#### **MOVING OUR COMMUNITY FORWARD**



#### \$570 Million For Affordable Rentals

As a lifelong resident of Kalihi, I understand how expensive it is for young people to live in our community. The average one bedroom rental on Oahu now costs almost \$2,000 per month, making it difficult to live in our beloved Hawaii and prosper. I am often asked questions about our high cost of living and its effects on our day to day lives.

We need to seriously address this housing crisis, and a much serious appropriation was needed. This year we have injected \$200 million of general funds into the rental assistance revolving fund, while also offering an additional \$370 million in tax credits for the building of affordable rentals. It is estimated that we will create over 25,000 new units with this appropriation! It is my hope that this project will enable more people of my generation to continue living near their families.

Also included in House Bill 2748 is \$10 million to the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, which will be used to help upgrade the infrastructure needed for these additional units, and \$50,000 to prepare an assessment of housing needs for persons with access and functional needs.

### **UH Promise Program**

Alleviates some of the burden of finishing college with a large amount of student loan debt by providing scholarships for the unmet direct cost needs of qualified students enrolled at any community college campus of the University of Hawaii system. House Bill 2501 also appropriates \$700,000 to establish and implement this program for the upcoming year.





#### Law Enforcement Standards Board

Hawaii was the last state in the nation to have any state-level regulation of police and only one of a handful of states that does not establish standards to be a police officer. HB2071 creates state-level standards to be governed by the Law Enforcement Standards Board which is made up of government officials, law enforcement officers, and members of the public.

### Ban on Modified Firearms

In the wake of the numerous mass shootings across the country, we have tightened up our already very strict gun control laws. The intent of Senate Bill 2046 is to prohibit trigger modification devices, including bump stocks, that are designed or function to accelerate the rate of fire of a semiautomatic firearm.

## Opioid Warning Label Requirement

Misuse of prescription opioid pain relievers has been sweeping the nation with drug overdoses claiming more lives in 2016 than motor vehicle accidents or gun violence, making it the deadliest drug crisis in US history. This measure would require a health care professional or pharmacist who dispenses any opioid drug to include a specific warning label on the package.



### Ohana Zones - \$30 Million

In an effort to restore public order and help the less fortunate, the legislature appropriated \$30 million to create Ohana Zones, which are essentially tent encampments for the homeless on public lands. In these zones the homeless will have access to basic sanitation, social workers, and a safe place to sleep. In the long run this will save us money due to reduced usage of emergency services, fewer sweeps, and less garbage/hazardous material cleanup.



#### **Death With Dignity**

Allows qualified, mentally competent, terminally ill residents of Hawaii with less than 6 months to live to obtain a prescription medication that will end their life. This was one of the more controversial bills of the session, with excellent arguments made by both sides.
