Aloha, friends and neighbors:

As I conclude the fourth session of my first term as your Senator, I want to express my deepest gratitude for allowing me to serve you in the Hawaii State Legislature. Over the course of these four years, I have advocated for development of successful strategies to cope with a slumping economy, brought on here in Hawaii by factors beyond our shores and beyond our control.

In the past year, we have seen some signs of economic vitality begin to emerge, especially in the visitor industry. Yet to fully recover, however, is the construction industry, where unemployment remains at unacceptably high levels. As Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, I led the Senate's focused approach to programs that would accelerate and diversify our recovery by funding work on the tremendous backlog of repair and maintenance projects at public facilities that have been put aside for too long.

By session's end, with collaboration from our colleagues in the House, we were able to include more than \$400 million in construction work. Getting people off the bench and onto contractor and subcontractor payrolls means dollars flowing back into our economy...and that's good for everyone. Our allocations were for repair and maintenance projects that were requested by the State departments who were able to determine their own priorities. They include:

\$136 million for our public elementary, middle and high schools statewide

\$49.2 million for state health facilities, including the State Hospital in Kaneohe and the several hospitals operated by the State Healthcare System

\$70 million for the University of Hawaii's four-year campuses; \$12.5 million for UH Manoa Athletics; and another \$20 million for the UH Community Colleges

\$60 million for State public housing projects statewide

Elsewhere in this newsletter you'll find information about other legislation we've passed to support our schools, improve our roads, and protect our environment. We have funded increased availability of emergency ambulance service in our region, and supported additional emergency health care resources at Wahiawa General Hospital. To promote agriculture, the budget includes \$1 million in improvements to the Kunia Agricultural Park, and development of an agriculture processing and packing plant at the former Dole facilities near Whitmore Village. That includes \$3.6 million to purchase the land as well as to upgrade infrastructure to support the facility. Another \$2.5 million was included for the upgrade of the Waiahole water system which is used by our Mililani and Kunia farmers.

Our needs are many, and our resources are not without limits. We have, in my assessment, done a good job of crafting a balanced strategy of investing in public, private sector and non-profit service organizations. By doing that, we are building a solid base upon which the economy can continue to grow and stabilize.

District 17 Highlights

I was successful in my efforts to include funding for projects in next year's budget that will improve facilities at several Mililani and Pearl City schools that serve the residents in our Senatorial district. Together they represent a State investment of \$5.805 million in our schools, with another \$15.2 million authorized for highway improvements and an additional \$875,000 in community facilities.

We'll soon see major improvements in the athletic facilities at both **Mililani and Pearl City High Schools**. I am especially pleased that significant funding is in the budget for renovation or replacement of the aging **Roosevelt (Kipapa Gulch) Bridge**, with consideration of expanding it from two to four lanes.

This budget also responds to community requests for energy saving photovoltaic panels for the **Filipino Community Center** and improvements at the **Hawaii Okinawa Center**, and a well-deserved and much needed batting cage in **Waipio Neighborhood Park** to support our championship caliber teams.

Legislature Funds Private, Non-profit Health, Welfare, and Education Organizations

After examining applications for grants-in-aid from literally dozens of community-based non-profit organizations, the Legislature allocated \$20 million that provide services to residents statewide.

Among them are **Adult Friends for Youth, Alzheimer's Association, Catholic Charities Hawaii, Child and Family Service, Coalition for a Drug Free Hawaii, Domestic Violence Action Center, Hawaii 3Rs, Kalihi Palama Health Center, and Palama Settlement**. Grants totaling \$1.75 million to **Wahiawa General Hospital** will help to finance hospital operations and alleviate added health care emergency needs that developed with the sudden closure of Hawaii Medical Center – West in Ewa.

includes about 450 students who have declared for this major.

Not only will students in this program benefit, but beginning this summer, construction will put a substantial number of workers on contractor and sub-contractor payrolls for most of the next two years. And that's good for all of us.

Congratulations and *mahalo* to everyone who worked so hard to bring this project to this point. I look forward to being back on this site in a couple of years when the building welcomes its first students.

One of the most satisfying things about being the Senator who works on the State construction budget is seeing the results of our work translated from numbers on a spreadsheet to shovels in the ground. I was honored to join campus and community leaders as we broke ground in April for the first new building on the Leeward Community College Campus in 35 years. The Education Building and Innovation Center – depicted here in an artist's view from the parking lot side – will allow expansion and enhancement of the Associate of Arts in Teaching (AAT) program.

I was pleased to have been able to include in last year's construction budget an appropriation of \$19 million dollars to get this long-awaited project underway. Enrollment at LCC is at an all time high – about 8,000 students in the fall semester – and a quarter of which come from the Mililani-Waipio Gentry-Waipahu area. The AAT program now



2012 Legislative Report

The Legislature voted on funding for a number of programs that position the State for continued growth and economic development, promote agriculture, and enhance health and human services. I served as conference co-chair and voted to support these bills:

Agriculture

-**House Bills 1943 and 283** provide additional resources to the pest inspection and plant quarantine programs, and allocate funds to eradicate a pest that poses a serious threat to Hawaii's coffee crops

-**Senate Bill 2695** creates a pilot program that may lead to a viable livestock feed production and processing industry in Hawaii.

Economic Development

-**SB 2236** authorizes special purpose bond funding in the amount of \$100,000 to significantly enhance the State's broadband infrastructure capacity, enabling Hawaii to compete more effectively in the global economy.

Heritage Preservation

-**SB 2678** establishes an advisory group to begin serious work on preserving the internment camp site at Honouliuli in West Oahu where Japanese Americans were detained during World War II.

Education

-**SB 2545** establishes an Executive Office on Early Learning, recognizing that high quality early programs that are affordable and accessible for all children are

critically important to ensure the success of future generations of Hawaii's *keiki*.

-**SB 304** appropriates nearly \$11 million from general funds to provide grants for public health, welfare and education.

Elderly and Health Care

-**SB 2320** appropriates nearly \$5-million to establish the Kupuna Program of home and community based programs to serve the needs of the elderly.

-**SB 2779** allocates \$1.4-million to establish aging and disability resource centers in each county to provide services for older adults, persons with disabilities and family caregivers.

-**SB 2939** authorizes issuance of \$80-million in special purpose bonds for the St. Francis Health Care System to renovate and re-equip the Hawaii Medical Center in Liliha to operate as a long-term care facility.

-**HB 1953** provides \$1 million to increase emergency medical and ambulance services in Leeward Oahu and emergency room services at Wahiawa General Hospital.

-**HB 304** adds over \$11 million to maintain funding levels for programs in public health, welfare and education.

Public Safety

-**SB 2261** funds expansion of the Weed & Seed crime prevention program, already active in the Waipahu community, to other areas of the state with an appropriation of \$336,000.

Senator Kidani's Committees . . . Some Bills of Note

Education: Charter School Reforms; Office on Early Learning

Last year, the legislature established a Charter School Task Force to take a look at Hawaii's charter school system and make recommendations for improvements. This year, many of the Task Force recommendations were incorporated into **SB2115**, to create a new charter school law that establishes a solid governance structure, with clear lines of authority and accountability that will create a much improved environment for student achievement.

SB2545 eliminates junior kindergarten at the end of the 2013-14 school year but creates an Executive Office on Early Learning that will oversee the state's system and *create a publicly funded early-learning program*.

Public Safety, Government Operations and Military Affairs: Justice Reinvention

The Council State of Governments conducted a data-driven study of Hawaii's criminal justice system to identify inefficiencies, ways in which to correct them, and proposals to use the resulting savings to fund programs reduce repeat offenses. **SB 2776** implements these recommendations with the goal of relieving our prisons of overcrowding, and thereby making it possible eventually to bring Hawaii prisoners back from facilities on the mainland.

Hawaiian Affairs: Settling Native Hawaiian Land Claims

The State Supreme Court years ago required the Legislature to formulate a plan to compensate Native Hawaiians for disputed land claims. **SB 2783** – already signed into law by the Governor – transfers title to about 200 acres of land in Kakaako to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA). The property is *makai* of Ala Moana Boulevard and is valued at \$200 million. OHA will now have the right to master plan and develop the property, subject to zoning and permitting conditions of the Hawaii Community Development Authority.




Reapportionment = New Senate Boundaries

Senate and House district boundaries are redrawn every ten years based on population figures as determined by the U.S. Census. The State Reapportionment Commission proposed a plan in September of 2011. A lawsuit was filed by Big Island residents and the Hawaii Supreme Court in January ruled that the inclusion of nonpermanent residents favored Oahu and denied shifting of a state Senate seat to Hawaii island.

A revised plan was redrawn in March and another lawsuit is currently pending challenging the exclusion of military residents and others. A panel of three federal court judges will hear the case in mid-May.

Depending on what the court rules, it is possible that there may be further changes to the map below. However, as currently drawn, the new district would be designated **Senate District 18**, and would include **Mililani Town, Waipio Gentry**, and adds the communities of **Waikele, Village Park** and **Royal Kunia**. Waipio Acres and Mililani Mauka were not included, a change to which I testified in opposition as I maintained that it was not a good idea to divide the Mililani community this way. The new district lines will apply beginning with the August 11th primary election unless the courts rule otherwise. I look forward to meeting and being of service to new friends and neighbors in the reconstituted Senate District 18.
