Ukrainian Exchange Student from Kailua Shadows Senator

In January, Senator Pohai Ryan and her staff worked with an exchange student from Lviv in the Ukraine, who is currently living in Kailua and attending Kalaheo High School as a junior. Olha "Olya" Shestakova, 17, took time shadowing Senator Ryan in her daily duties around the Hawaii State Capitol, meeting some of the elected officials, and telling us about her time in Hawaii and our district.

"It was the first time I had been on a plane," Shestakova said. "The travel was a challenge. I went from Lviv to Kiev, the Ukraine's capital city, Frankfurt, Washington, DC, Los Angeles and then Hawaii."

Having come from Lviv, a city comprised of about 760,000 citizens, Shestakova found the transition to living in Kailua quite a challenge: "At first, I thought, I don't want to go to Hawaii; I don't like the heat. But when I got to Kailua I found that living in a small town with friendly people was great. I live two blocks from the beach. And I really love my host family." Other students in the FLAG (Foreign Links Around the Globe) student exchange program reside in Kailua and attend Kalaheo High School.

As for the capitol, Shestakova called Hawaii's Legislature impressive in its openness and accessibility. "In the Ukraine, the [elected] officials are not as available to the public; people in Hawaii are so willing to talk to you or ask about your life."

In the Ukraine, Shestakova studies law at her high school; she speaks 5 languages fluently (Russian, Ukrainian, English, American Sign Language and Ukrainian Sign Lanuage) and is learning Japanese at Kalaheo High School. She plans on going to University in the Ukraine, to study either computer science or law.

Kailua Elementary Librarian, Nationally Noted

In September 2010, Kailua Elementary School Library's library media specialist Darren Tanaka was given the 2010 "Outstanding Service Award" by the Hawaii Association of School Librarians (HASL). Kailua Elementary School Library is recognized as the best in the state and top 35 in the country (of 100,000 libraries), according to the American Association of School Librarians (AASL). A plaque had been presented to Tanaka by Nancy Everhart, the president of the AASL, on September 23, 2010.

The library features a 30-student computer lab, a practice area for the annual speech festival, a digital audio studio and a visual media studio. For outside competitions, there are also preparation areas for robotic LEGO projects, aquaponics and hydroponics. It also has numerous instruments for children to play.

"We had this crazy idea: what if the discovery and exploration could come through instruments?" Tanaka said. Tanaka has worked closely with other parts of the staff to incorporate art, music and science into the space, which encourages students to spend time in the library.

"Opportunities to be curious happen all the time," said Tanaka, referring to his bringing insects from outside for children to see or playing music at recess for the students.

Tanaka was raised in Kailua and graduated from Kalaheo in 1989; his parents still live in Kailua, but he resides in Kaneohe with his family. Senator Ryan awards Tanaka a certificate from the Senate, recognizing his achievement, at the Kailua Town Board Meeting on February 3, 2010.

Summary of Bills

BILLS TO WATCH

The following are four of the more interesting bills referred to each of the Committees Senator Ryan serves on. For comprehensive information on these measures and all others submitted to the House and Senate please visit <u>www.capitol.hawaii.gov</u>.

SBI – Hawaiian Affairs; Referral: HWN/WLH, JDL/WAM

MEASURE TITLE & DESCRIPTION: RELATING TO STATE RECOGNITION OF THE NATIVE HAWAIIAN PEOPLE, THEIR LANDS, ENTITLE-MENTS, HEALTH, EDUCATION, WELFARE, HERITAGE, AND CULTURE. - Provides for the recognition of the Native Hawaiian people by the State of Hawaii and implements that recognition by means and methods that will facilitate their self-governance, including the establishment of or the amendment to programs, entities, and other matters that relate, or affect ownership, possession, or use of lands by the Native Hawaiian people, and by further promoting their entitlements, health, education, welfare, heritage, and culture.

SB6 - Water, Land, and Housing; Referrals: AGL, WLH

MEASURE TITLE & DESCRIPTION: RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LANDS. - Protects agriculturally suitable lands within the State of Hawaii (lands with productivity ratings of "A" or "B").

SB220 – Public Safety, Government Operations, and Military Affairs Referrals: PGM/JDL, WAM

MEASURE TITLE & DESCRIPTION: RELATING TO AN AUTOMATED VICTIM NOTIFICATION SYSTEM. - Requires department of public safety to establish a statewide automated victim notification system to provide crime victims with current information regarding the offender's custodial status.

SB200 - Ways and Means; Referrals: EDT/JDB, WAM

MEASURE TITLE & DESCRIPTION: RELATING TO A STATE LOTTERY. - Requires DBEDT to investigate the possibility for Hawaii to participate in the multi-state Powerball lottery operated by the Multi-State Lottery Association or the Mega Millions lottery operated by the Mega Millions consortium, or both. Report to legislature.
