. To account for the activities related to OHA's management and stewardship of the Forest Reserve, and to receive revenues from the sales of advertising space on OHA's monthly newspaper, Ka Wai Ola. All the appropriation account numbers identified above are Trust assets and during a recent State Review of OHA's funds (Special, Revolving, and Trust Funds), it was determined that these 'Special' funds will be characterized as Trust Funds going forward.

Source of Revenues:

- a. Ceded land revenue at \$21,500,000 per annum.
- b. Dividend and Interest income from investments.
- c. Realized gains from sales of investments.
- d. Interest earned from Consumer Micro Loan Program.
- e. Revenues generated from OHA's commercial properties operations Kaka'ako Makai parcels, Na Lama Kukui and Iwilei.

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that it must set right
 and fulfill its trust responsibilities to native Hawaiians,

 legislature to enact legislation that upholds its trust
 responsibilities and duty of care to native Hawaiians to:

- The genesis and source of the State's public land trust responsibility to native Hawaiians are the historical events that led to the illegal overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawaii; the

- 1 transfer of approximately 1,800,000 acres of crown, government,
- 2 and public lands to the United States under the 1898 Joint
- 3 Resolution of Annexation without the consent of and without

- 6 1959, with the explicit trust responsibility and requirement in
