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BUDGET NOTES AND HIGHLIGHTS



- <u>\$612,797</u> in general funds to retain the HILO YOUTH CHALLENGE ACADEMY.
- An additional <u>\$2,482,554</u> for the HAWAII KEIKI PROGRAM, promoting healthy keiki and reducing the amount of absences statewide.
- **<u>\$901,292</u>** to restore (14) important HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS positions.
- <u>\$500,000</u> for fiscal year 2022 in American Rescue Plan funds for additional funding for the RENT SUPPLEMENT PROGRAM for low income families.
- <u>\$5,400,000</u> in American Rescue Plan funds for fiscal year 2022 for additional funding for GENERAL ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS FOR TEMPORARILY DISABLED INDIVIDUALS to maintain the current level of benefits.
- <u>\$14,300,000</u> in American Rescue Plan funds for continued homeless services including the HOUSING FIRST PROGRAM, the RAPID RE-HOUSING PROGRAM, the HOMELESS OUTREACH SERVICES AND CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES, and the STORED PROPERTY AND DEBRIS REMOVAL SERVICE.
- <u>\$1,739,179</u> to restore (57) critical CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES positions.
- <u>\$31,035,000</u> for fiscal years 2022 and 2023 in American Rescue Plan funds for cash support for CHILDCARE.
- <u>\$4,684,584</u> in general funds and <u>\$10,286,655</u> in federal funds for HIV PREVENTION AND CARE SERVICES.
- <u>\$1,500,000</u> in American Rescue Plan funds for fiscal year 2022 for the EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON AGING for purchase of services for SENIOR CENTERS.
- <u>\$1,459,440</u> for (30) new CONSERVATION AND RESOURCE ENFORCEMENT officers statewide.
- <u>\$1,646,475</u> to restore the YOUTH CONSERVATION CORPS PROGRAM to provide youth with environmental stewardship opportunities.

SIGNIFICANT NON-BUDGET BILLS

- **HB887**: Increases penalties for sex-trafficking of minors.
- **<u>SB793</u>**: Removes the sub-minimum wage for disabled workers.
- <u>SB159</u>: Automatic Voter Registration.
- <u>SB512</u>: SNAP; removes \$10 cap and increases local produce purchases.
- HB1376: Mediation requirement for evictions. Encourages mutually beneficial resolution between landlords and tenants.
- <u>SB244</u>: Expanded liability protections for donors of food and similar charitable donations made to needy persons by organizations.
- <u>SB970</u>: Expanded telehealth recognition.
- <u>HB767</u>: Hawaii-Farm-to-School Program; Supports Hawaii's Food Security Goals; Supports local producers while providing students with nutritious locally grown food.
- <u>SB538</u>: Restores authority to the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission to enforce disability complaints.
- HB282: Expands no-cost emergency shelter for minors.
- HB566: Adds "coercive control" to the offense of abuse of family or household member.

2021 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

\$20.5 million for cellular-based vehicle to everything statewide system construction to increase broadband connectivity along state highways

\$10 million in fiscal year 2022 for the design, plan and construction of a new library in upper Puna

\$1.3 million to reinstall a right-turn-on red from Shower Drive to Hwy 130 that was removed to allow a left turn lane from Hwy 130 into Shower Drive

\$1.23 million to improve facilities at mountain view elementary school

\$250,000 to install split air conditioning units and other ventilation improvements at Kea'au middle school
