Rat Lungworm Disease – (click on link to get more information) Be aware. Make sure you wash your fresh produce:

Over the past 5 years, cases of eosinophilic meningitis caused by the rat lungworm parasite have risen sharply in Hawaii. Since 2007 there have been 42 statewide reported cases of 'rat lungworm', with 38 cases from the Big Island. Slugs, snails and flatworms are hosts of the rat lungworm parasite.

The parasite travels through the blood stream and can affect the brain and spinal cord. Symptoms may include flu-like conditions, severe headache, stiffness of the neck and back, skin tingling and sensitivity, sensitivity to light, hallucinations, paralysis, vision problems and visual impairment, short-tem memory loss, nausea and vomiting, debilitating nerve pain, even death.

An infected rat passes the worms in its droppings. Snails, slugs, freshwater prawns, crabs and frogs can become infected by ingesting the worms. Infection is generally a result from accidental consumption of a slug, snail or <u>their slime on unwashed or poorly washed</u>, raw produce or insufficiently cooked freshwater prawns, crabs and frogs. Chemical wash solutions have not shown to be effective in removing slugs and snails from produce and some victims believe that consumption of unfiltered catchment water may have been the cause of their infection.

Prevention is the best way to reduce your risk of infection. Control the rodents, slugs and snails and carefully (if you wear glasses, put them on) examine and wash your fresh produce, pay special attention to the curly leafy vegetables. Snails and slugs chew irregular holes with smooth edges so discard any vegetable leaves showing this type of damage or have slime trails. Do not leave your pet's food dishes outside at night as slugs, snails, and rats are attracted to the food. If you use rainwater catchment be sure to have the tank properly covered, check for slime trails and change your filters regularly. It is also important to regularly clean your tank and any gutters feeding into the tank.

what can we do to be prepared? Now that hurricane season is here, below are some tips when a hurricane or tropical storm threatens:

- Tune in to your local radio/television station to find out if there is an evacuation order and for shelter locations nearest you.
- Review your Emergency Plan- escape routes in your home, meeting location, emergency phone numbers, and your Emergency Kit (items in your kit should include 7 days of food, water and medications, battery or solar powered radio, flashlight and extra batteries, plastic bags and ties for waste, whistle, matches, blankets and tarps, personal hygiene items, and a first aid kit).
- Keep important documents such as your passport or driver's license, banking and credit card information, insurance information, healthcare directives, copy of property titles/deeds, prescriptions and dosages, list of family and important numbers, etc. in a sealed plastic bag.
- Store and secure outdoor lawn furniture and other loose, lightweight objects, such as garbage cans and garden tools that might be blown away by high winds, and become flying debris.
- Boats should be moored securely, or moved to a designated safe area well before the storm arrives.
- Windows should be boarded up. .
- Make sure you have gas in your car and some cash on hand.
