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## Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

I'm pleased to announce that the Emergency Proclamation Relating to School Bus Services, as outlined in section 127A-14, of the Hawai'i Revised Statues (HRS), has been extended. The extension comes as a result of my collaboration with the Hawai'i State Department of Education and the Department of Transportation (working with the U.S. Department of Transportation). The proclamation permits drivers possessing a commercial driver's license (CDL) with a "P" endorsement to drive school buses in lieu of a CDL with an "S" endorsement. This provision has enabled some affected routes to be restored across the state, particularly O'ahu and Kaua'i.

### Mililani For Maui Update

After the Maui wildfires, my daughter Malia Cook and I led the Mililani for Maui donation drive at Mililani High School. We had surprise visits from Lieutenant Governor Luke and Senator DeCoite, who represents part of Maui. Because of your support, we donated **38 pallets** filled with essential supplies and raised nearly **\$20,000 in cash donations** to the Hawai'i Community Foundation-Maui Strong Fund and the American Red Cross to aid in Maui's recovery.

literacy book coach, access to a digital children's library, and hard copy books to keep.

This year alone, Always Dream will make a significant impact by supporting children's literacy across 13 schools in pre-K and kindergarten classrooms. From the 2022-2023 school year, 93% of families report they are better able to help their child develop a love of reading and 82% of families report their child asks to be read to more often. The annual average number of books read per student during the program is 200! I am so very grateful for Kristi's much needed support and dedication to Hawai'i's keiki and local families.

### HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS FOR CHILDREN

- Increase being seen by drivers. Wear something reflective on your costume (nothing flammable).
- Carry a flashlight to light your way safely and help others see you.
- Walk, not run from house to house and use the sidewalk if available, rather than walk in the street.
- Watch out for cars, trucks and low-flying brooms before entering the street. Remember it may be hard for drivers to see you.
- Look for cars at driveways before crossing.
- Don't stop on the streets to check your treats. Have your parents do it at home when you meet. (Immediately report obviously tampered items and give it to police.)
- Limit your trick-or-treating to your own neighborhood. Trick-or-treat only at homes with porch lights on.
- Remember to say, "Thank You!" to the people who give treats and to the drivers who let you cross the street.
- Don't eat treats until checked by your parents.

#### **FOR PARENTS**

- Use a pre-planned, well lighted trick-or-treat route.
- Escort your children or designate a responsible older child to accompany the trick-or-treaters.
- Drive safely. Watch out for children when backing out of driveways. Use your headlights early and drive well below the posted speed limit.
- Leave your porch light on if you plan to participate in the festivities. Keep your walkways to your front porch clear.
- Give only commercially wrapped treats, coupons, gift certificates or coins.
- Inspect all treats brought home.
