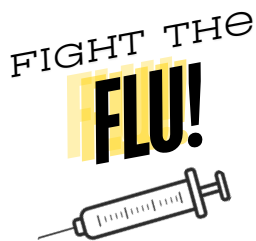

CONDO CORNER



Hurricane Insurance for Condominium Associations

Is your condominium association having a difficult time getting hurricane insurance?

Act 296 reactivates the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund (HHRF) to provide insurance coverage in scenarios where the private market fails to do so.

The HHRF is now accepting applications from condominium associations seeking to obtain hurricane commercial property insurance coverage. To be eligible, an association must: (1) have been previously denied hurricane coverage by at least two state licensed insurance companies operating in Hawaii and (2) have buildings with a total insured value exceeding \$10 million.

Cerebral Palsy Research Needs Your Help!

The United Cerebral Palsy Association of Hawai'i is extremely proud to announce that, after nine months of intense research, we have launched what we hope will be a groundbreaking and comprehensive study of the impact of aging with cerebral palsy! We need your help!

Our goal is simple: gather the most complete and meaningful data possible to improve the lives of people living with cerebral palsy. The information will be gathered, analyzed and sent to all of you, organizations that assist people with disabilities, and because this is a national survey, all state Department of Health agencies. It is our goal to join with our community to find the best resources for people with cerebral palsy while addressing the most cost-effective ways of helping. Here are some of our findings:

- Cerebral Palsy Is Not Just a Childhood Disorder—it has been reported that there are more adults with cerebral palsy than children!
- While the damage that causes cerebral palsy is not progressive, adults with cerebral palsy often face a significant increase in spasticity, ataxia, athetosis, pain, social isolation, depression, anxiety, and more.
- There is also a large gap in healthcare for adults with cerebral palsy and a high financial cost to society for that care.
