Rep, Olds recently visited the Hawaiian Humane Society, learning about the process animals in the shelter go through upon arrival. We have also gotten advice about the free-roaming cats, chickens, and roosters that have been in our community.

What can we do about the roosters and chickens?

We would like to remind everyone that according to our statute, only 2 hens are allowed to be kept, and that no roosters are allowed. Accordingly, Article 2 of Statute 12 of Animal Nuisances, it is unlawful to be the owner of an animal, farm animal or poultry engaged in animal nuisance as defined in § 12-2.2; provided that it shall not be an animal nuisance for purposes of this article if, when the animal, farm animal, or poultry is making any noise, biting, or stinging, a person is trespassing or threatening trespass upon private property in or upon which the animal, farm animal, or poultry is situated, or for any other legitimate cause which teased or provoked the animal, farm animal, or poultry.

There are complaint forms for private citizens, and a feral chicken brochure will be on the next page.

What can we do about the cats?

The Humane society has many different resources to help with the population control. Their website has helpful guides, and after the feral chicken brochure, is the Humane society's guide for their trap and neuter program, called Trap-Neuter-Return-Manage, or TNRM, which is free to do.

FERAL CHICKENS FACT SHEET

- The Department of Customer Services is addressing nuisance issues created by feral chickens in our community by helping to bring new attention, needed resources and a strong policy voice to the persistent concern.
- Feral chickens create nuisances by foraging in residential areas, crowing at inconvenient hours, posing health concerns with their waste and agitating household pets. More roaming chickens mean more nuisances. O'ahu residents can help manage the nuisance by not feeding feral chickens and reducing the feral chicken population in their community.

Who do I contact for feral chicken and poultry issues?

- The responsibility for responding to feral chicken problems varies with the location of the animals and the property ownership.

Options for dealing with feral chicken and poultry nuisances are listed below by property ownership.

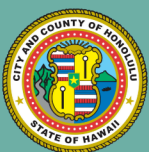

REPORT FERAL CHICKEN NUISANCES

Call Honolulu Police Department (911 non-emergency line) to report feral chicken noise nuisance or excessive poultry (more than two poultry per household).

Step 1 Identify and Plan

If you see a Free-Roaming cat (FRC) without a notched ear, he/she is likely not spayed or neutered.

Before you trap, always have a plan. Never trap without a confirmed spay/neuter appointment.

Step 2: Book a Spay/Neuter Appointment

Schedule a spay/neuter appointment at a participating Feline Fix veterinary clinic and pick up a humane trap.

Need an appointment?

FRC Appointments at the Hawaiian Humane Society's Ginny Tiu Community Spay/Neuter Center (GTCSNC) are available on Fridays. Please note, wait times range between 2 – 4 weeks.

Need a humane trap?

Deposit will be refunded to you when the trap is returned to the GTCSNC. Once your humane trap rental and TNRM appointment are confirmed, pick up your rented trap at GTCSNC Wednesday – Friday between 9 am – 4 pm.

Step 3: Trap the FRC

Days leading up to surgery

Establish an after-sunset feeding routine.

Communicate with other feeders not to feed because the cat will receive surgery.

2 days before appointment

Do not provide food; water only. Prepare the trap by lining the bottom with 2-3 layers of folded newspaper for comfort and cleanliness.

1 day before appointment

Set the trap in the normal feeding location, ideally against a wall or bush so that it blends with the landscape.

Bait the trap using strong smelling foods like tuna, sardines or rotisserie chicken in lightweight, disposable bowls.

Create a food trail leading to the trap's entrance.

Once the cat is trapped, immediately cover the trap completely with a towel or blanket to reduce the cat's stress. Keep the cat in a quiet, temperature-controlled area, like a lānai or garage, until surgery day.

Step 4: Surgery Day

Morning of appointment

Drop off cat at veterinary clinic. If scheduled at the GTCSNC, check-in time is between 7 am - 8 am.

Ensure your Feline Fix certificate application is filled out prior to arrival.

Afternoon of appointment

Pick up cat from veterinary clinic. If cat is at GTCSNC, pick-up time is between 4:30 pm - 5:30 pm.

When the cat is fully awake and alert, carefully open the trap door - only about an inch to prevent escapes - and slide a small plate of wet food in the trap. Monitor cat's activity overnight.

You'll see the cat's ear is notched, signifying they have been spayed/neutered and microchipped.

Day After Appointment

Return cat to the exact trapping spot, preferably before sunrise or after sunset

Clean the trap

If rented from Hawaiian Humane, clean and return trap to receive your \$75 deposit back.

Register the microchip

with your contact information on 24PetWatch.com.

Ongoing

Over the next few days, continue monitoring the cat for normal eating habits and activity levels. If you notice there are un-notched cats in the colony, repeat the TNRM process.

E-Bikes: New Law Alert!

Act 259 creates consistent statewide rules for electric bicycles and micro-mobility devices and strengthens enforcement protocols.

The measure establishes a regulatory framework that updates definitions, sets basic operational safety requirements and creates age-related standards such as helmet rules for minors and operating restrictions for younger riders.

An e-bike (or electric bicycle) is a lot like a traditional bicycle except it is equipped with an electric motor and rechargeable battery to provide the rider with a power boost.

E-bikes are 2- or 3- wheeled devices with:

- ✓ An electric motor at most 750 watts (1hp)
- ✓ Fully operable pedals

Electric bicycles are a **subgroup** of bicycles, sorted into **three classes** of e-bikes

Class 1, 2, & 3 e-bikes all have motors ≤ 750 watts.



CLASS 1

- ✓ Pedal-assist *only*
- ✓ 20 mph top-speed



AGE RESTRICTION



CLASS 2

- ✓ Pedal-assist
- ✓ Throttle
- ✓ 20 mph top-speed



AGE RESTRICTION



CLASS 3

- ✓ Pedal-assist *only*
- ✓ 28 mph top-speed
- ✓ Speedometer

Class 2 and Class 3 e-bikes can be ridden by individuals under 16 with direct parent/guardian supervision.

WHAT THIS LAW DOES



- Establishes a **regulatory framework** that updates definitions, sets basic operational safety requirements and creates age-related standards such as helmet rules for minors and operating restrictions for younger riders.
- Clarifies where **e-bikes and scooters** may operate and requires proper registration, with penalties for failing to comply.
- Mandates **accurate labeling and disclosures** from manufacturers and retailers so riders understand how their devices can be used legally and safely.
- To **support enforcement**, the measure provides clearer authority for addressing illegal or noncompliant devices and updates related laws for consistency.

KNOW THE DIFFERENCE



- E-bikes are NOT High-Speed Electric Devices
- High-Speed Electric Devices with motors over 750 watts capable of speeds faster than 28 mph (like e-motos, electric dirt bikes, & e-motorcycles) are NOT e-bikes.

Police can cite & seize non-conforming devices not legally registered to operate on public streets.

The law takes effect July 1.
