Actions by the Trump administration continue to threaten our community and economy by imposing tariffs, stripping federal funding for non-profits, and eliminating key federal positions. To protect us from the negative impact of these actions, the State legislature is working to fill in funding gaps and incorporate federal employees laid off into vacant state positions.

Community Updates

Pālolo for Peace

After a troubling shooting in Pālolo, the Pālolo for Peace event brought together community members for an afternoon of unity and empowerment. Rep. Sayama emphasized the strength of Pālolo's spirit, encouraging residents to continue fostering a safe and supportive neighborhood through collective action and understanding. His message resonated with attendees, reminding them that peace begins with a united community.

HB168 Paid Family Leave

House Bill 168, which aimed to establish a paid family leave program, passed its first reading but did not advance further this session. While the bill stalled, Rep. Sayama remains committed to supporting this important initiative and will continue to work on it during the interim. Supporting Hawai'i's workers in balancing family care and financial stability remains a priority, with ongoing efforts to strengthen the bill for next session.

Keiki O Ka 'Aina Read Aloud

Rep. Sayama recently visited Keiki O Ka 'Aina in Pālolo for a fun and engaging preschool read-aloud, bringing the story, "Rosie Revere, Engineer" to life and sparking excitement for reading. His visit highlights the importance of investing in education from a young age and supporting programs that nurture Hawai'i's future generations. Safe to say, the kids had a blast—and so did Rep.!

Rallying for Community Non-Profits

Although the federal freeze on grants was determined unlawful, community organizations may still lose federal funding. These organizations, like Aloha Harvest, Pālolo Chinese Home, & Maunalani Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, provide essential services — fighting food insecurity, caring for our kupuna, and strengthening community wellness. While the State looks to support non-profits with additional grants, I encourage everyone to get involved and provide a helping hand. Here, we highlight three great organizations, but there are so many others you can help with!



Aloha Harvest

Based in Kaimukī, Aloha Harvest rescues quality excess food and delivers them free of charge to non-profits feeding those in need. During COVID-19, they provided much needed meals to struggling families. Last year, Aloha Harvest redistributed 3 million pounds of good food that would have been thrown out. Pālolo Chinese Home

For over a century, Pālolo Chinese Home has provided quality care for Hawaii's seniors through residential, day care, and rehabilitation programs. In 2024, they received \$1.2 million from the U.S. Dept. of Housing & Urban Development— but with federal cuts looming, their ability to serve our kupuna is at risk.
