## FY 2025 Hawai'i State Budget

Despite substantial costs related to the Maui wildfires and COVID hazard pay, this budget expands programs in mental health care, education, and land management while providing historic tax relief to low and middle income families.



- \$447,159,926 for ongoing wildfire relief, recovery, and prevention
- \$365,000,000 for COVID era hazard pay for qualified public employees
- \$362,000,000 for costs related food, housing, and assistance for Maui
- \$ 25,000,000 into Rental Housing Revolving fund
- \$ 21,000,000 for Summer Learning hubs
- \$ 19,780,660 for the biosecurity program to fight invasive species
- \$ 18,266,346 for Department of Education bus contracts
  - \$ 18,000,000 for Department of Education food services
  - \$ 18,000,000 for Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division
- \$ 10,000,000 for fire and emergency response equipment

# 2024 Hawai'i State Legislative Session: Bills

#### **DISASTER PREPAREDNESS**

# **(SB2143)** RELATING TO INVESTMENTS IN WILDFIRE PREVENTION

Wildfires pose a significant threat to Hawai'i's communities, with potential consequences ranging from habitat destruction to water quality degradation. This bill aims to bolster funding for the state's wildfire management branch, enabling support for nonprofit organizations specializing in wildfire preparedness and mitigation, thereby safeguarding the unique biodiversity of Hawai'i's landscapes.

#### (SB2284) RELATING TO A WILDFIRE FORECAST SYSTEM FOR HAWAI'I

Recognizing the increasing threat of wildfires in Hawai'i, this bill proposes a proactive approach. It mandates the University of Hawai'i to establish a two-year program aimed at developing a wildfire forecast system using artificial intelligence. This system will play a crucial role in enhancing public safety and preparedness by providing accurate forecasts of statewide wildfire risks.

#### (SB582) RELATING TO WILDFIRE RESPONSE AND RECOVERY

Appropriates \$297 million to costs related to assisting displaced Maui resident with housing, food, and other items. Appropriates \$65 million to the One 'Ohana Fund to compensate victims of the Maui wildfires, who waive the right to sue for damages related to physical injury or death caused by the wildfires. The One 'Ohana Fund, established under the Governor, is a alternative means for families impacted by the wildfire to seek financial compensation without having to exhaust their time and money in lawsuits.

#### (HB2742) RELATING TO A WILDFIRE EVICTION MORATORIUM

Amends the Landlord Tenant Code to strengthen mediation procedures for eviction of a tenant. Modeled off of COVID era emergency proclamation, this bill ensures renters having difficulty paying rent are not at risk of becoming homeless and have a right to mediation procedures.

#### (SB2085) RELATING TO THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL

Hawai'i is the only state without a fire marshal's office. A fire marshal will provide an integral role in coordinating fire prevention between local agencies. By creating a permanent division of the state fire marshal within the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, we hope to ensure public safety from catastrophic events.

## TAX RELIEF

#### (SB1035) RELATING TO GET EXEMPTION

Creates a General Excise Tax exemption of health care goods and services provided by medical and dental practitioners to patients who receive Medicaid, Medicare, or TRICARE benefits. This bill will ease the fiscal burden on doctors and dentists while also ensuring health care access to the lowest income families and Kūpuna.

# (HB2404) RELATING TO INCOME TAX & STANDARD DEDUCTION

In addition to doubling the standard deduction this bill also adjusts the income tax brackets, providing tax payers with an estimated \$5 billion tax break over 6 years. These adjustments will ensure that increases to minimum wage will enable workers to keep their new earnings. An average Hawai'i family of four with a household income of \$88,000 will see their taxes owed fall from \$5,086 to \$1,473—increasing their income increase by \$3,613 by 2031.

## **HEALTH & EDUCATION**

#### (SB2476) RELATING TO SCHOOL DENTAL HYGIENISTS

To support oral health in our students, this bill authorizes licensed dental hygienists to perform dental care in a DOE school-based oral health program. By taking proactive steps to strengthen school-based oral health programs, we can help ensure all keiki are healthy and ready to learn.

#### (SB2257) RELATING TO TEACHER QUALIFICATION

To address teacher shortage, this bill authorizes the Hawai'i Teacher Standards Board to add certain qualified individuals with a high school diploma and other attributes of education, coursework, industry experience, and content expertise to the list of individuals who can teach career and technical education courses.

#### (SB2475) RELATING TO EARLY LEARNING

The bill establishes a Harm to Students Registry for all early learning programs, schools, and K-12 educational institutions within the State. The registry will contain information on school employees, contractors, or volunteers for whom a final finding has been issued as a result of an investigation, indicating that the individual has inflicted harm on a student. The Department of Education, charter schools, private schools, and early learning entities are prohibited from considering for employment any person listed on the Harm to Students Registry.

#### (SB2305) RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS

Introducing measures to safeguard older adults and individuals with cognitive or developmental challenges who may go missing, by establishing a 'Silver Alert' system, similar to the Amber Alert used for missing children. Law enforcement can promptly issue this alert when a vulnerable person disappears, aiding in their swift location. Additionally, this bill incorporates provisions to uphold the privacy and dignity of the missing individual.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

#### (SB2133) RELATING TO HOUSING

This bill addresses the need for infrastructure development in affordable housing and regional state projects in Hawai'i. By allowing the Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation to utilize bonds for construction purposes, including roads and sewer systems, it ensures vital community improvements. Moreover, by exempting these bonds from most taxes, this bill encourages investment in essential infrastructure projects, fostering community development and supporting affordable housing initiatives.

#### (HB1832) RELATING TO HIRING

This bill allows state departments to conduct their own applicant qualification reviews for vacant positions, rather than relying solely on the Department of Human Resources Development. By streamlining the hiring process, it aims to reduce delays and ensure qualified candidates are not lost to other opportunities while awaiting a response.

#### (HB2298) RELATING TO COFFEE LABELING

The objective of this bill is to protect consumers by verifying that coffee labeled with specific geographic origins such as "Kona" or "Kaua'i" actually contains a substantial proportion of coffee sourced from those regions. It establishes incremental criteria for the minimum percentage of coffee from the declared origin and includes exemptions for retailers who do not package coffee, shielding them from liability if the labeling fails to meet these standards.

## (HB2619) RELATING TO BIOSECURITY

Appropriates \$19,780,660 to the Department of Agriculture to lead and coordinate the State's invasive pest control and eradication biosecurity efforts; identify best practices for the treatment of certain pests; post certain information on its website; and document certain GIS database information. Appropriates another \$50,000 to counties for feral chicken control programs.

## HOUSING

#### (HB1838) RELATING TO ZONING

With recent legal concerns arising, there's a need to rethink how short-term rentals are managed. This bill aims to empower counties to decide where these rentals can operate, while also ensuring fair taxes from shelters and similar accommodations. The ultimate goal is to better regulate these lodgings and support local communities.

### (SB2726) RELATING TO CONDOMINIUMS

Condos can sometimes be a headache for residents, with disputes over management, documents, and more. This bill aims to tackle these issues by looking at how other states handle them. It proposes studying solutions like having a dedicated person to resolve disputes and ensuring condo managers are properly licensed.

#### (SB2919) RELATING TO PROPERTY

This bill aims to tackle the challenges around shortterm rentals and zoning rules in our neighborhoods. By giving counties more control over how land and buildings are used, it helps protect the character of our communities while respecting local decisionmaking. It also ensures that certain temporary housing options are included in tax laws, which could help fund important local projects and services.

#### (SB2836) RELATING TO MAUI'S PERMANENT HOUSING RECOVERY

This bill establishes a comprehensive framework within the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) to coordinate Maui's permanent housing recovery efforts. It designates the Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation to lead the Interagency Council for Maui Housing Recovery, ensuring efficient collaboration among state and county agencies to address housing needs on the island, with a particular focus on disaster recovery from
