

Aloha! I am happy to report on some of the measures I introduced or supported which passed during the 2022 Legislative Session:



On 04/25/22, Rep. Cedric Gates and Sen. Maile Shimabukuro participated in a vigil on Farrington Highway and at Keaau Beach for Michelle Kalena McPeek, who died tragically at the hands of her son. McPeek is the daughter of Episcopal priest Fr. Steve McPeek, whose parents were teachers at Mā'ili Elementary and Wai'anae Intermediate. Dr. Kahu Kaleo Patterson (standing in center of first row, holding pu or conch shell) was a key organizer of the event. Among other things, he blessed the food, which was provided by Pokai Bay Drive-In, Berny Luning, Patrice Tanna, Shirley and Sherry Cordeiro, Helen Patterson, Abeleen Lau, the Office of Sen. Maile Shimabukuro, and others. A man passing the event in a white truck generously donated four cases of water. Special mahalo to the Okimoto Ohana, owners of Waianae Store, along with employees, attended the vigil. They fondly remembered Michelle McPeek, who worked as a cashier at Waianae Store during the morning shift.

Among the many highlights of 2022 are \$315,000 awarded to Wai'anae Economic Development Council (GIA); SR139 Marijuana dispensaries to benefit Native Hawaiians; and \$300,000 awarded to Searider Productions (GIA).

DOT was awarded \$8.6m for traffic signal modern*ization*, \$1.5*m* for bikeway *improvements*, \$4*m* for highway lighting improvements, and \$14.5m for freeway destination sign upgrades or replacements. I was delighted to be visited by members of the Wai'anae Moku Kupuna Council at the *Capitol, who advocate for* transportation and many other improvements for the Wai'anae Coast. Stand-

Public Safety and Military Affairs HB2171 Appropriates \$900,000 and establishes a Department of Law Enforcement to consolidate and administer criminal law enforcement and investigations functions of the State. Effective 1/1/2024, the bill also transfers the law enforcement functions of the Department of Public Safety, Department of Transportation, Department of the Attorney General, and the Office of Homeland Security to the Department of Law Enforcement. It establishes a training center and a law enforcement complex. SR78/SR44 Wai'anae Police Distrct 9 \$100,000 Hoola Na Pua human trafficking prevention (GIA)
