Tour of the Kaiyu Maru Training Vessel

I spent an exciting afternoon with First Lady of Hawai'i Jaime Green and Superintendent Hayashi on a tour of the Kaiyu Maru training vessel, where we welcomed student fishery trainees from Fukuoka, Japan. The Kaiyu Maru Program, in partnership with Campbell High School, provides a unique opportunity for students from Hawai'i and Japan to engage in an enriching cultural and educational exchange. These students from Fukuoka have spent two months at sea, learning hands-on about sustainable fishing practices, ocean conservation, and the technical skills needed in the fishery workforce. It was remarkable to witness their dedication and passion for their craft.

For our students at Campbell High School, this exchange offers an invaluable perspective on global career opportunities in fisheries and marine science. By connecting with international peers and learning directly on a working vessel, our students gain practical knowledge and firsthand exposure to oceanic careers—right here in Hawai'i. Programs like these are critical in building the skills and perspectives that will equip our students to lead in areas vital to our islands and beyond.

Hawai'i Public Radio's Bytemarks Cafe

Ian Kitajima, President of Pacific International Center for High Technology Research (PICHTR), and I appeared on Hawai'i Public Radio's Bytemarks Café, hosted by Burt Lum, to discuss our efforts in expanding computer science education across the state. We discussed the journey we've taken, alongside dedicated partners from the Department of Education and industry leaders, to make computer science accessible to students in every public school in Hawai'i. This effort started in 2017 and brings together today's statewide computer science curriculum. This collaborative endeavor was and is driven by public and private partnerships.

During the interview, I shared how Act 51 (SLH 2018) and Act 158 (SLH 2021) helped lay a foundation for integrating computer science into education for kindergarten through 12th grade. This legislation not only addresses today's workforce needs but also opens doors to new career pathways in tech, including cybersecurity, green energy, and robotics. It is rewarding to see the positive impact this initiative has on students' futures as a result of the State Legislature's priority to diversify Hawai'i's economy.
