## **Senate Joint Committees Visit Maui Sites**

This month, I participated in a site visit of Hawaiian Electric Company's (HECO) facilities on Maui, coordinated by the Senate Committees on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism (EET), Commerce and Consumer Protection (CPN), and Ways and Means (WAM). Our focus was to understand HECO's ongoing efforts to reduce wildfire risk and strengthen the resilience of their electrical infrastructure.

In the aftermath of the devastating wildfires that have deeply impacted our neighbors on Maui, many of you have shared concerns about wildfire risks in our district. As a member of the WAM Committee, this tour provided my colleagues and me with a comprehensive overview of the proactive steps HECO is taking to address these environmental challenges on Maui and across the state. With wildfires becoming an increasing concern, the insights from this visit underscored the urgent need to fortify our electrical grid against future risks. The knowledge we gained will be instrumental in shaping the Senate's legislative priorities, as we remain committed to enhancing the safety and resilience of Hawai'i's energy infrastructure to protect our communities and support ongoing recovery efforts.

## **Waikele Elementary School Career and College Fair**


