PROPOSED ARMY CUTBACKS IN WAHIAWA

There have been recent reports of the proposed cutbacks to Army personnel in Hawaii, specifically at Fort Shafter and Schofield. The Army, along with other government entities, faces challenges in adhering to savings required by the Budget Control Act of 2011, and troop reduction is a consideration in meeting the savings required by the Act. As a result, Fort Shafter and Schofield are two of the 30 Army installations nationwide targeted for reduction.

The potential combined reduction of 19,800 Army personnel from both installations could result in a significant socioeconomic impact to Hawaii as the military is the second significant impact on our economy after tourism. The Army's presence at Schofield definitely impacts the economy of Wahiawa as the community has depended on the Army for economic stability especially after the demise of the plantations. Further, the Army has partnered with the community on many community projects and especially at our public schools where they provide academic help through tutoring and mentoring.

Troop reduction continues to be an issue as long as budget shortfalls need to be addressed. We need to recognize that Schofield, as a major Army installation in Hawaii, will potentially continue to be targeted for troop reduction because of the numbers there. This is why we need to diversify the economy to allow us to sustain our economy so we are not significantly impacted by reduction in military personnel or as happened with the plantations.

Projects we are currently working on will help us to maintain economic stability. The Whitmore Project, which will create an agricultural hub in Central Oahu; the Pacific Center on Aging, which will focus on research and development of products for geriatric care; and the First Responders Technology Campus, which will provide headquarters, training facilities and a data center for several state and county agencies.
