I joined the Waipahu Elementary School community to surprise **Principal Aaron Tominaga** with a special celebration to recognize him as the Hawai'i Elementary and Middle School Administrators Association (HEMSAA)'s 2022 National Distinguished Principal (NDP) for the state of Hawai'i. **Principal Tominaga**'s dedication to his students has transformed their student body of nearly half English language learners (ELA) and nearly all students eligible for free or reduced-price meals by developing a comprehensive system to accelerate support for ELA and math students. This resulted in a substantial reduction of "at-risk" students in both subjects in the past two years. **Principal Tominaga** is noted as a visionary leader who is a catalyst for change--an educator who is truly deserving of such praise and recognition! MILILANI MIDDLE SCHOOL BUILDING DEDICATION

Congratulations to **Principal Elynne Chung**, faculty, staff and students of Mililani Middle School on the exciting completion of their new classroom building! Senator Dela Cruz and I attended the dedication ceremony to present a Senate Certificate in honor of their campus evolution. Though Mililani Middle School was the first multi-track school in the state, it will transition to a single-track curriculum this upcoming school year with the addition of the new building. The 15-classroom building will host Media, Technology, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math), Family Consumer Science, English Language Learners and Career Exploration classes for grade 7 and 8 students. Though the Blazers are a young school, they are the largest middle school in the state of Hawai'i, and this transition will now align with the established DOE school calendar, gaining an additional eleven more days of school. As the grandparent of a proud Blazer, I am all the more proud to see their continued growth and success. SUZANNE VARES-LUM EAST WEST CENTER PRESIDENT

I had the chance to visit the East West Center to meet with it's new President, retired U.S. Army Major General, **Suzanne Vares-Lum**. We brainstormed about ways in which we can work together to best support our keiki in the years to come, and this meeting also provided me an opportunity to present her with a Senate certificate to welcome her in her new position. It is worth noting that **Suzanne** is the first woman, the first Hawai'i resident, and the first Native Hawaiian to hold this prestigious position. Her exceptional resume of impressive credentials makes her not only expertly suited for the job, but also an incredible inspiration to women. Congratulations **Suzanne**, I look forward to working together to continue making important strides for our community!

MCINERNY FOUNDATION RESEARCH OBSERVATORY DEDICATION AT WHS

Waipahu High School is home to the Hawai'i Department of Education's first research-grade, 17 inch telescope with a 12.5ft dome! I was eager to celebrate the dedication of The McInerny Foundation Research Observatory on the grounds of Waipahu High School alongside fellow legislators, Superintendent Hayashi and the Waipahu High School community. Not only is the telescope a milestone for the campus, but it is also designed to be operated remotely. This will allow students to collaborate on joint research projects in collaboration with other research teams throughout the State, country and around the globe. In addition, this program will also offer an astronomy course to give students the opportunity to hone their research skills in collaboration with other students and scientists across the world. A testament to the interest in the program and success of it's student participants, Waipahu High School has already had three teams of students publish their findings in the peer-reviewed Journal of Double Star Observations. The sky is truly the limit for these curious, hardworking students and I can't wait to see what they discover!



SB2184: RELATING TO DIGITAL LEARNING

Provides \$7M to the DOE for digital learning options for students in the upcoming 2022-2023 school year. This bill and funding is important to ensure that the DOE has resources to provide students with virtual learning options as needed.

SB2821: RELATING TO MENSTRUAL EQUITY

This bill is a long overdue step forward to addressing an inequity in our educational system. The fact that students have been forced to miss school due to being unable to afford basic hygienic products, or worse, using inappropriate and dangerous materials like newspaper or leaves to manage their menstruation, was appalling. Thanks to the tireless efforts of advocates such as Sarah "Mili" Milianta-Laffin and her students from 'Ilima Intermediate School, the Ma'i Movement Sisters, Nikki Ann-Yee, Jamie Kapana, and Brandy-Lee Yee, and many other advocates, this will never be an issue our students face again. This bill will ensure that no student faces these difficult decisions ever again and builds on the \$2M appropriation in the DOE budget to cover the cost of menstrual products which will be provided free of charge for all DOE students statewide.

SB2819: RELATING TO TEACHER COMPENSATION

The Senate has worked for many years to try to address the long-standing issue of teacher compensation in our State. When negotiating contracts, teachers have been restricted to a maximum of 7 classifications to determine their pay rates. This statute has been in place for years, and will be removed to allow teachers to negotiate future contracts that properly reflect the professionalism of teaching based on professional development and certifications. This is a tremendous step forward to address the recruitment and retention of highly-qualified teachers.

HB2000: RELATING TO EDUCATION

Over the last two years, the Legislature has set ambitious goals to provide early learning opportunities to all of Hawai'i's keiki. While the pandemic has slowed progress in this area, the Legislature has re-doubled its efforts to expand the availability of pre-kindergarten in our State with an appropriation of \$200M. This funding will focus on the expansion of facilities and sites for pre-kindergarten classrooms across our State.

SB2893: RELATING TO A SCHOOL SUPPLY SUBSIDY PILOT PROGRAM

If we want our keiki to learn, we must ensure that they have the basic necessities needed to learn. In many of our rural Title 1 schools, even the most basic of school supplies are difficult to obtain or afford. And while our teachers have often stepped up to fill this need, we must begin to look at shifting that burden away from those most in need. To that end, the Legislature has appropriated over \$800K for a pilot program to pay for school supplies for students of our rural Title 1 schools.

HB2511: RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS

A landmark bill supporting the native Hawaiian community, this bill allocates \$600M to Department of Hawaiian Homelands to provide housing, rent, and mortgages for Native Hawaiians applying for Hawaiian Homeland housing.

SB3048: RELATING TO STATE FUNDS

Local families have experienced tremendous economic challenges over the past few years, much of which has related to the costs of basic necessities like housing. This bill is appropriating \$300M to the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation (HHFDC) for low and moderate income housing development.

SB514: RELATING TO THE GENERAL FUND

This bill provides a well-needed tax rebate to local families. For those with income less than \$100K, a \$300 rebate will be provided. For those with income greater than \$100K, they will receive a \$100 State tax rebate. The varying amounts of these rebates are based upon the individual taxpayer and their associated dependent(s).

HB2510: RELATING TO INCOME

This bill will establish the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) as both permanent and refundable. This means that working families who qualify for this tax credit will be able to receive any excess beyond their tax liability as a tax refund. In addition to that, HB2510 also addresses the minimum wage increase, which will happen incrementally over the course of the next 6 years. The minimum wage will be raised every 2 years, beginning this year as it increases to \$12/hour in October 2022, \$14/hour in 2024, \$16/hour in 2026 and to \$18/hour in 2028.

CAPITOL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

- Kaleiopu'u Elementary School: \$2.139M for the plans, design and construction to maintain and improve facilities and infrastructure, including hazardous materials remediation; project may include repair, replacement, or new construction of roof/re-roof; project may include whole school renovation; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

- Kanoelani Elementary School: \$1.4M for the design and construction for a new portable; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

- **Kipapa Elementary School**: \$3M for the design and construction of a covered playcourt; other related improvements; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

-**Mililani High School:** \$3.5M for the design and construction for administration building expansion; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

-**Mililani High School CTE Facility:** \$9.3M for the plans, design construction and equipment for Career and Technical Education Facility for Mililani High School; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

- **Mililani Uka Elementary School**: \$1M for the design and construction of ADA improvements for public accommodations; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

-**Mililani Waena Elementary School Cafeteria Expansion:** \$7M for the plans, designs, and construction of the Mililani Waena cafeteria expansion, renovation of existing serving kitchen into administration space and other school improvements; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

-Waikele Elementary School: \$970K for the design and construction for lighting improvement campus wide; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

–Waipahu High School: \$26M for the construction of Waipahu High School's Integrated Academy Facility; including renovations and relocation for the Academic Health Center; and other related improvements; ground and site improvements; equipment and appurtenances.

-Waipahu Aloha Clubhouse/ Waipi'o Point Access Road Multimodal and Safety Improvements: \$2.1M in funding for the design and construction of the Waipi'o Point Access Road Multimodal and Safety Improvements.

EDUCATION BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS:

- \$114M for the restoration of the DOE budget that were cut due to COVID-19 economic shortfalls

- \$49M in additional funding allocated to cover existing shortfalls in areas like utilities expenses and school meal expenses. With rising costs of energy, improved efficiencies have slowed increases but not entirely stopped them. While the USDA waivers to provide free meals is a benefit to students, the meal revenue from selling full priced meals has resulted in shortfalls to the school food service budget.

- \$125M for various repair and maintenance projects to address the long-standing backlog of work to our schools statewide.
This money was appropriated as a lump-sum to allow the DOE, in accordance to BOE policy, equitably address school needs.
- \$600K in funding to the Grow Our Own program. This represents a doubling of the current line-item, bringing the new total for the program to \$1.2M. This will double the amount of teachers who will be eligible for the stipend to a total of 60.

STATE BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS:

After the many challenges we've faced in recent years due to the pandemic, we are thrilled to see the economic boost we have made. Thanks to a robust rebound in our economy, the Legislature passed bills that will benefit generations of working families for years to come. Here is are some key highlights from the State budget:

Department of Budget and Finance

- \$33.33M to leverage federal funds to expand broadband deployment

- \$335M to restore prefunding of post-employment benefits and address the State's unfunded liabilities

Department of the Attorney General

- Adding 13 new deputy AG positions to focus on human trafficking abatement, public safety and criminal justice

- \$6.75M to modernize Child Support Enforcement Services division KEIKI database

Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism

- \$1.5M for the Manufacturing Assistance Program award to increase local production of goods
- \$488K and 7 new positions in the Hawaii State Energy Office to support renewable energy projects across the State

Department of Human Services

- \$4M to increase the program allotment of Temporary Assistance for Other Needy Families (TAONF)
- \$6.9M to assist eligible low-income families with child care payments
- \$25.9M to restore adult dental benefits under MedQUEST
- \$5.8M to expand post-partum coverage from 2 to 12 months for MedQUEST patients and increase preventative treatment and screening services

Department of Agriculture

- \$425K to address damage to coffee crops and ranching from invasive species such as the coffee berry beetle, spittle bug, etc.
- \$658,480 for aquaculture development in the State

2022 LEGISLATIVE SESSION IN REVIEW

The Legislature's total budget for the fiscal year 2022 for all means of financing is \$15,719,399,902. Charted below are the budget breakdowns for all categories during the 2022-2023 years:
