Our community's loss : Irene Rosetta Elston—1914-2011

We all share a sense of loss with the sad news that Irene Elston – a former member of the Waipahu Neighborhood Board – passed away in late December at the age of 97. Irene and her husband, Bill, moved to Hawaii many years ago and managed property in Waipahu. From the early days of their time here, it was obvious that they were committed to assuring that their island home was a warm and welcoming place to live.

To say that Irene was a member of the Waipahu Neighborhood Board is to vastly underestimate her involvement in the community. In fact, the Neighborhood Commission Office records show that she was an elected Board member for 26 consecutive years, beginning in 1985. During that time, she also established and led the Waipahu Neighborhood Improvement Association and was active with the Waipahu Community Association. It is widely understood that Irene was instrumental in prodding the city to clean up and restore Pupuole Park to the benefit of the surrounding neighborhoods.

We are grateful for Irene Elston's dedicated hard work on behalf of Waipahu, and extend our condolences to her surviving son and grandchildren on the mainland.

The Legislative Session Begins . . .

The 2012 Legislative session began this month, and will continue for 60 working days through the first week of May. But even between our formal working sessions, our work continued. The Ways and Means Committee, on which I serve as Vice Chair, has been reviewing executive budgets and programs – many jointly with the House of Representatives Finance Committee – since mid-November. Committee members have also been conducting site visits across the state to review construction work funded in prior sessions. My schedule included late-December stops at Mililani Mauka, Kipapa, Mililani Ike and Kanoelani Elementary Schools where a number of improvement projects are underway to create positive learning environments for our youngsters.

A two-year state budget was approved last year, and the 2012 session will provide an opportunity to review progress, and, as necessary, revise the budget with added funds or possible reductions in spending. Governor Abercrombie outlined his proposed supplemental spending plan in mid-December, but revisions are likely as the State Council on Revenues has warned that the slowly improving economy may not provide enough funds to cover all of our needs.
