#### Aloha friends and neighbors,

This newsletter includes a lot of information about our schools focusing on students, teachers and administrator excellence. We've just completed our annual Education Week activities at the Capitol that highlight some of the outstanding work at our public schools from the elementary, middle and high school level and on University of Hawaii campuses. It's truly inspiring to celebrate student successes and to meet the young people who take advantage of all the opportunities our schools have to offer.

#### Legislative Update

After many hours of informational briefings and hearings on specific pieces of legislation, detailed work on the State budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1 has begun. The Senate Committee on Ways and Means, for which I serve as Vice Chair, met for a good part of last weekend to carefully craft a budget bill that will now be compared to the Governor's proposed spending plan and the budget already passed by the House.

In spite of the administration's statements that we have a budget "surplus," our Council on Revenues says that the robust economy of 2013 is cooling off, and the State has far less flexibility in budgeting than we had hoped for. The Ways and Means Committee, therefore, has taken a much more studied approach to formulating a budget, proceeding with caution in light of receding revenues. It's the prudent thing to do, and we believe the House will agree to this more measured approach.

Our capital improvement budget, which I oversee, has spurred job growth - especially in the construction industry - over the past couple of years. Now, we are proposing a more focused approach, designed to meet critical health and safety requirements, with a heavy investment in modernizing the state's information-technology capability to better serve our public purposes.

An important budget deadline occurs next week when the Senate's plan will be laid out in more detail. Follow our progress at the Legislature's Web site: <u>http://capitol.hawaii.gov</u>. Me Ke Aloha,

## The State of Hawaii Medal of Honor

For the ninth year in a row, the Senate and House met in joint session this week to present the State Medal of Honor to family members of four military personnel with Hawaii ties who died in a war zone during the past year.

The Medal of Honor was created by the Legislature in 2005 and was first presented the following year to recognize service and sacrifice by members of the armed forces, Reserves and the National Guard who were residents of Hawaii, attended an educational institution here or were stationed in the islands.

#### This year's posthumous awards . . . for service and sacrifice

- Hawaii Army National Guard Sgt. **Drew M. Scobie** of Kailua, Oahu killed in January in the crash of a plane on a night mission in Afghanistan;
- Air Force Capt. **Reid K. Nishizuka** of Kailua, Oahu killed in a plane crash in Afghanistan in April 2013
- Army Chief Warrant Officer 2 Edward Balli of Kapolei, Oahu killed in an insurgent attack in Afghanistan in January;
- Army Sgt. **Tofiga J. Tautolo** of Waianae, Oahu—killed in May when his vehicle was attacked with an explosive device in Afghanistan
