Aloha friends and neighbors,

The process of putting together the State's budget, deciding on priorities for spending State funds, and seeing those programs and projects become a reality is a deeply rewarding experience for me. The responsibility to residents of the 18th district and across the State for using our taxpayer dollars wisely is something that I take very seriously.

The public facilities in the communities I serve - outside Oahu's urban core - consist mainly of public schools and libraries and the major highways that make up our transportation infrastructure. I'm happy to say that I think we have received our fair share of funding for these facilities, especially our schools, and a visit to any of our high school, middle school and elementary campuses shows that improvements are underway virtually everywhere.

Funds continue to be made available. Just a few days ago, the State released money for the following projects:

- \$1,251,000 Mililani High School Design and construction to reconstruct the tennis courts and to resurface the lower
 parking lot to be ADA compliant
- \$1,100,000 Mililani High School Design and construction of additional restrooms and concession improvements at the MHS athletic field
- \$750,000 Kanoelani Elementary School Design and construction of a covered walkway to connect up to five buildings with the cafeteria to protect students and staff from inclement weather and the sun
- \$625,000 Kaleiopuu Elementary School Design and construction of a second emergency evacuation ramp through the back of the campus
- \$550,000 Kaleiopuu Elementary School Construction to upgrade the electrical system to provide adequate power infrastructure to support technology-based curriculum
- \$200,000 Kipapa Elementary School Construction to replace the air conditioning system at the school's admin building In addition, contracts have now been awarded for \$291,700 for electrical system upgrades at Kaleiopuu Elementary and another \$260,425 for construction of a parking lot and drop-off area at Kipapa Elementary. This work should be underway later this year.

Several other projects have already been approved by the Legislature over the 2012 and 2013 sessions that are being evaluated and await the release of funds. I'll be monitoring their progress to assure that all of our public school students have the safest and most up-to-date learning environments they deserve.

Legislative hearings continue between sessions

It was a standing-room-only crowd for our hearing last month during which the **Senate Committee on Tourism & Hawaiian Affairs** heard testimony from the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. DHHL was responding to an audit critical of the Department's oversight of the Homestead Services Division.

The audit cited insufficient record-keeping, a lack of effective policies and procedures and poor communication that severely hamper DHHL's mission to serve Native Hawaiians.

Department Director, Jobie Masagatani, assured us that changes in policies and procedures are already being made and that issues in the audit will be fully addressed by the end of this year.
