2021 LEGISLATIVE SESSION NEWSLETTER

The State Budget Bill passed this legislative session allocated \$14.926 billion in general funds, \$1.352 billion in Federal funds, & \$31.17billion through all methods of funding for operating & capital improvements for FY22-23.

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2021 LEGISLATION HIGHLIGHTS

Out of the 2820 bills that were introduced this session, about 265 measures passed & are on the way to the Governor for signature into law.

In addition, 845 resolutions were introduced on a variety of issues, out of which 266 were adopted. Some of the bills and resolutions that passed that I believe will be of interest to constituents of District 22 include:

<i>HB72</i>	Establishes a framework for the regulation of electric foot scooters
<i>HB766</i>	Appropriates funds to establish the photo red light imaging detector systems pilot program.
<i>HB601</i>	Amends the statewide traffic code to allow for the county chiefs of police to designate county employees to issue citations for traffic violations.
SB791	Authorizes removal of abandoned vessels within 72 hours at the owner's expense & makes abandonment a petty misdemeanor.
<i>HB490</i>	Crimes Against Seniors - enhanced penalties for crimes against seniors
HB1283	Provides for dementia training to first responders.
HB599	Clarifies that condo associations may conduct electronic meetings & electronic or mail voting during a state of emergency.
SB329	Authorizes the condo association board to dispose of abandoned property 30 days after notifying the owner; or to dispose immediately if owner is unknown.
<i>SB793</i>	Repeals sub-minimum wage requirements for disabled workers.
<i>SB1350</i>	Defers salary increases for executive, legislative & judicial branch officials.
HB286	Authorizes the Department of Taxation to require real estate investment trusts to annually report assets & revenues generated.
HB282	Clarifies the definition of "provider" to increase access to emergency shelters for unaccompanied minors
HR6	Requesting the Legislative Reference Bureau & John A Burns School of Medicine & DoH to conduct a study on the health effects of persistent urban noise in Honolulu
HCR45	Urges the US Congress to grant additional authority to the FCC to stop unwanted & illegal robocalls

BE PREPARED!

Hurricane season in Hawai'i (June 1 - November 30) has started

BEFORE

- **Board up windows.** Tape DOES NOT prevent windows from breaking.
- Trim trees & shrubs around your home & secure outdoor furniture & loose objects.
- Clear rain gutters & downspouts.
- Turn off utilities if instructed to do so. Turn the refrigerator thermostat to its coldest setting and keep its doors closed.
- Avoid using the phone, except for serious emergencies. Consider texting.
- Ensure a supply of water for sanitary purposes.
- Prepare to evacuate when directed to by local authorities. You will need to take your kit* with you, shelters do not provide any supplies, food, or water.

HOME SURVIVAL KIT:

- Portable radio, flashlights, & batteries
- First Aid kit
- Minimum 14-day supply of medications
- 5-7 day supply of non-perishable foods
- Hibachi or camping stove with fuel & matches
- Manual can opener
- Ice chest & ice/frozen ice packs
- Disposable plates & kitchen utensils
- Water one (1) gallon per person, per day

• Extra pet food

DURING

- **Stay indoors** away from windows, skylights and glass doors.
- Secure & brace exterior doors.
- Close interior doors & take refuge in a small interior <u>safe room</u>, like a closet or hallway, on the lowest level of your home.
- The eye of the hurricane is deceptively calm and almost free of clouds with light winds and warm temperatures. Do not go outdoors while the eye is passing; the full intensity of the storm will reoccur in minutes.
- Monitor your NOAA Weather Radio & local radio stations for emergency information/updates.

AFTER

- **Continuously monitor TV** (if working) & radio for instructions.
- Authorities will announce when it is safe to go outside and/or to return to your home.
- When assessing damage, take photos to document for insurance purposes.
- Be aware of hazards, i.e. down power lines, broken gas lines, contaminated water, weakened structures, broken glass, etc.

Stay Calm Stay Alert Stay Informed

EVACUATION KIT:

- Sleeping bag or blankets/bedding
- Important papers & documents (insurance/mortgage papers in a waterproof bag or on a USB flash drive)
- Infant necessities
- Personal toiletries
- Snacks & water
