Because Hawaii is unique, even the print design of the APEC Aloha print was given much thought. Tori Richard was selected by the Hawaii Host Committee to design and produce the APEC Aloha Shirt. Senator Kidani and all others who volunteered will be wearing this special Aloha print shirt and kukui nut lei.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness

On October 4th, Senator Kidani presented a certificate to the Hawaii State Coalition Against Domestic Violence in recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month and to congratulate them for their commitment to raise awareness of the plight of many victims in Hawaii.

As we recognize October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month across the United States, let us rekindle our hope and our commitment that while domestic violence has long been an issue within our society, we must continue to work towards seeing it come to an end.

Thirty-five years ago, in 1976, Hawai'i opened its first shelter for abused spouses. The services to these victims have been much enhanced due to the diligence and commitment of the Hawaii State Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

Problem: On October 26th, Senator Kidani received a request for assistance from a Waipio Gentry concerned resident regarding the Community pathway in Gentry Waipio. The Caller requested assistance with a growing problem of motorized vehicles on the path making it dangerous for residents walking or jogging on the path.

Resident has called HPD, contacted Kokualine and Real Estate Commission to no avail. HPD stated that due to the walkway being on private property they do not have jurisdiction and the authority to arrest or ticket the wrongdoers.

Solution: Senator Kidani suggestion was to contact the Community Association to authorize the police to have access to the private property. If that fails, she is currently working on a bill that would address the problem of HPD access to public common area that happens to also be private property (such as the Waipio walk path) - Senator will update as information is available.



Mock Legislative Pre-Conference Held at Aiea High School

Senator Kidani was invited to mentor and critique students during their Pre-Conference Mock Legislative Assembly on October 3rd. Students from across the state gathered to work on resolutions which will be brought to the annual Secondary Student Conference to be held on November 30—December 2nd at the Hawaii State Capitol. They collaborated, shared feedback on the quality as well as the topics of the resolutions and then voted on which issues will move forward based on what they believe are of most importance to them. Senator Kidani provided input and support to the students to strengthen the content of their draft resolutions. The goal of the conference is to help the students achieve their full potential as delegates in bringing forth ideas both on the topic of the resolution and the language of the resolution.



Site visits are a important part of being a fiscally responsible Legislator. By visiting sites that are requesting funding and/or have received funding, a legislator can get valuable information on the needs of the community and evaluate that tax money is being utilized in the most effective way.

On Tuesday, October 25th Senator Kidani, fellow senators from the Ways and Means committee and staff visited two sites on West Oahu, University of West Oahu (UHWO) and Nanakuli High and Intermediate. At UHWO the Senators received a tour of the construction site and was able to get information on the progress of the project. UHWO is happy to report that they will be open for classes on August of 2012.

Nanakuli High and Intermediate school gave a tour and a progress report on how their New Tech model implemented in 2009 with the help from Kamehameha schools have motivated their 9th and 10th graders to make significant strides in meeting milestones.
