The Battle of Iwo Jima was a major battle in which the United States Armed Forces landed and eventually captured the Island of Iwo Jima from the Japanese Imperial Army during World War II. This five-week battle comprised some of the fiercest and bloodiest fighting of the War in the Pacific of that time period. The battle was immortalized by Joe Rosenthal's photograph of the raising of the U.S. flag (top left photo) on Mount Suribachi by five U.S. Marines and one U.S. Navy battlefield Hospital Corpsman. This took place on the fifth day of the 35-day battle. Senator Kahele had the privilege of attending the Reunion of Honor Commemoration on Iwo Jima on March 21, 2015. As a former marine, it was his way to pay homage to the many American and Japanese soldiers who were in this ferocious battle.
