JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 16, 1974

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives convened in Regular Session on Wednesday, January 16, 1974, at 10:00 o'clock a.m., with the Honorable Tadao Beppu, Speaker of the House of Representatives, presiding.

The National Anthem was sung by Mr. Nephi Hanneman.

At 10:45 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

The Chair, at this time, introduced to the members of the House and their guests the Honorable John A. Burns, Governor of the State of Hawaii; Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. George R. Ariyoshi, and United States Senator Hiram L. Fong and Mrs. Fong.

The Chair then addressed the members of the House, as follows:

"Members of the House, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen:

I welcome all of you to the opening of the Second Session of the Seventh State Legislature. I believe we are entering what can be appropriately labeled 'times that try men's souls', and, I might add, patience, if you happen to be some of the many who had to wait in line this morning for gasoline.

I shall not burden you with the details of some of the concerns and issues confronting all of us in the Legislature and the people of Hawaii. Many of these have already been enunciated by legislators through program presentations at different times. There are many ideas and issues that are varied and diverse as the colors of the Chamber tapestry that is in front of you. There are many other problems and many issues, but I am sure that as we go along, we will be able to, as best as we can, solve the current problems. Using the Hawaiian concept of 'kukulu kumuhana', we must pool our strengths in a helpful and constructive nature toward providing the quality of life to which our people have a right.

I know it is a great challenge, but all of us must meet our responsibilities and obligations. I hope all of you will join me in accepting the challenge.

Thank you very much."

Representative Soares then addressed the members of the House, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, guests and honored people on this floor today:

Your House Republicans are examples of patience and I don't know any Hawaiian word to describe it any further. However, we are ready for the days ahead, Mr. Speaker. We realize our responsibilities to the people of our State and we dedicate ourselves this morning in this very colorful and honorable chamber, to serve the people of our State with dignity, honor and dedication. We want to be sure that everything we do is for them, as we are, their servants.

Mr. Speaker, the time has come for production, the time has come for example. Your House Republicans are ready for them.

Thank you."

DISPOSITION OF MATTER PLACED ON THE CLERK'S DESK

By unanimous consent, H. R. No. 1 was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative R. Garcia moved that H. R. No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Uechi.

Representative O'Connor then offered the following amendment to H. R. No. 1:

"H. R. No. 1 is amended in its entirety to read as set forth in House Resolution attached hereto as H. R. No. 1, H. D. 1:

'HOUSE RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1974, that so much of the Official Rules of Procedure adopted by the House of Representatives, State of Hawaii, Seventh State Legislature as hereinafter enumerated and set forth be and the same are hereby amended as follows:

1. Paragraphs (16) and (17) of Rule 6 relating to duties and powers of the Speaker are amended to read as follows:

(16) The Speaker shall, within five session days, refer all bills to committees subject to an appeal to the House. In referring bills to one or more standing committees, the first referral shall be to the standing committee whose area of responsibility as described in Part II of these rules is most closely related to the subject matter contained in the bill being referred. In the case of multiple committee referrals, the Speaker shall name the standing committee referred to in the sentence immediately preceding as the committee having primary responsibility for the drafting of, and to make recommendations for action on, the bill so referred. However, where more than one standing committee could qualify as the committee having primary responsibility, preference shall be given to the committee having jurisdiction on a statewide, rather than a local basis.

(17) The Speaker shall appoint the chairman and members of the conference committees pursuant to Rule 15(1) (d).

2. Rule 6 relating to duties and powers of the Speaker is amended by adding a new paragraph to read as follows:

(18) The Speaker shall, together in coordination with the President of the Senate, establish, no later than seven days after the opening day of session, cut-off dates to facilitate the smooth flow of legislation, including the last date for bill introduction, for third reading of House bills, for third reading of Senate bills, for conference drafts and agreements, for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill in oddnumbered years and the Supplemental Appropriations Bill in even-numbered years.

3. Rule 13 relating to Assistant Sergeantat-Arms is amended to read as follows:

RULE 13. ASSISTANT SERGEANTS-AT-ARMS

The Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms shall assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in enforcing his duties. In addition, the Assistant Sergeantsat-Arms shall perform the duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms in his absence."

4. Paragraph (1) (d) of Rule 15 relating to Committees is amended to read as follows:

(d) Conference Committees: Conference Committees shall be appointed for the purpose of resolving differences between the House and the Senate on any matters where the joint agreement of the House and Senate is required. The Chairman of the Conference Committee on the part of the House shall be the Chairman of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter to be resolved. The membership of a Conference Committee shall be based on proportional representation between the majority and minority parties. In appointing the minority party members, the Speaker shall consult with the minority leadership of the House. The Speaker shall appoint the members of a conference committee from so much of the membership, as the Speaker shall determine, of the standing committee or committees to which the matter has been referred; provided that the Speaker may appoint such members from without such standing committee or committees if the Speaker and the chairman of such standing committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter shall so mutually agree.

5. A new paragraph numbered (1) (f) is added to Rule 15 relating to Committees, to read as follows:

(f) Interim Committee: An Interim Committee is a committee established between regular sessions to accomplish specified objectives and work. The appointment of interim committees should be completed by the Speaker within thirty days following the close of the session. The chairman of any interim committee should be the chairman of the standing committee which has primary responsibility, as defined by the rules, over the programs or matters to be considered by the interim committee. The membership of an Interim Committee shall be based on proportional representation between the majority and minority parties. In appointing the minority party members to an Interim Committee, the Speaker shall consult with the Speaker shall appoint the members of an Interim Committee from so much of the membership, as the Speaker shall determine, of the standing committee or committees to which the matter has been referred; provided that the Speaker may appoint such members from without such standing committee or committees if the Speaker and the chairman of such standing committee having primary responsibility of the subject matter shall so mutually agree.

6. Paragraphs (4), (5) and (6) of Rule 16 relating to Standing Committees are amended to read as follows:

(4) Meetings of standing committees shall be public, with adequate reasonable notice; provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals. No standing committee shall sit during the time when the House is actually in session except with the permission of the Speaker.

(5) The chairman of each standing committee shall keep a record of public hearings and shall file same with the State archives, through the Speaker, as soon as practicable after each session.

(6) No member of the House should be placed on more than four standing committees.

7. A new paragraph numbered (7) is added to Rule 16 relating to Standing Committees, to read as follows:

(7) No bill shall be reported out of a standing committee unless it shall have received a public hearing.

8. A new paragraph numbered (4) is added

to Rule 19 relating to Conference Committee, to read as follows:

(4) The Chairman of the Finance Committee shall be designated the Chairman of the Conference Committee on the General Appropriations, Supplemental Appropriations, and the General Public Improvements Bill. He shall invite the participation of the primary committee chairman of the standing committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates. After review, the Chairman of the Conference Committee shall be responsible for preparing the budgets for consideration by the House.

9. A new paragraph numbered (3) is added to Rule 32 relating to Third Reading to read as follows:

(3) Any rule to the contrary notwithstanding, the House shall not concur with amendments nade by the Senate until such amendments have been considered and favorably reported upon by the standing committee having primary responsibility for the subject matter contained in the bill.

(10) Rule 51 relating to Standing Committees is amended to read as follows:

RULE 51. STANDING COMMITTEES

Standing Committees shall be created by resolution for each major subject matter area at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Seventh legislative session. The major subject matter areas and the Standing Committees therein shall be as follows:

EDUCATION AND CULTURE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote intellectual development and cultural enrichment of the community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

(1) Committee on Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to lower education, continuing education, public libraries, culture and the arts.

(2) Committee on Higher Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the University of Hawaii and the community colleges.

HUMAN RESOURCES

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to insure adequate income, housing, and physical and mental health of the people. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

(3) Committee on Public Health and Welfare, whose scope shall be those programs relating to general health, maternal and child care, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, mental retardation and hospitals, and to financial assistance, vocational rehabilitation, and social welfare services.

(4) Committee on Housing, whose scope shall be those programs relating to housing.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

This major subject matter area covers those

programs which are intended to insure employment for individuals and families and to encourage the economic development and growth of the State, to provide for Hawaiian Homes programs, to promote government efficiency and improved employment conditions for government employees, and to provide recreational opportunities. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

(5) Committee on Water, Land Use and Development, whose scope shall be those programs relating to land and water resources and use, marine resource development, industrial and product promotion, new industry development, financial and technical assistance to business, and outdoor recreation, State parks and historic sites development and protection, and fish and game management and Hawaiian Homes programs.

(6) Committée on Tourism, whose scope shall be those programs relating to tourism.

(7) **Committee on Agriculture**, whose scope shall be those programs relating to agriculture.

(8) Committee on Labor and Public Employment, whose scope shall be those programs relating to employment opportunities and labor-management relations, and to those programs relating to government operations and efficiency, employee pay and benefits, employee recruitment, classification and training, career development, employee performance, employment conditions, standards of conduct for public employees, and collective bargaining.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND JUSTICE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to safeguard individual and property rights, protect consumers from fraudulent and deceptive practices, promote public safety and improve the conduct of business affairs. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

(9) Committee on Judiciary and Corrections, whose scope shall be those programs relating to courts, crime prevention and control, criminal code revision, the rules of the House, judicial and legal questions, constitutional matters, programs of the Attorney General and of the Judiciary (except programs directly related to the Revisor of Statutes) and other pertinent matters referred to it by the House, public institutions on corrections and rehabilitation, and individual rights and civil liberties. In the event of a contest, it shall investigate and report upon the certificates of election of members. The Committee shall consider all petitions and other matters relating to elections and report thereon.

(10) Committee on Consumer Protection. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Consumer Protection, unless otherwise directed by the House, to consider all bills, petitions, resolutions, matters and those portions of the budget relating to programs for consumer protection and the regulation of trade, business, professions and occupations and other pertinent matters referred to it by the House.

ENVIRONMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote conditions which enhance ecological balance, safeguard the environment, and conserve natural resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(11) Committee on Environmental Protection, whose scope shall be those programs relating to environmental quality control and protection, and environmental health.

TRANSPORTATION

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to facilitate the physical movement of people and goods into and from the State and from place to place within the State. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(12) Committee on Transportation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to air, water and surface transportation.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote effective cooperation and coordination among the various levels of government and promote public defense. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(13) Committee on Federal, State and County Relations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to relations among federal, state and county governments, and relating to public defense.

FINANCIAL PLANNING AND MANAGEMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to produce the efficient, effective, economical and equitable acquisition and utilization of financial resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(14) Committee on Finance, whose scope shall be those programs relating to overall State financing policies, including taxation and other revenues and cash and debt management, and statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation.

LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT

This major subject area covers those programs which are intended to provide the administrative supervision of accounting and printing services. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

(15) Committee on Legislative Management, whose scope shall be those programs relating to supervision of accounting and printing services, control of the expenses of the House in accordance with the appropriations acts providing for such expenses, and auditing and settling of all accounts which may be charged to the expenses of the House.

11. Rule 52 relating to Standing Committees: General Responsibility is amended to read as follows:

RULE 52. STANDING COMMITTEES: GENERAL RESPONSIBILITY

Each Standing Committee shall consider all bills, petitions, resolutions, and other items relating to the programs and matters over which it has primary responsibility and all other items as may properly come before it.

Each committee shall systematically review those portions of the State's program and financial plan and variance reports as may relate to programs over which the committee has primary responsibility. It shall examine those portions of the executive budget and the General and Supplemental Appropriations Bills relating to such programs and recommend to the Committee on Finance the programs and amounts to be spent thereon. (The executive budget and the General and Supplemental Appropriations Bills are hereinafter collectively referred to as the 'State budget.') The recommended programs and amounts, taken as a whole, shall be consistent with and within the expenditure amounts allocated by the Committee on Finance.

On other bills referred to a committee by the House, the committee shall, after determination of the objectives of the bill, make appropriate recommendations, including, if proper, expenditure recommendations. Such expenditure recommendations shall be consistent with the allocations established by the Committee on Finance. On bills which relate to programs and matters over which a Standing Committee to which they are referred has no primary responsibility, the Standing Committee shall make no change of any kind to the bill unless the approval of the primary committee is first obtained.

Each Standing Committee shall review how programs over which it has primary responsibility have been carried out in compliance with legislative direction and whether studies, analysis, and audit should be conducted on all or part of a program in order to define issues and recommend improvements. Each Standing Committee shall also recommend amendments to existing appropriation acts and may further recommend revenue measures and improvements to the State's planning, programming, and budgeting system to the Committee on Finance.

In every case in which a Standing Committee makes a recommendation to the Committee on Finance, the latter shall make the final recommendation to the House; provided that in making its final recommendation, the Committee on Finance shall not, without the prior concurrence of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility, alter the recommendation of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility for the bill.

12. Rule 53 relating to Committee on Finance: Special Responsibility is amended to read as follows:

RULE 53. COMMITTEE ON FINANCE: SPECIAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Committee on Finance shall have primary responsibility over all programs and matters relating to the State's financing policies, including taxation and other revenues, level of expenditures, and cash and debt management, and to the Statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting, and evaluation. Subject to the provisions of these rules, it shall consider the reports of the fiscal officers of the State, all bills, petitions, and resolutions, those portions of the State budget, and all other items pertaining to such programs and matters. It shall also consider such other pertinent items as may be referred to it by the House.

The Committee on Finance shall establish, within the revenue-raising ability of the State, the general level of total governmental expenditures for each fiscal year of a biennial period and allocate to each Standing Committee a proportionate part of such expenditures. Each Standing Committee shall be responsible for budget review of the programs within its jurisdiction and for making program expenditure recommendations to the Committee on Finance. Upon receipt of the recommendations of the other Standing Committees, the Committee on Finance shall review the same to determine if, when taken as a whole, the programs and amounts to be expended thereon are consistent with and within the expenditure amounts it has allocated to the respective Standing Committees. In making allocations to and in reviewing recommendations in any program area, the Committee on Finance shall invite the participation of the chairman of the Standing Committee having primary responsibility over the program. After review of all Standing Committee recommendations, the Committee on Finance shall be responsible for preparing General and Supplemental Appropriations Bills and the General Public Improvement Bill for consideration by the House.

In all other appropriations bills, the Committee on Finance shall inform the Standing Committee primarily responsible for the program or matter under consideration, of the amount and type of finance available. Upon receiving recommendations for the expenditures from the appropriate Standing Committee, the Committee on Finance shall review such recommendations to determine if, when taken as a whole, the recommendations are consistent with and within the expenditure amounts allocated. In reviewing recommendations of the Standing Committees, the Committee on Finance shall invite the participation of the Standing Committee chairman concerned.

13. Rule 54 relating to Select Committees of the Various Counties: Special Responsibility is deleted in its entirety and a new Rule 54 relating to Committee on Legislative Management: Special Responsibility is substituted therefor, to read as follows:

RULE 54. COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT: SPECIAL RESPONSIBILITY

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Legislative Management to audit and settle all accounts which may be charged to the House and its individual members, and in general, to oversee the administrative operations of the House. The Committee shall be responsible for all expenditures made by the House and shall submit detailed monthly reports of said expenditures to all of the members of the House throughout its term of office. It shall from time to time direct the Clerk to draw drafts on the treasury for the payment of expenses of the House.

The Committee shall make recommendations on the expenses to be included in the appropriation bills providing for the expenses of the legislature, and it shall be charged with the responsibility of insuring that the expenses of the House are in accordance with the appropriation acts providing therefor.

The Committee shall regularly report to the House in accordance with data supplied by the Manager of the Print Shop, the numbers and amounts of the various bills, resolutions and other documents printed in the Print Shop. It shall also periodically report on the amounts of materials used by the Print Shop and the costs of such materials.

The Committee shall make recommendations to the House as to improvements in printing procedures, and as to ways in which the Print Shop may be more efficiently operated.

When directed by the House, the Committee shall procure cost estimates as to commercial printing of various documents and report its findings.

It shall also be the duty of the Committee on Legislative Management to consider all bills, petitions, resolutions, matters and those portions of the budget relating to programs to support the accomplishment of legislative goals, including the dissemination of information on legislative process and the establishment and operations of legislative staff and legislative staff agencies such as the Legislative Reference Bureau, the Revisor of Statutes, the office of the Legislative Auditor and the Ombudsman, and other pertinent matters referred to it by the House.

RESOLVED, FURTHER, that the said Official Rules of Procedure adopted by the House of Representatives, except as amended herein, shall remain in full force and effect."

At 12:01 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

Representative O'Connor moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Yuen.

The motion was put by the Chair and roll call having been requested, the amendment was adopted by a vote of 51 ayes.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering House Resolution No. 1, as amended.

Representative O'Connor moved for the adoption of **H. R. No. 1**, as amended, seconded by Representative R. Garcia.

Representative Wong rose and spoke in favor of the Resolution as follows:

"I believe that the people of Hawaii deserve a simple explanation as to why we thought it so important, and why we expended so much effort, to bring about reform in the Legislature. The first great principle that we are following is to have government completely open to the people and to place it in full public view. We shall be doing it with the House of Representatives. We shall push for it further in the administration of government. The reforms to which we commit ourselves mean that we believe that legislative business is the people's business. Whenever the people's business is conducted, there can be no veil of secrecy.

Surely, the events in our national government show how cancerous secrecy can be to our political life. We are determined that it shall not happen in Hawaii. The bold steps in reform taken by this honorable body mean that the House of Representatives is responsive to the mood of the times and that in our determination to open government to the people, be it to the credit of this body that it has started with itself.

The second great goal that we shall strive to achieve is to make this honorable body into truly an effective legislative body — capable of bold action, responsive to the people's needs and desires, and utilizing all of the talent and abilities of our members.

Again, events of our times show how perilous it is when power in government gravitates to the executive branch, thereby weakening the Legislature. We must be strong enough — we need to have the organization and methods to be strong enough — if we are to safeguard the public's interest.

Opening up the Legislature to the people, making this body a truly effective instrument of the people — these principles, I believe, are what reform is all about. I commend all of those who have worked so hard on reform. It has been worthwhile. We are about to commence on a new era, emboldened by a new spirit, in the Legislature. We shall remember this day.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative R. Garcia then rose and spoke in favor of the Resolution as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise not to rebutt the opinion of observers who see the House split as a 'power' struggle, but rather to give those observers another perspective of the situation.

Mr. Speaker, you and your supporters aided the Democratic Party through its adolescent stages, creating growth with improvement. The memory of the '54 Democratic movement is now a legendary one; still, its idealism should be used as a basis from which to strive for the changes necessary in government. It is time we realized that new ideas, beliefs and dreams exist, and that the objective here is not to destroy what has been achieved for Hawaii but to improve on it.

No one is to blame for the conflict that divides this House; it was inevitable. We must now realize that what we are faced with is not simply a conflict of power, but a striving for reforms with which to successfully handle the problems that confront us.

Mr. Speaker, the people of Hawaii seek a new generation of leadership in the House. The dreams that each of us had when we first entered office have unintentionally been lost. Perhaps we have been blinded by the traditions of the past; blinded by old fears, hates and rivalries. Hopefully, this is all behind us now. All of us should be willing to cast off the old slogans, delusions and suspicions of the past and move forward.

The rules reform presented in this Resolution offers an alternative to the present system while maintaining the best interests of everyone. This Resolution before us will:

1. Streamline legislative operations.

2. Foster greater public scrutiny and participation in government.

3. Democratize decision making. The power of our standing committees will be more evenly distributed with the responsibilities of each committee being truly fixed.

Under these new rules, we will be able to better utilize the talents of all legislators, Democrats and Republicans. Mr. Speaker, under this Resolution the veil of secrecy will be lifted from many of our committee proceedings so that all of our committees will become openly accountable to the public.

Rules reform has been an issue in the State House of Representatives for the past five years. The growing public distrust in government, enhanced by political scandal, makes it imperative that we restore the people's confidence in us. This Resolution before us is but a milestone toward a more responsive and effective Legislature. The fulfillment of the dream of constructive reform is not a struggle resulting in a winner and a loser, but the achievement of all of us assembled here, and more importantly, a triumph for the people of this State.

Again I emphasize that this is not a struggle for power's sake. The points brought to this floor are valid and necessary reminders that this body is part of a democracy and that our responsibility here lies not in turning out a great quantity of mediocre legislation, but rather, in determining the quality of life for the people of Hawaii. Mr. Speaker, it is often easy to adopt an attitude of stagnancy when the need for change is greatest. We must realize that this need for change is long overdue and that it is time that each of us here act in a progressive and constructive manner. Therefore, I urge all of my colleagues to vote for the passage of this Resolution and the needed reforms it will bring."

Representative Uechi then rose and spoke in favor of the Resolution as follows:

"I am most satisfied that we have finally arrived at this moment when we are about to adopt reform rules of this House.

It's been three long years since the introduction of these rules in 1971. At that time, those of us who proposed and supported these changes to the House procedure were publicly criticized as wanting power. Some in this group were adversely affected at the polls when we were constantly identified in the media as the 'House dissidents.'

In the intervening period, these reform rules attracted a few more of our colleagues and stronger support. The infusion of these new and strong voices brought to this group a new image — the reform dissidents. These new voices added much to make the original proposal a much finer document insuring an open government for the people of this State.

It is no secret that we also talked to the minority members of this House. At this time, I would personally wish to thank the leadership of the House minority for their valuable contribution to the final document before us. Mr. Speaker and members of the House, this document we are considering today are the House rules, not the majority rules or any faction of this House. We all contributed to this final document and I am confident that we will all benefit by its adoption.

Mr. Speaker, rules, as with any tool, can be used constructively or destructively. My hope is that we employ it in the spirit in which it was drafted.

Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I would wish also to extend our thanks to our Party Chairman, Mr. Minoru Hirabara, without whose efforts I do not believe that we could have even begun to sit and discuss our differences within our caucus.

Mr. Speaker, we have reached common ground. Let's do the best job for our constituents and for the State of Hawaii."

Representative O'Connor then rose and spoke in favor of the Resolution as follows:

"I am pleased to note, in reviewing the

amendment to H. R. No. 1, that it was signed by 51 reformists in the House. The adoption of this amendment by itself will not reform this body; however, the ideas and the concepts expressed in this amendment are the hallmark of efficiency and further streamlines the operation for this body. We can look forward, once these rules are passed, to tremendously increase effort on the part of most of the Representatives in this body because their effort and industry are required under the concept expressed in these rules to make this House move forward.

The House requires a complete change in attitude and a complete change in direction in the adoption of these rules and I am confident, Mr. Speaker, that this change in attitude and direction will be adopted by all as we move forward with greater responsibility and with that greater responsibility, the requirement for greater output placed on each one of us.

The people of Hawaii will benefit from the adoption of these rules as will those in this body. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I urge each of the members to vote for these rules and in voting for them to adopt the new attitude necessary to move forward in this body and to adopt an attitude of industry and effort so that the work product of this particular session will be a tremendous amount more than in the past.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cobb rose and spoke for the adoption of the Resolution as follows:

"Today, at long last, we are about to reform the rules by which this House conducts its business. The need for this change has become obvious, not only because of what happened last session, but also because of the need for more openness and efficiency in our entire legislative process.

On this day, Mr. Speaker, as we sit here surrounded by beauty and in the presence of history, we are witnessing a political change as profound as that of 20 years ago. 1954 saw a change of party -1974 marks a change of power, a change from the old politics of centralized power and control by a few.

Today marks an end, as well as a beginning, for every chairman of this House, who will be more powerful and more accountable for his decisions.

In addition, each of us as legislators will serve on no more than 4 committees, which should improve the record of the last session, when more than one-half the committee hearings had less than one-half the committee members present. Today, we will also witness the reduction, by elimination, of one-third of the committees in this House, including my own. These reductions should improve both our attendance and our accountability.

Then, in the third House of the Legislature that we call the Conference Committee, we will be able to see openly how their decisions are reached or the mechanics of how a bill goes in looking like an alligator and comes out as a giraffe.

What disturbs me today is the silence of the proposed rules on the problem of referral of bills, for, at the present time, only three states have no control over the referral power of their presiding officer and Hawaii is one of them. Yet, last session, we witnessed the referral of 2,054 bills to two committees. That is 11 more bills than were introduced in the House last year. In short, to implement the idea of reform in the referral of bills, we must have a change in the past practices of referral.

We must also have a change in the practice of killing bills just because they are introduced by a Republican or a Democrat who did not agree with the leadership on all issues. This is needed as a matter of merit even though it is not covered in the rules.

Thus the need today is not only to pass these reform rules but to make them work, for today, tomorrow and all our days thereafter. The alternative, Mr. Speaker, is an ugly regression of these rules, based on the hollow claim that they cannot work, or that the conduct of our business has become chaotic. No, Mr. Speaker, we haven't stopped talking about reform and I doubt if we ever will. Now we have before us a basic reform of our rules without major changes in our positions. These rules have been discussed and presumably agreed upon by members of both parties. So now the time has come to place both our sincerity and our votes on the line.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yim rose and stated as follows:

"I rise to speak in favor of H. R. 1, H. D. 1.

For some years, certain Representatives have been proposing House rules aimed at increasing the efficiency, responsiveness and accountability of this elected body. H. R. 1, H. D. 1, contains many of these same proposed improvements; in particular, I consider three provisions to be highly essential to improve operations within the House.

First, the provision to reduce the number of standing committees from 25 to 15. This will help to streamline operations of this House. As an example, out of the two thousand-plus bills and resolutions introduced during the last legislative session, the Committee on Military and Civil Defense was sent only three bills and four resolutions. And the Committee on Human Rights had less than ten bills and resolutions.

These are meager figures when compared to the hundreds of legislative measures referred to major House committees. Obviously, committees like Military and Civil Defense and Human Rights are unessential.

Second, the Resolution not only reduces the number of standing committees, it also changes the House rules by limiting the number of committees to which a House member can belong.

At present, there are a number of Representatives assigned to seven or more committees. It's unlikely, if not impossible, for these legislators to attend each committee meeting and public hearing. If they can't attend these meetings, then they are defeating the fundamental purpose of public hearings and that is to listen and react to the concerns of our citizens. For example, thirteen members sat on the Committee on Housing last session. Yet, only three to four members were in attendance at over 80% of its hearings. If each Representative were limited to a maximum of four committee assignments, we might expect much greater attendance at committee meetings and public hearings. With full attendance, full participation and better informed legislators, we could be on our way toward becoming a truly efficient, responsive and accountable body.

Third and finally, Mr. Speaker, H. R. 1, H. D. 1, firmly establishes the concept of 'prior concurrence' with this House. Presently, two committees — Finance and Judiciary — have the final say on almost every piece of legislation that passes through this honorable body. This tremendous power must be diluted and shared equally among all committees.

H. R. 1, H. D. 1, grants each committee total control and complete responsibility for all bills and resolutions referred to it. Mr. Speaker, passage of this Resolution may well start a welcome chapter in Hawaiian politics and I believe all for the good.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative King rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the reform rules have been eloquently commented on. I would just like to take a quiet moment to share with the members of the House a beautiful thought that Representative Medina told me about the other day: 'Do not walk before me, I may not want to follow; Do not walk behind me, I may not want to lead; Walk beside me and be my friend.' I hope that all of us working with the people of Hawaii will make this, not only a day we will long remember, but a session that we will long remember with pride and joy."

Representative J. Garcia then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in speaking in favor of the Resolution, the halitosis that has been hanging over this chamber for a few years has finally disappeared and a breath of fresh air now permeates this honorable body.

Mr. Speaker, the hours have been long, it has been trying for all of us, particularly those of us who met day in and day out, night in and night out, but I must say that the reward has been gratifying and certainly justifiable.

I want to say that the minority members, your House Republicans, are extremely happy for all sixteen members signed the Resolution and, Mr. Speaker, we did this because we learned that men can agree and disagree. We also found that where principles were involved, nobody backed away; but where issues were involved, everybody bended a little. What we are primarily happy about is the fact that the minority party is finally being recognized. We can now offer this honorable body our true position — the right of giving our constituents and the public of Hawaii the right to know the inside of every story.

We are thankful for the cooperation we have received and we certainly believe that today will go down in the history of Hawaii as the new era wherein the elected officials have finally become the servants and the electorate remains the master. Because of the hardening of the rules previously, we have given the people the impression that the electorate the servants.

I say, Mr. Speaker, that your House Republicans are ready to cooperate with the majority in any way possible for the betterment of the State of Hawaii because we know that you and I and all of us who were elected to serve the people by working together can and will keep Hawaii a good place in which to work and live, not only for today, but tomorrow and always."

Representative Ajifu then rose and spoke for the adoption of H. R. No. 1, H. D. 1, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe it is very timely for the consideration of this Resolution because everybody is talking of reforms and I believe we all agree that reform must come. It is evident by the fact that both of the Resolutions on our desk are comparable which indicates that we want changes.

Mr. Speaker, we have had many problems and the big problem has been that we have not been able to solve the little problems. I think we have heard many times on the floor of this House that there are no programs, no direction and so many other complaints that these little problems have mounted into an irreparable situation. I do not envy your position, Mr. Speaker, because the trouble with being a leader today is that you can't be sure whether the people are following you or chasing you.

Many of the problems could have been minimized or even avoided if the leaders of this House were more responsive. The other problem has been that the powers of this House were held in the hands of a few and I believe under the reforms proposed, the powers would be more equally distributed which, I believe, will lead us in the right direction.

This proposal reduces the number of committees from 25 to 15. This would mean fewer multiple referrals, elimination of conflicting committee recommendations and lastly, it would mean a more cohesive committee effort.

The second point I would like to emphasize which also produces more improved efficiency in House proceedings is the limitation of legislators to a maximum of membership in only four standing committees. This allows a legislator to maximize his or her efforts on only those four committees rather than the present practice of unlimited membership.

The third point is that it will enable all 51 legislators, particularly the minority, proportional representation on all of those committees.

Mr. Speaker, I believe the time has come for each one of us to make a decision whether we are sincere in what we say and what we do. The challenge is before us as individuals and I trust each one of you will vote your own conscience."

Representative Aduja then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H. R. No. 1, H. D. 1:

We have spent five days now trying to iron out something that will be workable and we have done so in this Resolution before us.

I do not think that reforming ourselves will change the whole story. I think the voters are now waiting for us to produce. Five days ago, it took me hour and a half to fill my gasoline tank; today, it took me two and a half hours to fill my gasoline tank. Toilet paper is no longer available in many stores and salt is also unavailable. Mr. Speaker, now that we have called ourselves 'reformists', let us work and try to solve the many problems facing the

people of this State.

To those of you who have sacrificed so much time and effort, Mahalo and God Bless You."

Representative Kato then rose and stated as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to say a few words on a more personal level.

It is common knowledge throughout these halls that I had been a candidate for the Speakership until a few days ago. There has been a great deal of speculation in and around the confines of this building regarding the organization of this House. I think it is about time that I set the record straight.

The media to a large extent has indicated to the public that we not only wanted to see reform in the rules but were out to grab power for ourselves. This, I will admit, is true. But it was our feeling that no matter what the rules, no matter how they are changed, the fact still remains that unless the leader of this House, whoever he may be, was more closely attuned in his philosophy of leadership to the times, more in line with our way of thinking, the rules could be and would be circumvented.

A cursory look at the situation might well have indicated that we were out for a power grab. But a closer and deeper analysis of the situation would have disclosed that our primary concern was not power, per se, but that we have a philosophy of leadership in this House that differed from what we have been experiencing.

In any political system, laws are administered by men, but no matter what the law, if they are not administered in the spirit in which they were adopted, any changes in the rules would not have been worth the paper they are printed on. Too many people, people who should have known better, have forgotten that our laws or rules are only as good as the people who administer them. We have not forgotten it.

However that may be, Mr. Speaker, you are still Speaker of the House. I think the message to you is quite clear. I do not consider what has happened here to be a victory or a defeat. I consider it merely a stepping-stone to what I hope will be more effective leadership, far more meaningful participation by every member of this House and, of course, legislation that we can all be proud of. I stand ready to do my share. The opportunity is now, Mr. Speaker. Let's get on with the job together and let's do it right."

The motion was put by the Chair and roll call having been requested, H. R. No. 1, as amended, was adopted by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair at this time stated that it would welcome a favorable vote on the change in the committee structure to conform with the rules of the House which will be taken up in the afternoon session.

The Chair further stated that all members will have every opportunity to express his views in committee and asked each member to put forth his maximum effort in the production of the bills and for its final passage.

Representative Suwa then requested of the Chair the status of five bills which passed the House during the closing hours of last session and which were not received by the Senate.

At 1:15 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives stood in recess until 4:30 o'clock p.m. this afternoon.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The House of Representatives reconvened at 5:30 o'clock p.m.

Representative Roehrig rose on a point of personal privilege and stated as follows:

"The Resolution which we have just passed, Mr. Speaker, is a vehicle for the implementation of the ideas, philosophies and social values which are a part of the present membership of this Legislature. No two legislators have identical backgrounds. We come from different eras and different life styles. Some have formal education, some have the education of hard knocks. We have come to better respect each other for what we are as individuals. Together we have all played a role in shaping the destiny of our fair State.

Mr. Speaker, your majority party, as you know, has gone through a period of confrontation, negotiation and adjustment. Starting in December of 1973, we got down to the brass tacks. Our good Party Chairman, Mr. Minoru Hirabara, brought us together as 35 individuals to discuss many matters. After everybody had said their piece in loud and sometimes very soft words, we came to realize that each one of us has intense feelings about our roles as legislators and the future of the State of Hawaii. I view the two months preceding the opening of the session as a period when the communication lines were opened for meaningful discussion and the Democratic Party began to reassert with renewed vigor its leadership role at the Legislature.

Through the intense efforts of all members of the Legislature, including the minority, culminating in the Resolution before us today, we have finally got it all together.

Looking at the individual effects upon each legislator's leadership role, I guess we can conclude that there were certain feelings of personal loss and personal victory. However, when we look beyond our immediate lives to those of our constituents, we quickly see that the public, as a whole, has been the principal beneficiary of our efforts.

Speaking of leadership, someone asked a famous conductor of a great symphony orchestra which orchestral instrument he considered the most difficult to play. The conductor thought a moment, then said: 'Second fiddle. I can get plenty of first violinists. But to find one who can play second fiddle with enthusiasm — that's a problem. And if we have no second fiddles, we have no harmony.' Hopefully, because some in this body have agreed to play second fiddle, we will have harmony during the remaining 55 days of the session and in the era of the '70's.

By reason of what we have accomplished, I

am proud this day to be a member of this Legislature."

ADJOURNMENT

At 5:40 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:00 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, January 23, 1974.

Wednesday, January 23, 1974

The House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1974, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Reverend John C. Wetzel of St. John's Lutheran Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Poepoe and Wakatsuki who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fifth Day.

On motion by Representative Kimura, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fifth Day was approved.

At this time, Representative King introduced to the members of the House Dr. Paul Ylvisaker, who is the national consultant to the Temporary Commission on Environmental Planning.

The Chair then appointed Representatives A. Chong, Carroll, R. Garcia and Ushijima to escort Dr. Ylvisaker to the rostrum, whereupon Dr. Ylvisaker addressed the members of the House as follows:

"Mr. Speaker and Distinguished Members:

I know it's customary to say what an honor and pleasure it is to address a group like this. I want you to know that I do understand what an honor it is when a group of people who have to endure so much talking is willing to hear yet another. I must admit that it's a relief to get back into the political setting from the academic. For the last six years, I spent three years working with the Legislature of New Jersey as a commissioner and then three years back in academia. Recently, somebody asked me what's the difference between dealing with a legislature and the faculty. And I said I thought I could see at least one difference in favor of the legislature from my point of view in that they were not tenured. That may not be your feeling.

The one point that I really find the difference that is exciting in the legislative body is where all of life comes together. All of our differences, all of those unresolved problems that haven't been handled by the rest of society, come to a legislator and he must stand in the middle, assessing all parts and bring it together. That's really the environmental problem that I am here to help you work with. It's where it all comes together. And we are now in an American and world society which is puzzled as to how to bring these pieces together and to bring good abstractions down to earth where one has to make very tough decisions.

Let me state my purpose in coming to Hawaii at the invitation of your commission and let me state it simply and straightforwardly so you know where I'm coming from. My purpose here is to encourage you, representing the State of Hawaii, and to give you some assurance to respond positively to the recommendations in general that have been made to you by your Temporary Commission on Statewide Environmental Planning. That body I regard as having done a very significant piece of work at your request. It enabled you to wait awhile while a distinguished group standing apart from selfinterest and political concerns examines the status of the environment in Hawaii and came back to you with their further conclusions.

As I understand their conclusions to you, there are, essentially, four. They are asking you to do essentially four different things. One, is to make a statement about the environment, the value of keeping and growing a good environment, to place that value very high among the values which are honored by this State. Symbolically, they have suggested that you might consider a constitutional amendment which would embody the environmental ethnic and the environmental value in that very precious and basic document.

Second, they have asked you to recognize what they, after careful consideration, have recognized is a current and immediate threat to Hawaii's environment—a threat indeed that it may have reached the limits of its carrying capacity that it is a danger in various critical areas of this great State of being what they describe an 'overload'.

Third, they have asked you to build a process—an open and fair process for defining whether indeed their hunch and their impressions are right—that you are at the limits of carrying capacity in various critical areas. Because those limits are very hard to define, to technical experts you can look for some guidance, but essentially, it must be from your basic instincts and observations and how you represent the feelings of your constituent as to whether, indeed, Hawaii has reached these danger points.

The important thing is, since we disagree often as to whether the threat is that real in general or specific cases, for Hawaii to join the front of a lot of other parts of our society, the forefront in setting up an open and fair process for raising those questions and also to pin it down to specific new entries of growth—that development, that power site, that highway, that airport runway—to find the device by which you can deal with those specific decisions with guarantees of fairness and openness.

Our society, in experimenting with the

results with a process of that kind, has developed in the last five years a new device called the environmental impact statement. It is a provocation, a pushing to anybody who would interfere again or to grow again in this environment to place a statement outlining what the effects would be. That environmental impact statement began with the federal legislation passed by Congress in 1969 and signed into law by the President on January 1. 1970. It's still a learning device. All through the nation now we are experimenting with it, sometimes finding that it works, sometimes having a feeling that it causes unnecessary delays, but still it is the beginning of a process we must enter on if we are to really protect and grow a good environment.

The fourth thing, then, that the temporary commission was asking this legislature to do is to encourage the citizen to participate and to give him reason to trust that the processes of declaring these areas of overload or the process of judging environmental impact statements to give them assurance that they can have a part in it or at least that they can trust the process. The critical thing in our nation today is really citizen participation and citizen trust. We are at an all time low in the attitudes of the citizenry toward government caused by such immediate things as Watergate. But in a deeper sense is the citizens' feeling of impotence. There is going to be an argument, I am sure, in this State about how the citizen should be brought into this process. Clearly, hearings are one device. Another is the much controverted idea of a broadened citizen standing to sue. This will be controversial, it has been elsewhere because the art of the new venture is to make sure that the citizens can trust, can participate without inviting this infinite harrassment, the frivolous suit, which produces as much damage sometimes as environmental degradation.

These four things are essentially the things being asked of this legislature, and I came here partly to encourage you to assure you that, from my observation, your commission has spoken well and carefully. To say that the experience in other states like Florida, Vermont, California, Michigan will be helpful to you though it won't give you all the answers, that generally that experience has been reassuring. The American is capable of learning a new game, learning it well and learning it fast. I wanted also to come here to say how symbolic I feel your response is going to be to the temporary commission's appeal to you.

Hawaii is a symbol of a precious and yet fragile environment. If preciousness attracts increasing numbers of tourists and residents to your shores, they come here to enjoy, how will they leave? To say that this was but a passing decade of exploitation in Hawaii, another callous example of how human beings can treat their environment. Or will the millions of kids coming through here, since this State not only advertised and gave of itself, but was willing to go through the tough, tough process of thinking of how to save and how to grow and how to encourage. I really feel, and this is not P.R., that if Hawaii does respond positively, not to every letter of the commission's recommendations, but to essential requests, that you are going to do a lot, not only to save your own environment, but really to save the soul of a real great nation. Thank you very much."

Thursday, January 24, 1974

The House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1974, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Reverend Richard G. Schumm, Pastor of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church, and also the Chaplain of the University of Hawaii Rainbows Basketball Team, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Kunimura and Wong who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Sixth Day.

On motion by Representative Kimura, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Sixth Day was approved.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGES

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Msg. Nos. 17 to 20) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 17) transmitting copies of a report prepared by the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Department of Planning and Economic Development, and the State Land Use Commission, in response to Senate Resolution No. 97 relating to the preparation of a master plan for the use of Federal lands recommended to be released to the State of Hawaii, was placed on file.

A message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 18) transmitting copies of a report prepared by the University of Hawaii in response to H. R. No. 118 and S. R. No. 116 relating to the appointment and employment and conditions of appointment and employment of women at several campuses of the University and Community Colleges, was placed on file.

A message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 19) transmitting copies of a report prepared by the University of Hawaii in response to S. R. No. 40, S. D. 1, requesting the University of Hawaii to temporarily suspend its present plans for the future physical expansion of Honolulu Community College and develop a more viable alternative that would be compatible with the preparation and implementation of other plans, was placed on file.

A message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 20) informing the House that no sub-leasing was done by the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands pursuant to Section 220(b), Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920, as amended (Act 173, SLH 1972), was placed on file.

DEPARTMENTAL COMMUNICATION

A communication from Richard E. Marland, Interim Director, Office of Environmental Quality Control (**Dept. Com. No. 1**) transmitting a summary of "The Use of Land: A Citizen's Policy Guide to Urban Growth", was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At 11:05 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:21 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 5, to receive the Governor's message.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Kunimura and Wong.

The Chair then appointed Senators Ching, Taira and Yee and Representatives O'Connor, Kimura and Soares as a committee to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Acting Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

The following is the address of Acting Governor George R. Ariyoshi (Gov. Msg. No. 21):

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Honorable Members of the Legislature, very distinguished guests, my fellow Hawaiians:

The patterns of history tell us that all things change. Our formal gathering here today, to consider together the progress and potentials of our beautiful and beloved State of Hawaii, is a gentle but insistent reminder of this fundamental principle.

For the first time in 12 years, you do not have the privilege of hearing, in formal address, the annual State of the State report by one of the greatest statesmen and political leaders of the Pacific era, Governor John A. Burns. Instead, the high honor and great privilege of presenting our State Administration's appraisal of our progress has been given to me and, needless to say, I would much rather not have had it thrust upon me under the circumstances that dictated it.

We are overjoyed, all of us, that Governor Burns has shown so steady an improvement in health that he can be expected to resume, in due time, his day-to-day duties as Governor. His remarkable recovery from so serious a setback in health is an additional proof of the patience, prudence, courage and fortitude of this extraordinary leader. We are all grateful to God, to his skilled physicians, and to all who have prayed with his family, that the Chief Executive will soon be back on duty at the Capitol.

I speak to you today both as Acting Governor, and as a former legislator thoroughly familiar with the complexities of the challenges which face you in this year of mounting difficulties.

We are united in a common desire to control and guide the forces of change in Hawaii, and to influence for good, as best we can, the currents of national and international events which are beyond our direct control, but which nevertheless exert their

powerful force in these Islands.

During the past decade, the remarkable partnership of the Legislature and Administrative Branches of our State Government has brought unparalleled progress to Hawaii and our people. My own firm confidence in the future progress of our State comes from my certain knowledge of quality of the collective leadership of our State, represented here in a diversity of political, professional and administrative skills and knowledge. This collective leadership truly represents a society, our people of Hawaii, which is the envy of the world for its social, economic, cultural, environmental and educational attainments and this is attainments and this is something, in the midst of our daily pressures, we must never forget. Hawaii's people are the source of our strength, the vast reservoir of our talents, and the wellspring of that motivating spirit that we call 'aloha.' You and I represent all those people. We are their servants, and it is both a great privilege and a very serious responsibility to serve with all the ability, compassion and generosity we can muster.

Our service to our people takes the practical form of intelligent and efficient management of the many complex problems and projects of the State government. It also requires this annual stocktaking, this overview, of the entire State, both in its relationship to the rest of our troubled world, and in regard to the needs and the desires of our people.

We examine again the fundamental philosophy guiding Hawaii's government; we review where we are going, and how we are to get there; we evaluate our resources and the present state of our affairs; we measure or estimate our potentials; we decide on our directions; and then we carry out those decisions. All of this implies, first of all, the necessity and value of comprehensive Statewide planning which unifies and coordinates the many diversified activities of the State and County governments.

Foremost among our more recent planning projects has been the work of the Temporary Commission on Statewide Environmental Planning, following your legislative initiative. The Commission's emphasis on consensus and a State 'conservation ethic' in the Hawaiian 'spirit of malama' are particularly praiseworthy.

Within the State Administration itself, staff work continues on the updating of the State General Plan Revision Program and it will offer us, in the form of a State Growth Plan for the next decade, more precise paths to follow in the areas of population distribution, pollution management, economic expansion, transportation, housing and other fields. We shall also have a better understanding of difficult-to-obtain social indicators which seek to measure our quality of life.

It has been the State's proficiency in planning — and I use this term in its broadest sense — which has led to our environmental improvements. It has also given us our State and County park systems; our core of science industries and agencies which have provided good jobs for so many of our people, our emphasis on Hawaii and the sea, which will soon be re-emphasized in a new document now in preparation; and our projects for promoting badly needed new industry to provide more employment opportunities for people now dependent upon a declining pineapple-processing industry. The jobgenerating concepts of a decade ago, such as a Foreign-Trade Zone is an example of our successful realities now.

You know, of course, that we have had serious economic stresses and a continuing fiscal 'crunch' which has mandated severe restrictions on State programs. The wisdom and prudent actions of Governor Burns as the Decade of the Seventies began led to his insistence upon greater fiscal responsibility by everyone in the State, and this has enabled us to bear with equanimity troubles which otherwise could have led to fiscal chaos.

Our freeze on hirings, our moratorium on spending for program expansion, our deferral of much-needed and much-desired new programs were all very difficult and unpopular steps to take, but both you in the Legislature and Governor Burns managed this task. Never was the spirit of aloha better displayed than in the past three years, as all our people cooperated in the work of managing our mini-recession.

Our coordinated curbs in spending have resulted in savings in the State General Fund of more than \$58 million in fiscal year 1972-1973 and in fiscal year 1973-1974, another \$21 million in anticipated savings will result and this will bring the total savings to \$79 million by June 30th of this year. Indeed, at the end of the fiscal year, our General Fund deficit was only \$158,000. This will climb, unfortunately, in the enormous wake of international and national economic upheavals and inflations which have hit our shores, to an estimated \$12 million by June 30th. While this is a manageable deficit, whether it will remain within controllable limits is still uncertain because of yet-to-be negotiated collective bargaining costs.

We must, therefore, continue to be severe in all fiscal judgments and this is an absolute mandate for every legislator, administrator and citizen in light of the grave and complex uncertainties of the energy crisis and our national, political and economic difficulties. But, it is more than a mandate for energy and money conservation; it is rather a bold challenge to all of us to use every skill and talent that we possess to provide innovative solutions to our continuing problems.

Despite the austerities of the past three years, we have been able to make considerable progress in many areas. We have vastly improved our Penal Code and administration of justice. We have managed despite complex legal and financial worries — to serve our people who often must depend for life itself on State programs of welfare, elderly care, housing, health and others.

In the area of housing — always an extremely difficult problem not only for our State but for the entire world, everywhere we can report some accomplishments. Act 269 of 1969 and Act 105 of 1970 were the pioneering tools which gave impetus to our comprehensive housing program and we have had to sharpen those tools, which were dulled by certain legal and technical difficulties. As of the end of 1973, we had completed a number of housing projects, others are now under construction and still others under consideration, and we are working on innovative projects in which the people themselves will have an opportunity to determine their housing preferences and their lifestyles.

You will receive from the Administration in this session bills to promote housing construction in Hawaii. They will eliminate the many technical restraints and constrictions which have made housing progress so distressingly difficult. We have already resolved a constitutional question related to 'moderate' income in housing legislation, thanks to your help and this past November, with Internal Revenue Service cooperation, we were finally able to resolve a problem which has since enabled us to sell \$35 million in G.O. bonds for housing. You will also be receiving a detailed report on our housing programs in the coming weeks.

In taking stock financially of where we are going as a State; in measuring our resources and the balanced relationship between taxes raised and taxes spent; in assessing these fiscal effectiveness and efficiency of our government, we have responded to your excellent recommendation and now have hard at work the Governor's Ad Hoc Commission on Operations, Revenues and Expenditures. I am very, very grateful to the many outstandit:g civic leaders who have participated in this very important task and you are to have their reports by the time you meet next year. In the interim, the closest watch continues to be kept on the volatile nature of our economy and our State's fiscal health.

I know that in your various committees and through your knowledgeable staff members, you are familiar with all the varieties of State problems facing us today. We will, together, tackle each one in due time — education, finance, crime and corrections, transportation, agricultural development, no-fault insurance, tourism, and 'people problems' such as welfare assistance and consumer protection. All these and more will be the object of our diligent, cooperative efforts.

I need not dwell on the seriousness of the energy crisis except to point out that it can be a blessing as well as a series of problems for all Americans and it should lead all of us to be less extravagant in our use of our nonrenewable resources. Recognizing the urgency and the long-range implications of the energy situation, the Energy Advisory Task Force, which I appointed, has been considering the immediate use and allocation problems and will prepare further recommendations on conservation, alternative energy resources, short and long-range energy plans, and ways in which we can become more energy self-sufficient. Legislation in this area will be submitted also for your consideration.

Again with a long-range view, I want to emphasize particularly our desire to improve the present commodity balance-of-payments picture in Hawaii. We are heavily dependent on Federal spending and tourism and we must continue to expand our economic base by increasing our exports of papaya, macadamia nuts, plants, flowers and foliage, air-flown fresh pineapple, and other Island products and we must encourage investment in new or expanding enterprises which foster these exports. Our present great quantities of food imports, for example, must somehow be modified through expanded and more efficient Island agricultural production and I would add to that aquaculture production as well. Our Islands and our people are historically oriented to the sea and ought to be among the world's best producers of protein-rich fish-farm products. We are constantly reminded of our very valuable marine environment and its potentials and we all must be particularly pleased at the progress that has been made in the past few years on marine-related projects and programs which will revolutionize life here in our Islands. The year 1974 may be known as the year of the Boeing Jetfoil which, I understand, recently was adjudged one of America's 100 most significant new technical products of 1973 and Hawaii will be far ahead of other areas as this vessel speeds through Island waters in inter-island service.

The year 1973 was the year of the Governor's Conference on Mass Transit Statewide, which holds enormous implications for our Pacific State. We shall see in the next few years new means of ferrying people and goods swiftly and safely from island to island, with the Jetfoil, semi-submerged platform ships, perhaps a giant sea ferry, possibly air-lift vehicles and new types of aircrafts to supplement our present interisland air lines and all these give promise of exciting new developments for our State. All are intended to carry out the fundamental philosophy of our Administration — that all of our people, throughout our widespread island communities, be unified in spirit and in fact through easy access to each other.

The present relative isolation of our Neighbor Islands has more drawbacks than benefits and this must be intelligently changed through sound planning so that population redistribution, economic-opportunities sharing, a moderating of Oahu's high housing densities and other programs will bring major benefits to all islands and I am confident that these goals can be achieved in an orderly and balanced fashion.

I have already stated my firm opposition to a fixed-rail mass transit line, involving a vast initial capital expenditure and commitment of untold millions of dollars to future operations, not to mention the vast displacement of people and large condemnation of land necessary and this deserves your careful evaluation. Perhaps we need to pay more attention to the wisdom of our Hawaiian forebears who, with only primitive resources, developed so magnificent a transportation system involving wise and efficient use of sea craft for ocean and inland waterways. If the flexibility of fast modern buses is acknowledged, the additional flexibility of smooth-riding water-transit vessels for our Island State appears to be of parallel benefit.

Comprehensive, long-range planning and the imaginative innovations which flow from the dreams and the visions of young and old — these are the twin, golden keys to Hawaii's future.

I have my own vision of that well-planned future and it is that future preferred by our children and our children's children. It is that of a great and sovereign State, internationally famous for its responsible stewardship of God-given natural resources, and renowned for the genuine warmth and quiet dignity of its multi-racial people.

The future Hawaii — the Hawaii of the bicentennial decade and beyond to the Year 2000 — will be properly managed because its people will be among the best educated in the world, thanks to the educational foundations laid today. Our State's educational facilities — our University, community and private colleges and other institutions of higher learning — will be unified on all islands by both the mass transit systems, vessels and vehicles I have mentioned, and by innovative programs which continue to improve the techniques of learning.

Our economic prosperity will continue because we will have acquired and maintained the fundamentals which make it possible—a highly skilled and wellmotivated citizenry, and a natural and social environment of excellence. Quality in all we do will be our watchword.

Our tourism industry will prosper, not merely because it will have expanded, but because it will have built into its expansion plans an honest production and efficient management which guards against shoddiness and poor service. This leisure-time industry will be integrated into our educational system to provide visitors with meaningful activity which will elevate the mind and the spirit, extending beyond the accepted forms of entertainment and recreation that we presently offer.

Our State of the future will be a Pacific hub of tremendously vital and profitable commercial and financial activity. It will become a new society, an open society — open to all that is good, closed to all that is alien to the interests and welfare of Hawaii's own people.

Our economy and our environment are inseparably related, as are so many things in our insular society, and it is understandable, therefore, that public concerns have been voiced over increased foreign investment in our future.

While I share these concerns, I am confident that we can continue to maintain control over our own destiny, and I am reminded of the thoughts of King Kamehameha IV on this very same subject. When he assumed the throne in December of 1854, he addressed part of his remarks to the non-Hawaiians attending the ceremony and he said: 'To be kind and generous to the foreigner, to trust and confide in him, is no new thing in the history of our race. It is an inheritance transmitted to us from our forefathers. The founder of our dynasty was ever glad to receive assistance and advice from foreigners and I cannot fail to heed the example of my ancestors. I therefore say to the foreigner that he is welcome. He is welcome to our shores welcome so long as he comes with the laudable motive of promoting his own interests and, at the same time, respecting those of his neighbors. But if he comes here with no more exalted motive than of building up his own interests, at the expense of the native - with no higher ambition than that of overthrowing our government, and introducing anarchy, confusion and bloodshed — then he is most unwelcome. The duties that we owe to each other are reciprocal. For my part, I shall use my best endeavors, in humble reliance on the Great Ruler of all, to give you a just, liberal and satisfactory government. At the same time, I shall expect you in return to assist me in sustaining the peace, the law, the order and the independence of my Kingdom.'

The words of Kamehameha IV one hundred and twenty years ago remain entirely meaningful in the context of our times and I believe his policy can serve as a fundamental guide for us in making sure that Hawaii is kept Hawaiian for tomorrow and we will maintain firm control of our lives, and not sell out to foreign interests, because the ultimate control will lie in our own people through advanced, enlightened and reformed political activity. Our young people see this vision now and they are now fashioning, through their intense political activism, the control of their own destiny.

We shall see, as we approach the 1976 and 1978 bicentennial years, tremendous grassroots activities by our good people of Hawaii. We shall overcome and conquer our problems...energy problems, employment problems, management problems, environmental problems, social problems... we shall beat them all because we will care and share and kokua and we will work together to build and enhance the beautiful Hawaiian community we call our Island home.

If these times are uncertain, let us be certain on one thing: Let us be certain that we are, collectively, capable of meeting the most difficult of challenges.

This is our vision. I know you share it too and together we shall strive to see it achieved, in harmony and through that patience, prudence and constructive effort by which all our dreams become reality.

Aloha and Mahalo."

. The Senate President then stated:

"Thank you very much Acting Governor Ariyoshi for delivering the State-of-the-State message today. I know that again this year we will be able to, as in the past, work together between the Administration and the Legislature to further enhance the lifestyle and the living comfort and condition of our people."

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

"I thought the cry of this House by some members of the House was that they did not have an opportunity for input, and l expected that maybe he had changed his mind, but I find that this House is also like the Chinese restaurant, where you have the ability to pick only the pork and not the vegetables."

Representative Uechi rose and stated that he would abide by the previous speaker's suggestion and withhold his comments for the caucus room.

"It was declared that there wasn't enough openness in this body, and we are going to take this into the caucus room."

At this time, Representative Yim rose on a point of personal privilege and stated as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, yesterday, the Honorable Representative from Kauai made several statements on this floor accusing me of receiving special treatment."

At this point, Representative Wakatsuki intervened and stated that there was nothing before the House that was germane to Representative Yim's point of personal privilege.

Representative Yim was granted permission to continue his point and further stated as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the statement was clearly a reference to me and all who understood the background, understood those remarks were targeted to a Representative Yim.

Mr. Speaker, this particular Representative from Kauai opposed my appointment to the special committee on energy. He had somehow concluded that there was a definite political advantage in my being a member of the Education Committee and a member of the Higher Education Committee and a member of the special committee on energy even though I have no chairmanship or even a vice chairmanship. How he can conclude that I have been given special treatment is beyond my understanding. On the other hand, the Representative from Kauai sits on the House Policy Committee, the Consumer Protection Committee, the Finance Committee, the Higher Education Committee and is Vice Chairman of the Housing Committee. Now I, too, believe in equal and fair treatment for all 51 members in this House and if the Representative from Kauai feels he is being treated unfairly, then, Mr. Speaker, I am willing to exchange all of my committee assignments

for all his committee assignments.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to briefly yield the floor at this time to the Representative from Kauai to find out if he will accept or reject my offer.

Representative Kunimura, can we exchange committee assignments?"

Representative Kunimura responded:

"Mr. Speaker, I refuse to answer to any kind of kangaroo court but as a rightful place, I sit in this chamber. I would have my time after he is through."

Representative Yim continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I doubted that the Representative from Kauai would accept the offer. His rejection is proof enough that if anyone had been receiving special treatment around here, it has been the Representative from Kauai and certainly not me. Besides being given special treatment in committee assignments, it seems that the Representative from Kauai had also been afforded unusual consideration in interim committee work during the past year. Mr. Speaker, as the Representative from Kauai requested yesterday, I am speaking from the front of my mouth and not from both sides when I say that government should be open to all. On this basis, let us take a look at the record for the past ten years and see who has been receiving special treatment."

Representative Wakatsuki, on a point of order, questioned why the members of the House had to be subjected to childish and juvenile tirade. He further stated that Representative Yim's speech has nothing to do with what was said yesterday. He then defined personal privilege stating that Representative Yim must confine himself to the aggrieved point and not go on and on in trying to get publicity, publicity, publicity.

The Chair stated that the point was well taken and asked Representative Yim to confine his remarks to what was said yesterday.

Representative Yim continued:

"I think the whole question is on special privilege — giving special consideration on being assigned to the committee on energy according to the Speaker yesterday. That is what I am addressing myself on and if you will permit me just a small couple of paragraphs and I will finish and I would not go on and on and on.

As I was saying before I was rudely interrupted, let us take a look at the record. For the past ten years, see who has been receiving special treatment. I have no objection to publicly printing a complete comparison between my record with that of the Representative from Kauai, especially with respect to per diem allowances, trips taken, committee assignments and committee chairmanship with particular reference to last year's per diem payment.

Mr. Speaker, in my desire to achieve more open government, I would like to again yield the floor to the Representative from Kauai to find out if he will accept or decline my offer to publicly look at the records. How about it, Representative Kunimura. Kokua or kanalua."

Representative Kunimura then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated as follows:

"Yesterday, Mr. Speaker, I brought up the point on input. Loud cry for many ears and I agree there should be an opportunity for all to have input in this body and I was one of those that agreed finally to this reform. But in implementing the reform, I saw in one area that the gentleman that just spoke that he had, Mr. Speaker, in my estimation, a convenient hearing because yesterday, I talked about, not special treatment, I talked about the person who cried about the loudest for reform and input make a special request to the negotiating committee on their side that he wanted to serve on only two committees. Now, Representatives from Oahu are entitled to serve on three committees if they are on Policy or four committees if they are not. (If this is my misunderstanding, I stand corrected.) But he chose to have representation on only two committees. Where is the cry for input? This is the question I raised and then when it comes to this energy committee, he wants to get on. I think any individual in this House willing to carry the full share of the responsibility and the work should be given the opportunity to a special committee, and in the area of special treatment, Mr. Speaker, I am on these committees because it is the choice of the Kauai delegation to have representation on these committees. We represent an Island county whereas the boys from Honolulu represent many districts. We have only one district on Kauai, Mr. Speaker, and if his offer is to exchange, let this House decide because many of the committees I serve on, it is by the request of the chairman and I was requested by the chairman of the Housing Committee to sit as a vice chairman. When you talk about input, Mr. Speaker, in interim work on committee assignments, it is not only the ability but also the ability to get along with people and to understand people. Okay? So let's put the card on the table and I accept, Mr. Speaker, opening up of the record any time. There is nothing to hide. I never signed the per diem allowances for myself. It was while I was attending interim committee sessions. During the session, the neighbor islanders are given \$20 a day, living expense. I hope many of you try living on \$20 a day but

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we are not complaining. But I respect the deaf man because he cannot hear but I detest a man who can hear and only hear what he wants to hear."

Representative Uechi then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to correct and respond to the statements made by the Representative from Kauai for the record."

Representative Wakatsuki again interrupted and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, point of personal privilege, according to parliamentary rules, go to the point where the person is aggrieved personally and unless he states that clearly, then he has no point. Not only stating it clearly, it has to be with merit, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair stated that the point was well taken and asked Representative Uechi to state his point of personal privilege.

Representative Uechi continued:

"I will make my point very clearly. The Representative from Kauai spoke of reference to the negotiating committee and our intent. As one of the three members of the negotiating committee, I would like to make it clear that when we negotiated the committee assignments, it was made very clear that Representative Yim would sit on two standing committees. The committee that is in question this morning or yesterday is a special committee and this was also a part of the negotiations. So in his remarks, Representative Kunimura also stated that if he was wrong in this, he apologizes. I say, Representative Kunimura, you are wrong."

Representative Kunimura stated:

"Mr. Speaker, let's get one thing straight. I stated yesterday and if you want to read from the record, I made reference, Mr. Speaker, to a person who makes a request for only two committees and then expects to be appointed to a special committee. Mr. Speaker, the whole truth was not divulged here and when you say discussion, that's the crux of you know what. It was a negotiation and let's call a spade a spade.

Mr. Speaker, he only related one half of the truth. The truth was, Mr. Speaker, you were there, that Mr. Yim wants to serve on only two committees and if he was assigned to any more committees, the deal is off."

Representative Wong then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this energy committee has been dragged all over the floor, I think the lights will go out. But since its been mentioned so often, Mr. Speaker, this is to clear

the record.

Mr. Speaker, I made it very clear to you in my discussions on the membership of this committee, that I requested Representative Yim to sit on this committee. Just to set the record straight, Mr. Speaker, you said that you would deliberate on this matter and that you would inform me the following day as to whether or not the Representative from the 15th District would in fact sit on the committee and you did, Mr. Speaker, as a matter of fact, inform me the following morning that you had appointed Representative Yim to sit on the committee. Now I think, Mr. Speaker, the record speaks for itself. Relative to the negotiation or as you say, discussion, I think it was made very clear, Mr. Speaker, to the negotiators for your particular group of individuals that Representative Yim requested membership on the special committee should the special committee be formed and we were informed by your negotiating team that it was acceptable. I want to state these facts for the record that we are not discussing the energy committee per se and if personalities are involved, that is completely unfortunate and since it is out in the open, I would like the record to so state the events that I have just related."

Representative Kunimura, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Here again, Mr. Speaker, the truth is not uttered. Yet, there was some communication between the two sub-committees but it was never brought back to the full caucus or to the full negotiating committee and this is where the hangup is and it was straightened out in Policy Committee this morning."

Representative Yim concluded:

"If he had some hangups that I am sitting as a member of the Education, Higher Education and Energy Committees, I am willing to resign from all of the committees and accept all of his committees. I will be very happy to do that and be willing to work on five committees rather than three."

Representative Fong then made the following observation:

"Mr. Speaker, if all the hot air that abounds this chamber were turned into energy, we would not have a crisis and no need for the special committee."

The Chair ruled that Representative Fong was out of order.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:03 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Kimura, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, January 31, 1974.

THIRD READING

At this time, Representative Kimura introduced to the members of the House Mr. James A. Harris of Des Moine, Iowa, who is an art and human relations teacher and who is vice president and president-elect of the 1.4 million-member National Education Association which is the largest professional educators' association.

At this time, the Chair appointed Representatives Amaral, Kunimura, Poepoe and Wedemeyer to escort Mr. Harris to the rostrum whereupon Mr. Harris addressed the members of the House as follows:

"Thank you very much and I certainly

appreciate the opportunity to say a word to this distinguished body especially due to the fact that you do have an opportunity to play a tremendously important role in education, which is not only vital to the lives of children, but vital to the very nation itself.

And I hope to share a concern of mine. I am concerned about the fact that, when we surveyed the public school children of the United States, we discovered that we have nearly two million school age children that are not enrolled in school. It was a survey done recently by Stanford University for the government which revealed the fact that, when children are allowed to receive less than an adequate high school education, it ends up in the kind of situation that we currently find ourselves in - and that is that a higher percentage of our high school youngsters spend a portion of their lives in some kind of correctional institution than all of the other institutions of higher learning combined. This survey also revealed that for the most expensive adequate college training, a youngster could be trained for approximately \$6,000 a year and that states are spending from \$12,000 to \$18,000 per year per child to keep children in correctional institutions and that the cost of income to the nation and production from uneducated individuals cost the nation a loss of \$6 dollars for every dollar that would be invested in order to provide that education.

I think that those are some statistics that have our attention in the association and I certainly hope that they have your attention because I think that, as I have pointed out in the beginning, not only is tremendously important in the lives of our children, but we owe it to them, but more importantly if we want them to be the contributing citizens that realize their greatest potential that we ought to do the very best that we can for them.

I heard about some of the things that you have done, and it is commendable. I certainly do want to encourage you to continue in this direction in the future and that you, too, would see education as one of the nation's number one priority items.

Thank you very much."

C. and help me seek justice for my officers and men of the Hukbalahap. Also the widows and orphans of Central and Southern Luzon who helped us during the resistance period, from 1941 to 1945.

We appeal for justice no matter how delayed it is for it is better late than none at all. The situation in the Philippines today gives us, the leaders of the masses, every opportunity to expand - expand the present labor unions, the credit unions, the village councils and local governments for broad democratic participation in the local autonomy for real democracy in every aspect of their daily life - economic, social and political. So any veteran benefits or back pay due will be put to utmost use through a foundation. The same is true with the royalties I am seeking to get for my book, 'Born of the People.' On these two missions of mine, I need your help so please chase me with your help up to Washington and New York.

Once more, may I repeat my heartfelt overflowing gratitude and in your warm Aloha which has its counterpart in the Philippines — Mabuhay — and with your word, Mahalo, I say in Filipino, Salamat po.

Gratefully, thank you."

Representative Aki then introduced to the members of the House Mr. Levi Stanley, University of Hawaii football star, who was selected by the San Francisco 49er's of the National Football League and also the Hawaii franchise of the World Football League. He was accompanied by Mr. Larry Price, Defensive Line Coach of the University of Hawaii football team.

The Chair then appointed Representatives King, Young and Saiki to escort Mr. Stanley to the rostrum and he addressed the members of the House as follows:

"It is an honor being here, but if it wasn't for the help of my teammates, I won't be standing here so I thank all the backers who have been backing our program to keep on backing the program.

Knowing that my son has these attacks I try hard to keep sufficient gas in the tank for emergencies. I have cut my driving by more than 50 percent. My shortage this morning was due to the trip I made last night to Children's Hospital for a shot to relieve his suffering. I had intended to fill my tank today, since my gas was low and my license has an odd number. I had no way of knowing my son would be ill. When I asked if I could have gas this morning, I saw the line of cars to your station. Many times in the past, I have found my way to the end of the similar and even longer lines.

In this case, however, I had a sick child in my car who needed medical attention and was in no condition to wait one and a half hours in the gas line. I am sorry to hear that you have no allowances for emergencies. I understand the pressure that you are under during these hard times. I only hope that these pressures don't cause us all to lose our human compassion for others. I am not one to ask persons to make an exception for me. But in this case I felt it was necessary.

When I reached the doctor's parking lot, my gas gauge read below empty. I thank God that we made it that far. My only problem at this point was how to get my child home after he received the medical attention he required. We remained in the doctor's office all morning and much of the afternoon while my son received injections and medication. His physician weighed the problems of whether to admit him to a hospital. When he began to show definite improvement, it was decided that I could take him home for the evening. At that time, however, it was 3 o'clock, and those stations which were not closed were preparing to close according to the new gas plan regulations. My husband was able to take time off from his work to siphon gas from his employee truck so that I could get home.

Therefore, today's problem is solved. But what of tomorrow? If my son should require medical attention or hospitalization tomorrow, how do I get him there? My license plate authorizes me to purchase gas today. Tomorrow I will not be able to purchase any. My gas gauge at the moment reads about one-sixth of a tank, not nearly enough for a trip to the doctor. Up to now, I have attempted to keep a cool head as advised by the leaders of this State. I have waited in many gas lines without complaint. However, at this point I must join those who are in panic because of our situation. I am nearly seven months pregnant and now find a new concern regarding this future delivery. Even those of us who tried to be prepared cannot foresee all the circumstances that might exist when an emergency arises. It is too late for this letter to help with my emergency; however, I hope it will help you to give more thought and perhaps some compassion to the next plea of a customer in true need of your help. Sincerely, Carol Moon'.

"Mr. Speaker, before I make the introduction I would like to read from **Compact Magazine.** I think it is most appropriate that I should read this. It's entitled: 'Fed's Erase

Hawaii Debt.'

'A strange thing happened to Hawaii's quarter million dollar federal audit exception. First, the U.S. Office of Education ordered Hawaii to repay \$259,000 in allegedly misspent federal compensatory education funds. Then Hawaii's outspoken representative, Patsy Mink, successfully battled in the House Education and Labor Committee for a five-year statute of limitations on the collection of such funds.

Finally, in what an Office of Education official termed an ironic twist, Hawaii was told it had no outstanding audit exceptions to repay.'

Mr. Speaker, I am very happy to say that this Congresswoman is among us today. I would like to introduce to you Congresswoman Patsy Mink."

The Chair here appointed Representatives Kor do, Takamine, Kunimura and Hapai to escou Congresswoman Mink to the rostrum, whereupo Mrs. Mink addressed the members of the House a follows:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Your introduction certainly brings back some very vivid and electrifying memories of my own experiences in the House of Representatives and in the State Senate.

I consider it a very, very happy occasion to have been invited here to just extend some very brief greetings on behalf of myself and as well as my other congressional colleagues who, I am sure, would have accepted the opportunity to be here if they could have.

I know that all of you serving in this Body have some very, very difficult problems which you are facing, some very, very difficult answers which need to be found in some of the crises with which you are faced. I realize, also, that in pursuit of these answers and in pursuit of equitable solutions to these problems that it often feels that it is an extremely lonesome and lonely course which you must pursue. Many of you have communicated the anguish and frustrations and agonies of the current crisis which have been brought upon us not because of any lack of diligence or foresight on the part of the government of the State of Hawaii, but because of the lack of vision and foresight on the part of the national leadership of this country for which you feel you have been wrongfully penalized. I commiserate with this feeling because many of us in the legislative assemblies and the national Congress felt the same way when many of these problems were being thrust upon us in the middle and late fall of last year.

I am here partially in response to many of these inquiries which have come to our delegation offices in Washington to assure you of our very keen concern and very intense willingness to cooperate in every way that we possibly can to provide you with the kind of information, the kind of answers, the kind of responses and interpretations and decisions from the national officials of the respective agencies with which you must deal with as expeditiously as possible. We are hoping that you will take this opportunity to utilize our offices in this way.

In a very complex situation just yesterday, we saw a reversal of a decision that I had received just a few days before where it was exactly the opposite; and even today as we stand here, the whole question with regard to the importation of gasoline in my own mind has not been thoroughly clarified. So we will continue to wrestle with these issues and work together with the State government and with the Legislature and hope that you will call upon us as frequently and as often as you care to on both sides of the aisle, because this is not a partisan question. This is a question which seeks the best answer for the best interests of all of the citizens of this great State, and this is what our job essentially is in Washington to try to get answers for you from the administration while at the same time pursuing legislative answers which we think are not only overdue, but extremely urgent. We are pursuing many avenues of alternate sources of energy; for instance, solar heat, geophysical energy and many of these other areas.

In my own capacity as chairman of the Subcommittee on Mines and Mining, I have the responsibility of trying to manage the huge reserve in oil, and three of our midwestern states have tried to come up with a program in which the federal government hopefully will have the total responsibility for exploration and development to the profit of the citizens of this country rather than for the oil companies.

So I hope that in dealing with the immediate problems that you will also help to guide wisely the course of this State in terms of meeting the future requirements for not just energy, but food resources and all other resources which we believe will be short in the months and years ahead. In the area of solar heat I think Hawaii has a unique responsibility. This is also true in geothermal generation of energy, and this is an area in which the federal government has already determined that they're prepared to spend tens of billions of dollars in research and development funds. So, I would hope that, while cooperating with the immediate crisis of supply in the fuel and other energy requirements of this State, that the Legislature would also give some consideration to these other areas and be one of the first states to come up with a program and a proposal to utilize the new funds which will

be released.

My own specific interests continue to lie in the field of education. We have struggled for the past two years to provide this State as well as other states in the union with the adequate funds which we feel education is entitled to have. And we see, finally, a breakthrough in the relaxation of the decision of the national administration to give up funds which it had impounded over the past few years. So, I look hopefully to the release of several millions of dollars in both the elementary, secondary as well as the higher education field. I know this is a very excruciating area of your concern to meet the demands of your constituents as well as to balance the budget.

So, I hope that in all of these areas you will give those of us who are attempting to represent you and your constituents in the national legislature an opportunity to come back and visit with your respective committee to give you the benefit of some of the facts and other materials that we have gathered to report to you directly on the progress of legislation which concerns this State. I know that I speak for all four of us in extending to you this invitation to utilize the good graces and offices that we hold. I hope that this Legislature will be successful and that, when it finally bangs the gavel in adjournment, that there will be significant achievements and accomplishments which will help us move forward in this very, very difficult year. Thank you very much."

At 11:46 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Representative Ajifu concurred with Representative Cobb and asked the Chair to settle the question of appeal before moving on.

The Chair stated that there is no motion on the floor — that it is a question of appeal.

At 2:26 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 2:28 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

Representative O'Connor, on a point of order, stated:

"The motion before the House is a motion to defer action on the ruling of the Chair for one day. The provisions cited by the Representative that spoke previously concerning appeals from decisions of the Chair in Cushings — all motions apply to appeals from decisions of the Chair and this is stated on Page 154, No. 6. Therefore, a motion to defer would be proper and I ask for a ruling of the Chair on this matter at this time."

The Chair ruled that the position taken by the Majority Leader is correct.

Representative Ajifu then rose and appealed the decision of the Chair and requested a roll call vote on this matter.

Representative J. Garcia rose on a point of inquiry and asked the Chair to state his motion so that the members of the House would know whether to vote aye or no.

The question before the House is the appeal of the ruling of the Chair. An aye vote sustains the ruling of the Chair. A no vote is against the ruling of the Chair."
