Aloha friends and neighbors,

As this year's budget bill (HB 1900) is now written, it includes \$20.5 million for a new classroom building at Waipahu High School, and cafeteria expansion at Kaleiopu`u (\$650,000) and Kanoelani (\$300,000) elementary schools.

A contract has now been awarded for construction of a new portable classroom building at Kanoelani Elementary (\$505,588), and funds have now been released so that design work can proceed on cafeteria expansion at Waipahu Elementary (\$275,000).

A final update on construction projects for Senate District 18 will be available in early May.

This week at the Capitol we have been recognizing Hawaii educators and students for achievements in the classroom and for outstanding community service. We set aside Education Week during Spring break as an opportunity to hear wonderful, inspirational stories about teachers' commitments to their students and schools and about the many ways students excel both in and out of the classroom. We began our presentations by honoring the DOE's 2018 Teachers of the Year, pictured with us below.

This school spring break week we are also getting to know Justine Jumalon (at right), Waipahu High School Class of 2018. Justine approached me at a Waipahu Band concert a few weeks ago and asked if she could spend her week off as a volunteer in my office. We welcome helping hands, and Justine has guickly become acquainted with the Legislature during an especially busy week. At WHS, Justine is an honor student ranked in the

top 25 of her senior class of more than 500. She also maintains a GPA just a hair under 4.0, has enrolled in Early College classes, and has been an active member of the school's Academy of Engineering. In her fourth

At the Capitol... we are a little more than half way through our 60-working-day Legislative session.

I am especially pleased that my *Senate Bill 2242* is proceeding through the legislative process. The bill creates a workforce development microgrant program to provide grants for public high school students to help pay for technical or workforce training.

Another important measure is *SB 2922* that would allow the public to vote on a process to fully-fund our public schools through a small increase in the hotel room tax and a surcharge on property taxes owners pay on properties they don't live in.
