FRESH, FAST, AND FLYING

In a bold move that promises to reshape Hawai'i's agricultural future, Maui Gold Pineapple Company forged a groundbreaking partnership with Amazon Air to airship its famed pineapples to the U.S. mainland—faster, fresher, and more cost-effectively than ever before.

This innovative shipping deal was initiated by Senator Wakai. After discovering that Amazon's cargo planes often returned empty after delivering goods to Hawai'i, Wakai boldly asked,"What do they take back to the mainland?" Their reply: "Nothing." Undeterred, "I approached Amazon saying, 'nothing is unacceptable—let's fill them with locally made products," Sen. Wakai recalled.

Months of planning with stakeholders—including the Department of Agriculture, Maui Gold, the Hawai'i Farm Bureau, and Amazon—culminated in a formal agreement to move forward with air shipments.



"This is a really big game changer for us," said John White, CEO of Maui Gold. He envisions this model supporting other Hawai'i-made products—such as ukuleles, aloha shirts, and local baked goods—in breaking into mainland markets.

"It's more than just what comes out of the ground... this model can help Hawaii manufacturing diversify away from tourism," said Sen. Wakai.

Community Kokua

As Hurricane Kiko approached the Hawaiian Islands, the Food Bank of Hawaii partnered with Salt Lake Elementary School to serve as a key distribution point for daily rations.
