FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 21, 1976

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1976, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The Honorable James H. Wakatsuki, Speaker of the House of Representatives, presided.

The National Anthem was sung by the Waipahu High School Choral Group led by Mrs. Maile Ho.

The Chair appointed Representatives Garcia, Machida, Morioka, Peters, Yuen and Evans to escort Kelii Tau'a to the rostrum.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Mr. Tau'a.

The Chair appointed George M. Takane as Temporary Clerk.

The Chair appointed Representatives Kihano, Chairman; Mizuguchi, Vice Chairman; Kiyabu, Oda, Shito, Takamura, Amaral, Clarke, Kamalii and Medeiros as a Committee on Credentials.

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Honorable W. Buddy Soares (Misc. Com. No. 1) submitting his resignation from the House of Representatives from the Seventh Representative District was read by the Temporary Clerk and was referred to the Committee on Credentials.

"APPOINTMENT

WHEREAS, the Honorable W. Buddy Soares, a member of the House of Representatives of the State of Hawaii from the Seventh Representative District, and a member of the Republican Party, was appointed to the State Senate as a member from the Seventh Senatorial District, effective November 1, 1975; and

The Chair thereupon referred Governor's Message No. 1 and the Proclamation to the Committee on Credentials.

The Chair declared a recess at 10:10 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:13 o'clock a.m.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Kihano, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1) stating that the Committee on Credentials had examined the letter of resignation of Representative W. Buddy Soares from the Seventh Representative District and Governor's Message No. 1 appointing Tennyson K. W. Lum to fill the vacancy created by the resignation and recommending that Tennyson K. W. Lum be seated as a member of the House.

On motion by Representative Kihano, seconded by Representative Mizuguchi and carried, the report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted.

The Chair appointed Representatives Abercrombie, Akizaki, Cayetano, Lunasco, Naito, Uechi, Hakoda and Santos to escort the Honorable Hiroshi Kato, Judge of the First Circuit Court, to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to Tennyson K. W. Lum.

OATH OF OFFICE

The oath of office was administered by the Honorable Hiroshi Kato, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii to Tennyson K. W. Lum, as a member of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

The Chair then made the following introduction:

"Members of the House, ladies and gentlemen, it's my distinct honor and privilege to present to you Representative Tennyson Lum."

Representative Lum then responded, saying:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Governor, Lt. Governor, fellow members of the House. I just want to say thank you very much Governor, and I will be doing my very best to contribute my part during this next legislative session.

Again, Governor, thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"On behalf of the members of the House, the Chair extends to Representative Lum, Mrs. Lum and members of the Lum family sincere congratulations. We welcome Representative Lum back into the fold. My only regret is that he sits on the wrong side of the aisle."

The Speaker then made the following address:

"Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Lt. Governor Doi, distinguished guests, my fellow colleagues, friends and fellow citizens:

Greetings and welcome to the re-convening of the House of Representatives of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

On January 15th of last year, I stood at this rostrum and pledged to maintain the integrity of the Speakership of this House, and also pledged my full support and cooperation to all, and I

now pledge to continue to do so. In return, I had requested from all, your support and cooperation, your patience and understanding, in the legislative process of enacting sound legislation and legislative programs. In this regard, I take this opportunity to thank all of you, the public in general, and especially my colleagues for honoring my request, and I am confident that such support, cooperation, patience and understanding will continue to prevail during the trying weeks and months ahead.

Over the past several days, I pondered over the dilemma of what to speak on: Should I speak of past accomplishments; or should I detail all of our legislative proposals. I have decided to do neither.

Our committee chairpersons in the various program areas will be articulating, from time to time, our legislative proposals during the course of this session. We will emphasize quality rather than quantity in our programs. In addition, we will direct special attention to our taxpayers. We will grant relief in the area of the real property tax. We will implement a renter tax credit program. We will increase the excise tax credits. And further, based on our careful assessment of the State's revenues, we will give serious consideration of the return of some tax dollars. We will also direct our immediate attention to the high unemployment problem currently existing in our State. We will adopt a statewide policy statement enunciating our State's goals and objectives on tourism. We will also re-affirm the proposition that every child in our State shall be afforded the opportunity to learn the three R's: how to read, how to write and how to add and subtract.

Presently, several bargaining units of our employees are engaged in negotiations with the Executive over wages and other benefits. I am urging both parties to expeditiously conclude an amicable settlement in order that the Legislature can fashion, with certainty, its legislative program in terms of fiscal responsibility and management.

Let me now direct your attention to an issue that is current in many of our minds. Unicameralism versus bicameralism.

John Connorton remarked that unicameralism is really not the question with which we should be concerned. Unicameralism is a change in the existing framework of government and however appealing it may seem because of its simplicity, it will not insure that the problems of the legislature will be solved.

Two of the most commonly used arguments by the proponents of unicameralism are as follows: First, unicameralism will be more economical; and second, unicameralism will be more efficient. Let us examine and analyze these arguments.

It has been repeated over and over again that economy can be realized by cutting down the number of legislators and in turn the attendant costs such as staff, supplies, equipment, and other services will be decreased. However, there is no guarantee that such costs will, in fact, be diminished. The real and more important question has to do with fair and adequate representation.

By cutting down the number of legislators, the proponents, in effect, are lessening the ability of minority groups within our community from being represented in our legislature. Furthermore, the smaller the body of legislators, the less weight of influence you as citizens will carry with your representative. Is this what we really want? Beware of what will be sacrificed for the sake of economy.

Let us now turn to 'efficiency'. Belle Zeller, author of the American State Legislatures, reports: 'The unicameral legislature of Nebraska has been criticized not for its haste, but rather because it takes much longer to get a bill through the legislature than under the old system. Despite the absence of a second house and the fact that only about half as many bills are introduced as formerly, the sessions have become longer.'

Today the public demands, and rightly so, far more opportunities for input and consideration of their points of view in the formulation of legislation and legislative programs. Our bicameral system is a deliberative process, as it should be, when responsible legislation responsive to the needs of our people are being considered. When a complex and far-reaching piece of legislation such as the no-fault measure is being formulated,

all and varying points of views, whether they are in the majority or minority, whether they are reasonable or unreasonable, have far greater opportunities of being heard, of being considered and argued within a two-body system. There is no question in my mind that such interaction and interplay of ideas from all walks of life will be dramatically reduced in a single house situation. The hallmark of our democratic process is not efficiency, but rather, full participation and adequate deliberation.

Our public is also concerned about the influence over the legislature of any strong vested interest groups, such as big business, big unions, big newspapers and other big and organized self interest groups.

It is quite obvious that the risk of any political faction or interest group to have dominant control over our legislature is far greater with a unicameral system. If we are to value independence and greater deliberations, then power and control over the flow of legislation should be diffused between two houses. William Riley, wrote in the Nebraska Law Review 'One argument for the adoption of a nonpartisan unicameral legislature was that the influence of lobbyists and pressure groups would be diminished. This hope has not been realized. Nebraska is acknowledged to possess a strong pressure system made up of a few dominant interest groups. The lobbyists direct their attention to the key people in the unicameral legislature upon any particular issue, and they tend to be eminently successful . . . I am satisfied that such is not the case in our bicameral system.

Now let me indicate to you that the largest afternoon daily in our State has become, in my opinion, an advocate for unicameralism. Rather than assume the role of a presenter of facts and arguments of both sides of this issue, the newspaper has advocated its position through its reporting and through its editor. No one here will dispute the right of any newspaper to editorially favor a position, but whether the newspaper be for or against a proposition, I am concerned about the power of the press when an attempt to mold public opinion to its thinking becomes quite evident.

The Hawaii Legislature has always operated under the bicameral system and to date, the proponents of

unicameralism have failed to show that our bicameral system is so bad that a drastic change in our governmental structure is in order. To the contrary, those who have carefully studied Hawaii's legislative process give our system a very high rating. The Citizens Conference on State Legislatures legislative evaluation ranked Hawaii seventh and Nebraska ninth among all of our states in an overall balance of the following: functionality, accountability, being informed and independent, and being representative. The evaluation report describes Hawaii's legislature as being the most openly accessible, the most comprehensible or least complex legislative system in our nation, and though not the smallest legislature in size, its 51 member House and 25 member Senate make thoughtful deliberation and rational organization possible and operative.

In spite of this high rating, and the arguments I have discussed this morning, there are those who still clamor for a drastic change. And, therefore, one really begins to wonder why? Are they succumbing to the temporary pressures of popular notions, or popular passions and impulses? Or, are they riding the waves of glamour attached to change, no matter what price the consequence?

Ladies and gentlemen, I submit that change for the sake of change, is not the answer to solving the problems confronting our legislature.

I thank you."

At this time, Representative Poepoe, on behalf of the minority, responded as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, members of the House, guests and friends. On behalf of the Republican caucus, I extend to you our sincere Aloha!

Mr. Speaker, thank you for your kind remarks. We will take them to heart and study them. Our caucus, however, begins this session with some mixed feelings. Public officials in Hawaii and across the nation are under fire. There is a growing cynicism about government and its growing bureaucracy. The people are losing confidence in their elected officials and in the system itself.

In Hawaii, after nearly two decades of strong leadership - - which spanned our last years as a Territory and our first years as a State - - we have reached a plateau. We lack viable, forward-looking, decisive leaders. We cannot expect that this condition can be changed overnight. Nor, of course, should we expect it to be.

However, we can make a start in changing the public's feelings about elected officials. And I believe that effort can begin right here in this chamber. We can address ourselves to this loss of faith, in part, by acting in good faith — in good faith with each other, in our individual caucuses, from one side of the aisle to the other, and, most importantly, in good faith with our constituents. We, as legislators, must say yes to the wishes of the people; and we must say no to legislation that the people oppose.

When I discuss the current loss of faith in government with individuals and groups out in the community, I continually hear: 'My opinion doesn't seem to count.' Or, I am asked: 'Why does it take so long for the Legislature to act on issues that the voters ask for time and time again?'

Well, what can I say? In past sessions our Republican caucus has promoted ideas such as campaign reform, sunshine legislation, lobbyist registration, ethics legislation and government reorganization. In some cases it has taken several years before acceptance of these ideas by your majority. Three years ago, the members of our caucus promoted a tax rebate for Hawaii's overburdened taxpayers; now the majority is coming aboard. In the meantime, the people have had to wait. These are examples of indecision and partisan gerrymandering that the public is tired of.

I have always been proud to have been a member of the House Republican caucus. Though we have been in the minority, many of our initiatives have brought change and openness to government and the Legislature. The Republicans in the Eighth Legislature are no exception. This past fall, the members of my caucus, at their own initiative and expense, held hearings on many issues the full House committees have ignored.

This session, the thrust of our caucus will be towards a complete revamp of our political system. We will continue our efforts at promoting a call for a Constitutional Convention. But we believe that the calling of the Convention is only a prelude to the ideas we will promote for an overhaul of the administrative, legislative and judicial branches of government. Our goal will be to take much of the partisanship out of politics and to get the people of Hawaii more directly involved -- with a greater and more meaningful say -- in their government.

We will specifically take these issues and ideas to the public: that the Constitutional Convention look at a new legislative structure, that the Con-Con investigate the possibility of more elected officials in place of appointed cabinet officers, that the merit selection of judges be considered, that we establish limited terms of office, that we establish staggered terms of office and other concerns.

These ideas, we believe, will help to begin the restoration of public confidence in government. We do not plan this action because we like to make waves. Instead, we will be promoting these ideas because we believe in them and believe that their time has come.

Mahalo nui loa!"

Representative Garcia then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, members of the House, distinguished guests and friends:

This morning, I would like to make a few comments and respond to some of the issues mentioned by our Minority Leader. But don't get me wrong. I respect many of the opinions expressed by the minority, but I would like to take exception with some of the things he has mentioned.

It is true that many people lack confidence in leadership within the political community, but that is not the whole picture. According to a recent Harris Poll conducted nationwide that measured confidence in our public and private sector, confidence in doctors is down from 72 percent to 43 percent; in the military, from 62 percent

to 24 percent; in religion, from 41 percent to 24 percent; in organized labor, from 22 percent to 14 percent; and in business, from 55 percent to 18 percent. This cynicism is more widespread across many fields than most of us realize. But more important about these statistics is the fact that peoples' moods are changing. They no longer accept without question the decisions of government, labor, business, and other public and private leaders. And it is this mood that we, as legislators, must address ourselves to. What we have to recognize is that people no longer live in terms of black or white, right or wrong, good or bad. It also means that we cannot hide behind party labels and criticize each other from that vantage point. We must be willing to drop labels like liberal or conservative when necessary. We must look beyond our traditional bias and traditional adversary relationships and we must begin to move toward unifying all of our efforts. Now, in the past, both Democrats and Republicans too, have worked hard and contributed to the passage of bills relating to campaign reform, sunshine legislation, ethics and lobbyist registration, and I am sure many ideas have come from both parties in the past and I am sure many more will in the future.

But the important thing to remember is that the job was done in these areas and it doesn't mean that we have to agree on everything but what it does mean is that we must work together.

Our Minority Leader suggested that we also revamp our political system. It is true that many people are questioning the system that we operate under and yet this same Harris Poll I mentioned earlier shows that 95 out of 100 people in this country still want the system we have to work. And we Democrats recognize that perhaps a review of our legislative structure is timely, but let us keep things in perspective. For, in the past few years, we, in-but let us keep things in and Republicans, have been reviewing our legislative operations. We have changed our House Rules to include streamlining our committee system, open conference committees, establishment of a Legislative Information Office, grassroots workshops and many other areas of improvements. What we must now do is communicate these changes to the people so that they may participate more fully

in our present system.

Our Minority Leader talked about partisan gerrymandering and yet in our discussions in caucus and in Policy Committee, I know that each Democrat is pledged to treat each legislator as an individual; to make use of his talents; and to make sure that we use his abilities. This we have pledged. So, Mr. Speaker, all of us have an opportunity to meet the challenge of this confidence crisis, a chance to move positively and forcefully toward fulfilling our responsibility, a chance to set the mood rather than accept it, and a chance to resolve conflicts and find solutions by working together.

Mr. Speaker, this is the challenge that all of us face in government, business, labor and the community in the days ahead and I know that we can do it!

Thank you."

At 10: 45 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:05 o'clock a.m.

"Mr. Speaker, we have been sitting in recess now for four hours--four hours. There is nothing on the calendar before this House; there is nothing on deck; nothing serious to discuss before this House. Your caucus has wasted our time; has wasted the time of the good people in the audience; has wasted the time of the State in an unreasonably long caucus on what I consider to be a personal problem in your caucus.

Mr. Speaker, I have excused the members of our caucus. We are not coming back to this session."

Representative Kimura then rose and stated:

"If I may, Mr. Speaker, respond to the Minority Leader's comments. The delay has been on some very important problems and we apologize for the inconvenience at this point. But we are sorry they have taken this attitude and I think we should proceed."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I request, at this time, that the Sergeant-at-Arms bring the minority members back to their chairs."

At 3:47 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:48 o'clock p.m.

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, have you directed the Sergeant-at-Arms to bring the minority members back to this Chamber?"

The Chair responded:

"I have not. The Chair believes that the business of the House can be conducted without the input of the minority members. If they wish to leave without any particular reason, then they shall be answerable to the public. We have met to deliberate and have full discussion and participation. We have 36 members in the majority. The minority has 15 members and it is so easy to conclude some of their businesses in one-third or one-fourth the time."

Representative Kunimura then inquired:

"Mr. Speaker, then, am I to understand that you are, by virtue of the power of the Speakership, suspending the Rules of the House?" The Chair responded:

"I am not."

Representative Kunimura continued:

"Because the Rules of the House, if I remember correctly, Mr. Speaker, only members ill and excused may stay away from the Chamber when we are in session. And I would like to request, at this time, are the minority members excused from participating in the deliberations of this body?"

The Chair responded:

"That is correct."

Representative Kunimura further stated:

"Then, Mr. Speaker, if I may make one point, that the address made by the great Minority Leader yesterday in cooperation, working together, was a hollow promise."

The Chair responded:

"You are correct."

At this point, Representative Kimura rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe announcements are in order at this time before adjournment."

The Chair stated:

"Before the Chair requests for announcements, the Chair would like to, for the record, indicate to all members here, the public, that the Chair's remark yesterday in reference to unicameralism and bicameralism was the Chair's personal point of view inasmuch as the Chair realizes that there are those in the majority and the minority who take the opposite point of view."

ADJOURNMENT

At 3:51 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Kimura, seconded by Representative Ushijima and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Friday, January 23, 1976.

At this time, Representative Ajifu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, point of personal privilege - several points, Mr. Speaker. First, yesterday afternoon when my Minority Leader and myself were up in the gallery, nobody introduced us."

Chair replied: "Wasn't worth introducing, as I understand; but proceed."

Representative Ajifu continued:

"Well, anyway, Mr. Speaker, it was a good feeling to be up there in the galleries and watch the House operate, and I thought as I looked down on this side of the aisle, it kind of reminded me "

The Chair then stated:

"Representative Ajifu, I don't think that's a question of privilege here, so the Chair will rule you out of order at this time. Let's proceed with the business at hand."

Representative Ajifu continued, saying:

"Okay, I will accept that, Mr. Speaker. I have another point of privilege, Mr. Speaker. I would like to first congratulate the Vice Speaker, on behalf of the Minority caucus, with regards to the remarks

Representative Kunimura, on a point of order, stated: "I believe that is not a privilege for one to congratulate anyone on this floor."

The Chair then stated:

"Representative Ajifu, the Chair, a few minutes ago, stated his interpretation of the question of privilege. You have not stated your particular reasons for invoking the question of privilege. The Chair will rule you out of order unless you confine your remarks as to why you think you're entitled to invoke the question of personal privilege at this time."

Representative Ajifu replied:

"Okay, well, I wanted to comment on and make some remarks with regards to the Vice Speaker's comments . . . " The Chair then remarked: "There is nothing before the House in that regard, Representative Ajifu. As a Floor Leader, I think you're well aware of the parliamentary rules."

Representative Ajifu then replied:

"Mr. Speaker, I will accept it if this is the way we are going to operate. I will presume here that the gag rule is being applied where. . ."

At this time, Representative Kunimura, on a point of order, stated: "Mr. Speaker, there is no reference to gag rules. We are following the rules of this House."

Representative Kimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, along that same line, I think if essentially the Minority Floor Leader can just get to the point of the point I think we'll be on our way."

Representative Ajifu then stated:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak to the point."

The Chair, at this time, stated: "Representative Ajifu, the Chair ruled you out of order."

Upon being recognized, Representative Lum rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Yesterday, as a member of this body, I was asked to go into recess for the purpose of caucus. The caucus was not made known to us on this side of the aisle and we went into the room waiting three and a half hours for something to happen..."

Representative Kunimura, on a point of order, stated:

"There is no point of personal privilege here - it's a complaint - tell it to his constituents or tell it to the press."

The Chair replied:

"Point is well taken. Representative Lum, your position of the minority was adequately responded to by your Minority Leader. Let's proceed with the business of the day."

Representative Lum then asked:

"Are you ruling me out of order, Mr. Speaker?"

The Chair replied: "That is correct."

Representative Ajifu, on a point of information, asked:

"Normally, what kind of business comes under 'Miscellaneous Business', Mr. Speaker?"

The Chair replied: "Representative Ajifu, I believe it's covered in the House Rules. If you would look into the Rules of the House of Representatives, you will find a provision under what kind of business constitutes 'Miscellaneous Business'."

At 12:17 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12: 19 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Takamura introduced Gary Chrisler from Manchester College, Indiana. He is here on a special field study tour, studying the Hawaii State and local County governments.

Representative Sutton introduced Mr. James Iams who is a top educator and has greatly assisted getting both public and private students into the top colleges in the United States, including Stanford University.

At this time, Representative Poepoe, on a point of information, rose and asked:

"I need a clarification on the ruling that you made this morning from the Chair. You've stated that if a party is aggrieved - if a Representative is aggrieved - limited to the extension of this chamber, as I understand it. Is that correct?"

The Chair replied: "That is correct - when it goes to his character, integrity and in his capacity as a representative."

Representative Poepoe then continued:

"In his capacity as a representative, yes. You did not put any time limit in that ruling, is that correct?"

The Chair replied, stating:

"I think the general understanding is not to exceed ten minutes under the speaking rules that we have adopted."

Representative Poepoe then remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, our caucus members feel that we have been unfairly treated by the Vice Speaker in his speech on opening day in rebuttal to my speech. Now, I believe that is fair ground for a response for this side of the aisle . . ."

The Chair remarked, saying:

"The boat has been missed and I am pleased to say that there's nothing before the House at this time. You have the press and other means, but not on this floor, at this particular time."

Representative Poepoe then stated:

"All right, let's clarify that, Mr. Speaker, if we may. You're saying that when the action takes place you must rise to a point of personal privilege right then and there. If someone intervenes, your chance for responding is gone. Is that correct?"

The Chair replied:

"You are talking about the remarks made on the opening day, not any particular matter before this House to be acted upon. On opening day we have traditionally followed decorum with the understanding of the minority in terms of who speaks and who rebuts and who responds, and we have proceeded on the gentleman's agreement and I think we all abided by it and so the matter rests at this time."

Representative Poepoe then remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I want every member of this House to be aware of the extension of your decision that you're making right now, because if you're telling me I can't rise on a point of personal privilege when an action has been taken an hour ago in the session that started at 9:30 this morning, I want the implications known to every member of this House."

The Chair replied, stating:

"I did not make such statements. I merely indicated to you what was the understanding on opening day. When and if the question of privilege is invoked during the course of the day, on a session day, the Chair will rule at that time whether or

not you are privileged."

Representative Poepoe then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I now rise on a point of personal privilege."

At 12: 25 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:27 o'clock p.m., the Chair stated:

"Representative Poepoe, the Chair has ruled that you are out of order."

Representative Poepoe replied, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am rising on a point of personal privilege. You haven't heard it yet. I can't be called out of order."

The Chair then stated:

"Representative Poepoe, you stated for what particular reason you rose on a point of personal privilege."

Representative Poepoe replied: "That is correct, and what is that reason?"

The Chair replied:

"That you had wanted to comment on what was said by Representative Garcia or other comments made on opening day. The Chair rules that such matter is not privileged for you to rebut at this time and the Chair rules you out of order."

Representative Poepoe then remarked:

"I agree. I don't agree with the ruling, but I agree that you've ruled on that. I am rising on a point of personal privilege concerning your statement as to what constitutes 'privilege'."

The Chair then stated:

"Under the House rules, the Chair has the right to determine the question of privilege and if the movant feels that the Chair is wrong, he has a right to appeal the Chair's ruling. The Chair has ruled on your question."

Representative Poepoe then asked:

"Mr. Speaker, your ruling is that I cannot speak on your decision. Is that correct?" The Chair replied:

"My decision can be appealed by you to the House."

Representative Poepoe then replied: "Mr. Speaker, I have not stated my position yet."

The Chair then remarked: "I think we're going in circles here."

Representative Roehrig, on a point of order, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that Represen~ tative Poepoe correctly should appeal the ruling of the Chair by saying that he rises on a point of personal privilege because of his dissatisfaction with the way you have ruled, is to beg the question. The question is whether or not the Chair should be sustained or not, and the proper procedure under our rules is to appeal the ruling of the Chair if you feel that the ruling of the Chair was improper. I think that Mr. Poepoe finds himself in that situation and that would be the proper parliamentary procedure at this point."

The Chair then replied:

"That is correct."

Representative Poepoe then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you must rule that I'm out of order; that I cannot speak on the decisions that you made this morning concerning personal privilege. You must rule now whether or not I can speak or not."

Representative Cobb then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that debate is limited both in Cushings and under our House rules on an appeal question, and in a limited debate situation the only debate that could take place would be on the procedural questions involved rather than the substance of the issue and that if the procedural questions were not satisfied to the satisfaction of the movant or the appellant, that then they appeal to the Chair either by a show of hands or a roll call vote could be taken."

The Chair then replied: "Point is well taken."

Representative Ajifu then rose and stated:

"Just for clarification, Mr. Speaker. I think when you first recognized Representative Poepoe, he rose on a point of information and there was no request for a personal privilege at that time. His last request was for a personal privilege."

The Chair replied: "Representative Ajifu, the Chair is well aware of what Representative Poepoe had spoken on

and he agreed to what I had indicated."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12: 32 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Kimura, seconded by Representative Ajifu and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 10: 45 o'clock a.m. on Monday, January 26, 1976.

FOURTH DAY

Monday, January 26, 1976

The House of Representatives of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1976, convened at 10:45 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Reverend Everett Curry, Jr. of the Community Baptist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Kunimura and Roehrig, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Third Day.

Representative Kimura moved that reading of the Journal of the Third Day be dispensed with, seconded by Representative Ajifu.

At 10:50 o'clock a.m., on request by Representative Lum, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:52 o'clock a.m.

The motion to dispense with the reading of the Journal of the Third Day was put by the Chair and carried, and reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Third Day was approved.

At 10:55 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:04 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's message.

At this time, the Chair introduced to the members of the Eighth Legislature the First Lady of the State of Hawaii and the Lieutenant Governor:

"We are in session this morning for the purpose of receiving our Governor's state of the State address. Before appointing the escorts, the Chair would, at this time, like to recognize our First Lady of our State, Mrs. Ariyoshi."

Representative Henry H. Peters then presented Mrs. Ariyoshi with a white carnation lei.

"The Chair would also like to recognize our Lieutenant Governor, Lieutenant Governor Doi."

The Chair then appointed Senators Ching, Taira and Yee and Representatives Ushijima, Kimura, Stanley and Poepoe to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Kathleen Stanley presented Governor Ariyoshi with

a red carnation lei on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Chair introduced to the members of the Eighth Legislature the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi:

"Members of the Eighth State Legislature, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, it is my distinct honor and privilege to present to you our Governor, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi."

The following is the address of Governor George R. Ariyoshi (Gov. Msg. No. 59):

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the Eighth State Legislature, distinguished ladies and gentlemen:

I am sincerely grateful for this opportunity to address you today in joint session and I thank you for your warm expression of Aloha. As a former legislator, I recognize and I appreciate the difficulties and challenges which are yours and I extend to you my best wishes for a productive and meaningful session.

In this year of our Bicentennial, a great faith must grow in us-faith in God, in our country, and in ourselves. We must hold a great hope for global, national and personal peace and prosperity. We must declare again our resolute fidelity to the spirit of Aloha and we must rededicate ourselves to that sincere righteousness in government and in our private lives which, our State motto tells us, 'perpetuates the life of the land.' And we must pursue, with unremitting diligence, the goal of excellence in all our endeavors.

When I appeared before you just twelve months ago, I expressed some of our fundamental hopes and aspirations, our broad objectives and policies and our basic concerns over the future of our beloved State of Hawaii. We were a new Administration and therefore we did not pretend to know all of the answers to the many problems facing us.

The months since then have been a period of assessment—thoughtful deliberation on the needs, the hopes, and the aspirations of our people and how best to meet them.

Let me briefly share with you some of the results of our assessment.

We all know that in the years which preceded Statehood, Hawaii was predominantly a rural, agriculturally oriented society. We were small in size and number, and we had little need for concern over events in other parts of the world. But the onset of World War II and the years which followed have greatly changed this State. We have more industry, more visitors and more people than we ever thought possible. We have built super highways, tourist destination areas, massive airports, modern schools, parks, a community college system, homes, stores and hundreds of other facilities designed to meet the needs of a new and burgeoning population.

Our people have told us that they generally like Hawaii as it is today. It is a good place to live. It is a good place to raise a family. They enjoy having visitors share with them the overwhelming beauty of our land. They are confident about their future and the basic soundness of our economy.

But they are also apprehensive. They have concerns. They have problems. These are some of the things that they have said to us:

What is wrong with a society when 8.3 percent of our people cannot find meaningful work?

What kind of a State have we built when we devote large amounts of our government resources to education, yet some of our children leave school unable to read?

What kind of State is this that can be so economically devastated by forces over which we have no control?

What kind of people are we to have lost faith in our government, its elected officials, and the civil servants who conduct our business?

What kind of society are we when our health needs are threatened because our medical practitioners can no longer treat us?

What kind of a State is this when our prisons neither rehabilitate offenders nor protect the innocent, and our children are afraid to go to school?

What kind of people are we when we permit those less fortunate than ourselves to suffer from hunger, illness, or lack purpose in their lives? What kind of society have we built when a middle income wage earner is unable to buy his own home?

These expressions of concerns from our people have indicated to us that they want this State Administration to set its priorities around jobs, a government open and responsive to the needs of its citizens, personal safety, the diversification of our economy, the basics in education, help for the less fortunate, and housing.

Knowing this, we are now prepared to present to you our directions and our programs for the conduct of our State government.

Some of these programs are already underway; some have been planned and are ready to begin; some, because of their complexities, are still in the planning stage; some require your support by enabling legislation and the commitment of resources; but all are identified and ready to be actively promoted and pursued. Let me share them with you.

Unemployment

I am appalled at the rate of unemployment amongst our people. To cope with this problem, the following program of action is being undertaken:

- 1. I have directed my
 Administration to accelerate the
 processing and release of authorized
 capital improvement project funds
 in order to get government construction projects underway just as
 quickly as possible.
- 2. I have authorized an acceleration of essential repairs and maintenance work for public buildings which will assist in creating more job opportunities in the construction industry. A total of \$6.9 million has been released for school repair and maintenance. I am also asking for an additional \$2 million for much needed improvements to our public facilities.
- 3. I am submitting legislation to continue through the use of unexpended funds the program which this Legislature began in 1975 which has provided government jobs to 700 unemployed persons.
- 4. I have implemented a corps of civilian workers through which the

unemployed were hired to work in various State park areas under the auspices of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

- 5. I have authorized the Director of Labor and Industrial Relations to negotiate an interest-free loan with the federal government to replenish the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund and to assure the continuation of benefits to all eligible recipients. This is a short-term solution and for the long term, I am proposing legislation which will insure the future solvency of the trust fund, provide for more equitable employer contribution rates and permit us to repay the federal loan.
- 6. I am proposing legislation which will provide benefits only to those claimants who are involuntarily unemployed through no fault of their own; which will render ineligible any claimant who leaves work on his own volition and without good cause.

Those are the major features of our action program to help resolve the current unemployment problem. It will not bear full results immediately since some of the activities will require your assistance; however, it is designed to get the State moving in the direction of relief for our labor force.

On the other hand, I do not believe that this is a problem for which the public sector should bear sole responsibility. Our business community too has an enormous stake in the overall health of our economy and I call upon them to undertake a concerted program of action to assist our people in their time of need.

An Open and Responsive Government

We are committed to the advancement of a philosophy which protects and promotes the rights and interests of our people as consumers and responds to them as the valued citizens that they are. We believe in the protection of the consumers in the market place and the efficient and the responsive delivery of government services.

Since I last addressed you, a number of steps have been taken in this direction.

- 1. We have established within the Department of Regulatory Agencies a specialized office to focus on consumer problems and expedite consumer complaints in industries regulated by the State.
- We have sought with some success and will continue to press for the elimina-

tion of the high disciminatory rates that our Hawaii's telephone consumers now pay for long distance calls to the mainland. We can and we must eliminate this discrimination without otherwise unduly burdening Hawaii's consumers.

- 3. We are now implementing the law passed by you during the last session which provides for the regulation of automobile repair dealers in the interests of the consumer public.
- 4. The Office of Consumer Protection has established a new outreach program to help consumers in outlying areas.
- 5. Based on authority given by you during the past session, the Office of Consumer Protection is now promulgating substantive rules dealing with misleading advertising.

Much more remains to be done. In this session, we will ask that you enact legislation to significantly improve and to strengthen the regulation of our most essential industries—energy, communications and transportation.

These utilities will warrant our special attention because they are presently experiencing substantive changes brought about largely by conditions beyond their controlnotably the severe shortage of capital and the spiraling cost of energy. Qualified and expert regulation therefore is essential.

Accordingly, we ask that you establish a full-time PUC--Public Utilities Commission. We also ask that you make an additional commitment of State resources to strengthen the regulatory process.

We will present for your consideration a major piece of legislation to deal with the current complex crisis in the field of medical malpractice insurance. A number of intricate and inter-related issues are involved in this question. I urge you to consider them thoughtfully and thoroughly.

We will, in this session, request appropriations to achieve a much higher degree of equity and uniformity in the real property assessment program; to develop a statewide integrated tax accounting system; and to computerize the general excise tax, the use tax and withhold-

ing tax programs. This, we believe, will improve our productivity, lower our costs, and result ultimately in savings to the taxpayer.

This year, as in the past, there will be a substantial package of bills for your consideration relating to the protection of the citizens in the market place. These measures attempt to clarify our consumer protection laws so as to improve our operations or include areas not previously covered. We hope that you will, as you have in the past, support such changes.

Let me state also that it is my conviction that the question of the calling of a Constitutional Convention should be put to the people on the ballot of 1976. I urge your positive action on this matter.

I want the people of this State to know that I have told my cabinet officers and their program managers that this Administration is dedicated to making government and its activities open to public view and scrutiny, and responsive to the needs of its citizens. I will insist on that posture throughout.

Personal Safety

In many parts of our nation today, law abiding citizens fear for their personal safety. Hawaii's people have only lately been faced with this problem, but we have learned that it is a matter of growing concern.

I am disturbed by the fact that the present efforts of various agencies from the Federal, State and County governments have not been as effective as might be desired in combating organized crime in Hawaii.

I am taking the position, therefore, that we should inquire into the situation and seek ways which will facilitate a more coordinated approach in the matter. I have asked the Lieutenant Governor to assist me in this task.

Infinitely more worrisome to all of us is the safety and the security of our children in our schools. For seven hours a day, 176 days a year, the school is the living environment of our children. We cannot, therefore, tolerate a situation in which the fear of physical harm or the destruction of school property endangers that environment and its educational purpose.

The fact of the matter is that our public schools are faced with an increasingly serious problem of anti-social behavior which disrupts and, on occasion, destroys the educational atmosphere. Property losses have soared, but more importantly and of greater concern to me is the increased incidence of hijacking, gang fights, assaults, threats and serious bodily injury which have occurred in recent years.

The Department of Education is continuing its efforts to stem the tide through its ongoing programs of alienation counseling and student activities. In addition, we have utilized three temporary State programs to supplement their efforts. The State and federal temporary employment programs have provided personnel for campus supervision and counseling. We also have instituted the School Security Patrol Pilot Project which is designed to curb disruptive behavior.

To further these efforts, we are asking you to provide funds to increase school security in the form of alarms and patrols, and to provide crisis intervention training for teachers such as will enable them to identify potential problems and deal with them before they become major disturbances. I most urgently request your favorable action on these items.

In this area of concern for personal safety, we must also address ourselves to the question of the adequacy and appropriateness of the treatment programs for juvenile and adult offenders. Our policy is to remove offenders from ready contact with our citizens when necessary, and to develop modern correctional programs to rehabilitate them and to seek their return to productive community life.

It is a known fact that most of Hawaii's prisons and jails were constructed in an era when isolation of offenders in order to protect society was the only purpose to be served. Later attempts to provide rehabilitative programs in such facilities have met with varying and less than satisfactory degrees of success.

It is therefore urgent, if we are to reduce the incidence of prison violence and meet the objective of public safety, that adequate funds be provided immediately so that construction of the correctional facilities called for in our Master Plan can begin without further delay. I am, therefore, recommend-

ing your immediate passage of an Administration measure which will permit the Department of Social Services and Housing to proceed.

We will require approximately \$10 million in State capital improvement funds. An Intake Service Center/Community Correctional Center will be located in each county of the State. This will replace the existing county jails. The present Halawa Jail will be remodeled and expanded to become the high security facility for the State, while the present Hawaii State Prison will be largely demolished and replaced by a multi-building Intake Service Center/Community Correctional Facility for Oahu. This Administration is committed to the construction of these facilities. Hawaii State Prison, and all that it represents, must go -- and soon.

We are transmitting to you legislation which we hope will further contribute to peace and order in our public places. This legislation would require that persons convicted of a crime due to mental illness shall, before release, be subjected to a mental examination and hearing to determine whether they should be discharged back into the community. I urge your favorable action on this proposal also.

The Economy

During 1975, our Administration emphasized the broad goal of greater independence for Hawaii in two basic areas: energy and agriculture. We have made important gains in understanding how precariously we live in terms of our dependence on imported petroleum. We have joined with the Federal government in trying to make every citizen aware of this basic problem and of the need for conservation of energy. At the same time, we have moved toward developing alternate energy resources. We have been fully aware that this is a long-range program, and that progress will be painfully slow in light of the complex economics involved.

We are looking into the potential for the development of what energy specialists call 'energy plantations' which would grow crops for fueling electrical generating systems. Solid waste products offer other energy potentials. A State waste recycling center is in operation on Sand Island. Our State Task Force on Solid Waste Energy Resources reports that the

municipal wastes on Oahu alone could replace 1,000 barrels of fuel oil per day. I am pleased that our sugar plantations on the Big Island are burning tons of bagasse to produce electricity and make better use of a once wasted resource, a resource which once was a pollutant.

Kauai's Mt. Waialeale is the object of intensive study now by our Department of Land and Natural Resources. We seek to determine how this enormous energy reserve can be wisely developed. Your cooperation last year in funding this study could eventually result in a large hydroelectric dam, beautiful new lakes and parks, and an inexhaustible power supply for the Garden Island, with a concomitant decrease in its need for costly petroleum.

In our supplemental budget request, we are asking you to fund the support facilities—roads, utilities, shelter, and fences—for the Hawaii Natural Energy Laboratory at Ke-Ahole Point on Hawaii. Ke-Ahole is an ideal location for conducting our essential scientific energy studies and testing.

Let me also share with you the fact that the National Strategic Petroleum Reserve Storage Plan, which was being developed by the Congress, would have been of little benefit to Hawaii because it limited such oil storage to the Mainland. We worked swiftly and, with welcomed help from our Congressional delegation, we convinced Congress of Hawaii's unique supply vulnerability. I am pleased to report that last month Congress passed the Energy Policy and Conservation Act with a provision for Hawaii to have its own Strategic Petroleum Reserve Storage. This is important in protecting us from oil embargo-type crises. Additionally, it may bring millions of dollars to Hawaii in construction funds.

Energy is a fundamental need for Hawaii and, with your help, our Administration's energy work will continue.

No less fundamental and critical to our future is our work in agriculture, where diversification, stability and expansion are our goals. These goals in no way conflict with or detract from our continuing dedication to the importance of our basic agricultural enterprises of sugar and pineapple.

Many of our present farming ventures are highly profitable. But we need many more. We need to raise more beef, more chickens, more hogs, more fresh fruits, vegetables, flowers and foliage. We need more modern slaughterhouses and processing plants, and much bolder marketing. We need to consume more of our island products. and less of imports. We need to sell more and more of our farm products overseas.

An Agricultural Development Plan is currently in the making and will, upon completion, be integrated into our State Policy Plan. I do not intend to present to the people of this State a static, inflexible plan for agriculture. Rather, I intend that it will be one that incorporates alternative means for the implementation of programs to achieve our desired agricultural goals.

One of these goals is the preservation of agricultural land, not only for agricultural development today but also to preserve significant land use options for our children and their children. We know that, in ancient Hawaii, the Kapu system regulated land use, and did so on the basis of sound ecology. There was a sense of 'stewardship' in regard to landholding in those days which still influences us.

But the pressures to urbanize agricultural lands throughout the State continue to mount because of speculation in land.

I believe that the time has come to meet this issue squarely and headon. The farm land in our State is rapidly appreciating to a point far beyond its value for agricultural use. We must, therefore, regard our agricultural lands as a limited resource, not as a replaceable commodity. This can only be done by eliminating investment opportunities in agricultural land for other than agriculturally beneficial purposes.

To this end, I am now in the process of seeking a means of accomplishment. We are absolutely serious about preserving agricultural land. I do not intend to see our farmers forced to give up their land piece by piece, bit by bit, valley by valley, because the real loss, in the larger context, will be the people of Hawaii, and their children.

On Kauai, at Kilauea, speculators have driven the paper value of the

former Kilauea sugar lands up from one to thirty million dollars. A plan, with careful consideration, is being developed to keep Kilauea in agriculture for the preservation of the lands and the desired lifestyle of the community. If these efforts fail, we intend to go to court to condemn the leasehold interest of those lands.

If necessary, we are also prepared to go to court to prevent the subdivision of agricultural lands for residential purposes at Mokuleia or Waiahole/ Waikane, or any other place. The issue here is not the size of the lots after subdivision—it is the intent of the subdivision. Will the subdivision promote agricultural activity, or will it result in residential use under the guise of agriculture? Will it frustrate the intent of our Land Use laws?

In addition to the preservation of agricultural lands, we have taken steps forward in agricultural development. The most significant of these is the development of agricultural parks. In various phases of planning and development are agricultural parks in Pahoa in Puna, Hawaii; Kahei in North Kohala, Hawaii; and Kilauea on Kauai. Studies are currently being conducted for more agricultural parks in other areas.

We are grappling with other problems facing the farmers--problems such as product marketability, water supply and transportation. We refer to this as an agri-business. I believe we have made great inroads in these areas and we are achieving the necessary spirit of working together with the county governments and private industry. It is worthy of our best efforts.

Now, I know that Kohala is much on your mind as I reiterate my long-standing espousal of diversified agriculture. There are many who call the work of our Task Force there a failure. I call it a longrange effort and experience in which we have not yet been successful. Our difficulties there will not lessen our determination to increase our agricultural enterprises. Kohala is a lesson to us that the goals we seek will be extremely difficult to achieve...I think those of us who are leaders within our State must tackle not only the problems which are easy to solve-we must take on the problems that are indeed difficult to solve; the

problems that the private sector is unable to cope with. We went into Kohala to save an island community and a Hawaiian way of life. We do not intend to abandon that commitment. But we do intend to learn from our experiences.

To me, Kohala is important--not only in providing employment opportunities for the people of Kohala, but Kohala is important to our entire State. When we speak, for example, about the need for us to produce more beef...and we only produce 40 percent of the beef that we consume...we are not going to make it. The ranchers and the Parker Ranch aren't going to make it unless we have another slaughterhouse on this island and in this State. Hence, I place a great deal of importance on what is happening in Kohala with Hawaii Biogenics... that we may have another slaughterhouse; a place where our independent ranchers can take their cattle to have them fattened before slaughter.

In aquaculture and forestry, we have also made significant gains. Thanks to legislative appropriations of several years ago, Hawaii today is the leader in the successful scientific production of millions of juvenile Malaysian prawns, which are now used to stock many island commercial prawn ponds. Catfish, oysters and possibly mullet also show great promise. We will soon send to you a new report on Hawaii's aquaculture which provides an objective appraisal of our progress in this exciting food field.

We also know that we can grow many trees more quickly and in greater abundance than most places in the world. What we must devise is a vigorous program of forestry which will allow a commercial timber industry to develop and, at the same time, permit the forests to serve as watersheds and I would take you back to the years around 1957 or 1958, when the then Territorial Legislature, in their wisdom, decided on a tree-planting program and planted many eucalyptus trees on the Big Island, some of which are being harvested today for wood chips by firms within our State.

These are potentials that our Administration is working on now, and you will hear much more of them in the months ahead. The report of the Governor's Economic Advisory Task Force gave us many insights in this and other areas, and we are grateful for their advice and assistance.

Let me turn now to the question of Kakaako--a large area of 600 acres of prime urban properties lying between Waikiki and downtown Honolulu. It is an area which can be utilized far more efficiently and beneficially by our people. Its proper development can help to relieve the pressures for residential development on our agricultural lands.

Our Department of Planning and Economic Development has completed, not a plan for this area, but a practical manual, the Kakaako Urban Design Demonstration Study, to show to our civic leaders what can be done to make Kakaako beautiful. It is this Administration's intent to assist in getting the development of Kakaako moving. Kakaako's time has come.

Comprehensive, long-range statewide planning is always a difficult subject, but that is only because modern life itself is difficult and complex. In your own planning mandates to this Administration, you have given us much needed policy direction on which to build. Our Administration is reciprocating with a cohesive program of planning and action which continues to demonstrate the State planning leadership for which Hawaii is recognized and honored nationally. Our major work is the Hawaii State Plan, which is to be the Master Plan, or primary planning and policy document of the State of Hawaii. You will soon receive the firstyear interim report on this project as mandated by your session last year.

Long-range tourism planning has been recognized by us all as necessary. Again, your own earnest concern is evident in your past legislation. We are asking for staffing for a State tourism coordination office and for the development of a ten-year controlled growth policy plan for tourism. We have received an excellent report from our Tourism Planning Advisory Committee, whose work is a vital first step in deciding the future course of this billion dollar industry, an industry which is so important to the economy of our State.

In this respect, Waikiki is allimportant. It is the heart of our tourism industry, representing many millions in public and private investments. We have consistently pressed for its improvement. We have made available State funds, State expertise and State cooperation. I am very pleased to report progress here, particularly with the generous response of the City Council.

We are asking for your funding support in the development of a moviemaking and television production industry in our State. It offers its own economic impetus to Hawaii, as well as an impact on our visitor industry through the mass advertising of our beautiful State.

Last year, I stated our commitment to the development of programs to better utilize our marine resources and to teach us to live better in our ocean environment. Continued progress is being made in the establishment of an ocean energy laboratory at Ke-Ahole Point; in the assessment of the resources of offshore sand, coral, mineral, and living resources in the Archipelago; and in the evaluation of our potential for underwater parks and ocean recreation.

Closely allied to our economic viability is our transportation planning and capital improvement programs which involve massive expenditures and long-range commitments. The immediate fate of Oahu's TH-3 highway project rests with the Federal Appeals Court. But there is a pressing need to complete our interstate highway system and to provide a third trans-Koolau route, thereby alleviating the serious traffic stresses on our other highways.

A separate but related issue is the question of what kind of future we want for Windward Oahu. have a feeling that too often the TH-3 is confused with this question of what should take place in Windward Oahu. To me, growth in Windward Oahu, the only relatively undeveloped coastal zone remaining on Oahu, is going to come whether we have TH-3 or not, unless we decide on a whole regional plan--not Waiahole/ Waikane by itself--to get what we want. We are working toward an integrated Windward Oahu Regional Plan. I have given instructions that I want a great deal of citizen input, in order that we may realize a future preferred by the people of Oahu for the Windward coast.

No transportation project operates in isolation. We recognize that an integrated mass transit system statewide, linking all of our island communities with planes, the new jet foils and other surface vessels, buses, cars and trucks, and smoothly linked roads and highways, is one of the most basic needs of a unified State. I am sure that you know that since 1956, there have been some 25 or so separate studies concerning an inter-island ferry system. Our Administration is confident that the present updating and consideration of all data and arguments will give us the 'right' answer to our inter-island transportation system soon.

At your request, we have just had completed a study of transportation funding and responsibilities. It addresses, among other things, the imminent deficit in our highway fund. And it presents a bold new approach for us to consider in the funding of transportation programs--that of providing for our transportation needs from the general revenues of our State rather than from user charges. While some of us may have reservations about use of general funds in this area...I place myself in this category...I urge that we keep our minds and options open as we review this study which will be presented to you shortly.

Let me also emphasize that we are seeking to enhance our economic relationships with our Asian and Pacific neighbors, by aggressively and personally establishing the kinds of contacts which will enhance our standing in their eyes as a good place and a good people to do business with. This is an area of international trade in which I have a great deal of confidence that our State is destined to move towards.

Education

In the field of education, I have become increasingly aware of the concerns expressed by parents, legislators and educators themselves regarding the decline in standardized test scores--particularly those in reading as achieved by our children. I wonder whether we have not unwittingly contributed to this phenomenon by filling too many of our education hours with non-basic subjects at the expense of the fundamentals of reading, writing and mathematics. I challenge our educational leaders therefore with the task of reevaluating their

programs and their priorities to assure our students of the basic skills and competencies that they will need to face life's challenges.

The way in which our public school system is governed is a fundamental question. It determines how clearly the public is able to ascertain where the responsibilities and accountability for accomplishments in our schools lie.

The responsibility for public education in Hawaii is currently shared by the Legislature, the Executive and the Board of Education. Uncertainty, confusion, and conflict regarding our respective responsibilities and accountability can, and have resulted in the past.

While I personally favor an elected Board of Education, I believe it appropriate that this Legislature address itself to the question of governance of the public education system.

In order that students obtain greater benefits from our educational system, we must give greater flexibility to school administrators so they can better cope with local conditions. Bigness brings red tape and bureaucratic constrictions which stifle the enthusiasm of even the best educators. Unless I be misunderstood here, I am not speaking of an effort to try to do away with the one-uniform, onestatewide school system that we have...it is a good system, providing equal educational opportunities to all of our children wherever they come from. What I am talking about is that we must be mindful of the shackles we place on teachers and principals. We must seek to give them our confidence and trust through simpler procedures and greater authority and flexibility at the school level within a centralized school system...we must seek to give a greater degree of flexibility, so that principals working with teachers can have a sense of importance again. They should be involved in developing programs. They need to have a sense of accomplishment beyond that of transmitting information to the classroom. I hope that we can address ourselves to this problem and attempt to give a greater degree of flexibility at the school level.

In our higher education programs, there are three issues which need our immediate attention: West Oahu College, the law school and improved athletic facilities.

It is the intent of this Administration to make higher education at the baccalaureate degree level more accessible to the citizens of this State. It is difficult in some instances to determine the most efficient method of providing educational services to those that need them.

To me, West Oahu College's present program represents an innovative approach which has now become a reality by offering instruction to an anticipated 150 students in classrooms at Mililani, Pearl City, and Campbell High Schools...I understand from this morning's paper that the figure may be off a little bit. The Department of Education facilities are now being utilized for the delivery of higher education on weekends and after school hours on weekdays.

While I am committed to providing undergraduate instruction in the West Oahu area... I personally happen to feel that some youngsters who go to the University, to the Manoa campus, don't get the best possible education because it is too impersonal -- some of our youngsters need a smaller setting...that's my commitment to the young people in our community, that we have another setting outside of the Manoa campus to provide this educational opportunity...however, while I feel very strongly about this, I am personally not yet convinced that building a new physical plant at this time is in the public interest.

To me, there are a number of possible alternatives that need further exploration prior to making a commitment of such magnitude...including what we have just started very recently—the utilization of some of our classroom facilities. I see the possibility of providing community college instruction in the outlying areas also—an outreach program...and maybe looking at the possibility of freeing some of the present facilities at Leeward for the use of four-year college opportunities.

What I am saying to you is, I believe there are some new innovations that have come into the picture, and I think that it is truly important for us to really assess what has taken place recently.

The new School of Law at the University of Hawaii reflects our commitment to provide the opportunity for the citizens of this State to develop vocational competency commensurate with their abilities and their desires. I am concerned about the ability of this new school to meet national accrediation standards relating to physical facilities. To insure that accreditation is not endangered in the immediate future, I have requested of you \$725,000 in capital improvement project funds for the renovation of the interim School of Law facilities. Funds have also been requested for the planning of permanent facilities in a location above the new parking structure in the quarry area of the Manoa campus.

And, finally, in this area of education, my capital improvements project budget includes \$9.7 million of Phase I of the new physical education facilities on the Manoa campus, that we estimate will cost a total of \$28.9 million in all three phases. These new facilities will adequately provide for the health and physical education instructional program, the intramural sports program, the recreation and free time activities for men, as well as women, and for community activities. This is consistent also with our new Division I status in intercollegiate competition.

The Aged

Every society is judged by how it cares for its aged, its disabled, its afflicted and its poor. It is intolerable that in our affluent society, there are many who suffer-often in silence and alone-out of sight and out of mind. We must remember them and help them. We do this through many government programs, often with tremendous assistance from generous volunteer citizens who share a practical compassion for those in need.

I do not believe that the needs of our State's elderly citizens have been adequately met in the past. I ask you to join with me in making sure that for those of our State who are in their 'autumn' years, life is made richer and more meaningful.

In our supplemental budget request, we have asked for \$650,000 to continue the congregate dining, the tuition free education, and outreach services for the elderly. We also ask for favorable consideration of legislation, which is also pending, which calls for the establishment of an Executive Office on Aging to be located in the

Governor's Office.

Developmentally Disabled

Numerous programs have been initiated and operated by public and private agencies, and we are now ready to implement our plan to more adequately provide for the developmentally disabled. It calls primarily for the expansion of community based services, and for the strengthening of programs for the prevention and early detection of developmental disabilities. In addition, Waimano Training School and Hospital will be improved. Operating funds amounting to \$1.26 million, and a capital investment of \$738,000 to implement these activities are being requested in the supplemental appropriations

Welfare

I firmly support our welfare system for those who have need for such assistance; however, I just as firmly object to giving money to those who are not qualified.

In recent years, we have become aware of the fact that, due to staff shortages, welfare payment errors have occurred and payments have gone to persons not eligible for such assistance. Moreover, we are penalized by the Federal government for such inefficiency. We are asking in our budget for sufficient funds and positions to fully monitor our welfare payment system.

Immigration

Immigration is a federal question and basically a federal problem, but it is the states that get most affected by what the Federal government does. Hawaii, amongst all 50 states, is the state which is more greatly impacted than any other state, and so we have been asking the Federal government to assume greater responsibilities for the programs designed to help immigrants in the transition. So far, we haven't gotten very much response.

In the meantime, I urge your support of legislation, which is currently pending in the Legislature, that puts financial responsibility on sponsors who in the future sign affidavits of support for immigrants.

Housing

Providing home ownership opportunities for low and moderate income families is, and continues to be, a high priority item of this Administration. The task of providing adequate housing for our people has been a complex and a very difficult one. Like any complex mechanism, the process of repeated 'fine tuning' must be an integral and ongoing part of the program. It is for this reason, I requested a review of our State's housing program; a report detailing those refinements will be transmitted shortly to you for your review.

Let me state now, however, that it is our intent that the State Housing Program will, under our Administration, assume more of an assertive role than it has in the past. We are particularly interested in pressing for quality as well as quantity in our housing supply. Moreover, in order to facilitate better coordination of our housing delivery system, it is my intention to fill the position of Special Assistant for Housing in my office very soon.

We are also undertaking a program to build in excess of 800 homes on our Hawaiian Homes lands. This should help our island people very significantly. We are also submitting legislation which would reduce the ancestry requirements for designated successors of Hawaiian Homes lands from 50 percent to 25 percent, in order to provide an incentive for the homesteaders to conscientiously maintain and upgrade their homes and property. We are not talking about dropping the standards generally, in allowing people with less than 50 percent to come onto the property. We are talking about making it possible for a person, once qualifying, with less than 50 percent Hawaiian blood and the children of qualified homesteaders to continue on the premises. We hope that this will bring much needed debate and discussion to a problem which has been too long ignored. I recall, going back to the years when I was a freshman legislator, 1955 session, when this matter was first brought up. I think it is timely for us to consider again whether we should go this route.

Financial Integrity and Government Efficiency

Over these many years since Statehood, Hawaii has been blessed with a healthy economy and it continues to grow. Although government expenditure increases can be currently accommodated by the revenue generated by the existing tax structure and by carryover funds, I am concerned that, like so many other states, the longrun fiscal prospects for us could be one of imbalance, if not properly managed. I have taken a stance therefore that our fiscal policy shall be one which will not require general fund tax increases. I believe that with restraint in spending and borrowing, we can accomplish this goal. I ask for your understanding in its accomplishment.

Collective bargaining for public employees has been a new and positive force in Hawaii. The law has provided a means for all employees covered by collective bargaining agreements to participate in decisions on wages and working conditions. But it has excluded certain employees, chiefly in middle management, who should be accorded proper recognition as part of the management team. I am submitting legislation to accomplish this.

Let me also recognize the work now being done by our Government Reorganization Commission. They have a tremendously important service to render, and we are committed to cooperate and assist them with the full resources at our disposal.

Parks

Finally, let me just share with you our plans for extensive park development in our State. I believe that we should pursue a policy of acquiring extensive lands in our State such as will assure their preservation in perpetuity for the recreational enjoyment of our people. For this, too, we will need funding authorization from you. We plan to develop the Diamond Head State Park and parks in North Kohala, Kaiaka Point, Wainapanapa and Waimano Gulch. We also want planning monies for possible park developments at Queen's Beach and Sacred Falls. We also intend to acquire as much as possible land at Malaekahana. We ask for

your authorization of funds as requested in the supplemental budget so that these recreational areas can be made available to our people.

I have spent this morning a good deal of time, perhaps more time than I should have taken, outlining to you the major goals and programs of our Administration. There are numerous other programs just as worthy which time simply does not allow me to mention. Suffice to say that you will be hearing more about them.

We intend to move ahead in a cautious, considered, business-like fashion. We will not make promises that we cannot fulfill; we will not seek headlines at the expense of solid performance; we will stand on our record, all of us, and our accomplishments will speak for us.

In this task which lies ahead, we ask you to share the burdens with us--all of the people of our State. We want to attain our objectives in partnership with you, members of the Legislature, with our business leaders, our labor leaders and the people of Hawaii. Let us dedicate ourselves to working together with a common resolve and a unified sense of purpose such as will make our State, our beloved Hawaii, the kind of State that we want it to be.

This is my commitment to you.

This program is my commitment to our people.

Most importantly, this program is my commitment to our children who shall inherit this beautiful and bountiful earth that we call Hawaii.

Aloha and Mahalo."

Senate President Ushijima then rose and stated:

"Mr. Governor, you have identified some of the problems which are of great concern to the people of the State of Hawaii and to this Legislature. We sail in the same sea and we are charted on the same course. We agree with you that implementation is necessary, and action to solve these problems is paramount. We offer you our cooperation to solve these problems for a great Hawaii.

Thank you very much, again.

If there is no further business before this joint Eighth legislative body, I hereby declare that this session is adjourned."

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:11 o'clock p.m.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

H.R. No. 7 (Deferred from January 27, 1976):

Representative Roehrig moved that H.R. No. 7 be adopted, seconded by Representative Uechi.

At 11:40 o'clock a.m., on request by Representative Poepoe, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:18 o'clock p.m., Representative Poepoe offered the following amendment to H.R. No. 7:

"House Resolution 7 is amended to include the following new paragraphs:

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1976, that so much of Rule 11 of the Official Rules of Procedure adopted by the House of Representatives, State of Hawaii, Eighth Legislature, as hereinafter enumerated be, and the same is hereby, amended as follows:

- 1. Paragraph 11.5 of Rule 11, relating to the creation of standing committees, is amended by redesignating it as paragraph 11.6.
- 2. Paragraph 11.6 of Rule 11, relating to the general responsibility of standing committees, is amended by redesignating it as paragraph
- 3. Paragraph 11.7 of Rule 11, relating to the Committee on Finance, is amended by redesignating it as paragraph 11.8.
- 4. Paragraph 11.8 of Rule 11, relating to Committee on Legislative Management, is amended by redesignating it as paragraph 11.9.

- 5. Paragraph 11.9 of Rule 11, relating to committee meetings, is amended by redesignating it as paragraph 11.10.
- 6. Paragraph 11.10 of Rule 11, relating to Standing Committee Reports, is amended by redesignating it as paragraph 11.11.
- 7. Rule 11 is amended by adding a new paragraph to be designated 11.5 and to read as follows:

'Rule 11.5. A majority of the members of any standing committee constitutes a quorum, of which a majority vote shall be required for the conduct of the business of the standing committee. At no time shall the standing committee attempt to conduct, or continue to conduct any business of the standing committee with less than a quorum actually present at the designated meeting place. If a quorum is not present at the designated time and place of meeting, or if at any time after commencement of a meeting the standing committee attempts to conduct business, including but not limited to hearings, deliberations and decisionmaking, with less than a quorum present, the chairperson of the standing committee or a majority vote of the members of the standing committee who are then present shall adjourn or recess the meeting until such time as a quorum is present or as the chairperson designates.' "

Representative Poepoe moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Ajifu.

Representative Poepoe then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Speaker, this is a simple amendment to House Resolution 7. You can go by the first 7 points on the amendment and get down to the revision in Rule 11.5. This amendment requires that a standing committee have a majority present before any hearings, deliberations or decision making of the committee can continue.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment is put forth by our caucus which has imposed upon us accountability. When the good people of the State come to testify before our committees, we want them to testify when the majority of the members are present so that a majority of the members can hear their testimony and can make the proper decisions.

I ask that every person in this body support it."

Representative Roehrig then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this amendment. The proposal of the Minority Leader would effect a substantial departure from the present rules and practice of the House. The reason that he has given for the proposed amendment is apparently so that the public would see a full committee in session when they could participate in our deliberations.

One of the problems that we face in this legislature, and in legislatures across the country, is that the various members of the House, and for that matter the Senate, have diverse responsibilities. For example, this past Monday -- 2 days ago -- your Judiciary Committee had a hearing on the supplemental budget of the Department of Social Services as it relates to corrections. At the outset of the hearing, we had a majority of the members present; however, by dinner time when we were concluding the hearing and we were in a discussion of some of the very important nitty-gritty programs that the Corrections Division intends that we have for the Corrections Master Plan, there were only two Representatives left--myself and one other majority member. All of the minority members who had been present had left; they had other matters that they had to attend

Now, it is my feeling that I respect the minority members! other commitments. I expect that they have other responsibilities, so we have never taken the position that it was improper for them not to attend to conflicting duties, and they have been very courteous to me to inform me when they are unable to continue in a hearing for a particular reason, and I think that the rule that we presently have on this matter is sufficiently covered in Rule 11.10(3) which provides that, in the final analysis, the will of the Committee is represented by a majority signature on the Committee Report. This gives the Committee sufficient flexibility and leaves in the sound discretion of the Committee those instances wherein it is prudent for the majority party and the minority party and the chairman to have a majority present on the consideration of issues before this legislature.

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I would ask the members of the House to vote this amendment down."

Representative Kimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in furtherance of the arguments advanced by the chairman of our Judiciary Committee, I also strongly oppose the amendment proposed by the Minority Leader.

First of all, each and every one of our standing committees, Mr. Speaker, does have a committee rule or committee rules and in that, it governs the matter of decorum, the matter of procedure, the matter of quorum and so forth.

And it has been the past practice that this system where the committee determines the internal operations of the particular committee is the best workable method. The Finance Committee, for instance, is a large committee. The members are all over on different committees also.

Now, in the case of the majority, Mr. Speaker, at the outset of the session, we adopted what we call the 'bracketing system' and in this, we categorized our members in various groupings to minimize the conflict so that we can get maximum attendance. The minority, it appears, has not seen fit to do so. Well, that's their internal problem.

The other matter is this, Mr. Speaker, the testimony of witnesses generally in these public hearings is the matter of the committee gathering testimony on the various subjects that come before the committee, and each and every member of the committee is provided with a folder of all the testimony of the various witnesses that appeared, and the absentee legislator for that particular hearing can get all of the testimonies that were introduced at the committee hearing.

Furthermore, the minority has employed a system whereby they have a particular representative primarily assigned to the committee to cover the committee's doings. Furthermore, they are equipped and furnished with staff who can also cover the proceedings of the hearings.

And lastly, the Committee Report which is really the moving document for all measures, requires the signature of the majority and a committee report attendant to it and with all these safeguards built into it, Mr. Speaker, the rule advanced by the Minority Leader is purely unnecessary."

Representative Blair then rose and spoke against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the amendment to House Resolution 7 offered by Representative Poepoe.

Mr. Speaker, I take offense at the introduction of this resolution by the Republicans. To me, it is the worse that we have a majority of all members on the committee in attendance. Mr. Speaker, I think what we, in fact, see here is a requirement of a super majority of Democrats since the Republican attendance, at least in my committee, is pretty dismal.

Before we take a vote on this, and I will be asking for a roll call vote, I would like to go on record as saying that there are some Republicans whose attendance, percentagewise, ranks in the teens in my committee and if they vote in favor of this resolution, their names will be released to the press.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Poepoe then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, time for rebuttal.

Mr. Speaker, the chairman of the Judiciary Committee has so kindly hit it right on the head. Our problem here is that we have conflicting duties. You are admitting, by that statement, that we have over-organized. The chairman of the Judiciary Committee is admitting that when we get to the end of any hearing, two people are left; two people hear the testimony that the good public has brought to us, and two people impose the decisions on the rest of the committee.

Now I ask you, is that what you want? That is not what our caucus wants. We have, Mr. Speaker, each member of this caucus serves on six or seven committees, a person. Now, let me remind you that a committee meets in the morning, and a committee meets in the afternoon and, if you wish, a committee can meet in the evening. That gives you three committees that you can attend. I don't care what your structure is--whether it is according to program structure or not--that's three. Now, when you try to stretch yourself to six or seven, you're stretching it pretty far.

What is our problem, Mr. Speaker? Our problem is basic organization, scheduling and the size of the committee. If you reduce the number of committees, if you reduce the size of the committees, members of this House can handle their different assignments and be present at every committee hearing. You're giving the public, in my opinion, political rhetoric when you give every member of the Democratic majority a title such as chairman so that they can take it out. . . "

At this point, the Chair interrupted:
"Representative Poepoe, will you please confine your arguments to what is presented before us regarding whether or not a committee needs a quorum.
We are not referring to the particular structure of a committee, the number of committees that we have in the House."

Representative Poepoe continued:

"Mr. Speaker, the good Representative from the 14th district made some rather broad implications on members of my committee and I was responding to that. He was really doing that on a point of personal privilege. . ."

Representative Blair then rose on a point of personal privilege, stating:

"Point of personal privilege, Mr. Speaker. . . . "

Representative Poepoe stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have the floor."

The Chair replied: "Representative Poepoe, please continue."

Representative Poepoe continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, because we are doing our own checks; and the member from the 14th district should check his attendance in a couple of committees such as Youth and Elderly Affairs and Higher Education before he goes to the press with all the names. We have the power in this legislature by majority vote of both Houses to recess ourselves if we need more time during the session so that all committee members can hear the proper testimonies and make the proper decisions. I thank you and I ask for a favorable vote."

Representative Blair then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, when Representative

Poepoe first spoke, he talked about imposing upon us accountability. I was simply trying to comply with his desires.

As for the question of multiple attendance problems, my committee meets in half of its meetings on Saturdays and so there is very little scheduling problems on Saturday hearings.

The other point that should be brought out is that the chairman of the Finance Committee who has, I think, the heaviest burden of any member of this body is also a member of my committee and his attendance record is excellent.

The point of information which I rose to speak on earlier was that when Representative Poepoe refers to me as the good Representative from the 14th district, I don't want it to be understood that he is slighting Representative Stanley who is also a good Representative.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair stated:

"Your point is well taken, Representative Blair."

Representative Poepoe then rose on a point of order and stated:

"I stand corrected."

Representative Lum then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"I feel that I have been incorrectly, inaccurately accused of something that I am not guilty of. As a member of the committee Representative Blair is the chairman of, I have never missed a meeting that he had..."

The Chair interrupted: "Representative Lum, Representative Lum. . . "

Representative Abercrombie then rose, stating: "Point of order, point of order, Mr. Chairman."

The Chair recognized Representative Abercrombie who then went on to say, "I don't believe any names have been mentioned down here."

The Chair responded:

"That is correct and that is the ruling of the Chair. No names have been mentioned in this regard."

Representative Lum retorted:

"Then I think he should clarify that point because I am a Republican member."

Representative Blair then rose, stating:

"I will be happy to clarify that point. Representative Lum did not attend any meetings last session of the committee. Thank you."

The motion to adopt the amendment to House Resolution No. 7 offered by Representative Poepoe was then put to a roll call vote and failed to carry by a vote of 35 noes to 14 ayes, with Representatives Ajifu, Carroll, Clarke, Evans, Fong, Hakoda, Ikeda, Kamalii, Larsen, Lum, Medeiros, Poepoe, Santos and Sutton voting aye, and Representatives Amaral and Wakatsuki being excused.

At this time, Representative Lum offered the following amendment to House Resolution No. 7:

"House Resolution 7 is amended to include the following new paragraphs:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1976, that so much of Rule 34 of the Official Rules of Procedure adopted by the House of Representatives, State of Hawaii, Eighth Legislature, as hereinafter enumerated be, and the same is hereby, amended as follows:

- 1. Rule 34 is amended by adding a new paragraph to be designated 34.2 and to read as follows:
- '34.2. Any bill that is in committee on or after the fortieth legislative day may be recalled from that committee on any following legislative day, if one-third of the members to which the House is entitled vote in favor of the recall.'

Representative Lum moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Ajifu.

Representative Lum then spoke in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the reason why this amendment is being offered at this time is to clarify what I think may be a problem with the wording of the present rule and I will read that rule to the body so they know what I am talking about. Rule 34 relating to bills: recall from committee.

'Rule 34.1. Any bill that has been referred to a committee may be recalled from that committee 20 days after referral, if one-third of the members to which the House is entitled vote in favor of the recall.'

According to the Constitution and the way I interpret it, it talks about the 20-day period and I will read to you what the Constitution says about this. I am now talking from the Supplement 1975, Supplement Volume I, page 21, the last paragraph. It says: 'Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee in either house, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members to which such house is entitled.'

As I read this particular provision in the Constitution, I think it sets the upper limit of when a particular bill may be recalled. It does not say that you cannot pull it out before the twentieth day. It has no reference to that. I read it as an upper limit of twenty days and from then on, any bill can be pulled out.

According to Rule 34, it says that the committee has to wait twenty days after referral and those of you who have been around for a while know that a referral can occur on the thirty-fifth day or the fortieth day or the forty-fifth day. And so my particular amendment addresses itself to that particular point: that any bill that is in committee on or after the fortieth legislative day with the actual twenty days left may be recalled from the committee on any following legislative day if one-third of the members to which the House is entitled vote in favor of the recall.

I have always been in the minority; therefore, I consider this particular provision set up by the Constitutional Convention, which I was a member of, as a protection for the rights of a minority whether he be on this side of the aisle or on that side of the aisle. I read this particular rule as a further restriction on the rights granted to us by the Constitution. Therefore, to clarify this, I am offering this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Roehrig then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in opposition to this amendment and, in doing so, I am somewhat surprised by the arguments made by the prior speaker regarding what the Constitution says and what the rule says.

For those members and other people who are present, a reading of the House Rule which is 34.1, Article III, Section 13, the second paragraph of our Constitution. Those two provisions were read. It is readily apparent that the precise substance of the Constitution is presently contained in the House Rules. The Constitution makes reference to the twenty-day period starting after a bill has been referred to a committee. That's in the Constitution itself and that is the reason why that particular language is in the House Rules. The identical substance is presently in the House Rules. What this particular amendment will do would be to substantially alter what our State Constitution presently provides by altering the twenty-day period to the fortieth legislative day which is not the language of the Constitution. Consequently, we would be in precarious shape Constitutionally if this House were to adopt this amendment, and I think this is a matter that the minority attorneys have brought to their attention. I am rather surprised, at this point, that they continue to ask our acceptance of this amendment. It is patently unconstitutional and I would ask that every member of the House vote this down.

Representative Kimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in opposition to the proposed amendment.

Mr. Speaker, perhaps the ridiculousness of this particular proposal can be best illustrated by an example. The matter of the cut-off date over the course of the years has varied from thirty, thirty-five days and we have, within recent years, lowered or come closer to the opening . . . well, a shorter cut-off date. However, assuming that if the cut-off date by agreement with the House and the Senate is established--let's say the thirtieth or thirtyfifth day--then, this bill introduced on that last day would have but a period less than the minimum of twenty days required under the Constitution. And therefore, with all these problems, and that this particular proposal which, by that example, is patently unconstitutional, I urge the members that this amendment be voted down."

Representative Lum then rose, stating:

"May I, Mr. Speaker, react to the two previous speakers?"

The Chair directed Representative Lum to "proceed" and he continued:

"To the esteemed chairman of the Judiciary Committee, we have been through this before on abortion. Interpretation of words, interpretation of meanings to words--leads us to have attorneys and courts.

I think I want to address myself to the point of referral. I am suspicious of the fact that the bill may go from one committee to the other on the thirty-fifth or fortieth day. As an example, the bill on appropriations dealing with the University of Hawaii might go from Higher Education to the Finance Committee. As I read this particular rule, that bill cannot be recalled until after twenty days. Now, we are not going to be around twenty days after the referral, so how can you say you give us the right to recall under those circumstances?

My amendment addresses to the fact that there is a possibility that a bill may be referred on the 35th day, 36th day, 40th day, 45th day, to a different committee and when that bill is referred, then we have the right to still recall because it has met the first provision which is 34.1 of at least having twenty days. It further clarifies the fact that you can recall a bill out of the committee.

As far as unconstitutional, we can sit here and talk and discuss, attorneys will discuss this, this will never be judged unless it gets to the courts and it is decided by the courts themselves. I am not an attorney myself and perhaps my interpretation is wrong but I am backed up by counsel. I went into further deliberation after I heard your open caucus comments today and I still agree with my counsel that we are right, and I urge this body to consider the amendment and correct the injustice to the minority members of both this side and that side. Thank you."

Representative Roehrig rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to make

a few additional comments in opposition. I won't belabor the subject matter that myself and the prior speaker have addressed ourselves to. I would only add this point that had I been afforded the opportunity to go into an open minority caucus on this particular issue and had an opportunity to listen to the minority attorneys, perhaps this would not have been such a problem on the floor today. Thank you."

Representative Kimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the proponent of this amendment is really arguing for some other than the committee system. We have a system whereby we have standing committees to consider bills, and what he is advocating is that the legislature operate on a Committee of the Whole basis and I think this amendment should go out the window."

Representative Poepoe rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Speaker, the point of clarification that we seek is referral. If the referrals start on the day the bills were initially introduced, it goes to the first committee—that's fine and dandy. We don't want any games played when a bill cannot be yanked and is referred on the forty-first day.

Now, you can take that back to your caucus and discuss it."

The motion to adopt the amendment to House Resolution No. 7 offered by Representative Lum was put to a roll call vote and failed to carry by a vote of 35 noes to 14 ayes, with Representatives Ajifu, Carroll, Clarke, Evans, Fong, Hakoda, Ikeda, Kamalii, Larsen, Lum, Medeiros, Poepoe, Santos and Sutton voting aye, and Representatives Amaral and Wakatsuki being excused.

At this time, Representative Ajifu rose on a point of information and inquired of the Judiciary Committee chairman: "I wonder if the Judiciary Committee chairman would explain to us the proposed amendment, Section 14.5, Items 1 and 2."

Representative Roehrig responded:

"Mr. Speaker, it might be quicker if we just have a short recess on this

matter and I would be happy to discuss it with Representative Ajifu. If he doesn't want a recess, then I am happy to explain it to him here if he'll ask me a particular question about the particular rule change."

Representative Ajifu responded:

"Yes, I would like to have it on record, Mr. Speaker, when he explains Item 1, Section 14-5, which reads: 'The authority of a conference committee shall be limited to solely resolving differences between the House and Senate versions of a bill or resolution. Accordingly, a conference committee shall not: (1) amend those provisions of a bill or resolution which are identical in both the Senate and House versions of a bill or resolution; provided, however, such identical provisions may be amended to conform to all other provisions of the bill or resolution.'

I am not clear in my mind as to what this really means."

Representative Roehrig responded, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that the language of the proposed amendment speaks for itself. If there are any particular words that Representative Ajifu does not understand the meaning of, I would be happy to address my attention to those words, but I have a very difficult time responding to his question because he has read it through and the wording of the proposed change seems reasonably clear.

Perhaps we should have a short recess on this matter. I would be happy to chat with him."

At 12:47 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:52 o'clock p.m., Representative Ajifu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think we have come to an agreement that the Judiciary Committee will state it for the records on that particular subparagraph 1 as to what that proviso implies."

Representative Roehrig responded, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, in response to the question raised by Representative Ajifu prior to recess and after our discussions during recess, the record should reflect that the intent in paragraph 1 of the new Rule 14.5 is that there will not be changes in substance. There may be renumbering that must be accomplished because of deletions and provisions in the bill by the joint House/Senate conference committee so that the language in the latter part of number 1 says that: 'Such identical provisions may be amended to conform to all other provisions of the bill or resolution.' That particular language is illustrative of the idea that if the renumbering must be accomplished, this technical flexibility is given to the committee.

As far as paragraph 2 is concerned, Representative Ajifu asked me what the intent of the last proviso was as regards increases of salaries and pensions of elected and appointed officers of the State or county being considered by separate bill other than the appropriations of public improvements or bills ratifying collective bargaining. It was merely pointed out and the record should reflect it that the intent here is that such measure shall be considered by a separate bill and not either one of the two there mentioned."

Representative Ajifu then offered the following amendment to House Resolution No. 7:

"House Resolution 7 is amended by amending subsection (2) of paragraph 14.5 to read as follows:

'(2) Amend a bill or resolution by inserting into the bill or resolution any unrelated or new subject; provided that the above provisions shall not apply to the General Appropriations, Supplemental Appropriations and the General Public Improvements bill; provided, further that any increases to the salaries, pension, or retirement benefits for any elected or appointed officer of the State or County shall be considered by separate bill other than the aforesaid Appropriations and Public Improvement bills or any bill ratifying collective bargaining agreements; provided, further that any appropriations of funds in ratification of collective bargaining agreements shall be considered by separate bill other than the aforesaid Appropriations and Public Improvement bills.'

Representative Ajifu moved that the amendment be adopted.

At this point, Representative Kimura rose on a point of order and upon being recognized by the Chair, stated:

"I see now for the first time a written copy of the proposed amendment offered by Representative Ajifu. I believe this move is a highly deleterious one, Mr. Speaker, and I question the good faith of the minority to advance it at this time. It is exactly three minutes to 1 p.m. This amendment, as I understand, was prepared days ago, and it should have been offered to us so we could have covered this along with the other two proposed amendments in our Policy, in our open caucus, and now we are put to a further delay to cover all of these items again and, Mr. Speaker, I feel this practice should cease and desist in the light of what was said several days ago by the Minority Leader."

The Chair interrupted:

"Your point is well taken, Representative Kimura."

The Chair then recognized Representative Poepoe who asked:

"Mr. Speaker, are you clarifying a point of order for a speech against the measure. . . "

The Chair responded:

"No, it was a point of information. Representative Ajifu, I believe you have offered an amendment. Will you so move?"

Representative Ajifu again moved that the amendment be adopted, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I move to amend House Resolution 7 by amending subsection 2 of paragraph 14.5 and, Mr. Speaker, if I may be permitted to read the total amendment, the total amendment as I am proposing."

The Chair then stated:

"Representative Ajifu, I would prefer that the second be made first before we go into discussion."

Representative Poepoe seconded the motion.

As the motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair, Representative Kimura rose and asked for a recess.

The Chair declared a recess at 1:00 o'clock p.m., subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of discussing the amendment.

Upon reconvening at 1:15 o'clock

p.m., Representative Suwa was recognized and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, I am requesting the introducer of the amendment to withdraw the amendment because I think we are faced with a much bigger problem that we ought to resolve first and have some discussion in this area pertaining to the operation and also pertaining to the preparation, the Governor's preparation, for the budget, so at this time, I ask the Minority Floor Leader to withdraw this amendment."

Representative Ajifu responded, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have not accepted to withdraw my motion at this stage; provided, I would like to ask, to make this request—if we can defer this total package, House Resolution No. 7, for one day to give us time to review the questions that have been posed, I would then, at that time, consider the withdrawal. But otherwise, if there is no compromise on this, then we should proceed to act on it."

Representative Kimura then rose and stated:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker, the deferral of one more day of this Rule which has been lying on the Clerk's desk for days is totally unacceptable to the majority. I believe that we have a motion on the floor and we should proceed with the disposition of the motion on the floor."

Representative Ajifu rose and spoke in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, although the intent of House Resolution 7 is admirable and long overdue, I admit, Mr. Speaker, that it does not fully protect the interest of the general public. I submit, Mr. Speaker, that this does not happen.

I call your attention to paragraph 14.5 which prohibits the conference committee from amending a bill or resolution by introduction of any unrelated or new subject matter but which excludes the broad areas of general appropriations, supplemental appropriations, and general improvements bill, and which requires separate bills for any increases to salaries, pensions, or retirement benefits for any elected or appointed officers of the State or county but deletes, by language, any bill ratifying

collective bargaining agreements.

Mr. Speaker, in view of the uproar which followed the previous attempt of the majority members of this body to increase the salaries and pensions of elected and appointed officers of the State Administration, Judiciary, legislative members, the amendment submitted by the majority members is both appropriate and timely. Nevertheless, Mr. Speaker, I submit that the exclusion of collective bargaining agreements from the prohibition specified by the proposed amendment, the majority party defeats the general purpose of the amendment. It permits the tying in of collective bargaining agreements to appropriations and to public improvements bills, in effect, forcing members of this legislative body to accept whatever collective bargaining agreements that were executed, or voting against the appropriations and your general improvements bills.

The prospect, Mr. Speaker, of our State's Chief Executive someday capitulating to the pressures of organized groups which seek ever higher collective bargaining benefits is beyond the realm of reality. The power of organized labor is both immediate and sobering. Should the occasion rise when we, in the legislature, are faced with the decision of voting for or against a combined collective bargaining agreement, an appropriation or public improvements bill in total, many of us will be faced in exactly the same situation we faced the last days of the previous session when we were forced to vote for or against collective bargaining agreements in the same package as salary increases for elected and appointed officials were.

Mr. Speaker, it is mandatory that we, in our best legislative interest, separate the matter of collective bargaining from appropriation and public improvements bills, no less than the separation of appropriation and public improvements bills from salary, pension and retirement benefits for elected and appointed officers of the State or county. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I urge all of the members of this House to vote for the amendment. Thank you."

Representative Suwa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, after pleading for his withdrawal of his amendment, I understand that he had a wonderful speech written and I thought he was talking in reference to the main motion ---House Resolution No. 7.

What this amendment actually does is in conflict with some of our guidelines set by our statutes in terms of the collective bargaining law. Therefore, I ask the members to vote down the amendment because we are not in any way abusing that section of the collective bargaining."

Representative Kimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in furtherance of our Finance Committee chairman's argument against the proposed amendment, I think it is well to point out that in this proposed amendment the issue is whether or not the collective bargaining agreement should be by a document other than by the budget bill or any other bill. This matter has serious implications as to whether or not, as Representative Suwa had alluded to, and that is whether we run a conflict with our statutory law. The main thrust of our resolution deals with 14.5 which is the rules regarding conference committees and in this case, Mr. Speaker, the proposed amendment tries to latch on to. . . well, it deals with a separate and general subject and not specifically to conference committees and the reports that come from it. So, therefore, Mr. Speaker, I join in voicing a strong opposition to the proposed amendment.

Representative Ho then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak against the measure. I know my colleague, Representative Kimura, has indicated some of my concerns. I believe that this amendment does not address 14.5 and what we call conference committees insofar as if we are talking about what happened last session, you have a collective bargaining bill which was piggy-backing. I think on 14.5 where the House or the majority had tried to resolve this problem, if there is another bill that is on collective bargaining, there is third readings and we vote on the measure.

Now, how does it come into conference? I don't see where, if we're talking about conference, that has no bearing on what his amendment is trying to say as far as confernce committee. I don't think it addresses the issue."

Representative Cobb then rose on a point of order and the Chair asked Representative to "state your point."

Representative Cobb then said:

"Under House Resolution 7, under paragraph 2 of 14.5, the intent there is rather clear that it may be a bill or separate bills, in the plural, to ratify pay agreements or increase in retirement or pension benefits for elected or appointed officers of the State. The paragraph itself does not mandate that it either be one single bill or a series of bills and yet there is still a lack of clarity as to whether or not the proposed amendment that is before the House to be voted on deals only with the conference committee or would apply the prohibition of such piggy-backing practices throughout the legislative process from First Reading to conference reading."

The Chair stated that the "point is well taken."

The motion to adopt the amendment offered by Representative Ajifu on House Resolution No. 7 was put to a roll call vote and failed to carry by a vote of 34 noes to 15 ayes, with Representatives Ajifu, Carroll, Clarke, Cobb, Evans, Fong, Hakoda, Ikeda, Kamalii, Larsen, Lum, Medeiros, Poepoe, Santos and Sutton voting aye, and Representatives Amaral and Wakatsuki being excused.

The Chair, at this time, put the motion to adopt House Resolution No. 7 to vote.

Representative Roehrig then rose and spoke in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the main motion.

By this proposed rule change, your majority party, through its caucus, tried to improve the workings of the important conference committees of the legislature by defining more clearly and with more exactitude the perimeters of their deliberations. This proposed rule will limit the authority of conference committees in several ways.

First, it will prohibit conference committees from considering last minute amendments not contained either in the House or Senate version of a bill so that the only matters considered in conference are going to be items that have withstood this scrutiny and sunlight of public opinion in a public forum.

Secondly, it would effectively prohibit the practice that has been

called 'piggy-backing' of unrelated matters.

Finally, it would also prohibit the inclusion of increases in salaries, pensions, or retirement benefits of public officers and employees. . . excuse me, public elected officials and appointed officers, from inclusion in the budget or any bill relating to collective bargaining. The bill will not apply to certain matters relating to the conference committee on the budget because of the fact that a mere change in the dollar amount may arguably be considered a new matter or something which was not identical in the House or Senate measure on a particular bill.

The record should reflect that it is the intent of the majority in adopting this rule that in situations where technical and non-substantive changes are found necessary to correct conference drafts which are being clocked on the members' desks, that it be understood that this can be accomplished by a majority of both houses as the practice has been in the past.

This matter was brought to the minority leadership's attention in our discussion with them.

Also, on page 2, the record should reflect that there is a typographical error in line 3. The word after the word 'further' should be 'that' rather than 'than'. Also, at this point, to sum up the thrust of this resolution, let's tell it like it is. The effect of these changes, in the final analysis, is to insure the public of this State that we have benefitted by our past experience in this area and by these changes, will stimulate greater public confidence in the democratic process and in this legislature.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in favor of House Resolution No. 7.

I am indeed happy to see that the head of our Judiciary Committee, Representative Roehrig, has brought out the essentiality of the restoration of confidence. I, as an individual member of this House, brought a suit the first week of June immediately following the last session asking that the courts invalidate the pay raise on the basis of the fact that it had violated the Constitution and my House Rules. That case will be now heard on February 4th. I have filed a motion of Summary Judgment."

Representative Kimura then rose on a

point of order and stated:

"I think the court's calendar and what happens in the Judiciary are separate problems, and they have places posted for court proceedings, and I think he is kind of overstepping the bounds, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair remarked:

"Representative Kimura, your point is well taken."

Representative Cobb then rose and upon being recognized by the Chair, stated:

"In reference to the remarks by the Representative from the 15th district, I believe the House Rules belong to all of us, not him. Not to be construed as his rules, these rules are adopted by all 51 members of this House."

The Chair replied:

"Your point is well taken, Representative Cobb."

Representative Sutton continued:

"In a Russian. . . "

Representative Kimura rose on a point of order and stated:

"If the Representative that just spoke would differentiate which of the Representatives from the 15th district."

Representative Cobb replied:

"My apologies, Mr. Speaker. I was referring to the one in the gray suit."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and stated:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker, that doesn't tell me anything at the moment."

The Chair then directed Representative Sutton to continue and Representative Sutton went on to say:

"Is Mr. Abercrombie satisfied now?"

The Chair replied that he was and asked Representative Sutton to continue.

Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"Just to reiterate the remarks that

I pick up following in consecutive sequence from the thoughts that were given to us by the head of the Judiciary Committee, Representative Roehrig, and this is totally relevant thereto. His remarks have now become part of the record and I am following through. I am happy indeed to see that the Democratic Party has, at last, come to a sense that they must change these House Rules. . ."

At this point, Representative Abercrombie rose on a point of order and stated:

"Democratic Party is pejorative. Everyone knows that. I think if the present speaker would use the phrase 'Democratic Party', he will not aggrieve me personally."

Representative Sutton then responded:

"Strike the word 'Democrat' and put in the word 'majority' please."

The Chair then replied:

"Representative Sutton, will you please be careful on how you phrase your words so that we can continue with the business of the day."

Representative Sutton replied:

"Yes, sir."

The Chair then directed Representative Sutton to continue.

Representative Sutton went on to say:

"I brought this suit in order that we would have this type of a beginning of our session where there would be an admission on their part that they were wrong in the last session and that we would correct it. They..."

The Chair interrupted:

"Representative Sutton, we have not stated for the record that we were wrong or that this was an admission. We have pending before us a resolution—it calls for the adoption of certain procedures that we wanted to see corrected, so will you please limit your remarks to either for or against the resolution."

Representative Sutton replied:

"I am for the resolution because of the evils that it corrects and I am trying to show the evils that were corrected, and I feel that there is great necessity to make these changes. Representative Kimura is standing."

The Chair asked Representative Sutton to continue as "your time is getting to be very minute so..."

Representative Sutton replied:

"Representative Carroll has just yielded his time to me. Representative Carroll, do you yield?"

The Chair then said:

"Representative Sutton, he does not have to yield until your time runs out so please continue."

Representative Carroll then rose and stated:

"I reluctantly yield."

Representative Abercrombie then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Perhaps if Representative Sutton would take the luminous pocket watch that he has on his possession out, he could keep track of the time and thus not violate it."

Representative Sutton replied:

"I am complying therewith."

Representative Blair then rose on a point of information and inquired:

"I am beginning to wonder if Representative Sutton is filibustering."

Representative Poepoe then rose on a point of order and stated that "the Representative from the 15th district has the floor."

The Chair responded, stating:

"That is correct, but a point of order has jurisdiction over any other point so I am requesting. . ."

Representative Blair interrupted:

"I am beginning to secretly think that Representative Sutton is against this and is filibustering on the floor of the House. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"Representative Blair, he is not filibustering. He is continuing to support his remarks with some evidence and I would like to see him continue."

Representative Sutton continued his remarks, stating:

"Oliver Wendell Holmes said that

'one page of history is worth a hundred pages of law.' We have a page of history. The piggy-backing had occurred on the pay bill. My law suit brought this out and we have now seen the results of my law suit. They have corrected it. God Bless them. Aloha, mahalo, and thank you."

Representative Kamalii then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Resolution No. 7, however with some reservation.

Mr. Speaker, if the intent of the House resolution, as drafted, is not to permit piggy-backing of collective bargaining bills to appropriations and/or public improvement bills, then, I submit that House Resolution 7, although I support its intent, may and can be challenged on the grounds of unconstitutionality just as the previous session's pay bill is now being challenged in the circuit court by my colleague and the Attorney General's Office.

Mr. Speaker, though this resolution does not take care of all of the minority's concerns, we will still support House Resolution No. 7 because, fellow colleagues, some improvement is better than no improvement.

Thank you."

Representative Lum then rose on a point of information and asked:

"I would like to know, if we pass this resolution changing our Rules, and the Senate doesn't amend their Rules--what would happen in conference committee if they disagree to abide by the Rules of the House?"

Representative Kimura responded:

"I would like to answer that, Mr. Speaker. We abide by our Rules and the Senate abides by their Rules, and an example of that in the previous session—we took the bold step forward of having open conferences. There was much trepidation and fears expressed all the way around and today, we live with it. That's all, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lum further inquired:

"I would like to know then, if the Senate disagrees and they would like to change the rules, that we are not able to go into conference or are we going to be able to go into conference?"

The Chair replied:

"As far as the Chair is concerned, the Senate has their own rules and the House has ours. Our House business is conducted by what is reflected in the House resolution."

Representative Cobb then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in reference to the questions raised by my colleague from the 7th district, in case either House is unable to agree either on procedure or the merits of the bill, the bill is dead."

The motion to adopt House Resolution No. 7 was put by the Chair and was adopted by a roll call vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Amaral and Wakatsuki being excused.

Also present to honor Mrs. Shimeji Kanazawa were the Puuwai Opio (young at heart) Serenaders, led by Mrs. Garner.

If I might paraphrase an anonymous philosopher in that I look around and see beautiful flowers and know that the world is filled with trouble at times but in a world that is filled with the flowers that we see here, and the true flowers of life and love are found in the flower of the people of the State of Hawaii, and we would like to thank you for letting us walk through your garden.

Thank you very much."

Leis were then presented to the honorees by Representatives Kamalii, Santos, Evans and Ikeda.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

NINTH DAY

Monday, February 2, 1976

The House of Representatives of the Eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1976, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Henry S. Wong of United Church of Christ, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Garcia, Hakoda, and Roehrig, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives for the Eighth Day.

On motion by Representative Kimura, seconded by Representative Ajifu and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Eighth Day was approved.

At this time, Representative Kimura introduced "a very distinguished visitor from the State of Louisiana, State Representative Richard S. Thompson, who represents the Parish of Grant and portions of LaSalle and Rapides in the Louisiana State House."

The Chair then appointed Representatives Kimura, Stanley, Naito and Kamalii to escort the Honorable Richard S. Thompson to the rostrum.

Representative Thompson then stated:

"Thank you very much. This is most unusual. We came over with an ACD convention from the other 49 states looking at your beautiful country.

I was over here ten years ago when you were in the other building. I think you have a much improved building to meet in. I have enjoyed the individual office spaces of which we do not have. We have about three times as many as you all. We have 105 in the House and 39 in the Senate. So, I want to extend greetings to you all from our Speaker and from the House and Senate back in Louisiana, and to tell you that it's wonderful to visit and have the hospitality that we have here.

Noticing your agenda and discussing with some of the members of the

House, we have the same problems. I understand facing you all is possibly a constitutional convention. We've just gone through this. We had 44 members of the House - one from each of the five districts - plus the rest - the other 39 - appointed by the Governor. And, we came up with a new constitution - it took 13 months to develop. It was put to the vote of the people and was adopted and went into effect January 1st of this year. So we are operating under a new constitution.

We've been meeting in May, but will now start meeting in March. We meet 60 days in an 85-day period, which gives us 15 days or 25 days, whichever way you want to look at it, that we can have to go back and converse with our constituents to feel their feelings about bills. So what we generally do is get all the bills introduced, then go back home for about two weeks, and then committee meetings for ten days, then that takes up our 60 days. We do not count committee meetings as days. What a day is which either house convenes is considered a day of the 60-day session.

I'm just happy to be here - all these flowers. And, for the ladies' benefit, we only have one in our House, so I think it's much more pleasant to see as many ladies here and all of the flowers. Somebody asked me, says: 'Do you have a majority and a minority party?' And, I said, 'Well, I don't know what you call it, we've got 101 Democrats and 4 Republicans in the House.'

And the elections which you all, I understand, are facing this fall - I have just been reelected last November, so we had our elections in November and December. The Governor, the Senate and the House all are four-year terms elected all at the same time. So we either all go out or all come back in or a mixed up variety of it. We've just been elected for another four years.

I would like to extend an invitation to any of you all to come to Louisiana. We'd like to have you down there during the sessions of the legislature. I personally would like to have any of you that would like to come visit. My area is 44 x 84 miles - completely agriculture. I'm a farmer completely. That's my entire business.

I personally would like to have each and everyone of you come or any of you come.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"On behalf of the House, the Chair extends warm greetings. We want you to take back to your Speaker, Speaker Bubber Henry, our personal best wishes."

The following introductions were then made to the members of the House:

Representative Cobb introduced Chris Pedoe and Craig Chun who are seniors at Iolani and are here for a week observing the legislative process.

Representative Blair introduced Paul Naito and his nephew, Kenneth Kuniyoshi.

Representative Fong introduced 27 5th grade students from Punahou who were accompanied by their teacher, Mr. Eldredge.

Representative Kunimura, on a point of information, asked:

"You all gonna call a short recess so we can all meet Representative Dick Thompson?"

The Chair replied:

"The Chair will call a short recess in due time."

At this time, Representative Fong introduced the Narcissus Queen, Coralie S. L. Chun, and the members of her court as follows: Caroline Wang, 1st Princess; Sandra Mew, 3rd Princess; and Lisa Chock, 4th Princess. They were accompanied by Mr. Anthony Ching, General Chairman of the Narcissus Festival and president-elect of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce.

The Chair appointed Representatives Yap, Yuen, Blair and Fong to accompany Queen Coralie Chun to the rostrum.

Queen Coralie then presented the Speaker with a Narcissus plant and stated:

"Good morning everyone. I'd like to take this time to extend a sincere Aloha and Mahalo for letting us be here with you today. On behalf of the entire Chinese community, I would like to extend a Kung Hee Fat Choy. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"On behalf of the members of the House, the Chair would like to extend to the Queen and her court best wishes. We certainly appreciate the Narcissus flower and the programs there for review by the members. I want to remind Representative Yap that I don't think he's too old to escort some lovely ladies to the rostrum."

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 1893-76, SD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that S.B. No. 1893-76, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 1893-76, SD 1, and respectfully urge that this Honorable Body pass this bill on Third Reading.

The bill appropriates \$5,658,855 for the Legislature and the legislative support agencies. Mr. Speaker, this represents an increase of 10 percent over the 1975 appropriation for the House of Representatives and the Senate.

The appropriation will maintain the services and the resources to the Legislature, and will allow us to continue to improve the technology and the competent staff, and the various functions of the Legislature. The intent is to make the legislative process more efficient and to also make legislative information more accessible to the public.

Mr. Speaker, I firmly believe that this bill provides a good budget for a well-functioning legislature and I urge this Honorable Body to pass this bill on Third Reading."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Senate Bill No. 1893-76, SD 1.

The appropriations for the Senate and the House constitute a ten percent (10%) increase over the 1975 appropriations. I find this very difficult to justify, Mr. Speaker. In addition, the appropriations would increase the amounts for the Legislative Auditor, the Ombudsman, and the Legislative Reference Bureau by substantial amounts.

It is submitted, Mr. Speaker, that this Legislature accomplished its mission in 1975 on an appropriation of 10 percent less and did a good job. It is submitted that there is no change in function, no increase in public service, no deviation, Mr. Speaker, from the assigned role, but you yourself conduct this through. The cost of government comes out of the pockets of the taxpayers whom we represent, Mr. Speaker. Our first task is to run a tight ship that sets an example to other departments of the government. We are the example, Mr. Speaker.

It is said that democracy requires the initial example for efficiency from the very body that has the appropriating power which we alone possess under the Constitution, Mr. Speaker. We control the purse strings for the government of Hawaii. Let us show an example of frugality with the taxpayer's money for our own expenses.

I urge all my colleagues here to vote 'no' on this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Akizaki then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to provide necessary funds for the expenses of the Legislature and the expenses of the legislative support agencies. There is an increase over the 1975 appropriations to meet the increased costs for equipment rentals, supplies, staff services and other expenses of the Legislature during the present 1976 Regular Session, our interim committees that may be established between this 1976 Regular Session and the forthcoming 1977 Regular Session, and for other non-session and pre-session expenses before the convening of the 1977 session concerning the House of Representatives' budget. It is estimated that \$1,350,000 is going to the pay of our employees presently working in this Legislature.

In closing, Mr. Speaker, I must say a few words about State Representatives who voted 'no' on previous legislative expense bills.

As your Chairman on Legislative Management, I have never met a State Representative after voting 'no' refuse his per diem payments, refuse his travel to neighboring islands for committee work, refuse the legislator's annual allowance, and refusing office secretaries and staff. All of these expenses add to our operational cost.

I have finally come to the conclusion that it must be for political or election oriented purposes that they vote a loud 'no' or perhaps it is nothing but a big 'shibai' for the benefit of the newspapers, television and radio.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I had not planned to speak on this matter and I have not served notice to the Chairman or Vice Chairman of the Committee but in view of the previous remarks, I am going to speak against it and

at the same time ask, due to the charges made on this floor, that a complete list of all per diem, all travel, and all other expenses by every legislator in this chamber be made available to the public so that we can see where the 'shibai' is and where it isn't. Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose and the Chair asked: "For what purpose do you rise?"

Representative Sutton answered:

"I rise, Mr. Speaker, on a rebuttal of Mr. Akizaki's charges.

Mr. Speaker, I attended the malpractice sessions in Sacramento on my own pocketbook. I also attended in Washington, D.C., the FTC hearings that have to do with whether or not they would send an attorney here for the Federal Trade Commission, and they have now re-established that office solely by my lobbying in Washington, D.C. to get that. That was on my own pocketbook. I have never taken one penny in this entire time that I have been elected to travel one inch. I have been to the islands of Hawaii, Maui, Kauai, Molokai, Lanai, and I have even gone by canoe to the island of Kahoolawe. No charges there.

I, therefore, consider myself as not charged by Mr. Akizaki because I was not his target. . . "

The Chair interrupted, stating:

"Representative Sutton, no names were mentioned so if you feel that you are aggrieved, the Chair rules you out of order at this time."

Representative Abercrombie was then recognized by the Chair and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to say that I believe Mr. Sutton when he says he has not moved one inch."

Representative Kimura then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, on behalf of the members of the majority, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill 1893-76, Senate Draft 1.

The purpose of this bill, as stated by the Chairman, is to provide the necessary funds for the operational expenses of the Legislature and all of its support agencies for the fiscal year 1976 up to June 30, 1977. The seven support agencies and staffs covered in the bill are both the Senate and House of Representatives, the Legislative Auditor, the Office of the Ombudsman, the Legislative Reference Bureau, the Office of the Revisor of Statutes and the State Ethics Commission.

The increase over last year's appropriations is a small amount when one takes time to consider the rise in the cost of living index from 1975.

Mr. Speaker, we do not live in a static fiscal environment and the Legislature is no exception. The rising costs for equipment, supplies and staff services necessitate appropriate increases.

There is, however, a greater and more important justification which frugal thinking cannot accommodate. If a Legislature is to be genuinely accountable to its constituency, if it is not to be unduly dependent upon special influences, then it must be able to generate its own information. That information, moreover, must be accurate, ample and current. And the Legislature must have the time and the expertise it needs to analyze and use that information.

A Legislature that meets only for a few months every year cannot probe very deeply into the whys and wherefores, the facts and figures, the social and economic implications, of the legislation that comes before it. Nor can it very readily accumulate information, or undertake any searching analysis or investigations on any continuous basis. It is only with the assistance of permanent and highly skilled professional staffs and through the utilization of the interim period that these activities can be recorded, maintained and conducted with the depth and thoroughness that is required.

I, therefore, urge, Mr. Speaker, all members to vote in the affirmative."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"Every year, we pass this as the first measure and it is only because of an accident of the calendar that we would be doing so again this year. We have four other measures also on our desks and if there is no objection, I would like to request, by motion, we defer to the end of the calendar on this measure."

Representative Suwa responded:

"If we proceed with the House in

order, I have no objections."

At 12:40 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12: 42 o'clock p.m.

The motion to pass S.B. No. 1893-76, SD 1, on Third Reading was put to a roll call vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1893-76, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Cobb and Sutton voting no, and Representatives Lee and Takamine being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1893-76, SD 1, had passed Third Reading at 12:45 o'clock p.m.

DEFERRED MATTERS FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

H.B. No. 1994-76 on Third Reading:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 1994-76, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to increase the real property home exemption from \$8,000 to \$14,000.

Mr. Speaker, an explanation is in order on Special Committee Report No. 16 that is on our desks dated February 9. To keep the records straight, this interim report was submitted on August 27, 1975. Since then, continuing research by the staff of Finance has rationalized that the \$14,000 would be in order. Therefore, the Committee has recommended that such action is necessary because net assessed valuations for tax rate purpose have been increasing dramatically in recent years. The statewide total as of July, 1974, reached \$8.32 billion as compared to \$1.82 billion in 1960. The burdensome rise in assessed valuations has substantially increased the cost of home ownership to countless taxpayers who do not stand to benefit at all from the higher valuations

unless they are willing to immediately sell their residential properties and can afford to acquire other suitable housing for their families.

House Bill 1994-76 reflects my Committee's support and I urge the members of the House to do so as they did in the 1975 session not to deny the homeowner, especially the elderly, the tax relief to offset high property assessments."

Representative Ajifu then rose and inquired whether or not the Chairman of the Finance Committee would yield to a question to which Representative Suwa replied in the affirmative.

Representative Ajifu then asked:

"Mr. Speaker, the question is-have we passed a similar bill as stated in our Order of the Day, H.B. No. 1994-76, and also all of the other bills listed on the calendar this morning-H.B. Nos. 1995-76, 1996-76 and 1997-76? Did we pass similar bills last session and which are now in the Senate?"

Representative Suwa replied:

"Mr. Speaker, as I stated earlier that we did, but as to the change from that of \$12,000 to \$14,000 reflects the continuing research by the staff. This is to reaffirm our action to the concern of the taxpayers, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ajifu then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to state for the record that I believe, procedurally, we really should have taken some other course than going this route by re-introducing a new bill, and I would like just to leave it for the record that there are other alternatives that we could have used in trying to correct the measures that are being proposed here this morning."

The Chair then stated:

"That may be so but this is the alternative that the Finance Chairman has sought fit to proceed on. Any further discussion? If not, Mr. Clerk, call the roll."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1994-76 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE REAL PROPERTY HOME EXEMPTION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takamine being excused.

H.B. No. 1995-76 on Third Reading:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 1995-76, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this Honorable Body has always been concerned about the plight of many hard-working poor of the community in the low-income bracket. Accordingly, in the 1975 session, we adopted House Bill 16, HD 1, which we had increased the excise tax credit to the individual with an adjusted gross under \$8,000.

With the passage of H.B. No. 1995-76, we will be reaffirming our support to provide relief to more than 219,000 taxpayers who stand to benefit from this bill. I urge all of you to vote 'yes'.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1995-76, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXCISE TAX CREDIT UNDER THE INCOME TAX LAW", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a roll call vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takamine being excused.

H.B. No. 1996-76 on Third Reading:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 1996-76, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1996-76.

This bill establishes an income tax credit for low-income household renters. Its purpose is to give those renters, with low or modest income, a tax break.

In 1970, the Legislature adopted a system of income tax credits for household renters. The purpose of the credits was to reduce the higher tax burden of renters.

In 1974, the Legislature repealed all the existing credits—consumer, educational, drug and medical, and renter—and replaced them with a single excise tax credit. However, the repeal of the renter credit emphasized the problem of the higher tax burden of renters in comparison with homeowners. The new excise credit cannot solve this problem since it does not distinguish between renters and homeowners.

The enactment of House Bill 1996-76 reaffirms the House position and would re-establish the necessary renter credits and provide for some equity. I, therefore, ask the members of this Honorable Body to vote 'yes' on House Bill 1996-76."

Representative Kamalii then rose and inquired whether or not the Chairman of the Finance Committee would yield to a question to which Representative Suwa replied in the affirmative.

Representative Kamalii then asked:

"Mr. Chairman, was there an identical bill passed in 1975?"

Representative Suwa answered:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker, the House adopted as their program, House Bill No. 239 which was introduced by Representative Kamalii."

Representative Kamalii then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of this measure and I would like to read my speech given on March 13, 1975.

This bill establishes an income tax credit for low-income household renters. Its purpose is to give those renters, with low or modest income, a tax break. The average wage earner who rents deserves a tax credit similar to the homeowner who is allowed a home exemption.

In 1970, the Legislature adopted a system of income tax credits for household renters. The purpose of the credits was to reduce the higher tax burden of renters.

In 1974, the Legislature repealed all the existing credits--consumer, educational, drug and medical, and renter--and replaced them with a single excise tax credit. This consolidation simplified the credit system and, although it is as yet untested, should greatly relieve the problems both claimants and the administration experienced under the multiple credit system. However, the repeal of the renter credit again emphasized the problem of the higher tax burden of

renters in comparison with homeowners. The new excise credit cannot solve this problem since it does not distinguish between renters and homeowners.

The enactment of House Bill 1996-76 will again re-establish the necessary renter credits and provide for equal treatment of both renter and homeowner under the State's tax laws. Therefore, in order to have an equitable system of tax credits, I ask the members of this Honorable Body to vote 'aye' again."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to thank Representative Kamalii for her compassion for all of us low and modest-income renters. Thank you.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1996-76, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDIT FOR RENTERS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a roll call vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takamine being excused.

H.B. No. 1997, HD 1, on Third Reading:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 1997-76, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Act 200, Session Laws of Hawaii 1971, provided that certain land parcels may be dedicated for residential use if the land is situated where the land use zoning has changed to a higher than residential use. The provision is restricted to a person sixty years of age or older who is a fee simple owner or who is a lessee of real property where the lease term is ten years or more. The dedication is limited to a parcel of land not more than 10,000 square feet in area.

Mr. Speaker, H.B. 1997-76, as amended, would liberalize the dedication provision by eliminating the age restriction and by allowing parcels for single-family residential use, regardless of size, to be dedicated within the hotel/apartment resort or commercial zoned lands. On equity grounds, there seems to be no clear

justification for limiting the dedication provision to persons on the basis of age. Also, persons owning or leasing parcels of land in excess of 10,000 square feet may be just as deserving of relief.

Persons affected by this provision are usually lifelong residents of the State who desire to continue to maintain their present single-family residences. The dedication provision ensures that their parcels of land will be assessed on the basis of actual use rather than at a possible higher value depending on the nature of surrounding parcels.

I urge all of you to support H.B. 1997-76, as amended."

Representative Amaral then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of this bill and also my remarks go for the other bills that we acted upon. The records will show that, in the past, I have introduced measures on home exemption and also on land dedication.

I congratulate this body for zeroing in on these areas in 1975 and again in the 1976 session. As I see it, the only problem is we need to convince our friends across the hall in the Senate. We hope we can do this this year."

The Chair then remarked:

"Let the record show that at one time or the other, I believe that all of the members here have introduced similar measures."

Representative Kondo then rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, just for clarification, I would like to ask the Chairman of the Finance Committee a question."

Representative Suwa replied: "Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kondo asked:

"When you speak of 'parcel' in this bill, I presume that you mean one block of land. Is that correct, Mr. Chairman?"

Representative Suwa replied:

"Yes, one lot, based on tax key, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:00 o'clock p.m., on request

by Representative Roehrig, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:05 o'clock p.m.

Representative Suwa then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, if there is some question as to the intent, this does not apply to condominiums and also to rental housing."

Representative Kamalii then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. I am pleased at last that the small property owners in the 11th district which this is going to have a great deal of impact on will now have an opportunity to have a fair and equal treatment and I urge all my colleagues to vote 'aye'."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1997-76, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LANDS DEDICATED FOR RESIDENTIAL USE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a roll call vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takamine being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1994-76, 1995-76, 1996-76 and 1997-76 had passed Third Reading not earlier than 12:50 o'clock p.m.

ADJOURNMENT

At 1:10 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ajifu and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Tuesday, February 10, 1976.

A man who rose to meet the challenge and the crisis of a nation divided unto itself.

Out of his natural pioneer character emerged the firm belief that a man is a man, equal in his rights with other men to live and express his own sense of individuality. From him we have gained the true meaning of freedom, freedom with equality. And with this thought in mind, Mr. Speaker, we can strive continually to develop the kind of America of Lincoln's ideals - an America in which everyone, male or female, of whatever status, race or origin can lend their abilities and talents in joining together with equal dignity and opportunity to build a better society.

For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, we honor Abraham Lincoln. For Republicans, he is an enduring symbol of our Party. For everyone, he is the father of a course of human life and dignity which is yet to be completed. And always, Mr. Speaker,

his life will continue to serve as an inspiration to this generation and continuing generations.

Mr, Speaker, may I ask that in closing, may this House adjourn today in honor of the 16th President of the United States of America, Abraham Lincoln."

H.B. No. 2255-76:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to speak in favor of this. This does one simple thing--it changes an 'or'...deletes the 'or' and puts an 'and' so that we have it in the conjunctive rather than the alternative.

Mr. Speaker, a year ago, I took the floor here and tried to caution on this and when we deal with these various leasehold condemnations, when we deal with anything that has to do with due process and constitutional provisions, we have to be exceedingly careful. I am glad to see that Chairman Shito is now remedying this situation and I heartily concur. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2255-76, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACQUISITION OF RESIDENTIAL LEASEHOLDS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Lunasco, Oda, Suwa and Uechi being
