It is extremely important that Hawaii focus on sustainability because we are an island state and, while connected with the national and international markets, we must heavily rely on or our own resources. We have an obligation to care for our resources and pass on a better Hawaii to the next generation.

Another good reason to focus on sustainability is to improve our economy. Jobs in the "green" or "clean energy" industries are the professions of the future, providing opportunities for current workers and the future generation to access workforce opportunities with greater economic advantages while simultaneously meeting our obligations outlined in the state motto: "The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness".

Hawaii holds a strategic advantage in sustainable industries due to our natural resources and our location as hub between the West and the East.

Many exciting developments are taking place, and the legislature is working on smart policy to meet the goals that will improve our state on many fronts.

Electric Vehicles

The State of Hawaii Dept. of Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT), through a federal grant, is partnering with private companies to put more electric vehicle charging stations per capita in our state than any other by the end of 2012. We are an ideal place for such a venture because of the high gas prices and short driving distances.

HAWAII GREEN JOBS INITIATIVE

Hawaii experiences unique challenges in converting from a State that is 90% dependent on imported oil to one that meets the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative vision of being 70% reliant on renewable energy by 2030. As energy sector participants develop energy effi-



cient and renewable energy solutions, a strategic consideration is the availability and reliability of Labor Market Information (LMI).

The **Hawaii Green Jobs Initiative** is part of the Department of Labor & Industrial Relations' (DLIR) Research & Statistics Office. Launched in December 2009 with federal funding under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), the program aims to assist the State of Hawaii transition to a greener economy. Our partners include a Green Workforce Intelligence Network composed of government and industry representatives.

The goal of the Hawaii Green Jobs Initiative is to generate baseline employment estimates and projections in which education and training providers can be confident. Products will include: occupation and skills reports for industries, industry sectors, and state and local areas; a dedicated green sector website; asset map of green employers and training providers; new career pathways and rapid reemployment tools; training and awareness outreach activities.

\$6.1 million to the University of Hawaii (UH) to work with industry partners to allow the electric grid to take on more solar energy by developing and demonstrating state of the art photovoltaic (PV) inverters.

- \$750,000 to state Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) to provide technical assistance to the Public Utilities Commission and ultimately help remove barriers to allow for more renewable energy on the electric grid.
- \$300,000 to the UH Maui College in partnership with DBEDT and private industry to accelerate the adoption of electric vehicles in Hawaii.

Hawaii State Capitol: Leading By Example

The Hawaii State Capitol Building has entered the EPA's Battle of the Buildings contest which is comprised of 245 buildings across the country competing to see who will reduce their energy consumption the most.

In 2008 the State Senate launched their paperless initiative to make bills, testimony, hearing notices and other legislative documents fully accessible online. As a result, the Senate has reduced paper usage by 80% since 2007. During the

2010 Legislative Session, 1.5 million pages were

printed, compared to 8.3 million in 2007. Over the first three years of the initiative, the Senate has saved over half a million dollars in purchasing paper and copy machine expenses. Ours is the only legislature in the nation to operate fully paperless, and we are serving as a model for legislatures across the nation.

Other initiatives include recycling, energy and water conservation and emissions reduction.

GREEN JOBS FOR THE HOMELESS

Community Services is partnering with the Dept. of Human Services Homeless Program Branch to provide green job opportunities for individuals working toward escaping homelessness.

Programs will be organized into two categories:

- I. Recycling at State Buildings
- 2. Hydroponics (produce)

Many state agencies already participate in recycling. But there is no organized effort

The State of Hawaii Office of to get all of them involved in a coordinated effort. This is a perfect opportunity to have homeless shelter residents spearhead the collection This is a win-win process. because our state will become more environmentally friendly, while simultaneously providing funds to continue shelter services and give these individuals current work experience they will need when venturing out into the job market.

> The hydroponics program is already underway at Next

Step Shelter. The residents grow the produce to be sold at farmers markets and other venues. There may also be an aquaponics program in the future, and again, the shelter residents would be responsible for tending the product (tilapia farming), and learning to get the product to market.

These initiatives are a part of the Governor's plan to end homelessness. We will be hearing more about such initiatives in the near future.

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HAWAII'S WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT **COMPREHENSIVE PLAN**

The initial Green Workforce Report, released in late 2009 highlights some notable findings regarding developing a green economy and green industries. This report formed the foundation for the Labor Market Improvement (LMI) Grant.

During 2010, surveys were sent to over 9,000 local companies, asking whether they would determine themselves to be "green" based on criteria presented.

In December 2010, an initial evaluation of the surveys was presented to the WDC. Most "green" jobs on Oahu and Maui focused mostly on construction industries, while on Kauai and Hawaii, waste management claim most of the green jobs. The 2011 report should be available soon.

To support Hawaii's efforts in developing a new green economy and the workforce needed to compete, seven recommendations were made:

- I. Conduct a survey of business establishments based on the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) to determine occupations considered "green"
- 2. Determine the impact of "green practices" on industries and occupations that do not directly produce green products and services, but apply practices to daily operations to improve the environment and support sustainability
- 3. Expand green job development by soliciting job orders on the HireNet Hawaii website and by offering retraining and reemployment services for people to re-enter the workforce
- 4. Obtain green job openings by extracting jobs from online job banks and conducting job vacancy surveys
- 5. Build partnerships with employers, labor unions, and community colleges to provide guidance on gaps that exist within education and training systems
- 6. Conduct focus group sessions with industry representatives for better knowledge of needed skills
- 7. Support continuous improvement through usability studies and customer satisfaction surveys.

Historic Sites of Senate District 25

From a perch above Hanauma Bay, which is located at the eastern edge of Hawaii Kai, named "Mookua o Kaneapua," one can see Molokai, Lanai and Maui on a day with clear weather. Maui's enormous mountain, Haleakala, can also be seen. It's said that the area is a well known landing place for canoes from Molokai, since the easiest way to land on Oahu, due to swift wraparound currents that head north (making Sandy's a classic surfing spot), is to approach from the south of the island.

The name Hanauma could be interpreted using the word "uma" as curve, and "hana" which can mean bay. It is also said that, at one time, King Kamehameha I's favorite wife, Kaahumanu, once spent a month at Hanauma bay being entertained by hula and uma, which is the Hawaiian word for hand-wrestling competitions. It stayed a gathering area for royal people and was a known fishing spot for King Kamehameha V.

Other interpretations lead

to that same definition of handwrestling, making the word "hana" refer to work (or the act of doing something). There is a legend about the area in which two chiefs solve a conflict by hand-wrestling, which was a common way to prove strength and settle arguments. They were fighting for the love of a beautiful woman named "Ke-ohinani" (which could be interpreted as "the beautiful young creature"). Whoever prevailed in the challenge would receive the chance to marry Keohinani. In the

end, Keohinani was turned into the curved mountainside near Hanauma bay. After realizing that the strength of the two chiefs may be so great and so matched that it was possible that they both lose their life, Keohinani submitted prayers to the gods to resolve the situation - what she received was immortality as this mountain, which could be admired by both men and anyone who lived in the area. The legend also says that her father, to protect her, took on the shape of a lizard and curled in next to her, forming Koko Head.
