My staff and I look forward to welcoming visitors throughout the upcoming legislative session.

I continue to be committed to improving Hawai'i's education system by addressing teacher shortages and retention through programs such as dedicated affordable housing and educational pathways in partnership with local high schools and the University of Hawai'i system; supporting early childhood education initiatives, including universal pre-K programs; coordinating with various state agencies to establish educational and vocational tracks in K-12 schools for emerging industries; and pursuing school-level accountability.

My heartfelt mahalo nui to each and every one of you for allowing me to continue to represent the residents of our beautiful Central O'ahu community. I look forward to 2023 and am enthusiastic for the year ahead, working on behalf of all of our local families.
