Last month, a project I had been working on for two years with DOE and DOT finally came to life! Students from Mililani, Waipahu, and Pearl City High Schools collaborated with local artists and the Hawai'i Department of Transportation (DOT) to transform nearly three-quarters of a mile along Kamehameha Highway, from Waipahu Street to Waipi'o Uka, into a vibrant visual story celebrating the Waipi'o Ahupua'a. It was truly inspiring to see students come together to create a piece of art they can take pride in while beautifying our community. Brought to life with the help of nearly 100 high school student painters, the mural presents a mauka-to-makai perspective, illustrating O'ahu's water journey from the mountains to the sea and depicting how it shapes the land and sustains the life around us.

Waikele Elementary earned national recognition for its innovative career pathway program, preparing students for success from an early age. Waipahu High School was honored with the prestigious North Star Award for its leadership in inclusive education. I also had the opportunity to visit Pearl City High School as part of the National Career Academy Coalition's tour, where I witnessed firsthand the incredible work being done through their College and Career Academies. Our schools continue to shine with accomplishments that reflect the dedication and hard work of our students, teachers, and staff!

HIDOE's New E-bike Rules and Regulations



The Hawai'i State Department of Education has announced new regulations regarding electric bicycles (e-bikes) on school campuses, effective immediately starting November 5th. Emphasizing that student safety remains the top priority, as the use of motorized vehicles becomes more common. Key updates include:

- Electric motorcycles (including those with "ghost pedals") are strictly prohibited on all HIDOE properties.
- Elementary and middle/intermediate schools: E-bikes are not allowed due to age restrictions, riders must be at least 15 years old.
- High schools: Students aged 15+ may bring e-bikes if they are properly registered and display a county-issued decal. Unregistered e-bikes will be confiscated and returned to parents.

Kamehameha Highway Mural Project

On October 25th and 26th, in partnership with HDOT and HIDOE, High School students from Mililani, Waipahu, and Pearl City, successfully completed a collaborative mural project along Kamehameha Highway. Nearly 100 students participated through the HDOT Workforce Internship Program, gaining valuable hands-on experience in the field. The mural, with leadership by three local artists, depicts a mauka-to-makai lens, telling the story of Oʻahu's water journey from mountain to sea, transforming the land and sustaining life along the way. What started as a vision to beautify our community has turned into something truly special — a collaboration between our students, artists, and agencies to bring color and pride to our neighborhood.



Drive with Aloha on the Road: Safety Starts with You!



As we enter the holiday season, let's all remember to drive with aloha. Here are a few simple reminders to help keep you and your loved ones safe on the road:

- 1. Always Wear Your Seatbelt It's your first line of defense in an accident. It is the drivers responsibility to make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly buckled up.
- 2. Stay Focused and Avoid Distractions Keep your eyes on the road and avoid texting, eating, or adjusting the radio while driving.
- Follow Speed Limits Speeding reduces reaction time and increases the severity of accidents. Drive at safe speeds, especially in school zones and residential areas.
- 4. Don't Drive Under the Influence Alcohol, drugs, and even some prescription drugs can impair your ability to drive. Always choose to drive sober.
- 5. Use Turn Signals Let other drivers know your intentions. Signal well in advance before turning or changing lanes.
