Senate Special Session approves judicial nominees



The Senate convened a two-day special

session earlier this month to consider approval of three nominees for vacant judgeships that are subject to the confirmation process. The Judiciary Committee heard testimony from the three nominees, the public and from professional organizations, and upon the committee's recommendation, we voted to approve the appointments. District Court Judge **Shirley Kawamura** will now move up to a Circuit Court judgeship on Oahu. Hawaii Island Family Court Judge **Melvin Fujino** will fill a Circuit Court vacancy on that island. And **James McWhinnie** – an Oahu attorney in private practice – takes a District Court position.

An opportunity for public service

Governor Ige has issued an appeal to qualified and dedicated Hawaii resident volunteers to consider applying for positions on State boards and commissions. These positions offer a great opportunity for citizens to have a voice in government and to influence decisions that shape the quality of life we all enjoy.

The 185 boards and commissions cover a wide variety of expertise, including the Board of Health; State Board of Nursing; Board of Veterinary Examiners; Board of Taxation Review; Real Estate Commission; Board of Electricians and Plumbers; Board of Certification of Operating Personnel in Wastewater Treatment Plants; Board of Professional Engineers, Architects, Surveyors and Landscape Architects.
