LEGISLATIVE UPDATE



- House Bill 2802 HD1, safeguarding marriage equality, passes its third reading in the House of Representatives! It is now headed to the Hawai'i Senate for consideration.
- Hawai'i has officially become a trauma-informed state, committing to values like safety, trust, and empowerment in both state workplaces and services.
- The district survey has yielded the following results: 54% of respondents are in favor of marijuana legalization, 38% are in disagreement, and 7% are unsure, with a total of 607 responses. The top three ranked issues identified by respondents were homelessness/mental healthcare, crime, and affordable housing.

LEG CORNER

Every month we will be giving you a view into how and what we do at the Capitol to make your voice be heard and pass laws that enhance the lives of our constituents. This month we will focus on:

The Executive Budget

Crafting the Executive budget involves multiple entities.

The **Council on Revenues** plays a crucial role by preparing revenue estimates four times annually, aiding fiscal forecasting.

The **Governor**, through the Department of Budget & Finance, initiates the "budget bill" in collaboration with Executive departments.

The **Legislature** receives the Governor's draft budget, amending and ratifying it using legislative procedures, involving multiple voting stages and potential gubernatorial vetoes.

Senate Ways and Means (WAM) and **House Finance (FIN)** serve as the pivotal "money committees," generating and managing numerous reports, estimates, and calculations. They conduct informational briefings, receiving input from Executive departments, agencies, and leadership.

Additionally, the committees collaborate with the **Department of Taxation** and prepare amended versions of bills, along with budget worksheets. Public engagement remains essential, influencing budget deliberations through advocacy and testimony on various topics.







Join us for the 15th Annual Art at the Capitol event, themed "Ao & Pō," exploring Hawaiian culture and the Capitol building's juxtapositions. The collaboration with the State Foundation Culture and the Arts and Hawaii State Art Museum supports public access to art and many state supported arts organizations.

You can look forward to a poetry reading by Brandy Nālani McDougall, music by Honolulu Youth Symphony, perfomances by Ballet Hawai'i, films from Hawai'i International Film Festival, and a Meet & Greet with Hawai'i Contemporary artists, light refreshments and much much more!

 The official State motto, Ua Mau ke Ea o ka 'Āina i ka Pono, is written at the bottom of the State seal. It means The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness.

- There are **twelve letters in the Hawaiian language** five vowels and seven consonants. The 'okina mark (similar to an apostrophe) and kahako mark (line above a vowel) are used to clarify pronunciation.

CONDO CORNER

All condominiums associations are governed by two primary documents: the Declaration and the Bylaws. Some condominiums also have House Rules. It is important to read these documents and understand what they contain as they govern the ownership and use of your unit.

The **Declaration** is the legal document which creates a condominium. It includes legal descriptions of the condominium and each individual unit and describes the allowable use of the units and the common areas.

The **Bylaws** establish how a condominium is governed. They address elections, meetings, budgeting, and insurance requirements.

The **House Rules** govern day-to-day condominium living. They may establish quiet hours and rules for guest parking and set fines for rule violations.
