2024 Legislative Summary

Affordable Housing

- \$25M to deposit into the Rental Housing Revolving Fund
- \$10.5M for Public Housing repair and maintenance
- \$1.5M State Rent Supplement Program

Maui Wildfire Recovery

- \$297M for expenses related to non-congregate sheltering (Red Cross) & Kala'iaola) and \$65M for One Ohana fund (SB582)
- \$200M State Risk Management Revolving Fund (Insurance claims)
- \$186.2M deposit to the Major Disaster Fund

Lifelong Learning

- \$3.7M for Hawaii Promise for Community Colleges
- \$2.48M for Workforce readiness programs
- \$1.3M for Hawaii Keiki Healthy and Ready to Learn Health Technicians
- Funding to expand health care workforce development programs in public high school health care workforce certificate program and glidepath program for certified nurse aides (HB1827)

Supporting Children and Kupuna

- \$5.75M in state match and \$9.78M in federal ceiling for increased reimbursement rates for community residential and adult day care programs.
- \$1M for youth mental health services
- \$250,000 for a Silver Alert Program (SB2305)
- Increase in state supplement payments for care homes (HB2216)
- Increase in monthly allowance needs (HB1974)
- Establishes 1 Long Term Care Planner to develop a comprehensive longterm care plan for the Executive Office of Aging (HB2224)

Tax Relief for Families

Increases standard deduction amounts and widens income tax brackets for specific taxable years. As minimum wage increases, working families may be pushed into higher tax brackets unless these rates are adjusted (HB2404)

Community Services

- \$15.5M for Medicaid Home and Community Based Service contract increases
- \$3M mobile treatment clinics
- \$450K for an Immigration and Services Access Unit (SB2787)
- \$400K for menstrual products and dispensers in state buildings

Illegal Fireworks

- \$1.27M for Illegal Fireworks Task Force within the Department of Law Enforcement to stop the importation of illegal fireworks into the state.
- Authorizes law enforcement to safely inspect and dispose any stolen/ fireworks according to Fireworks Control Law (HB2193)
