THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

(**DOD**) is headed by an adjutant general and director of civil defense. Maj. Gen. Darryll Wong was confirmed to this position in 2011. This department has the crucial responsibility for the defense of the State and its people from mass violence, originating from either human or natural causes. Five divisions belong to the DOD: Hawaii Army National Guard, Hawaii Air National Guard, State Civil Defense, Hawaii Office of Veterans Services, Youth CHalleNGe Academy. THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC

SAFETY (DPS) is headed by a director of public safety. Jodie Maesaka-Hirata was confirmed to this position in 2011. The department is responsible for the formulation and implementation of state policies and objectives for correctional, security, law enforcement, and public safety programs and functions. It is responsible for all public and private correctional facilities, service of process and security of state buildings. DPS is comprised of three divisions: administration, corrections and law enforcement, which is comprised of the Sheriff's Division and Narcotics Enforcement. Office of Veterans Services

The Office of Veterans Services (OVS) is the principal state office responsible for the development and management of policies and programs related to veterans, their dependents, and/or survivors. The OVS acts as a liaison between the Governor and veterans' organizations and also between the Department of Veterans Affairs and individual veterans. Our objectives are to assist veterans in obtaining State and federal entitlements, to supply the latest information on veterans' issues and to provide advice and support to veterans making the transition back into civilian life.

Hawaii State Civil Defense

The Hawaii State Civil Defense Agency (HSCD) is responsible for the coordination of activities of all organizations for civil defense within the State. Civil defense to include a disaster or emergency beyond local control, for which the state will assume direct operational control over necessary functions.

HSCD's powers and duties include preparing comprehensive plans and programs; training and public information; operational control; facilities protection; and air raid drills. HSCD is also responsible, during an official emergency period, for shelters and first aid stations, quarantine and immunization, police and fire departments, suspension of laws.



Hawaii Army National Guard

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The Hawaii Army National Guard's (HIARNG) federal mission is to serve as an integral component of the Total Army by providing fully-manned, operationally- ready, and well-equipped units that can respond to any national contingency ranging from war and peacekeeping missions to nation-building operations. The state mission of the HIARNG is to provide a highly effective, professional, and organized force capable of supporting and assisting civilian authorities in response to natural disasters, human-caused crises, or the unique needs of the state and its communities.

WOUNDED WARRIOR PROGRAM

The Wounded Warrior Program is a nonprofit organization raising awareness and enlisting the public's aid to meet the needs of injured service members, to help them and to provide programs designed for their unique needs.

Law Enforcement Division

Public Safety's Law Enforcement Division is divided into two very distinct and important sub-divisions: Narcotics Enforcement and Sheriffs.

NARCOTICS

ENFORCEMENT

NED serves and protects the public by enforcing laws relating to controlled substances and regulated chemicals. They are responsible for the registration and control of the manufacture, distribution, prescription, and dispensing of controlled substances and precursor or essential chemicals within the state.

SHERIFFF DIVISION

The Sheriff Division carries out law enforcement services statewide. Its mission is to preserve the peace by protecting all persons and property within premises under the control of the Judiciary and State facilities; providing process services and execution of court documents; handling detained persons; and providing secure transportation for persons in custody. It also provides law enforcement services at the Honolulu International Airport.

Corrections

The Corrections Division is composed of a number of parts including: program coordination, correctional industries, program services, health care, institution division, offender management, PSD comprehensive offender registry plan and locate an offender program.

Primary responsibilities include operation of Hawaii's jails for pretrial and short term sentences and prisons for long term secure incarceration. Additionally, this agency is focusing on programs to decrease recidivism by providing vocational rehabilitation which gives inmates a chance to learn a new skill while simultaneously providing community services.

Other programs of importance for Correction include education, nutrition, religion, substance abuse counseling and sex offender treatment. The Intake Services section focuses on community supervision of offenders as well as diversion programs and reentry issues.

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ARE YOU PREPARED FOR AN EMERGENCY?



The US Dept of Homeland Security provides some simple steps to prepare for and respond to potential emergencies including natural disasters, which are a concern in Hawaii. The three keys that are stressed: organize an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different types of emergencies that occur and the appropriate responses.

We should ideally have at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kit in the workplace, vehicle or other places we spend time.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

□Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

□Food, at least a three-day supply of nonperishable food

□Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

□Flashlight and extra batteries

□First aid kit

UWhistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelterin-place

□Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

□ Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)

ADDITIONAL ITEMS TO CONSIDER

- Prescription medication and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Pet food and water for your pet
- Important family documents such as insurance policies, ID, bank account records (store in waterproof container)
- Cash or travelers checks and change
- Emergency reference materials (www.ready.gov)
- Sleeping bag or blankets
- Change of clothing (long-sleeve shirts, pants, sturdy shoes)
- Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper—when diluted 9 parts water to 1 part bleach, it can be used as a disinfectant
- Fire extinguisher
- Matched in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates , plastic utensils. Paper towels
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles or activities for children

STATE OF HAWAII PUBLIC EMERGENCY SHELTERS

Public Emergency Shelters may not be open during evacuations for a Tsunami warning. Civil defense or emergency management will provide locations of tsunami evacuation centers or assembly areas through local media.

Historic Sites of Senate District 25

Na Pohaku o Hauwahine

Location: Right side of Kapaa Quarry Road at the Y intersection.



Na Pohaku o Hauwahine is a protrusion of boulders on the western edge of Kawai Nui Marsh. From this vantage there is a scenic view into the 12acre marsh area.

Historical legend has it that Hauwahine is a manifestation of the water spirit (mo'o) of the marsh. Pele's younger sister, Hiiaka, and her companion Wahineoma'o traveled through Windward Oahu and may have experienced a solar eclipse at this particular site.



The previous fishpond and taro paddies have been gone since the early 1900s, but at 850acre wetland is left behind. It is the largest on the island of Oahu.

sentative Chris Lee for a Marine Corps hosted tour of the next generation Marine Operations in Urban Terrain (MOUT) at Marine Corps Training area in bellows. Structures were build to recreate the realistic deployment environment of Middle East terrain, including visuals, sounds and smell.

Senator Ryan was most impressed by the role playing exercises conducted by American Afghani actors

who simulated actual combat conditions. One of the most jarring components was to experience the Humvees rolling in.

This project is extremely important for military preparedness. But it also brought in an economic impact of \$28 million to Hawaii in the areas of vendors, suppliers and contractors, infusing more than \$10 million into the local economy.
