

#### (D) Senate District 17– Serving Mililani Mauka, Mililani Town, Waipio Acres and Waipio Gentry



Aloha, friends and neighbors:

Two issues have attracted a good deal of public and media attention this summer. In each case, the Legislature is doing its due diligence and conducting reviews to assure that expenditures of taxpayer dollars are legal, appropriate, and not wasteful.

*First*, the University of Hawaii has been under fire for its handling of what is apparently a scam in which a \$200,000 payment was authorized to secure an on-campus concert to benefit UH Manoa athletics. That money is missing, and in the somewhat clumsy efforts to investigate how that happened, UH has now expended tens of thousands of dollars on two law firms and for outside public relations counsel. More money was spent on attorneys' costs for falsely-implicated Athletic Director Jim Donovan.

This information was only part of what was revealed to a Special Senate Committee on Accountability at a six hour long hearing on Monday. The loss of the concert money and the mounting legal bills are serious enough. But it is also evident that the University has some grave flaws in the way its fiscal, personnel and legal procedures are carried out. Even the governing Board of Regents chair admitted that its own policies may have been misinterpreted, and the Board is doing its own review of these issues.

UH President M.R.C. Greenwood repeatedly apologized to the Committee and a statewide TV audience for all of this and assured legislators that policies and procedures will be put in place to prevent these kinds of things from happening again. Our job is to hold the university accountable for that and to assure that taxpayer dollars appropriated to UH are spent to further the institution's educational mission.

Second, the Legislative Auditor has found that the Department of Education has lost control of costs for its student transportation program. The Auditor also determined that in many cases, no one was evaluating school bus routes to make sure they were best serving the needs of our students. We directed that the audit be conducted when it became clear last session that we weren't getting the answers we sought about these matters in hearings before the Senate Ways & Means and Education Committees - two of the Committees on which I serve as Vice Chair.

In each of these cases, money has been spent without clear accountability from our public educational institutions. Both UH and the DOE must answer to the public; they will be the focus of considerable attention during the 2013 session. Me ke Aloha,

#### **Construction funds continue to flow to our public schools.** There are two important goals:

- to reduce the tremendous backlog of repair and maintenance projects – with major focus on health and safety issues – that have been put on the back burner for so long due to budget restrictions
- to put people back to work in the many construction jobs that are required to complete these tasks.

Since the start of 2012, more than \$187 million in construction funds have been released for public school facilities across the state. Some of these funds were in the \$400 million accelerated repair and maintenance package initiated by the Senate in the 2012 session.



# In our neighborhoods, Waipahu High School and three elementary schools are on the list for the latest allocations just this month, totaling just over \$6 million.

- Kaleiopuu Elementary \$810,000 for electrical upgrades and air conditioner unit replacement
- Kanoelani Elementary \$1.326 million for a new fire alarm system, electrical system improvements and other work
- Waikele Elementary \$253,000 to improve campus drainage, refurbish the fire alarm system and for other projects
- Waipahu High School \$3.646 million for improvements to athletic facilities, replacing some air conditioning equipment, classroom, library and lab upgrades, and lighting, driveway and parking lot improvements
