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Aloha,

I have been working on several pieces of legislation for the 2010 legislative session:

- Solar and Photovoltaic (PV) Use: Use stimulus or general funds to encourage more consumers to purchase solar/PV technology. Vendors would get tax credit directly from state and tax credit would be assignable.
- Excessive Speeding: Authorizes the court to order forfeiture of a defendant's vehicle if it was used in the commission of the excessive speeding offense and in at least two prior excessive speeding convictions.
- Care home and daycare safety: Require sprinkler system, fire and smoke alarms for care homes and daycares.
- Alternative Energy: Allows eligible customer-generators to carry over unused credits for excess electricity from previous months until exhausted.
- **Tour de Hawaii:** Resolution requesting the Hawaii Tourism Authority to study the feasibility of establishing a "Tour de Hawaii" bike race, in the spirit of the Tour de France with the possibility of staging race segments on all the major populated islands.

If you have any requests for proposed legislation, please submit them to my office by October. Interim is an ideal time to sit down with me or one of my staff to discuss your issue and begin to develop legislation for the 2010 session.

SEPTEMBER 11 REMEMBERANCE CEREMONY

The City and County of Honolulu hosted a Remembrance Ceremony on September 11 to honor the memory of those who lost their lives eight years ago in the World Trade Center and Pentagon terrorist attacks. Senator Daniel K. Inouye's remarks on 9/11 were read aloud at the ceremony.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Free or reduced-cost lunch: In 2008, 38.6% of Hawai'i public school children received free or reduced-cost lunch, with the highest percentage among children in Hawai'i County (48.1%) and the lowest percentage among those in Maui County (33.1%).
- On time graduation: In 2008, the percentage of students who graduated within four years of the first time they entered the ninth grade was 80.1% for the state of Hawai'i, with the highest percentage occurring in Kauai County (85.1%) and the lowest percentage occurring in Hawai'i County (78.2%).
- College going rate: In 2008, the percentage of high school seniors who reported being accepted into higher education or training in May of the graduating year was 54.0% for the state of Hawai`i, with the highest percentage occurring in Hawai`i County (59.2%) and the lowest percentage occurring in Maui County (45.4%).

Kaho'olawe Legislative Access Tour

The Kaho`olawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC) invited Senator Kidani and other Hawaiian Caucus legislators to a special access tour of Kaho'olawe on September 15-16.

KIRC arranged the tour to give legislators a better understanding of the KIRC's strategic plan, vision for the future, current programs, and to begin a dialogue on future funding opportunities through site inspections and interaction with both KIRC staff and on-island volunteers.

Senator Kidani and the other guests explored the reef system and at Honoko'a Bay and KIRC staff gave a cultural briefing and demonstrated several ways they are encouraging sustainability and restoration on Kaho'olawe.

Senator Kidani and the other guests then completed the day with a hike of the Ala Loa trail. Overnight accommodations were at the KIRC's Base Camp facilities—complete with potable water sources, showers, machine shop, generator, education center, and reverse osmosis facilities.

The next morning Senator Kidani explored the Navigator's Chair, Bell Stone and other cultural and archeological sites and planting restoration work along the way before returning to Maui.

E Ala E – Rise Up

As the 'Öhua landing craft approached Honokanai'a Bay on a mid-September morning, Executive Director Mike Näho'opi'i began the chant *Mele Komo – Request to Enter* and, to a person, they stood. Respectfully. The purpose of this access was to enable members of the Hawaiian Caucus and other state legislators who have supported Kaho'olawe in the past to better understand the KIRC's new strategic plan, vision for the future, current programs, and to begin a dialogue on future funding opportunities through site inspections and interaction with both KIRC staff and on-island volunteers.

Included among the men and women of the Hawai'i State Legislature who'd taken time to update their acquaintance and relationship with Kanaloa Kaho'olawe were Senate Vice President Russell Kokubun of Hawai'i Island, Maui/Kaho'olawe Senator J. Kalani English, and Senators Brickwood Galuteria and Michelle Kidani of O'ahu and, from the House. Hawaiian Caucus Chair and Maui/Kaho'olawe Representative Mele Carroll. Earlier in the day, at a brief stop at Honoko'a Bay, members of the entourage explored the pristine reef system, noting that protection of Hawaii's resources can yield a near perfect habitat for reef fishes, honu (turtle) and 'īlioholoikauaua (Monk seal). The "nursery effect" of the Reserve's protection - food fish populations spilling out into the waters of Maui Nui - was also discussed in terms of sustainability.

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After settling into Honokanai'a Kauhale – including the inaugural overnight accommodations in recently retro-fitted Hut 10 – the group toured Base Camp facilities including potable water sources, showers, machine shop, generator, education center, and reverse osmosis facilities, and engaged in a comprehensive discussion of KIRC's alternative energy objectives, before traveling to Kealaikahiki for a cultural briefing at the Star Compass and a hike along the a recently completed section of the Ala Loa trail.

Following an after-dinner kanikapila led by Senator Galuteria, legislators headed for bed in preparation for a very early (4:30 a.m.) rising to call "E Ala E" and greet the sunrise at the Rain Ko'a. Traveling next to Moa'ulaiki, legislators explored the Navigator's Chair, Bell Stone and other cultural and archeological sites and planting

restoration work along the way. In returning to Base Camp, their last stop was Sailor's Hat – a poignant reminder of the devastation once wreaked upon Kaho'olawe that stands in stark contrast to today's aloha 'äina with which we mälama this incomparable island.

As they departed the Reserve to the chanted strains of *Ke Noi 'A'ama – Request for Release* – the legislators, like so many earlier visitors, rose as one, quietly and reflectively, before the profoundly personal awareness gained within the Kanaloa Kaho'olawe experience.
