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Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

I hope you had a wonderful and refreshing summer. During this interim season, I am grateful for the opportunity to continue connecting with our neighbors, attend community events, and continue advancing progress for our schools, keiki, and the future of education in Hawai'i. I remain dedicated to uplifting public education and serving our community. Creating a safe and supportive learning environment for all students continues to be a top priority of mine. That is why I am proud to share that under Act 139, introduced as Senate Bill 1300 which I authored this legislative session, students who qualify for reduced-price meals are now eligible to receive one free breakfast and one free lunch each school day at no cost. This Act benefits approximately 11,000 students who qualified for reduced-price meals last school year by offering free meal options this year. This school year, the Hawai'i State Department of Education is serving up new breakfast and lunch items that blend locally sourced ingredients with global flavors. The fresh dishes balance student favorites with innovative ideas inspired by food trends and student feedback. These efforts align with the Department's farm-to-school initiative and Act 175, which support student health while strengthening local agriculture. Students and families can check their school cafeteria menus for the new menu offerings!

- Mini blueberry pancakes
- · Local 'ulu (breadfruit) banana bread
- Korean beef bowl made with local ground beef

- Local 'uala mash made from scratch or locally sliced sweet potatoes

In community news, a recent proposal before the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has raised serious concerns for Central Oʻahu residents. Blue Hawaiian Helicopters has requested an exemption to lower its minimum flight altitude from 1,500 feet to just 700 feet across parts of Hawaiʻi, including Central Oʻahu. While the company claims these routes are "generally unpopulated," more than 85,000 residents live in Mililani, Waikele, Waipahu, Village Park, Royal Kunia, CORP, and Makakilo, communities that would be directly impacted by helicopters flying low over homes and schools. Although the company cites safety as its justification, residents and community leaders have voiced concerns about increased noise, safety risks, and the lack of public discussion. Thank you to Mililani Neighborhood Board No. 25, Chair Danielle Bass, who brought this issue to the attention of the legislature and community leaders, which allowed us to submit testimony in opposition to the FAA that reflected the strong concerns of the community.






Kaua'i Island WAM Site Visit

It is our kuleana to provide the resources needed to keep this important dialect alive for our keiki and future generations.

Wahiawā Center for Workforce Excellence Groundbreaking

On July 28th, I joined Governor Josh Green, Senator Donovan Dela Cruz, HIDOE Superintendent Keith Hayashi, UH President Wendy Hensel, State Librarian Stacey Aldrich, and other leaders to break ground for the Wahiawā Center for Workforce Excellence. This building will be a visionary 43,000-square-foot facility that will bring together educational services, workforce development and community spaces under one roof. This new hub will include:

- The Wahiawā Public Library, offering modern meeting rooms and flexible learning spaces on the ground floor.
- HIDOE administrative offices to support 20 schools across the Leilehua-Mililani-Waialua Complex with centralized services and training areas.
- UH Community College satellite classrooms on the third floor, including computer labs and a sensory lab designed to integrate with other UH facilities.

Construction begins now and is scheduled to conclude in about two years. It will also include a multi-level parking structure. I look forward to seeing this community resource take shape and benefit generations of learners!

HIDOE Revitalizes Public School Menus to Support Local Farms

As Chair of the Senate Education Committee, I am proud to highlight an important step forward in how the Hawai'i State Department of Education is revitalizing school lunch menus to feature more locally grown and produced foods. The fresh dishes balance student favorites with innovative ideas inspired by food trends and student feedback. With support from legislative funding, through Act 137, sourcing 30% of school food locally by 2030 and 50% by 2050. HIDOE partnered with Kapi'olani Community College's Culinary Institute of the Pacific and the world-renowned Culinary Institute of America to create student-informed menus that reflect the unique tastes of Hawai'i. This initiative not only provides healthier meals for our students, but also strengthens Hawai'i's local farming economy. Students and families can check their school cafeteria menus for the new menu offerings.
