


On July 6, 2011, Governor Abercrombie began the process for recognition of Native Hawaiians.

Kalaeloa Photovoltaic Park Proposed





Texas-based Hunt Development wants to put a 5.91 MW photovoltaic park at the runway intersection of Ewa Field in Kalaeloa. The solar project will be placed on part of the 499 acres Hunt leases in the area. The site is part of the historic Marine Corps airfield that was attacked by Japanese air forces on the morning of December 7, 1941.
