Aloha, friends and neighbors,

Our legislative session is scheduled to adjourn on Thursday, May 3. Decisions on budget allocations were completed about a week earlier than in previous sessions so that we could allocate \$125 million in immediate emergency relief funding for residents of Kauai and East Oahu who suffered property damage and losses due to catastrophic flooding.

Here are some items in the construction budget that we finalized this week for the year beginning July 1 that will be of interest to area residents:

• **Mililani High School** - \$5 million for planning, design, construction and equipment for a girls athletics locker room

- Waipahu High School \$20.5 million for a new classroom building
- Kaleiopu`u Elementary \$650,000 for renovation and expansion of the school cafeteria
- Kanoelani Elementary \$300,000 to increase the capacity of the cafeteria
- Mililani `Ike Elementary \$325,000 for a new bell and PA system
- UH West Oahu \$5 million for renovation and construction at the campus center and the UHWO library

My Committee on Education heard testimony from nominees to the Hawaii State Board of Education. They include (photo at right) **Dwight Takeno** and **Catherine Payne.**

Dwight has been a senior administrator at the University of Hawaii and served as Interim Executive Director and chief negotiator for the Hawaii State Teachers Association. He assumes the seat now held by Board member Hubert Minn.

Catherine will serve as Board Chair, as current Chair Lance Mizumoto completes his term. She has devoted her adult life to education, serving as a teacher and in administrative positions as Vice Principal at Waianae High School and Principal at Farrington High School. She is currently the temporary DOE Complex Area Superintendent for the Farrington-Kaiser-Kalani Complex.

Current Board member **Maggie Cox** has been confirmed for reappointment to her position on the Board, representing Kauai County. These appointments and the re-appointment are effective July 1, 2018.





About that Constitutional Amendment . . .

I am pleased that both the Senate and the House overwhelmingly voted in favor of offering Hawaii voters the opportunity to vote on a means to create a source of significant new funding for our public schools. This would allow the state to create a property tax mechanism with proceeds dedicated to fully-funding our public schools. With the passage of Senate Bill 2922, a question will appear on the ballot in November asking whether the State may create a tax surcharge on residential investment properties with proceeds going to our schools.

All other states nationwide fund their schools through property taxes. If Hawaii voters approve the question on the ballot, lawmakers will return to the Capitol in January to work on details of the tax plan.

The Senate's intent is clear:

 \diamond The homes that you own and live in will *not* be taxed; the focus will be on residential investment properties.

 \diamond The Senate will *not* allow a tax to be collected on residential investment properties valued at *less* than \$1 million; the threshold could be even higher.

♦ Further, the Senate does *not* intend to tax any commercial properties – just *residential* properties.

Over the next several months, you will hear a lot more about this issue. Step one in the process is to vote yes on the Constitutional amendment question that will be on the ballot.

Some miscellaneous notes:

The final disposition of several bills is not yet known as committee work continues. Among the bills still pending are:

• Measures that would fund computer science instruction and laptop computers to enhance STEM studies;

• A bill that would require a review of unused state property or underutilized DOE facilities that could be made available to public charter schools;

• A bill that would help to cover fees for ACT and SAT tests for eligible high school students;

• A bill that would assure that charter school teachers are eligible for incentive bonuses for teachers at hard-to-staff campuses or who earn National Board certification.

I am pleased that the budget we will approve this session includes \$400,000 to provide scholarships to continue UH College of Education programs to assist DOE substitute and emergency hire teachers and educational assistants to earn their teacher licenses.
