As a member of the Women's Legislative Caucus, I co-sponsored a bill to address the backlog of untested sexual assault evidence kits, known as "rape kits" across our State. We are working with law enforcement to test more of these kits in order to bring closure to victims, solve cold cases and ultimately, make our communities safer.

## **State Legislature Approves CARE Act**



Rep. Ichiyama and other elected officials collected food for Lanakila Meals on Wheels, a program that delivers nutritious meals to our kupuna in need.

On May 3, 2016, the Legislature unanimously approved **HB 2252**. Also known as the **CARE Act, HB 2252** was introduced to protect our growing kupuna population by supporting and ensuring that all patients and caregivers are participants in the hospital discharge planning process. Specifically, this bill requires hospitals to provide a patient's designated caretaker with education and instructions on caring for the patient once he or she returns home. Allowing patients and their caregivers to participate in the discharge planning process will make the transition smoother from the hospital to the home.

Representative Ichiyama received an overwhelming amount of testimony in support of this measure from constituents. AARP and other agencies also expressed strong support for **HB 2252**. Previously, hospitals, not the patients, decided whether to involve a caregiver in the discharge process. Representative Ichiyama recognized that a growing population will likely rely on their families and friends as caregivers. This measure is a positive step forward in providing our kupuna the quality care they deserve.

# 2016 End of Ses

#### The State Budget

**HB1700 HD1 SD1 CD1** The state budget bill, which appropriates funds for operating and capital improvement costs of the Executive Branch for the supplemental year of the current biennium will now go to Governor David Ige for his signature. The bill appropriates approximately \$13.7 billion in general funds for FY2017, including more than \$1.1 billion for capital improvement projects (CIP) funded by general obligation bonds and approximately \$2.5 billion for CIPs funded by all other means of financing.

#### **Affordable Housing and Homelessness**

**SB2561 SD2 HD1 CD1** Establishes a goal of developing or starting the development of at least 22,500 affordable rental housing units ready for occupancy between Jan. 1, 2017 and Dec. 31, 2026. Establishes a temporary special action team on rental housing to make recommendations to the Governor, Legislature, and other parties to achieve this goal.

**SB2560 SD2 HD1 CD1** Appropriates \$500,000 for the Department of Health to provide treatment and care for homeless individuals with serious and persistent mental health challenges to enable them to reside in a permanent dwelling or homeless facility.

#### **Education**

**SB3126 SD2 HD2 CD1** Provides \$100 million for air conditioning, heat abatement and related energy efficiency measures at public schools. Aliamanu Elementary School and Aliamanu Middle School are on the priority list for heat abatement projects.

#### **Environment and Invasive Species**

**HB2646 HD2 SD2 CD1** Creates a permanent fuel tank advisory committee to study, monitor, and address fuel tank leak issues, including the Red Hill Fuel Tanks.

# sion Highlights



Rep. Ichiyama met with local high school students regarding a bill to prohibit smoking in cars with a minor present.

**HB1050 SD2 CD1** Mandates the Department of Agriculture to perform specified tasks to address the interisland spread of invasive species.

#### **Public Safety**

**HB1907 HD2 SD2 CD1** Requires all law enforcement agencies and departments charged with storage and preservation of sexual assault evidence collection kits to conduct an inventory of all kits and report to the Attorney General. Requires the Attorney General to report to the Legislature on the number of untested sexual assault evidence collection kits being stored and plans and procedures for the disposition of new and untested kits. Appropriates funds for testing of at least 500 kits.

#### Labor

**HB2605 HD1 SD2 CD1** Appropriates funds to support job training and supportive services for individuals who are unemployed due to the closure of Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company and the Makena Beach and Golf Resort on Maui.

#### Health

**SB2557 SD2 HD1 CD1** Implements the concussion monitoring and education program for school athletics to administer concussion testing to high school student athletes, and implement a concussion awareness program for school athletics.

#### Kupuna

**HB1878 HD1 SD2 CD1** Appropriates \$1.7 million for Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs) and \$32,000 for fall prevention and early detection services for the elderly. Requires the Executive Office on Aging to submit reports to the Legislature on its development of a system of evaluation to determine the effectiveness of the ADRCs in each county.

#### Agriculture

**HB1689 HD2 SD2 CD1** Establishes an organic foods production tax credit, making Hawaii one of the first states in the nation to do so, applicable to taxable years beginning after Dec. 31, 2016.

#### Energy

**HB2569 HD2 SD1 CD1** Requires the Department of Education to establish a goal of becoming net-zero with respect to energy use by Jan. 1, 2035, and to expedite the cooling of all public school classrooms.

#### **Military and Veterans Affairs**

**HB2489 SD1 CD1** Appropriates funds for the establishment of a veterans services counselor IV position within the Office of Veterans' Services to assist all veterans, with a primary focus on female veterans and for the Vietnam veterans 50th anniversary commemoration.



Rep. Ichiyama and Chair Choy turned in the signed committee report to Ross Miyasato at 11 p.m. for HB2772 HD1 SD2 CD1, which requires the University of Hawaii to implement training for all students on sexual assault and provides resources to make all campuses safer for students and staff.
