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Aloha, friends and neighbors:

Last week, the Department of Education issued a status report on its efforts to air condition classrooms or otherwise provide heat-relief to Hawaii public school students and teachers. The renewed pledge is to meet the stated goal of air conditioning 1000 classrooms by the time the new school year begins in just a few weeks. That's about eight months *behind* the initial goal laid out when the Legislature approved \$100 million in funding for this work in our 2016 session.

Waipahu High, Intermediate and Elementary schools are all on the DOE's priority list for air conditioning and heat-abatement projects; funds for planning and equipment have been approved for work to be done in some facilities on these campuses. In some cases, basic electrical system upgrades are necessary before air conditioning units can be installed.

Along with air conditioning, there are other ways to help cool our schools landscaping, ceiling fans, heat-blocking tinted windows, "white roofs" that reflect heat, roof vents that draw heat out of classrooms, and even shade structures over open areas. The DOE's 33 top-priority schools have all been evaluated to determine what works best in their individual campus circumstances.

The Legislature approved **House Bill 957** to provide additional funding for heat abatement work—up to \$46 million through borrowing from a fund already earmarked for energy savings that have as yet been untapped. The Governor signed the bill this week so that this work can proceed—we hope at an accelerated pace. Bottom line, it's all a critical part of boosting student achievement in a more comfortable teaching and learning environments in our schools statewide.

As Chair of the Senate Committee on Education, I was invited to accompany Hawaii Island lawmakers on a tour of public schools in Kohala and Waimea. At right, the **STEAM** (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) building at Waimea Middle School will open for the new school year. I worked with my colleagues in the 2013-2014 sessions to obtain \$16 million in funding for this major new facility. The building includes a large interior corridor and three smaller rooms that can be used as alternative project work spaces for students.





Waimea Middle School's still-under-construction \$16 million, nineclassroom STEAM Building will be the largest structure in Waimea.

A pilot program was underway this year in Kohala schools to develop guides for **Farm-to-School** activities, including purchasing locally grown food and ingredients, modifying school lunch menus, kitchen staff training on scratch-cooking, minimizing food waste, and growing food for cafeteria use. The program will expand to all Hawaii Island schools, then to Maui, and eventually to Oahu campuses.

With deep roots in agriculture, Waipahu, Mililani and Central Oahu schools should be the first on Oahu to benefit from the program.
