Waipahu High School's science department chair **Michael Sana** has worked hard over the years to find opportunities to nurture and grow science talent among his students. This past summer, Michael secured funding so that WHS could stage its very first Science Scholars Program Symposium in collaboration with Rutgers University. Forty juniors and seniors participated in the five-week program. Their project was to take a look at the protein and genetic

makeup of Duckweed – a plant found in Wahiawa's Lake Wilson – for potential uses in medicine and for other scientific purposes. The students used distance learning tools to send their findings to Rutgers researchers and received instant feedback on their work.

Waipahu High was the only Hawaii school to participate in the national program, but Michael wants to get other island schools involved. WHS has excelled at the State's annual science and engineering fairs thanks to outstanding teachers who encourage their students to challenge themselves and develop technology and laboratory skills for potential careers in science. *Congratulations*!

State offers low-interest solar energy loans

The Legislature in 2014 established a program to help residents install renewable energy producing equipment at their homes with low-interest loans from the state. The Hawaii Energy Office has announced that loan applications are now being accepted from residents seeking to finance solar photovoltaic systems under the state's Green Energy Market Securitization (GEMS) program. GEMS is aimed at consumers who want to install PV systems, but cannot afford the high upfront costs or do not qualify for traditional financing. Twenty-year fixed-rate loans are available for the purchase of a PV system installed at a single-family residence within the service areas of the Hawaiian Electric Companies.
