

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Pueo Site Visit

I went on a site visit with scientists and researchers from the UH's Department of Natural Resources & Environmental Management and the state Department of Land & Natural Resources at UH West O'ahu on August 21. The purpose of the visit was to get an update on efforts to research and protect the pueo owl in our state. The good news is that UH has secured \$150,000 to do additional studies on the pueo, including a Navy-led project in Lualualei Valley, Wai'anae and a USDA grant to study the effectiveness of pueo as biocontrol agents. I also plan to reintroduce legislation in 2019 to dedicate state funding for pueo breeding and foraging studies.

Tour of UH West O'ahu Allied Health & Administrative Building

I went on a tour of the UH West O'ahu Allied Health Building on August 31. A Groundbreaking Ceremony for the facility was held November 28, 2016. The building will house programs such as allied health, community health, health information management, long-term care, and biology.

The 43,000-square foot building will contain administrative offices, faculty offices, classrooms, and lab spaces. It will be the sixth building on the campus. About eight new faculty members will be hired to teach the Allied Health concentrations, which include community health, health information management, and occupational therapy.

Students will also take classes to complete public administration degrees with concentrations in justice, healthcare, and disaster preparedness and emergency management. The State Legislature appropriated \$36.7 million for the project and the building is scheduled to open October 27 for the administration and Spring 2019 for students.

National Drive Electric Week

I participated in an interview for Hawai'i News Now's Lifestyle Program for National Drive Electric Week at HECO's Fast Electric Charging Station next to Ruby Tuesday's at Kapolei Commons on August 27. National Drive Week will be September 8-16 and is a nationwide celebration to heighten awareness of today's widespread availability of plug-in vehicles and highlight the benefits of all-electric and plug-in hybrid-electric cars, trucks, and motorcycles.

As background, I served as the Chair of the Senate's Energy and Environment Committee from 2009 to 2015. During this time, we were ramping up our efforts to switch to a clean energy economy. So in April 2011, I purchased an all-electric Nissan Leaf because I thought it made sense for the ENE Chair to "walk the talk."

Just a year later in 2012, there were 751 electric vehicles in our state. However, I'm pleased to say that we continue to make progress and as of July 2018, there are 7,497 EVs and close to 600 EV charging stations across the state. That makes us 4th in the country behind California, Washington, and Oregon in per capita EV ownership.

And, BTW, my Leaf has 80K miles and runs like a charm. Though if my kids bought me a Tesla Model X, or even better a Porsche Taycan, I'd gladly add their names back to my last will and testament. Just sayin'!

Screening of "Junk Raft" Documentary

I presented an Honorary Certificate to Marcus Eriksen at the screening of his new documentary "Junk Raft" at the Royal Hawaiian Resort on August 29. Marcus is respected as a scientist, researcher, environmentalist, sailor, writer, artist, and advocate. He is perhaps best known for constructing a boat called JUNK entirely out of single-use plastic bottles and sailing it 2,600 miles across the Pacific in an effort to save our seas from plastic pollution. In 2000, Dr. Eriksen traveled to Midway Atoll and saw first-hand the devastating impact of plastics on the Laysan Albatross. He received his Ph.D. in Science Education from the University of Southern California in 2003 and shortly afterwards took a 2,000-mile, 5-month journey down the Mississippi River on a homemade raft of plastic bottles. In 2007, Dr. Eriksen published My River Home, which chronicled his Mississippi River experience paralleled with his deployment as a Marine in the 1991 Gulf War. His second book, titled JUNK RAFT: An oceanic voyage and the rising tide of activism to fight plastic pollution, was published in 2017. It tells the story of how plastic pollution at sea was discovered, the impact on people and the planet, and the growing movement to solve the problem through zero waste initiatives in the largest cities worldwide. Dr. Eriksen is the Research Director and cofounder of the 5 Gyres Institute, the organization he cofounded with his wife Anna Cummins. 5 Gyres is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization in special consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council since 2017. Their mission is to empower action against the global health crisis of plastic pollution through science, education, and adventure. Mahalo nui loa to Marcus for teaching the world how we can save our seas and ourselves.

Honoring Samoan Flag Day

I presented an Honorary Certificate at the Annual Samoan Flag Day Celebration at Keehi Lagoon Beach Park on August 18. This event honors the Samoan culture through community gatherings and traditional cultural activities. Samoan Flag Day commemorates the first raising of the American Flag in American Samoa. This year's celebration was organized by Moemoe o Faiga Nu'u A Tamali'i ma Failauga o Samoa I Hawaii Nei, an organization focused on the enrichment of the Samoan culture. The vision of this organization is to provide a supportive, inclusive community for Samoans to celebrate their heritage and to educate the public about the Samoan culture, while promoting peace and harmony not only among Samoans, but with other cultures as well. The theme of this year's Samoan Flag Day was "O le tele o lima e mama ai se avega," which translates as "helping hands will ease the burden." The Fa'a-Samoa is a guideline for every Samoan on how to lead their lives by embracing their culture and environment. An integral part of this practice is family and community coming together to pitch in and to be of service to one another, hence, "o le tele o lima e mama ai se avega."
