UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, over 230,000 individuals (roughly one third of the state's workforce) have lost their jobs, causing the antiquated system to overload. This system which is also used by the Department of Human Services was scheduled to be upgraded this July. Hawaii and Nevada have the highest unemploymen trates in the nation.

Changes continue to be made to address issues. The State Unemployment Office is working tirelessly to get all claims into the system to be processed. Almost 200 additional employees have recently been assigned to provide additional assistance including three of my staff. FACE MASKS



MASK MANDATE

Non-medical face coverings must be worn at essential businesses and on public transportation

Individuals are now required to wear face masks in most public settings such as grocery shopping and riding the city bus, while still abiding by the statewide social distancing and stay-at-home mandates. Everyone has done a great job providing masks for the community from established retail businesses to non-profits and those <u>sewing their own from home</u> as well! Please note Mask Mandate Exceptions: using ATMs, entering banks, those with asthma or a medical condition that prevents them from wearing a mask, first responders, whose performance of duties may be inhibited by doing so and keiki under 5 years old. In fact, it is dangerous for young children to wear masks as it may result in choking or suffocation.

UNEMPLOYMENT RESOURCES:

1. <u>State of Hawaii</u> <u>Unemployment Insurance</u>

The official state unemployment website to file your claim or check on the status of your claim. Open to file Monday through Friday: 6:30am-11:00pm HST Weekends & Holidays: 9:00am- 11:00pm HST

2. Hui Claims Status

To check on the status of your unemployment benefits claim status, please click the link to Hui Claims.

3. <u>Pandemic</u> <u>Unemployment Assistance</u> (PUA)

Federal unemployment support under the CARES Act for otherwise ineligible workers, including self-employed and those whose claims may have already been denied due to such limitations.

3. <u>Federal Pandemic</u> <u>Unempoyment</u> <u>Compensation (FPUC)</u>

FPUC provides a temporary emergency increase in unemployment compensation benefits to eligible individuals for \$600 per week in addition to weekly benefits they receive from other unemployment programs. This will be paid automatically with your unemployment claims.

HEALTHCARE

To comply with the stay-at-home mandate, healthcare providers have done an amazing job transitioning services online to offer a wealth of options for patients during this challenging time. These recently introduced <u>"telehealth"</u> option provides a virtual appointments for patients to consult physicians from the comforts of home without having to enter a doctors office or hospital. Many smaller clinics are also offering these options to ease the stress of patient demand at the hospital as well.

Healthcare providers are covering the cost of testing and in many cases, offering benefits such as waived copays for the likes of mental health to ensure that health-care is provided without the fear of lost insurance benefits. For a list of healthcare resources see those noted to the right.

RIMPAC 2020



We are thrilled to hear the latest update regarding the 27th annual Rim of the Pacific military exercises schedule to take place later this summer. The biennial maritime exercise is the world's largest international maritime exercise that is normally scheduled from June through August, but in a recent update from Governor David Ige it was announced that it will be held August 17-31 instead.

"I'm pleased the Navy has agreed to postpone the RIMPAC 2020 exercise and will conduct the at-sea-portion this year to help keep Hawaii safe as we continue to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. I'm working closely with Adm. Davidson to monitor the situation. If conditions change later this summer, we will reassess and respond appropriately."

The Census Bureau temporarily suspended 2020 Census field data collection activities in March, but steps are already being taken to reactivate field offices beginning June 1, 2020, in preparation for the resumption of field data collection operations as quickly as possible following June 1." The Census Bureau window for field data collection and self-response has been extended to October 31, 2020.

A kindergartener counted in the 2020 Census this spring will be starting high school when the next census comes around in 2030: That's 10 years of school supplies, teachers, school lunches, and so much more. This is your opportunity to help ensure they have a bright future.

Right now, students across the country are getting an introduction to the 2020 Census through the Statistics in Schools program. This program offers free activities and resources to schools to help prepare their students for an increasingly data-driven world.

Students are learning that the 2020 Census is a count of every person who lives in the United States and its territories. Responding to the census helps your community get its fair share of funding. Census data guides how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to states and communities each year for schools, health care facilities, roads, transportation, recreation centers, social services, and more.

Students are also learning these key things about the 2020 Census—and we want you to know them too:

- Starting in March 2020, everyone living in your home needs to be counted. That includes children and newborn babies, citizens and noncitizens, relatives and nonrelatives, and even those staying with you temporarily.
- It's easier than ever to respond to the census. You can respond in 13 different languages, and you can complete it online, by phone, or by mail.
- Your responses to the census are safe and secure. The law requires the U.S. Census Bureau to keep your information confidential, and your responses cannot be used against you in any way.

You have the power to shape your future, and the future of all children, by counting everyone in your home in the 2020 Census.

Grab-and-go Student Meals

The Hawaii State Department of Education (HIDOE) is implementing the Seamless Summer Option program a few months earlier than scheduled, as approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Hawaii Child Nutrition Programs, to provide free grab-and-go meals for students during the extended spring break period.

The schools below will be providing breakfast and lunch free of charge to children 18 years or younger, regardless of eligibility for free or reduced price meals. Parents or caregivers who pick up a meal must be accompanied by a child, according to USDA requirements. There will be no personal interaction between HIDOE employees and the community. All meals will be placed in containers. Meals will be located outside of the cafeteria, preferably closest to a driveway or other natural access point on the campus.

Lunch service hours: 11:30 a.m.-12 p.m.
