Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

As another eventful legislative session has concluded, I would like to express my gratitude for your engagement in the legislative process by submitting testimony and sharing your input with my office. I'd like to highlight several important bills that passed both the Senate and House chambers during the conference phase and are on Governor Green's desk for consideration:

SB2475 SD2 HD2 CD1: RELATING TO EDUCATION. This measure, the first in Hawai'i, establishes a Harm to Students Registry to ensure safer learning environments and hold accountable those who have committed egregious actions towards students, preventing them from securing employment at other educational institutions.

<u>HB2404 HD1 SD1 CD1: RELATING TO INCOME TAX</u>. This bill increases the standard deduction amounts and adjusts income tax brackets, which designate how much tax is owed for different levels of income, every two years from 2025 to 2031. If enacted, this will be the biggest tax cut in the state's history, benefiting working families beginning with the 2024 tax return.

SB2305 SD2 HD2 CD1: RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS. This bill establishes a silver alert program to help locate and safeguard missing kūpuna, cognitively impaired, or developmentally disabled.

SB2476 HD2 CD1: RELATING TO DENTAL HYGIENISTS. This bill permits licensed dental hygienists to perform preventive dental sealant screenings and apply preventive dental sealants in a school-based dental program.

I am also pleased to share that **SB582 SD2 HD1 CD1, RELATING TO STATE BUDGET** was signed into law as Act 10. The Act appropriates emergency Lahaina recovery funding for this fiscal year, including \$297 million for shelter, food, and other assistance and \$72.5 million for temporary homes. Act 10's enactment reminds me of the Mililani for Maui donation drive we hosted last August at Mililani High School, where many of our neighbors and community members rallied to gather over 38 pallets of essential donations and \$17,000 in cash donations for our friends and family in Maui.

I would like to thank my staff– Committee Clerk Lisa Barnett, Office Manager Danicia Honda, and Legislative Aides Mary Janell Murro, Malachi Burrows, and Michael Mori– for their hard work and dedication throughout this legislative session.

Be on the lookout for our upcoming End of Session newsletter, which will provide a more comprehensive overview on measures passed and budget breakdown by departments. I am proud of the progress we've made during this legislative session and look forward to continuing our momentum throughout the interim. Mahalo nui loa for your steadfast support!
