RELATING TO CONVICTION DATA.

HD1 (HSCR814-06) Requires a review committee of the judicial council to investigate the current status of internet access to criminal conviction data. (HB1984

RELATING TO THEFT.

(HSCR666-06)

Provides that an individual caught with stolen property belonging to three or more persons in the same or separate incident as part of a common scheme or plan commits second degree theft. (HB1826 HD1)

RELATING TO LIMITATION OF ACTIONS.

(HSCR648-06)

Extends the statute of limitations for a civil action based on child sex abuse to 10 years after the victim reaches age of majority. Provides a 1-year window to bring an action for child sex abuse if the extended statute of limitations has expired, provided that no more than 25 years has passed since the victim reached the age of majority. (HB2895

RELATING TO EMOTIONAL DISTRESS. (HSCR448-06)

Clarifies that liability for negligent infliction of emotional distress or disturbance will not arise from damage to real property and inanimate

material objects.

HB 3253

RELATING TO THE HAWAII RULES OF EVIDENCE. (HSCR683-06)

Provides that an issue regarding admission or exclusion of evidence is preserved for appeal once the court makes a definitive ruling on the issue and that a litigant need not renew objection or make offer of

proof thereafter to preserve the issue for appeal.

RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE.

(HSCR665-06)

Makes technical and substantive changes to Penal Code chapters 704,

706, 707, 708, 709, 710, 711, and 712. (HB3256 HD1)
