IN RESPONSE TO ACT 212, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2018

DECEMBER 2024

Act 212, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018 report on Inmate Rehabilitation, Reentry System, to include Performance Indicators:

To identify the factors that may increase the chances of an offender re-offending, the Reentry Coordination Office (RCO) created a reentry plan form. This form is utilized by our Correctional Case Managers statewide from the start of an offender's incarceration and is useful in identifying an offender's needs prior to release.

Primary factors identified as an important part of an inmate's release plan is housing, employment, family relationships, community support, and personal documents. The Reentry Coordination Office continues to maintain contracts with various clean and sober homes for both male and female offenders, with the recent addition of Therapeutic Living Programs for the female furloughees.

The Reentry Coordination Office also maintains a contract with the Goodwill Industries to offer job readiness services for male and female offenders on Oahu and the Big Island. The City and County Team WorkHawaii has also partnered with the Reentry Coordination Office to offer job readiness services to those who are maxing out from our prisons with a continuum of services in the community. Parents and Children (PACT) also assists those on furlough by providing items for employment and access to their computer lab for job searching.

Other partnerships of significance include the Waikiki Health Center (Medquest applications), Transforming Lives (Reentry classes and Resource/Housing Fairs), United Self-Help (Peer Support), Child Support Enforcement Agency (Modification to monthly payments/debt), Veteran's Administration Outreach (Establishing eligible benefits), Department of Transportation/Department of Motor Vehicles (State ID), and Department of Health (Birth Certificates).

The Reentry Coordination Office has been providing one (1) months worth of bus passes for qualifying male and female offenders being released from our prisons statewide.
