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## Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

The 33<sup>rd</sup> Legislative Session came to a close on May 2<sup>nd</sup> and here are several key initiatives which I helped to pass. If signed into law, the funding could bring meaningful change to classrooms and student experiences across our state.

SB1300 SD1 HD1 CD1, RELATING TO SCHOOL MEALS - appropriates critical funding to expand free school meals and provide support for families classified as ALICE - Asset-Limited, Income-Constrained, Employed, Beginning in the 2025–2026 school year, thousands of students who currently qualify for reduced-price lunches will receive free school meals.

HB300 HD1 SD1 CD1, relating to the state budget - includes significant funding to advance key priorities within the Department of Education. These targeted investments will support innovative learning, promote gender equity in athletics, and strengthen connections between schools and local communities.

#### Hoʻākea Program – \$8,000,000

Appropriates funds in FY26 and FY27 to support the continuation and expansion of the Ho'ākea Program, a unique partnership with the Polynesian Voyaging Society that engages students in hands-on learning grounded in Native Hawaiian culture.

#### Mathematics and Financial Literacy - \$927,248

Appropriates funds and 6 positions to expand curriculum initiatives and for instructional support for classroom teachers.

#### Public Pre-Kindergarten Learning - \$13,264,299

Appropriates funds and positions in FY26 and FY27 for 108 teachers and teacher assistants and other expenses. This money will ensure all children eligible for preschool have access to high-quality early learning opportunities. This is an initiative led by Lieutenant Governor, Svlvia Luke.

#### • Girls Flag Football – \$726,100 reoccurring funds

This is a meaningful step forward which advances gender equity in school athletics and expands opportunities for student engagement and development by officially recognizing girls flag football as a DOE sport.

During the summer months, I continue working with our DOE, supporting thoughtful progress in our public education system, culture, and community, and creating lasting learning opportunities for our youth. Mahalo for staying engaged and informed and I hope that you and your families have a very safe and restful summer!

Colleagues from the Senate and House, as well as Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, came together to celebrate the end of the Legislative Session.

## Priority Bill SB1300 on Meal Subsidies Passes State Legislature

No child should have to worry about where their next meal will come from – especially not when they are trying to learn. Students who are fed are better able to focus, learn, and grow. That is why I authored and introduced SB1300.

Beginning with the 2025–2026 school year, and continuing in 2026-2027, the bill appropriates \$565,000 each year for thousands of students across the state who currently qualify for reduced-price lunches to receive free school meals. This will expand upon the federal free meals subsidy by providing free meals for approximately 34,000 Hawai'i students over the next two years.

Additionally, in the 2026–2027 school year, the bill appropriates \$2.8M for the program to expand further to include students from families earning up to 300% of the federal poverty level. This would ensure more students being able to focus on learning without the barrier of hunger or financial hardships, at a cost of \$2.8 million.

## **Release of funds for Community Projects**

#### **Okinawan Cultural Center:**

\$400,000 in funds released for the Hawai'i United Okinawa Association (HUOA) will replace and repair 23 parking lot light poles at the facility. By supporting necessary improvements such as lighting repairs, we are helping ensure this community hub remains a safe and welcoming place for generations to come.

#### Kanoelani Elementary School:

As part of my ongoing efforts to improve public schools, I secured \$150,000 in Capitol Improvement Project (CIP) funding for lighting improvements for Kanoelani. The funding for 10 new light poles is a critical investment in the safety and well-being of our students and faculty as they host and participate in various evening events on campus.

#### Mililani Uka Elemenatry School:

\$1.5 million in funding for telecommunications improvements were released as part of the CIP for Mililani Uka. This will support the design, construction, and renovation of essential telecom infrastructure, to assure the school is equipped with modern technology.

Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke hosted her 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Food Drive Fest on April 16<sup>th</sup>. This event brings together legislators and local business to support the Hawai'i Food Bank - raising awareness and providing essential food assistance.
