The number of booths the event brought together was one of the most exciting parts because it demonstrated the magnetic power of events for a good cause. Seeing also the displays made by participating students reminded me the passion that Campbell has instilled in these young leaders.

### US Marine Corps. Base Visit March 3, 2025

The US Marine Corps extended an invitation to tour MCBH to commemorate the flying of the Hawaiian flag and to tour the gun range. MCBH is the first base in Hawaii to fly the Hawaiian flag as a result of a resolution proposed last year. Since May of 2024, our state flag has been up out of respect for and as as a reminder of the military's responsibility to our lands. This same flag was presented to me during

my visit. In addition, residents near MCBH have commented on the noise produced by use of the gun range. During the tour, the Marines allowed me to see what they have done to mitigate impact on nearby residents as well as compare it to the Pu'uloa Range Training Facility in Ewa.

## Kākoʻo ʻŌiwi Site Visit March 3, 2025

Currently, our state is struggling to produce enough taro to sustain poi production. Rocky Kaluhiwa, a Hawaiian rights advocate for the East side extended and invitation for us to tour Kāko'o 'Ōiwi where the owners of the land showed us how land can be efficiently used for food production. The people working on Kāko'o 'Ōiwi are some of the most knowledgeable on the island when it comes to growing kalo and using traditional Hawaiian irrigation systems. That's why they should not have offered me a kulolo sampler because you know there was no refusing from me. On top of kalo production, one of the most important things they do is involve students from local schools and from UH in the farming process - providing education to our future farmers. After learning myself how knowledgeable these experts are, it's clear these students are in good hands.

#### MADD Press Conference - February 12, 2025



Alcohol is degenerative to the population of Hawaii and the unfortunate reality is that many continue to suffer because of its accessibility. Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) invited us to a press conference to relay stories regarding the historic damage alcohol has done to our state. Measures to combat alcoholism in this session alone include SB1643, our bill to lower the blood alcohol threshold for driving under the influence and other bills to raise taxes on liquor. Many of our speakers at the conference came out previously to show support for these bills. Any step we can take to deter the purchase and consumption of alcohol is a positive step for everyone in our community.

### - Sign Waving for A'ole Casinos - February 13, 2025

While we are on the topic of harmful substances, we should mention our fight against SB893, which would introduce casinos at the Aloha Stadium district and the Hawaii Convention Center. The message needed to be loud and clear so the tent and the speakers had to come out for this sign waving. A huge mahalo to everyone who showed up to sign wave - the louder the opposition to gambling, the better. Later that afternoon, we were so glad to hear that SB893 was deferred. Gambling is destructive to families, plain and simple. If the new stadium project needs to be funded by the introduction of casinos into our communities, then the project was questionable to begin with. Testifiers made this very clear to our Senators and ultimately, the right decision was made.

It also gave me an excuse to wear my red shirt which never got the chance to be pulled out of the closet yet. Although this is a celebration that happens every year, many people including myself do not know its story and significance which puts this event in the perfect position to educate our decision makers.

This year's Day at the Capitol event was hosted by The Hawai'i State Council on Developmental Disabilities. The event includes discussions with legislators, mock hearings, a Capitol tour, and educational presentations on the legislative process. Ultimately, the goal is to foster the greater understanding necessary to support our people with developmental disabilities. The great folks over at Goodwill Hawaii stopped by my office to speak with me about pressing matters like the availability of universal changing tables in public accommodations. In collaboration with these organizations, we successfully submitted a resolution to address the issue.
