

SIXTEENTH DAY

Wednesday, February 8, 1978

"It is obvious to you, Mr. Speaker and this honorable body, why I am standing today. I am extremely proud to be Portuguese. On behalf of the Portuguese community in our State, I would like to say 'Mahalo' for the spirit of aloha which we are about to demonstrate."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

There may be only one member of this House of Portuguese ancestry but, certainly, there are many others who are Portuguese at heart. I have been called one - not only Portuguese at heart, but a Portuguese at mouth.

Mr. Speaker, truly and honestly, we are blessed because we have so many people from all over the world come to drop their anchors here in Hawaii. I would like to share with you that for many, many years, I thought that 'pan', the Japanese word for bread was a Japanese word, and also, only about three months ago, I learned that the famous tempura (fish cake) is also of Portuguese origin. So, they have influenced, not only Hawaii, but the Portuguese have contributed to the good taste, good politics, and goodness in everything throughout the world, and may I, Mr. Speaker, request that this session adjourn today in memory of the many members of the House that preceded us who have served here - people like the Chief Clerk of the House, I still remember, O. P. Soares, back in the '40s. Another great name - a member of this House for some 26 years - Manuel S. Henriques, and many others who have definitely left their mark for a better Hawaii and, in their memory, I would like to request this session be adjourned today."

Representative Dods then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to clarify the comments made by the previous representative. There are two of us here."

Representative Evans interrupted:

"Make that three."

The Chair remarked:

"Let's make that 51."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, my uncle, Judge William Whitney, was a Consul General who had the same job that John Henry Felix now holds. He was an excellent Consul and did such a wonderful job that when he went to Lisbon, they declared a holiday."

The Chair remarked:

"As for that one, let's make it 50."

Representative Ueoka then proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Portuguese have made, as pointed out, many contributions to the State of Hawaii in government, politics, business, in agriculture - the Cravalho's, the Damon's, Bothelo's, the Felix's, and many, many others - so all of us can be justly proud of these people and the benefits that we receive here in Hawaii because of the efforts of this particular ethnic group."

Representative Ueoka then introduced the Honorable John Henry Felix, Consul of Portugal, and Mrs. Edna Ryan, President of the Hawaii Council of Portuguese Heritage.

Leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Evans and Medeiros and Representative Ueoka presented the resolution.

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of welcoming and extending best wishes to the guests.

"Mr. Speaker, this morning we have with us a young lady who is really an example that everybody in the State can be proud of — a mixture of brains and beauty and a product

of Kaiser High School, a public high school.

It gives me great pleasure and honor to introduce Dr. and Mrs. Byron W. Bender, parents of the honoree; Dr. Margaret Oda, principal of Kaiser High School; and Judith Lee Bender."

At this time, Representative Ajifu presented the honoree with a red carnation lei, while Representatives Evans, Fong and Medeiros presented the others with tuberose leis. Representative Ikeda presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

At 11:44 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "to extend best wishes and aloha to the honored guests."

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:50 o'clock a.m.

On motion by Representative Uechi, seconded by Representative Kihano and carried, H.R. No. 249 was adopted.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1802-78, HD 1:

Representative Takamine moved that H.B. No. 1802-78, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

At this time, Representative Takamine rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to just comment that I'm sure all the attorneys here know the late Federal Judge Metzger. I'm sure that if he were here, he would be recommending that everybody vote for this bill. The late Judge Metzger was a great champion for the working people, the minority and the poor.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. No. 1802, HD 1, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Wage and Hour Law'.

The purpose of this bill is to increase the present \$2.40 an hour minimum wage to \$3.35 an hour in four yearly increments beginning July 1, 1978. The first increment would be to \$2.65 an hour effective July 1, 1978; the second increase to \$2.90 effective

July 1, 1979; the third to \$3.10 effective July 1, 1980; and the fourth to \$3.35 an hour effective July 1, 1981.

This bill attempts to eliminate the gap between the earnings of a minimum wage worker and his cost of living. These workers are clearly disadvantaged and are the persons who need a higher wage. For example, a head of a family of four employed full time at the present \$2.40 an hour minimum wage would be earning \$4,992 annually.

However, the federal government's poverty level for a Hawaii family of four is \$6,730 annually, or an equivalent of an hourly wage of \$3.24. This head of a family of four would be earning \$1,730 below the federal poverty level income criterion. Obviously, there would be little or no incentive for the worker to seek employment. Another basis for comparison is the Department of Social Services and Housing's July 1977 annual maximum allowance for a family of four, excluding food stamp bonuses and medical care costs covered by Medicaid, which is \$6,396. At the proposed \$3.35 hourly rate, the worker would earn \$6,968 annually and have some incentive to seek employment.

In 1977, Congress increased the federal minimum wage under the Federal Labor Standards Act which would put the minimum wage at \$3.35 an hour by January 1, 1981.

In light of testimonies received at the public hearing by our committee, our committee believes that this bill makes the Hawaii minimum wage equal to the federal minimum wage within six months of the federal increases which becomes effective on July 1 of each year until 1981.

The Employment Opportunities and Labor Relations Committee agreed that simultaneous increases to the maximum proposed rate would impose undue burdens on some employers. Therefore, we feel a phased increase would allow employers to prepare for the increases and would still improve the wage earner's ability to cope with increased living costs.

The hourly wage increases contained in H.B. No. 1802-78, HD 1, which raises the income of disadvantaged minimum wage workers will also provide more incentive for such workers to seek employment. Therefore, we strongly urge the passage of

H.B. No. 1802-78, HD 1, on Third Reading, as a step towards improving the conditions for the workers of Hawaii."

Representative Larsen, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would also support this measure, but I would like to express some concern that I have about it.

Mr. Speaker, the bill that we have before us brings Hawaii up to the federal minimum wage, which is certainly what we have to do and should do. However, in doing this, we always get quoted the fact that a family of four can't live on a minimum wage. I agree with that philosophy. I feel that even at \$3.30 an hour, if the minimum wage went up to that right now, a family of four would still be below the poverty level set up for the State. So that is not a germane argument, I think, to the fact that we should pass the bill. If you're working at minimum wages, you can't really support a family of four. Therefore, in Hawaii we have two people working rather than one.

Now, the other side of the coin, which I would like to bring up right now, is the fact that there are many people in this state who are not employed - single people, young people who are not employed - because the minimum wage is so low, and these people are in droves on the unemployment role.

Now, I believe that one of the reasons why there are so many people unemployed is because minimum wages are low. Excuse me, because minimum requirements are so high. I would like people to work for me in cutting grass on a temporary basis, but when they say that they won't do it for less than \$2.40 or \$2.60 an hour, I'm not interested in having them come and do a minimum amount of work. There are other situations like that throughout the State. However, because we are tied in with the federal government on many issues, and I think we should be on minimum wages, I will also support this measure.

Thank you."

Representative Ajifu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against passage of this bill, which calls for an increase in the minimum wage over a four-year period.

I strongly believe that Hawaii faces more hard times ahead for its economy,

and that this bill will place even greater stress on the inflated cost of living in this State.

While the standing committee report says that the bill attempts to eliminate the gap between the minimum wage and the cost of living, I would argue instead that it will widen this economic gap.

The report also says that one basis for comparison and a reason for the four-year graduated increases in the minimum wage is that the welfare allowances in the State of Hawaii are more beneficial to some people than regular employment. I can only surmise, then, that perhaps we have built up a welfare structure that is a dis-incentive to people to find jobs and be self-supporting, and that we might need to re-direct our efforts to see why it is more profitable to live on government welfare money than to earn a living and support one's self.

Let me point out that I am not opposed to the initial increase in the minimum wage to \$2.65 an hour beginning July 1, 1978. I think that some increase may be justifiable. My objection is to the graduated increases over the four-year period.

I think the matter of minimum wages must be handled with great caution at this time. If we pass an increase for this year, we should be able to review some of its impact on our economy by next year's session and see whether more increases can be called for.

This progressive four-year minimum wage increase may prove to be disastrous to our consumers who are, after all, wage earners as well. Passage of this bill, as it now stands, leaves no option for changing conditions in our economy. Instead, it might well prove to be inflationary and create even greater hardship on Hawaii's consumers and on our welfare costs.

I'd say, let's take this step. Let's approach it in a careful manner. Let's take it one step at a time and make sure there is sufficient opportunity for reassessment of the indirect 'costs' these increases will mean to our consumers and taxpayers.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I haven't had to give this a clear conscience and a very clear bit of thinking because my worthy

friend from the island of Hawaii is really more knowledgeable on this concept of labor relations than I am. And he brought up the fact that I was for three years the law clerk for Judge Delbert Metzger. I wrote the Waialua overtime case.

Now, Mr. Speaker, what I am concerned about is the basic concept that this bill buys inflation. This bill buys the fact that we must have a higher cost of living in Hawaii. And this bill says to the students of the University of Hawaii or the high school of McKinley, or Roosevelt, or Kaiser, which we just honored, that the employer, when he gets up to the fourth increment - because I do buy the first increment - but when he gets up to the fourth increment, he might have two students that were working for him in the afternoon and he tells me he'll tell one of those students that he has to stay home, that he just cannot find the money to pay those two students.

Now, when we talk about a minimum wage, we're not talking about the subject that the worthy gentleman from the island of Hawaii is so knowledgeable of. We are talking in terms of the individual who does not have a job, who is trying to put himself through college, through school, to supplement by work. I think that he almost reached the point because if you'll read the committee's report, they will make this statement, 'Your Committee finds that simultaneous increases to the maximum proposed rate would impose undue burdens on some employers'. They start right off and make an admission that it would impose undue burdens on some employers. Now, Mr. Speaker, we are not talking of the large Big Five companies in the interstate business. We're talking of the corner drugstore, the little garment maker; we're talking about ten thousand small businesses. We are talking, Mr. Speaker, about something that is entrusting. By definition it must be entrusting; otherwise there would be no need for this legislation because the federal government will preempt it.

So, what we are talking about is something unique to Hawaii. We have two very serious conditions that we, the Legislature, Mr. Speaker, are not able to put off to anybody else. Right here in our laps is where we solve inflation, cost of living, and where we solve the terrifying unemployment that is occurring.

We have in the economy now 70 percent dependent on tourism. We have an economy where one of the industries, regardless of

what the Advertiser says in the morning editorial, is in very deep trouble. Pineapple is competing throughout the world. And we find ourselves in a very uniquely dependent situation to have an economy that is self-sustained because, Mr. Speaker, we are like a foreign country and we get an imbalance of trade. If we ship dollars out of here in greater extent than we bring in, then we have a deficit.

Back in 1960, it was one for one. Now we are shipping \$4.00 out and only getting \$1.00 back. We have an unfavorable balance of trade. And so we have a situation where the economy of these islands is dependent on us licking the cost of living increase. And yet, right here in front of us, is a bill which buys that cost of living increase, because in the next sentence, by the the Committee's own report, and I'm not putting anything in here that's not in the report, Mr. Speaker, you must have one right in front of you. I'm not reading anything in - 'a phased increase is recommended, which would allow employers time to prepare for the increases, which still improves the wage earners ability to cope with the increased living cost.'

To cope with the increased living cost, in other words, Mr. Speaker, we are saying that we, the Legislature, can't cope with the increased living cost. We are the ones to attack that. The buck stops right there in front of your microphone. That's where the buck stops. This is the body that licks inflation. This is the body to lick cost of living. This is the body to say that we will have full employment in Hawaii. And we do not achieve that by making a four year increment merely because Uncle Sam has done it. If Uncle Sam is going to lead us down the primrose path in all of the ventures that he thinks is appropriate for the very wealthy states like California that has assets greater than the German empire, that's zenith. Then, on this primrose path, we will find many, many troubles and quick sand. It is time we stopped following Uncle Sam and said to him, we will make our own decisions.

Thank you."

Representative Abercrombie then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, serious allegations

are made against this bill and need to be answered. It's one thing to be able to vote the measure through. It is another thing to answer the questions which have been raised, which are legitimate questions, especially those of the last speaker, and I think they deserve an answer and I'll try to do so now.

Mr. Speaker, with respect to welfare, we have a flat grant system in this State. I'm sure the chairman of the Public Assistance Committee would agree. The chairman of the Finance Committee would agree that in going over the circumstances in which the Department of Social Services and Housing have presented their budget, that the flat grant system which was our attempt to deal with the inflationary pressure that indicate that these people are having this money at the absolute minimum possible to sustain themselves in their livelihood with their children and family in the State.

It is not welfare that has caused inflation. Welfare payments right now are at the minimum that this State in good conscience can make them under the flat grant system. Why is it that the welfare costs seem high? Mr. Speaker, I submit to you that it is certainly not that of the person on welfare, because the person who's on welfare is spending that money on some of the same businesses that the previous speaker mentioned - at the drugstore, at the gas station, in the shoe store, at the small businesses all over this town. People on welfare very seldom, if ever, have large bank accounts. If they are cheating, if there are people abusing the welfare system, they should be brought to justice and put in jail. But for the people who are on the welfare situation because it has been determined that they need to be, that money is being spent right in this community, not in board rooms in San Francisco, in Hong Kong, in Phoenix, in Chicago, in New York City, but in the State of Hawaii.

Why are those costs so high? I submit that it's not wages, and I defy anyone in this body today to prove to me that it is wages which are the inflationary factor in the United States today. On the contrary, there are four elements which cause inflation today in the United States which this body is attempting to deal with and I'm certain that the chairman of Finance and the chairman of Public Assistance would most certainly welcome the assistance in terms of the previous speaker in combating them: one, housing;

two, energy and transportation; three, food; four, health - and combined with health and energy and transportation is the insurance business. These are the areas in which inflation is occurring in the United States today. This is the area in which costs are climbing so exorbitantly and so swiftly that we can scarcely dare deal with them. These are the areas where the special interest pressures are being made, not from the welfare situation.

The welfare situation, in great measure, exists because these four inflationary factors in the United States have not been adequately addressed nor dealt with. I shall not stand here and allow people who are unable to defend themselves, the poorest in our society, to become the goat, the scapegoat, for our inability to address these factors that I have just mentioned. And the big business people behind them who support them and do well with them. . . they are not hurting. Their wages go up. They are the ones who command the gigantic salaries and the bonuses. They are the ones who are subsidized.

In this State, right now, the only business, the only agricultural business of any size, which is unsubsidized and taking care of itself is the growing of marijuana. It is the only unsubsidized major agricultural business in this State today. Sugar, pineapple, in one form or another, are all subsidized.

No one complains about socialism for the rich. I don't hear that phrase. On the contrary, I hear all that Congressional delegation from most of us. Anybody ever stood up and was against the subsidy for sugar? My god, they'd probably get run out of the State.

Now, whoever worries about A & B or others? It can be quite a dividend at the end of the year for their stockholders as a result of having received a subsidy from the tax money of the people of the United States. So let's put the burden where it really is, in those four elements: food, housing, energy and transportation, and health, and the insurance businesses that deal with them.

My reservation, which I'm sure the previous speakers and others would note, on this bill is because it should be at least simultaneous rather than six months behind. I wish it had come in earlier. Our

cost of living is in fact higher here in this State, and the fact that we are coming in later means an additional burden on the people.

I will vote for the bill, but with a reservation it should have come earlier rather than later, and partly because of the circumstances I have just outlined.

Student wages. I submit, again, Mr. Speaker and members of this body, it is not student wages which are causing inflationary traffic. All you have to do is to see how that number works. They don't pay the minimum wage now. I defy anybody to come in and prove that. They've got a plan all worked out for that one too. Everyone is worthy of his or her labor. When I was a student working in the Interstate Creamery Company, working with ten gallon milk cans, throwing them up on the ceiling and table like everybody else, I worked just as hard for my \$1.92 at that time as the other teamsters to whom I paid dues for the summer. Every man and woman that I worked with in that business felt that I was doing my fair share. I earned my wages, and just because I was sixteen, seventeen or eighteen years old, it didn't make a damn bit of difference. I was earning my wages - every hour of it.

As for the balance of trade deficit, we are easily tossed around. I submit to you again, Mr. Speaker and the members of this body, that there would be no balance of trade deficit if one was to look into the welfare, if one was to look into the minimum wages that have been paid the people in this State, because that money is spent here. If there is a deficit in this State, it is because we have businesses who make money off our sky, our water, our land, our people, and take the money outside and invest it someplace else, especially in tourism; most especially in tourism.

We are utilized by the tourist industry to make money, and that money, to the extent that it doesn't have to be invested here for their own profit, for the continuation of the profit that has been there for all these many years, is then taken from this State and spent elsewhere. We have to beg them to keep this money in this State. So if there is a trade deficit, it has nothing to do with the people of this State. We are not the ones who have the advantages that the great tour companies and others like great airlines have to come here. I'm not at Western Airlines to brag how much money they made coming to Hawaii last year.

So the bottom line is this, Mr. Speaker - this bill is a modest bill. This bill is the least we can do. This bill will not solve our problems in these four areas. This bill should only be a beacon to all of us on the floor of this House, where the previous speaker said the problem should be solved. He addressed the problems that I have outlined where inflation is occurring in such a manner as to do justice to our citizens. And on that basis, I urge you to pass it."

Speaking in favor of the bill, Representative Campbell stated:

"Mr. Speaker, members of this House, I hadn't planned to rise to speak on this matter, but I do rise to speak in favor of the bill."

I was really surprised to see that there was any opposition to it. The previous speakers have mentioned significant points which I wanted to raise related to support of the bill, but I do want to add my voice in support of the bill because we're going to have to give aid to this minimum wage earner who has to face the problem at the grocery store and a problem totally in the market place.

As the previous speaker has pointed out, this is a modest bill, and it's the least we can do; therefore, I urge all of you to vote 'aye' on the bill.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura, upon being recognized, stated:

"I was not going to make any statement on this bill, but I feel compelled that the two voices against this bill have no minimum wage problem. One derives fantastic income from money investments. You've heard it from the floor of this House about ownership of large tracks of land on the Big Island. The other has a second income from the bank. They don't have any problem . . ."

Representative Kamalii interrupted on a point of order and stated:

"I would appreciate it if the speaker would defend and speak for the bill and please not bring up finances to the other members."

Representative Kunimura replied:

"I'm talking about the insensitivity here to the people we're trying to help. I'm not mentioning names. If the shoe fits, wear it, damn it."

Representative Kamalii again interrupted on a point of order and stated:

"I think it's quite obvious who the representative from Kauai is referring to when he refers to the two who spoke against the bill, and again, I ask that we refrain from interjecting their finances and speak for the purpose of the bill."

Representative Kunimura continued, stating:

"And on our side, those who are for this bill have other incomes, but they have compassion. And this is the difference. This is a body that should have compassion; nothing different. I'm not against the people with second or third incomes. I believe that we all come here to do our best. And wherever we come from, wherever we want to go, we should always feel the need to take care of everybody. And I cannot stand this, damn it, of trying to act so pious on this floor and knock down the poor working man that is scraping for a living."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"I'm the third one who rises to speak in favor of the bill who hadn't planned to make any remarks, but some of the previous remarks occasioned these observations in favor, if I may."

First of all, I want to incorporate the remarks of my colleague from the Eighth District as being pertinent to my own feelings on the bill. But more importantly, Mr. Speaker, with the observation of the practical reality of why the bill is needed. In effect, we will be faced with a giant system of inequities if we fail to act on this measure at this time after the Federal Congress has acted. I grant you that it is putting the cart before the horse in some cases and we shouldn't always follow the congressional lead, but I think it is a case of simple justice, in this case, even though there is a lag of six months. I would also like to point out that there is at least a six month lag to the enactment of this House at this particular time of legislation.

I would take exception to the remarks that the poor are defenseless when there's a member of the Judiciary Committee. . . I've seen a track record of legal aid in winning the suits in the last year or two against many firms

in the community.

I would also take exception to the idea that the four elements mentioned by the speaker from the Thirteenth District are the only elements comprising inflation. Another case can be made that in the small business, mama-san and papa-san's store, where the increased wage has to be paid that it will tend to increase prices. It becomes a problem of simple economics.

I don't feel that's the major inflationary factor, but I think it's one that certainly has to be recognized. It is also a sense of reality, recognizing that we are in a sense locked in - we are a part of America, and our national Congress has already acted on it. We should follow too. I ask my colleagues to vote for this bill.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise on the point that it might be different from the others stated.

This bill is in the right direction towards correcting . . . omitting not the federal minimum wage alone, but that of the poverty level set by the federal government.

Let's assume that \$2.55 per hour based on eight hours per day, times the average monthly of twenty-three days, to bring about \$483, in comparison to the head of the family earning \$500 and one dependent is qualified for welfare of \$70 or a reduced amount of food stamps. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, it is incumbent upon that of the people without the head of the family and having the one dependent will be out of welfare.

Mr. Speaker, we can go on and on, but I think that the area we are to be concerned with is to meet the poverty level set by the federal government as far as wages are concerned.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Abercrombie, upon being recognized, stated:

"I would like to also rise a second time, only for the purpose of clarification for the record.

Mr. Speaker, when I indicated the four areas, I did not say they were the only answer. They were the major areas; the ones that far

outstrip the ordinary arguments that are made, or I should say the arguments that are made, almost as a matter of course about wages, causing the situation.

I would be prepared to argue that this is not the case, not on the floor now, but at some other time, if it seems appropriate as to why it is the case.

And the second situation, in respect of legal aid, they have their own problems right now. But if legal aid has won cases, I presume they won cases because the law wasn't being enforced, and not because they were able to blow one by the judge or succeed in some area where they hadn't a right to succeed. If the law wasn't being enforced, then I suspect that the judge decided that it should be.

If we need to change the laws, I might suggest that. I don't think we should bring legal aid into the circumstances, and we have, as the other speakers have pointed out, the power to change laws right here within this body. I think legal aid's function is to see that the laws are enforced in the sense that bringing it to the attention of the Judiciary when they do not believe that they have been enforced. If they have been successful in this endeavor, it means that we have to look at our laws if we wish to change the results or the outcome.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura rose and stated:

"Speaking for the second time, I totally agree with Representative Abercrombie about the poor and the defenseless. We are referring not to the union man because there isn't a union in the State of Hawaii that has \$2.65 as their contract wage, way beyond that.

These are the people we are talking about. The poor and defenseless are the unorganized workers of the State that have to work regardless of what the conditions are, as long as it is legal. And we are trying to raise the legal minimum wage so that they would have some protection that the union affords their members."

The Chair, at this time, stated:

"The Chair is of the opinion that sufficient debate has been made on this bill. Mr. Clerk, call the roll."

The motion to pass H.B. No. 1802-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN

ACT RELATING TO THE WAGE AND HOUR LAW", on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a Roll Call vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Ajifu and Sutton voting no, and Representative Dods being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1802-78 had passed Third Reading at 12:31 o'clock p.m.

Shigetomi, State Director for Vocational Education; Paul Mello, State President of the Future Farmers of America and a student at Castle High School; Lorie Koga, Statewide President of DECA; Mrs. Ruth Oshiro, Chairperson, State Board for Vocational Education; and Mr. William Kea, Chairperson of the State Advisory Council on Vocational Education.

Representative Shito presented Mrs. Miyahira with a lei, Representative Evans to Paul, Representative Ajifu to Lorie, Representative Kunimura to Mrs. Oshiro, Representative Stanley to Mr. Kea and Representative Naito to Mr. Shigetomi. Representative Takamura presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Kihano, at this time, introduced fifteen students from the Waipahu Chapter of DECA who were here observing the presentation to their teacher, Mrs. Jean Miyahira.

Representative Kunimura, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you're such a fast gun with that gavel, you didn't even give us an opportunity to speak on the resolution. May I be permitted, at this time, to state for the record, as co-introducer of that resolution?"

The Chair directed Representative Kunimura to "proceed", and Representative Kunimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, would you like to check the tapes of the proceedings this morning? I've never seen a deliberate body like ours. I'm speaking very seriously that all those, you know, all those in favor, bang, bang, bang, you know. I think we should be given an opportunity to compose ourselves and be recognized and rise to the occasion.

Mr. Speaker and members of this House, I would like to invoke and provoke the conscience of this body. Are we a country? Are we a state? Are we a county of men and women that do service by resolution?

I'm very reluctant about this resolution. And when Brother Carl offered it to me, I felt yes, this resolution has a place if it is going to be something that's going to be provocative and give us an opportunity to say, look at what they have done and how much

more can be done for those who do not choose to go the University but who would like to get into the area of vocational type of work. And if this resolution, from this day forward, is going to cause us to switch our conscience and place vocational education in a proper place of priority in this State, then we have done something today. But if it is just congratulatory respect of resolution that will be forgotten before we vacate this chamber today, then we have done a great disservice.

We have tried, from this House, to change the government of vocational education. Today it rests with the State of Hawaii Board of Regents. And the Board of Regents who has governance over the University's wide system, also has governance over vocational education because they are also the State Board for the Vocational Education. We know, and they know . . . first of all, they are very, you know, composed of very busy people, and they are not paid. They are a part-time board and the University is such a large entity that it takes a lot of time.

So what happens? Until Mrs. Oshiro took over the chairmanship of the State Board for Vocational Education, it was as useful as a chet on a bull. But Mrs. Oshiro gave me her word and she has done a yeoman's job.

But the day is coming real soon when we both will have to have a separate state board for vocational education dedicated to that proposition, and that proposition alone, and have not the president of the University become the executive officer for vocational education, but a person divorced and separated from the system because that person's services depart from the education and also the community college systems.

We have funding from federal as well as state. All of these complexities cause for the people who are interested in vocational education to be forgotten. Mr. Speaker, I hope that you would be the one to lead us again to have this separation, and clearly establish for this State that vocational education is not secondary, it's not mediocrity to blame the trade, it's not failure, because without those who are employed in construction and all the other areas of vocational offering, that this State and this nation shall soon collapse. And we should make this announcement real soon because we are going to be a nation of white collar employees and nobody out there to take care

of our plumbing.

So, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to say that maybe the Department of Education, instead of having their social promotion of people that have worked in the field and proven without hardly any support that can make the program like that as successful and have a person like Dr. Shigetomi to give them the full power and range to make vocational education a meaningful one in this State. Otherwise, let us go home and close our books and be condemned for going home without doing anything, instead of trying to put a beautiful corsage in the wool of the public's eye.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is certainly a great honor to have a woman so world-renowned as Juliette May Fraser here with us today.

Mr. Speaker, you will see one of the most beautiful murals and series of murals. If I can take you back, Mr. Speaker, to the year 1876, and we will now proceed, Mr. Speaker, not by your command but by the command of his majesty, King David Kalakaua.

Mr. Speaker, our tour will imagine us back in time of early November of that year of 1876. We shall see downtown Honolulu as it might have been, the seat of government and teeming, fast expanding waterfront town - probably the type that Representative Abercrombie could lustily cheer for. We shall see the latticed royal bungalow and Iolani Barracks, and we shall walk along Merchant Street, we'll look up Fort Street and Bethel, and we'll see Hollister's Drug Store, Dillingham & Co., and Lewer's and Dickson, and M. McInerney's, the Pacific Commercial, Honolulu Hale, and Hatfield and Co. - that is the predecessor of AmFac.

Amongst the many people unknown to history we shall see the King, soon to depart on a visit to President Ulysses S. Grant, chatting with his bandmaster, Captain Henri Berger; a reform school boy who is a band musician; a royal household guard sentry; and a stalwart Honolulu policeman.

We'll see Charles and Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, recently returned from their grand tour of Europe with builder Lishman and clerk Samuel M. Damon III, inspecting plans at the site of the soon-to-be erected Bank of Bishop & Co. - that's where several of our legislators work.

We'll see our Governor John Dominis with his wife, Princess Liliuokalani, and then Princess Ruth in her carriage accompanied by a horseback rider, Crown Prince William Pitt Leleiohoku and Colonel Sam Parker. We'll see Dowager Queen Emma talking with Honolulu's first fire chief, Alexander Joy Cartwright, Jr. We'll see a hapa haole family, dressed like the haoles but pure Hawaiian at heart, and a venerable Chinese scribe-calligrapher with a young client.

We'll see much, much more, Mr. Speaker, so please join us to see the magnificent murals that our great artist, probably the greatest artist in the history of Hawaii, Juliette May Fraser, has given it."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as Ms. Fraser approaches

her 100th year, I want to say that she is literally my oldest and most beloved constituent. She is everything that Representative Sutton said that she is. A more gracious person does not walk the face of the earth."

On motion by Representative Kamalii, seconded by Representative Carroll and carried, H.R. No. 293 was adopted.

Representative Carroll then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is really an honor to be able to see the adoption of this resolution.

Ms. Dalrymple, over the past number of years, whether she knows it or not, has been a personal inspiration to me and, I'm sure, to many other people who run along the Ala Wai, across Diamond Head and on out to Hawaii Kai, which I don't make yet. But I have watched her and admired

her and it's with a feeling of great pleasure that she is here honored today."

Upon being recognized, Representative Abercrombie stated:

"Mr. Speaker, rising to speak in favor of the resolution, one of the things that had to be left out, I expect, of the resolution due to the time factor, was that yesterday was an event in Hawaiian history which will be treasured by Cynthia and the ladies who accompany her today. More than 700 women competed in the first 10 kilometer race ever to be held in the State of Hawaii, which was co-directed by Cynthia and, I'm assured by everyone connected with the race, that it had nothing to do with the fact that she won first place in that race too.

I had the pleasure of being down at the park cheering lustily for all the people who were working hard as they crossed the finish line and I expect that next year it will be even greater.

It is really the efforts of women like Cynthia and the Honolulu Women's Track Club that Hawaii has become the leading center throughout the world for running for both men and women.

This is a, as I say then, a particular pleasure for me because of my personal friendship and aloha for Cynthia."

Representative Poepoe then rose and remarked:

"Please let the record show that he was cheering 'heartily' and not 'lustily'."

The Chair replied:

"I believe it was meant to be exactly."

Representative Say then rose and stated:

"I have a few words on behalf of congratulating Cynthia.

I really do envy her because during, I think it was December of last year, I also ran the marathon. When I was doing my seventeenth mile, she was on her way back on Kalanianaʻole Highway. So she was something like two hours, thirty or forty minutes, while it took me five hours and 16 minutes.

Thank you."

At this time, Representative Poepoe

introduced Miriam Beams, president of the Honolulu Women Runners Organization; Susan Stricklin, co-race director of the 10 kilometer race; and the honoree, Cynthia Dalrymple.

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Yuen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2054-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RESIDENTIAL LANDLORD-TENANT CODE", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Shito, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 43-78) recommending that H.B. No. 1830-78, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Yuen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1830-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH EDUCATION RESOURCES", was referred to the Committee on Education.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

By unanimous consent, the following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 301 to 304) and concurrent resolutions (H.C.R. Nos. 61 and 62) were referred to the Committee on Legislative Management and further action was deferred until tomorrow, February 15, 1978:

At this time, Representative Kamalii rose and wished all the members a "Happy Valentine's Day."

TWENTY-FIRST DAY

Wednesday, February 15, 1978

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1978, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend T. Samuel Lee of the Aldersgate United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Baker and Lunasco, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twentieth Day.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Twentieth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATIONS

The following communications from the Senate (Sen. Com. Nos. 22 to 26) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 22) transmitting Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 50 commending Robert McElrath upon his retirement as Hawaii regional director of the International Longshoremen's & Warehousemen's Union which was adopted by the Senate on February 14, 1978, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

On motion by Representative Takamine, seconded by Representative Sutton and carried, S.C.R. No. 50 was adopted.

Representative Takamine, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, while this resolution honors Mr. Robert McElrath for his long years of dedicated service to his union which helped to bring democracy here in Hawaii, Robert McElrath is the ILWU.

Bob has been the ILWU since, he took the place of the late Jack Hall in 1969. Everything that he did, everything that he said, automatically became an ILWU position.

The resolution notes that Bob

McElrath started his organizing activities in 1938. He has been in the labor movement for four decades. He started this movement to help the poor, the underprivileged and the oppressed at a very young age of 22.

His story, like that of his predecessor, the late Jack W. Hall, is a story of change here in Hawaii from a completely dominated and controlled lifestyle to what we have today.

Yes, Brother McElrath deserves the thanks of this body, thanks of the people of the State, in addition to the membership he has given leadership to.

Recent articles in the Advertiser focused attention on a labor leader here in this community.

In contrast, the ILWU leadership transition to Thomas Trask is smooth and peaceful.

I recall a statement made by the late Governor Jack Burns in one of his addresses to the Legislature, and I quote: 'the essence of a good leader is that he leaves behind many new leaders to carry on his work', unquote.

I need not say that Brother McElrath did his job well. The record already proves that. He helped build a union, a democratic rank and file union, controlled by the rank and file rules. Bob has been effective. He brought progress to the many communities where ILWU members work and live, and he helped to advance the cause of this great State.

Yes, Bob McElrath made it possible for other unions here in Hawaii to organize, grow and function. He did not leave millions in the ILWU treasury. His goal was to put as much purchasing power in the ranks of his membership.

Mr. Speaker and members of this body, while Bob McElrath is retiring from active office, I know he will have more time for those of you who care to get the background and the history of Hawaii. He has a tremendous amount of facts and figures regarding the events of the last four decades here in this State."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"At the very start, Mr. Speaker,

I want to say that Mr. McElrath's word was his bond.

At the time that I met Robert McElrath, I was a law clerk for Judge Delbert Metzger, senior federal judge. I told Mr. McElrath that the Judge was busy, and subsequently, I notified the Judge that I had not given access to the chambers to Mr. McElrath. The Judge told me, hereafter, always bring Mr. McElrath back into the chambers because his word is his bond and he is a man of truth and honesty.

I have learned the importance of this man. Subsequently, I negotiated, representing the employers, a contract of collective bargaining of Love's Biscuit and Bread. Mr. McElrath represented the union. Mr. McElrath again was a man of his word and the contract was negotiated entirely verbally. Subsequently, a formal written agreement was submitted to Mr. McElrath and he signed it without any deviation. His word was gold.

Through the subsequent years, I have run for every political office in this State. I have run for governor, lieutenant governor, United States senator and twice for United States Congress. Each time, I asked Mr. McElrath for endorsement of the ILWU and he said 'no'."

At this time, the Chair remarked:

"And for good reasons, I presume."

Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"Sir, I have just withdrawn my endorsement for your judgeship.

As I stood on the street corners of Hilo and Kahului and Lihue . . . as I worked the early morning sugar workers at 4 o'clock in the morning, there were many times there was brought to me a lunch or a breakfast. Blackie Martin brought it to me in Hilo. This is from Mr. McElrath. He said he couldn't endorse you, but at least he wants you to have your food while you're working the streets. This same thing happened throughout the Hawaiian Islands, in all of these campaigns.

And I would be remiss today if I did not rise and tell this high body and you, Mr. Speaker, that this is a man of his word and a man of great kindness of heart, and he makes friends on both sides of the

aisle. And to show this, we've asked our leader, Kinau Boyd Kamalii, to give a beautiful lei to the sergeant-at-arms, who will deliver it to Mr. Takamine so that tomorrow it may be given to Mr. McElrath at his testimonial.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura, upon being recognized, stated:

"I rise today with a very heavy heart and also great happiness that at least Bob McElrath would be able to read the resolution passed by this House, because we've had resolutions passed here in this House for people like Jack Hall and many others who have started the struggle about the same time as Mr. McElrath, but recognition came only after they passed on.

I can still remember, and I was very young, working in the sugar plantation, not knowing when tomorrow would come or how tomorrow would come.

We talk about oppression. We had oppression then. Hawaii was not like it is today. Hawaii was a place of semi-feudalistic society where a few have and a very large number have not. I don't know why . . . I cannot begin to even wonder why people like Jack W. Hall and Bob McElrath and so many others came over here to Hawaii, because when they came over here, they were abused, they were kicked around, chased around by camp police and by our own county police, because what they were trying to do was against the vast interest of the monetary people. But they stayed and suffered.

And I can still remember, Mr. Speaker, having had the kind of education, grammar school and high school, I didn't really know what my rights were - established by our founding fathers so many years ago, about little over 200 years ago - that as an American I had certain inalienable rights. And it took the union, like ILWU, to cause me to stir, to cause me to take, and then cause me to fight for the right that was ours as established in the Constitution.

I can still remember the days when Hawaii called Jack W. Hall the biggest communist; 'Red' Bob McElrath, the second lieutenant in command.

I'm happy today that that's all gone, but I see a tomorrow, because time has shown us that the whole world is a pendulum. We have good years and

bad years and I hope never again in the history of Hawaii will we ever see the day when people cannot rise and speak for what they believe to be the gospel truth. I hope there will be forever established in the hands of the Legislature the sense of fair play and the sense to protect every individual's right as an American to seek and to build into the most beautiful person.

Today, Mr. Speaker, we should reflect our thoughts back to people like Koji Ariyoshi, and there are so many others. We've always congratulated other people for athletic achievement, scholastic achievement, but only in recent years has this body had the guts to rise and say Jack W. Hall was a good man; Bob McElrath is a good man, he helped this State. And we had many others.

I can remember the father of the son who sits here with us. We used to call him 'Colonel Cobb'. He had a high standard because he stayed to support something that was unpopular. And everywhere and anywhere you stand there will always be people that come on after the fight, after everything is established and say, I knew him, he was a good man. But where was he when the struggle was on.

And I want to leave just one thought. I don't care who it is and what color he is, that Hawaii will forever be a place where the pilot light never goes out. The freedom is always on the stove boiling so that we can set the pace for all the world to see, that here in Hawaii, we may be small in size but we are big in righteousness.

Thank you."

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 23) transmitting Senate Bill No. 1627-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AUTHORIZATIONS FOR COLLECTIVE BARGAINING COST ITEMS FOR EMPLOYEES IN BARGAINING UNIT II", which passed Third Reading in the Senate on February 14, 1978, was placed on file.

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 24) transmitting Senate Bill No. 1628-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ANNUAL REPORTS", which passed Third Reading in the Senate on February 14, 1978, was placed on file.

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 25) transmitting

Senate Bill No. 1639-78, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM", which passed Third Reading in the Senate on February 14, 1978, was placed on file.

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 26) transmitting Senate Bill No. 1894-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII MEAT INSPECTION ACT", which passed Third Reading in the Senate on February 14, 1978, was placed on file.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, S.B. Nos. 1627-78, 1628-78, 1639-78, SD 1, and 1894-78 passed First Reading by title and further action was deferred until tomorrow, February 15, 1978.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Sutton introduced Senator Robert B. Watt from Montana, "who has been head of taxation, both when he was in the House and when he moved to the Senate. The taxation laws of the State of Montana are greatly admired by many jurisdictions."

The Chair thereupon appointed Representatives Kihano, Kondo, Yuen, Ajifu and Sutton to escort Montana State Senator Robert Watt to the podium.

The Chair then stated:

"Members of the House, ladies and gentlemen, it is my distinct honor and privilege to present to you Senator Robert Watt from the great State of Montana. He is basking in our tradewinds and sunshine while his colleagues are in deep snow."

Senator Watt responded by stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker and fellow legislators, I would wish first to bring these greetings from the Legislature of the State of Montana.

I wish next to thank Representative Sutton, a very interesting man, and I've only been here a short time, for introducing me. But I would also like to make it clear, that before he introduced me, that I do not agree with him politically.

The next thing I would like to say is that I think that here in Hawaii

you have a delightful democracy and I hope that you keep it that way. I have visited before and I'm enjoying this visit very much.

The third thing I would like to do is to invite all of you, at your convenience, to visit the state of Montana. We are a state a little bit smaller now in population than you are because you have grown more rapidly. Our area, however, is tremendous. We are as large in area as all of the islands of Japan put together, England and Scotland put together, or as the whole country of New Zealand.

I would also invite you, if you're free next winter, to visit our legislature. The reason I am here is that we meet biennially. We're not now in session, but when we do meet next January, it will be for 90 days. So, we will be in session both before you meet and after you meet. I might suggest that you might enjoy it more if you came after you adjourned instead of before because, as the Speaker said, it's really cold there and, of course, you aren't used to it.

And with that, I thank you very much for this courtesy."

The Chair followed with the following remark:

"The Chair will call a recess to allow members to greet our guest from Montana. The Chair would like to inform the members that when our good Senator says that he does not necessarily agree with Representative Sutton politically, what he really meant was that he belongs to the great Democratic Party."

At 11:53 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:09 o'clock p.m., Representative Cobb introduced 110 7th and 8th grade students from Star of the Sea Junior High School. They were accompanied by their teachers, Sister Adrian, Ms. Sylvia Clamaron and Mrs. Dale Bordner.

Representative Blair introduced Margaret Hirsch and Helen Kishlar, cousin and aunt, respectively, of Representative Stanley, who are visiting from San Diego.

Mr. James Kurita, Economic Development Director for the island of Kauai,

was introduced by Representative Kunimura.

Representative Kunimura, upon being recognized by the Chair, stated:

"May I correct, for the record, the statement made by my very dear colleague, Representative Takamine? Correction? Not correction...."

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Clarification."

Representative Kunimura continued, stating:

"Yeah, clarification, to spell out the intent of his remarks, because so often enemies of labor will use devious devices to undermine the solidarity of the union, while we've got to remain ever vigilant so that no misunderstandings. . . ."

The Chair interrupted and said:

"If there's no objections, the Chair will permit Representative Kunimura to clarify statements made in reference to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 50. Proceed."

Representative Kunimura continued, saying:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In his statement, when he makes everything that he did, this is referring to Bob McElrath, everything that he said automatically became an ILWU position, it was the intent of Mr. Takamine that because of the great trust and because Mr. McElrath had only the union's interest at heart, that his recommendation and his position were always ratified by the executive board of the ILWU and, if necessary, the rank and file of the ILWU. It was not a one man union. ILWU has always been, from the beginning, now and forever, a union of rank and file.

Representative Kamalii, at this time, asked:

"I wonder if the Chairman of Legislative Management will yield to a question?"

Representative Kunimura replied in the affirmative and Representative Kamalii asked:

"Last week, it was stated that you were contemplating having a meeting of the Legislative Management Committee. . ."

The Chair interrupted and said:

"The Chair would appreciate it if all questions be directed to the Chair."

Representative Kamalii continued, asking:

"Mr. Speaker, I wondered if the Legislative Management chairman has finally agreed on a date."

Representative Kunimura replied:

"Mr. Speaker, I have not forgotten. We are trying to put together a recommendation, and then maybe next week when we have all of the recommendations put together, then the Committee meeting shall be called. So, until then, may I request the madam to be vigilant and get after me."

"Mr. Speaker, this matter was discussed in our Committee, and the definition of a minor is age 16. However, there was some question as to whether 14 is . . . if some other legislation has passed to bring it down to 14.

And at the Committee hearing, we also talked about raising it up to 18, but we thought it best that we discuss this further in the Judiciary Committee.

So, this matter will be discussed in the Judiciary Committee."

Representative Abercrombie responded by saying:

"I'm quite satisfied with the questions involved."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1838-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC HEALTH AND MORALS", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Peters, seconded by Representative Dods and carried, H.R. No. 305 was adopted.

Representative Shito introduced a group of officers and men of the Hawaii National Guard who were seated in the gallery observing the presentation to General Aiona.

Representative Sutton introduced the parents of General Aiona, Mr. and Mrs. John Aiona, Sr., who were also seated in the gallery.

Mrs. Georgette Gus, mother of Mrs. Aiona, was introduced by Representative Ikeda.

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it's an honor for me to introduce this resolution.

Colonel Aiona, as I referred to him a number of years ago, was my battalion commander when I served in the 29th Brigade.

Some of you may not have known some of the episodes that took place while I was a member there. But just by way of the record, I served as the so-called radical, I guess, in the 29th Brigade. More specifically, as the chairman for the deactivation of the 29th Brigade. My other brother, Dave Schutter, and I gave a lot of headaches to this man here.

But, I must admit, Mr. Speaker, you know, the areas Representative Kunimura and Representative Takamine talked about. . . a man that contributed a heck of a lot to the State, a heck of a lot to the labor movement, there were some words about the right of each individual in the State to profess themselves, to basically exercise that right or what would be considered to be right or wrong at that particular moment. Well, I personally felt that it was unjustifiable when the men of the 29th Brigade were called up.

I think so often we, as local boys, have the tendency of sitting back and not making too much noise, and Uncle Sam or somebody up there pushes the button and expects us to respond a certain way. Some of our men, though tired, did not expect to sit down and lie dead. We were encouraged by Colonel Aiona. Now, let me set the record straight on that. He recognized our rights and he fought for them. To me, that kind of leadership in the military is badly needed.

He has a very warm personal approach in solving problems. He opened the door to many of us that perhaps disagreed with certain things that was done in that period of time. He tried as best as possible to explain the positions of the military and did a very good job, as a matter of fact.

All I can say, Mr. Speaker, is that I have a very deep love and aloha for this man because I know he has a lot of aloha for a lot of other people as well. He is very straight and stern. He expects you to do your job, to do it on a timely basis. If you have a particular function to perform, you're going to do it.

There are many other qualities that I'm sure that he possesses as a leader. I'm personally very, very grateful

the military has found fit to promote Colonel Aiona, a person who well deserves those stars, General of the Army National Guard.

So, without further ado, I would like to introduce the General and some of the other people who are here as guests."

Representative Peters then introduced General Seifferman, Mrs. Susan Aiona, wife of the honoree, who was presented with a red carnation lei by Representative Dods, and the honoree, who received a red carnation lei from Representative Ikeda. Representative Shito presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

At 12:35 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:38 o'clock p.m., Representative Cobb rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to add a few comments to the record, in honor of General Aiona.

Having been familiar with the military promotion system for some time, and knowing how rigorous it is, in terms of the very stringent requirements of the review boards, I think it's very encouraging when we see a home grown man, the qualities that General Aiona has, have stars fall upon his shoulders, because the higher in rank a person goes, the more trust that is put upon him. And when a person reaches General officers rank, I know one of the things that the promotional board looks at is whether they'd be willing to put their own lives in the hands of an individual being considered for promotion.

And, speaking as a member of the Army reserve, I just want to say that I'm perfectly delighted that Colonel, now General Aiona, acquired it.

Thank you very much."

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Kawakami, for the Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Homes, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 49-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2022-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and

be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

By unanimous consent, action was deferred for one day.

Representatives Kawakami and Uechi, for the Committees on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Homes and Agriculture, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 50-78) recommending that H.C.R. No. 26 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Kawakami, seconded by Representative Caldito and carried, the report of the joint Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 26, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO DISPOSE OF PUBLIC LANDS FOR AGRICULTURAL PURPOSES BY MEANS OTHER THAN PUBLIC AUCTION", was adopted, with Representatives Ikeda and Sutton voting no.

Representatives Kawakami and Mizuguchi, for the Committees on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Homes and Education, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 51-78) recommending that H.R. No. 253 be adopted.

Representative Kawakami moved that the report of the Committees be adopted and that H.R. No. 253 be adopted, seconded by Representative Mizuguchi.

Representative Naito, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution. I do so because on the committee report before us this morning, I see that my name, as well as four other members, have been marked 'excused'.

I appreciate the expediency with which this committee report has to be gotten, so just for the record, I'd like to make it clear that if I had had the opportunity to sign the report, I would have done it without any reservation, very happily.

Thank you."

Representative Abercrombie then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"It was my privilege yesterday to be able to testify before the committee, chaired by Senator Abourezk, which was held in the State Capitol auditorium.

He very graciously allowed us the

opportunity to present evidence and petitions to him concerning the leprosy patients at Hale Mohalu in Pearl City.

It is my belief that Senate Bill No. 860, concerning financial assistance to those people who would qualify under the law, should it be changed, might aid and assist in the matter of resolving any financial problems in terms of construction and/or programs for people of Hawaiian ancestry who have leprosy.

As the members may know, the addition of the word 'native Hawaiian' to the present Native American Act would provide them with all the resources available from the federal government now presently available under the Native American Act.

The testimony was overwhelmingly in favor of it and Senator Abourezk accepted the testimony very graciously. It is my hope that he would utilize his good offices to see that the leprosy patients of the State of Hawaii of Hawaiian ancestry be included and thought of when the Congress votes on whether to include native Hawaiians in the Native American Act.

Thank you."

As per the request of Representative Mizuguchi, the following is inserted into the Journal:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.R. No. 253, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE SENATE SELECT COMMITTEE ON INDIAN AFFAIRS TO ACT FAVORABLY ON PROPOSALS TO ASSIST NATIVE HAWAIIANS".

Mr. Speaker, your Committees on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Homes and Education have heard testimonies from the DOE, Alu Like, Kamehameha Schools, and other interested parties and have found the following:

There are approximately 150,000 Hawaiians and part-Hawaiians in the State, and possibly an equal amount living in the mainland United States. The latter information is not accurately known as yet. The native Hawaiians, as defined in Title VIII of P.L. 93-644, comprise over 18% of the total population of the State. About 8% of the native Hawaiians are of full Hawaiian ancestry and about 37% of the adult Hawaiians have 50% or more Hawaiian ancestry.

Approximately half of the total native Hawaiian population in Hawaii are 18 years of age and under. This represents about one-fourth of all the children in the State and one-third of all school-age young people.

Historically, native Hawaiians had treaties with approximately 15 foreign governments, including the United States. The last monarch of the Hawaiian nation, Queen Liliuokalani, was deposed in 1893 by United States citizens with the assistance of United States military forces. Several years later, Hawaii became a territory of the United States; then a State in 1965.

In the intervening years, the native Hawaiians, as the host culture, have welcomed the diverse ethnic groups that now comprise our State population. However, the native Hawaiians have suffered in the process.

The need for federal legislation to provide assistance to native Hawaiians became apparent in reviewing the following data.

Although native Hawaiian youngsters comprise approximately one-third of the school-age youngsters, as of June 1977 only 7% of certificated personnel in the public school system were native Hawaiian.

Although native Hawaiians comprise approximately 18% of the total population of this State, only 10% of the students in the University of Hawaii system are native Hawaiian.

Of the native Hawaiian parents surveyed in the needs assessment, almost unanimously the parents felt it important for their children to finish high school and three-quarters of the parents feel that at least some college is important. A major obstacle appeared to be the need for financial assistance.

There are wide gaps between the parents' actual education and the desired education for their children. According to the OEO 1975 census update survey, compared to the total population, native Hawaiians have smaller percentages who have high school diplomas who pursue further schooling after graduation. Of native Hawaiians 25 years and older, approximately 85.7% of the Hawaiians and 50% of the part-Hawaiians on Lanai did not receive high school diplomas. On Maui, the percentages are 52.1% and 33.4%, respectively. On Kauai, 62.0% of the Hawaiians and 32.5% of the part-Hawaiians did not receive a high school diploma. On Oahu, the percentage is 53.1% and 30.2%,

respectively. The reasons are not documented.

Extracted data from the Department of Education 1976 ethnic and language survey show that our native Hawaiian youngsters are having difficulties early in their educational experiences. Comparisons of reading scores and school adjustment data about our young people will confirm this.

In June of 1977, more than half of the young people in the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility and, as of December 1976, about half of the adults in the correctional system were native Hawaiian. It is believed that a survey of those persons would reveal a direct relationship between lack of educational success and concomitant low self-image and their socio-economic problems.

Alu Like's 1976 needs assessment and area community meetings throughout the State indicated the concern of native Hawaiians for a means of consistent communication and opportunities to make education more relevant to their youngsters. They pointed out the importance of incorporating Hawaiian history, culture, and language in the school curriculum and urged the utilization of culturally acceptable approaches to learning to increase the levels of success of their children.

As of March 1976, of the low-income welfare clients, 24.6% were native Hawaiians, and of those, 68% were children.

Currently, the life expectancy of the native Hawaiian is approximately ten years shorter than for any other ethnic group in this State. Health education and outreach is only one facet to this area of concern.

Although we do not yet have enough data on the number of native Hawaiians in medical, legal, business and other professions of importance to the community, it is quite apparent that the numbers involved currently are minimal.

Certainly, some native Hawaiians have become self-sufficient in varying degrees and we are very proud of their achievements. However, federal assistance is needed to impact on the still existent needs of other native Hawaiians.

In economic opportunity and employment, approximately twenty percent

(20%) of the native Hawaiians have incomes below the federal poverty level.

For 1976, approximately 14.4% of the native Hawaiians were unemployed.

According to a socio-economic profile, "Hawaiians in Management" by Homer and Kanahele, in 1972 only 2.3% of the owners/operators of business establishments were native Hawaiian.

Last year of the 178 native Hawaiian applications for loans from the Small Business Administration, only 12 were approved.

Last year only 42 native Hawaiians were assisted by the Hawaii Economic Development Company to develop plans and receive technical assistance in setting up entrepreneurial ventures.

Funds allocated for native Hawaiians can address needs over a wide spectrum.

In the pre-school years (birth to age 4) -- innovative pilot projects can be implemented in family education and parenting (to include parent training and related supportive services).

In early education (from age 5 years through grade 3) -- there can be implementation in the public school system of methods found through years of research to be significantly successful in teaching youngsters to read and to relate in school. This would include:

- Related training of teachers preparing for credentials and in-service training of existing teachers.
- Appropriate printed matter and audio-visual equipment, curriculum revision and evaluation.

Quality pre-school centers and related educational programs could be provided for native Hawaiian youngsters throughout the State.

Throughout the educational process, there can be provided:

- Experiences and activities which integrate the native Hawaiian cultural concepts into his/her educational experiences.
- Approaches and techniques which are culturally relevant and acceptable would be used in teaching methodology.
- Academic and vocational preparation relevant to career development plans

- would be implemented.
- Parent advisory groups would be involved in the planning, development, and evaluation of programs.

Comprehensive guidance, counseling, testing and supportive services to native Hawaiians in educational programs could be provided to strengthen their self-concept and thereby encourage the young people to enter, remain in or re-enter schools.

Alternative educational programs and activities incorporating cultural concepts and approaches would be provided, evaluated and replicated where and when successful in communities throughout the State.

Adult education opportunities for high school equivalency in the shortest periods feasible can be designed and implemented for older native Hawaiians.

Special certification for kapuna (elders) who have specialized skills to teach our young people could be issued so that educational programs could utilize their services and properly remunerate them for their expertise.

Grants for undergraduate professional preparation and graduate level fellowships, institutes, seminars, workshops and conferences would be facilitated and encouraged.

Land acquisition and construction costs for native Hawaiian cultural centers on each island would add substantially to perpetuating cultural art, crafts, language, ceremonies, and celebrations. The land could be held in trust for native Hawaiians.

A revolving loan fund could provide more fiscal assistance and encouragement than is currently possible through existing agencies and institutions to native Hawaiian prospective entrepreneurs or emerging cooperatives struggling for existence.

Native Hawaiian non-profit organizations would be provided funds and technical assistance for planning, fiscal management, development, implementation and evaluation and thereby also impact positively on addressing native Hawaiian concerns.

Assistance in legal matters, clearing of land titles, and research on native rights would be greatly facilitated.

Numerous other creative activities,

opportunities and programs not now possible could finally be provided.

In closing, the real measure of success for the State will be when economic and social self-sufficiency of native Hawaiians will have been attained and the negative statistics for native Hawaiians will be a thing of the past. I look forward to that day and encourage all of my colleagues to work cooperatively to facilitate that outcome.

The measures currently being reviewed by the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs are extremely important to native Hawaiians and all the people of Hawaii Nei.

Mr. Speaker, I urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of H.R. No. 253 and support the proposed federal legislation to assist native Hawaiians."

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wasn't able to participate in yesterday's Senate hearing. I did have a few remarks that I wanted to make for the record.

First of all, Mr. Speaker, it's common knowledge that most native Hawaiians have been basically ripped off by those capitalists who were here in my ancestors' period. These bills being considered by the Senate, introduced by Senator Inouye and Senator Sparky Matsunaga, well, it may not be the total solution to some of the social ills inflicted upon our people, but is a move in the right direction.

And particularly, Mr. Speaker, there are some attempts in this measure to define a native Hawaiian - it's one who can show that his ancestors were here prior to 1787. I consider that a fairly good definition as opposed to what we now find in the book regarding native Hawaiians being eligible for such programs as Hawaiian homes, with our restriction in terms of Hawaiians having to prove that they have 50% Hawaiian blood.

As you know, Mr. Speaker, I've been having interim hearings on all the islands regarding this position of H.B. No. 1469. The moneys or lands that have been patented to the State by the Federal Government, with conditions that are clearly outlined in the Admissions Act, one of those purposes, or one of those conditions, basically mandates the State to utilize the revenues from these patented lands to the State. More particularly, for

the betterment of native Hawaiians.

I'm personally surprised that in my investigation that this is not being done. There are some efforts being made on the federal level that we're not doing it here in our State level. Mr. Speaker, some of the practices that we find administratively, currently being practiced, were established many years ago.

I'm personally grateful, as a native Hawaiian, to have the opportunity of serving with so many of you that have been so sensitive, concerned, and understanding the needs and concerns of native Hawaiians.

I thank Representative Mizuguchi and Representative Kawakami and their committee members for their consideration of this resolution. I thank all of you for the positive and very diligent response that you're about to make today.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. No. 253, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE SENATE SELECT COMMITTEE ON INDIAN AFFAIRS TO ACT FAVORABLY ON PROPOSALS TO ASSIST NATIVE HAWAIIANS", was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

At 12:56 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Thursday, February 16, 1978.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1954-78

Representative Takamine moved that H.B. No. 1954-78, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., on request by Representative Sutton, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:53 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Garcia and Uwaine.

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I did not know how to have an audible signal when the signal from the huddle was mixed."

The Chair remarked:

"That is why you never made the Stanford football team."

Representative Sutton continued his remarks, stating:

"Sir, again I withdraw my endorsement for your judgeship."

Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against H.B. No. 1954-78, and I would like to point to this very insidious thing which we are doing.

We find that on the 18th of February, 1977, approximately a year ago, the Department of Labor published in the Federal Register Title 29, C.F.R., Part 29 - Labor standards for the registration of apprenticeship program - a term of apprenticeship, and they declared that not less than 2000 hours and certain standards of apprenticeship. That is not even a Federal statute. That does not have the force of law. It is a regulation put out by a particular body and until challenged, it has the force of law, but it is not law. It's no more law than things of the past in various departments in the State of Hawaii where we, the legislature, have not enacted it in the statutes. So this is not a Federal statute that we are following. And then, all of a sudden, we say that because certain labor standards were set down by a bureaucratic administrative body, that we must incorporate this into the statutes of the State of Hawaii. This reasoning is not only serious, but it will lead us down a very terrible primrose path in the pitfalls that are unbelievable.

We are a very different state than most states of the Union. We're an island archipelago in the middle of the Pacific. We're an island archipelago without oil, without timber, without vast resources of being able to grow grain. We're an area that is uniquely dependent upon the tourist industry for most of our incoming dollar. It's now up to 75%. We are a nation in itself, because we are way out here in the middle of the Pacific, totally dependent on a favorable balance of trade, and we have an unfavorable balance of trade. When we forget productivity, we bring about inflation. The moment you lower the standards for an apprenticeship program, you have in so many words said, all right, fine, we accept less productivity, and less productivity means inflation. Mr. Speaker, we have the highest cost of living of any place in the United States of America with the exception of spots like Nome, Alaska. And you know what Nome is like.

Now, Mr. Speaker, we have a very serious problem when we feel that we must follow some bureaucratic standards set down, not as a Federal statute, but just as a bureaucratic

rule or regulation, and then use that to have the tail wag the dog instead of the dog wag the tail. We have gotten the cart before the horse. We have reversed this.

Now, Mr. Speaker, you and I happen to be in a profession - how would you like it if all of a sudden they said anybody from here on in doesn't have to pass the bar examination? You wouldn't like it and I wouldn't like it.

Now, Mr. Speaker. . ."

At this point, the Chair interrupted and remarked:

"That is a presumption on your part, Representative Sutton."

Representative Sutton replied:

"From this distance, I can read your mind, sir."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, look at this thing in all sincerity and in all seriousness. Look at what we're doing. Those who have already achieved the apprenticeship program, we're saying that the next people that come along, you do not have to go over these degree of hurdles. Look at the Olympic games. Supposing they had a high hurdle and then reduced it six inches. We saw last night what can happen when we have an Olympic champion that knows how to handle himself - 8 to 1 odds and he won. He did not receive anything favorable. Eight to one were the odds against him. Nobody asked for any special consideration for him. He just won that fight the way he should win it by putting out more than the other fellow.

Now, by the same token, in the apprenticeship program, it's a competitive situation very comparable to sports. We don't change the standards in the middle of the game and that's what we're doing here solely because of some administrative body of the Federal government. So, I would urge my colleagues and even the chairman of the Labor Committee who is a very distinguished friend of mine and ask him if he would not reconsider it. Maybe he would like to recommit this for further study.

Thank you."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to rise and speak in favor of this bill and defend this bill as a member of the distinguished chairman's committee."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Abercrombie continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I thought I had definitively outlined the causes of inflation on this floor and we would be finished with it for the rest of the term. However, I find that my lesson was not well taught. It is necessary sometimes, having at one time pursued a teacher's career, to recognize that sometimes some pupils are slower than others and must be taught over and over again exactly what are indeed the facts. Less productivity and inflation means inflation, yes. This is the circumstance that was outlined to me by the previous speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I commend to your attention and the body's attention that the distinguished gentleman who heads the committee of which I am a member is trying to do exactly the opposite. He is trying to increase productivity by recommending this bill to the floor. If we continue on to the 4000 hours situation, we are, in fact, asking that productivity stay below what it might be.

I commend to your attention the situation that is outlined in the committee bill that there are now occupations in the State of Hawaii which do not require this kind of situation. In order to expand, if I may quote just a moment. . . 'In order to expand the apprenticeship system into non-traditional occupations, less work process time may be required in the fields of health, energy, environment and industries other than construction.'

The chairman and the committee's attempt is to address exactly the problem that is brought up by the previous speaker. We are trying to increase productivity; that's why we're passing the bill. We are trying to move beyond the traditional occupations and expand our job opportunities for our people in the State of Hawaii.

Secondly, balance of trade deficit has been brought up. Again, I thought I had made a definitive statement on this situation and need not do it again, but I shall again with the idea, Mr. Speaker, that we have an example even more recent than those I cited the last time I rose on this issue.

There are banks in this State who are opening branches in the Bahamas. If there is a balance of trade deficit, maybe it's because money is leaving the State of Hawaii and going to the Bahamas. Take it up with the banks - not with the workers. The last time I looked, there were no workers opening banks in the Bahamas. This issue is addressed, and this bill is addressed, to workers and to people whose jobs and productivity are here in the State of Hawaii, not those people who expect to profit by their investment in the Bahamas or elsewhere.

I think I have addressed, in the course of my remarks to this point, the increase in job productivity.

The last point raised by the speaker was the analogy to sports, as if nothing had changed. I realize that it is very difficult for the previous speaker to recognize that many changes have taken place in sports since the time that he engaged in them more actively. However, Mr. Speaker, I must say, and I must point out that there have indeed been changes in the sports field in terms of the conditions under which sports activities take place. In the boxing field alone, which was referred to, you may have a ring of one size, you may have a ring of another size, you may have gloves of one size, or you may have gloves of another size. This is a matter of choice in the matter of what is suitable to the occasion. As far as the pole vault, for example, is concerned, we now have a difference in the kind of pole that is utilized. As far as the change in standards, women may now enter marathons. It was previously forbidden to them to enter the marathon. Women were actually yanked out of the line if they attempted to enter a marathon. It was illegal for them to do it. So we have all kinds of changes, and we have had changes in the conditions.

This is one of the things the apprenticeship program that we're addressing here is involved in. Because we are a non-traditional occupation not previously addressed by the construction or classic trade formula, we are in a sense, on a new track.

It is quite common knowledge and should be to the previous speaker that we have hardened turf surfaces now. We have tracks which are not the traditional gravel tracks or ground tracks and that world

records are now allowed on these new surfaces. That means that we have recognized that the capacities for sports activities and/or other kinds of activity, in this particular instance, job opportunities, may take place with a new concept.

I urge the previous speaker to take into account what I have just said, and ask all of us to vote on this positively so that we can get on in this new age, in this new time, where the kind of productivity and the kind of jobs for our people that our Committee on Employment wishes to see available for all our people.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura rose and stated:

"I would like to say a few words in support of this bill."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Kunimura stated:

"I have never agreed more than I did say what the gentleman from Manoa has stated for the record, and may I add that only yesterday, we congratulated a leader of a great trade union that we never did before. And I learned a long time ago, Mr. Speaker, in the creation of this universe, everything's moving and if you don't move with the universe, you're going to be left behind. And I hope that the good gentleman, my colleague on the Finance Committee, would take this lesson that we've got to move with time. And situations are changing, and we should keep up with time, and that he change his mind today and vote for this bill."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have received two notes asking what is a terrible primrose. . ."

The Chair interrupted:

"Representative Sutton, will you please be recognized before you speak."

The Chair then recognized Representative Sutton and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have received two notes from various members of this assembly asking me what is a terrible primrose path. A terrible primrose path is the one that the Representative from Manoa and the Representative from Kauai would lead us down."

Representative Kunimura rose on a point of personal privilege and directed by the Chair to "state your point", Representative Kunimura stated:

"I think we are 51 members here with enough intelligence to follow the path of those who are leading us in the right direction. And I don't think I have followed anybody, you know, up the creek. And if I were to follow that man - the gentleman who gave the description about the terrible primrose path - I would be up the creek."

The Chair remarked:

"The Chair recognizes Representative Kunimura's statement as further support of the bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1954-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LABOR STANDARDS FOR THE REGISTRATION OF APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAMS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Ajifu and Sutton voting no, and Representatives Baker, Lunasco and Machida being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1954-78 had passed Third Reading at 12:07 o'clock p.m.

DISPOSITION OF MATTER PLACED ON THE CLERK'S DESK

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 264, HD 1, as amended by the Senate, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative Cayetano moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 264, HD 1, and H.B. No. 264, HD 1, as amended, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Takamura.

Representative Cayetano then explained the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill - the title of this bill is, 'Relating to Construction and Maintenance of Sidewalks'.

Last session, the House passed over this bill, H.B. No. 264, HD 1, to the Senate. The Senate, in its wisdom, amended the bill and we had a Senate draft 2. After due deliberation, the Senate, in its greater

wisdom, decided that the regular House version was the better version and, thereby, amended the bill to Senate draft 2 which is the exact copy of House Bill No. 264, HD 1.

With that, Mr. Speaker, I ask that the members support the motion."

Representative Ajifu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just for the record, Standing Committee Report 1151 states Senate draft 1."

Representative Kondo stated:

"The bill is Senate draft 2."

The Chair then said:

"The Chair will direct Representative Ajifu's attention to the first page of the bill and you will see Senate draft 2 on it."

Representative Kunimura stated:

"It's the Senate style of listing what the subject matter is about the Committee Report is referring to, but the actual matter before this House is Senate draft 2."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in the rather unique Senate style alluded to by the distinguished gentleman from Kauai, they begin at the top with referencing the previous draft of the bill on the pink Committee Report and, at the bottom, recommends its passage in the form attached hereto as H.B. No. 264, HD 1, SD 2.

The Committee Report merely explains the changes made and the final form of the bill is recommended at the bottom which is just above the Chairman's signature."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 264, HD 1, and H.B. No. 264, HD 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF SIDEWALKS", having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Baker, Lunasco and Machida being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 264 had passed Final Reading at 12:12 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Kamalii rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I have before me a legislative timetable and it states that February 17th, Friday, that all party bills are to be reported to the final committee. My first question is, will you please define for me what a party bill is?"

The Chair responded, stating:

"The Chair would not, at this time, like to get into the subject matter. It is not before the House. I believe that is an internal memorandum and so the Chair rules that your point of information is out of order at this time."

Representative Kamalii stated:

"Well, I will appeal the ruling of the Chair, if that is what it is. I think this matter is a great concern to all members of this House."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair's ruling has been appealed. All in favor of sustaining the Chair's ruling will vote 'aye'. All those who oppose will vote 'no'."

Representative Ajifu then requested a roll call vote.

Representative Abercrombie rose on a point of clarification and asked:

"So I don't end up the way I did last time, would you restate what it is that the 'aye' or 'nay' vote will mean, please."

The Chair stated:

"The 'aye' will sustain the Chair's ruling. . ."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted, stating:

"And the 'nay' will be against the Chair's ruling."

The Chair answered:

"That is correct."

Representative Abercrombie then thanked the Chair.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the Chair's ruling was sustained.

Representative Kamalii then rose

on a point of personal privilege and the Chair asked:

"State your point on the grounds on which you seek the floor for personal privilege."

Representative Kamalii replied:

"Well, I feel that I have been personally aggrieved that there is a timetable that's floating around this floor, and as a member of this House, I don't get a full explanation. . ."

Representative Kunimura interrupted on a point of order and directed by the Chair to "state your point", Representative Kunimura stated:

"The subject matter referred to by the honorable minority floor leader is not before this body at this time, and how can anyone be aggrieved with something that is not before this body."

The Chair ruled, stating:

"The Chair rules that Representative Kamalii, you are out of order."

Representative Ajifu then rose on a point of information and asked:

"I would like to know your decision for ruling out of order - on what basis are you ruling out of order? The reason why I state this is that insofar as the motion for personal privilege is concerned, it is in order at any time and it does not need to be on the calendar as such. This is one of the incidental motions which could come up at any time."

The Chair responded, stating:

"I do not challenge Representative Kamalii's right to seek the floor for a specific purpose, and after listening to her reasons for seeking the floor, the Chair has ruled that she has no personal privilege grounds or rights on the subject matter."

Representative Abercrombie then rose on a point of clarification "on the remark of the Representative from Kauai because you did not respond to it," and asked:

"May I ask for it?"

The Chair replied:

"The Chair sustains Representative Kunimura's point of order."

Representative Abercrombie then

asked:

"I would like to raise a point of order and turn that. I suggest to the Chair that that ruling may . . . you may wish to change that ruling. May I bring it to your attention? It will take me about three seconds."

The Chair answered:

"There is nothing before the House at this time. . ."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted, stating:

"My point of order is this: The reference from the Representative from Kauai, I think, made in all sincerity, was that unless the matter is before the House at this time, one cannot raise a point of personal privilege. That went unremarked upon by yourself.

According to Mason's, questions which relate to the proper functioning of the body. . . you know, what I am driving at. . . on a point of order, is that if the personal privilege point is related to the functioning of the body. . ."

Representative Kunimura rose on a point of order but Representative Abercrombie continued, asking:

"Do you know what I am driving at?"

The Chair then stated:

"May we have Representative Abercrombie continue his remarks."

Representative Abercrombie continued, stating:

"My point is I don't want to get

an argument. I want to settle it because it is in the records - it's in that Journal. It is going to be printed right now and without further reference. I don't want to argue with the gentleman from Kauai. I want to know what was meant by what's before the House, because of previous reference by yourself, and that is why I am rising on a point of order. I am not sure whether I am rising on the proper point or not. I want to make sure I understand.

It says, 'Affect the proper functioning of the body.' Now, you can rise on a point of personal privilege if you are questioning the proper functioning of the body whether or not some issue is before the body as such. Then, it really doesn't affect personal privileges as I see it, and I think that is what needs to be clarified."

Representative Kunimura stated:

"Mr. Speaker, my point of order was raised on your point that was aggrieving. I mean. . . you know, the grievous point that the minority leader raised, and that matter is not before this body, and you know, nothing is before the body. Zero times zero equals zero."

The Chair then said:

"May we proceed with the announcements."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Friday, February 17, 1978.

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1978, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

Representative Ushijima, for the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 67-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2258-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ushijima moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 2258-78, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Abercrombie.

Representative Abercrombie then rose to "speak in favor of this bill, with reservations", stating:

"My reservations, Mr. Speaker, are not in the slightest concerning the appropriation for continuing education for women. This is one of the finest programs that the University offers. That is my complaint.

Each year the Committee on Higher Education, chaired by Representative Ushijima, is presented with a series of measures, or is forced on its own to present a series of measures, because the University takes advantage of the fact that they know very well that our committee and this Legislature will vote the funds for these operations, whether it's continuing education for women, whether it's women's intercollegiate athletic program, whether it's funds for library services, UH, Manoa, etc.

All these bills come before us every year because the University sits in the back of the room smugly watching, while it forces dozens and dozens of students who, in good faith, come before us, testimony written, some of them shaking when they speak - they're not used to speaking in public - feeling they must defend themselves

the Legislature, having it in their minds that the Legislature is the one that is the stumbling block between their precious program and what it means to them, and whether or not the University will be able to put it forward. This is a cynical and vicious undertaking by the University.

We were forced the other evening to the point that the chairman even had to indicate to one of the officials of the University that had become embarrassing. . . that the hearing had become embarrassing because of the utter lack of concern and input from the University. The University officialdom then, and I want to say it on this floor, I want to say it for anyone in the gallery, anyone in the media who is listening, anyone who reports on such issues as the phase one building at UH, that the University has taken advantage of this Legislature and our Committee on Higher Education and its good work, over and over and over again. And, I repeat, in a cynical and vicious fashion.

I utilize the word 'vicious' because they are taking the good faith and intention of students and making it appear, I repeat again, as if the Legislature somehow wishes to thwart those good intentions and those good motives of the students. They take the program that they know will pass and put them in the so-called supplemental budget and then they restrict them; then, they do not seek to have them funded properly. This is unfair to the students, it is unfair to the taxpayers, it most certainly is unfair to the Legislature.

I am not one normally to stand up and have to defend the Legislature - politicians as a group. We all know that we have plenty of people in the public ready, only too ready to stand up and defend us on our virtues. We also know, of course, that that comment is, to say the least, ironic. We know that it is not the case. We know that the Legislature is most often considered a stumbling block to social progress, that we serve special interests, that we do not serve the public interest. And so I say that in this particular bill, and in the bills to follow from Higher Education, we most certainly plead guilty. I most certainly do, as vice chairman of Higher Education, of serving a special interest. That is to say, the students' good faith in us that we will respond with measures

and money that respond in turn to their genuine needs.

I most certainly do not plead guilty, but rather accuse the University of cynically using people at the University and using the Legislature to further its own fiscal incapacities, its mediocre leadership, and its utter lack of vision.

I will vote for this bill. I urge others to vote for this bill and, above all, I urge that the message be taken forth to the public that it is the University administration, and the administration alone, that is responsible for the mismanagement, the misfeasance, the incapacity to deliver a first rate educational system to the State of Hawaii.

This Legislature, our Committee in particular, has voted every single penny ever requested by the University in response to students, teachers and the public presenting us a case and proving a case. We have voted even more money for these projects, for these programs. Every one of them is considered as a legislative luxury and not a response to the University's needs.

So I urge us all to pass this bill and subsequent bills. I have 'I do not concur' on one of these bills. It is not because I'm against what is in the bill. It is because I do not concur with the methodology. I do not concur with the kind of games being played with legislators and with the good faith of the people of this State by cynical and mediocre administration at the University. The sooner it is removed, the better we will all be. And if that is not clear, I will say it again - the sooner the administration at the University is removed, including its chancellor system, the better we will all be.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2258-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR WOMEN", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ushijima, for the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 68-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2475-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and

be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Abercrombie and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2475-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ushijima, for the majority of the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 69-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2473-78 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ushijima moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 2473-78 be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Abercrombie.

Upon being recognized, Representative Abercrombie stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this is the only bill that I'll speak further on in this respect. May I speak in favor?"

The Chair directed Representative Abercrombie to "proceed", and he said:

"Mr. Speaker, because not all the people in the gallery will know the content, I wish to state for the record, and for them, that this is 'A Bill for an Act relating to library services at the University of Hawaii in Manoa Campus. The purpose of this bill is to appropriate \$250,000 to augment the library services budget. This appropriation would be used to provide the required staffing of Hamilton Library Phase II, continued automation of library operations, library acquisitions and equipment replacement'.

I wish to emphasize the required staffing. If the staffing is required, why has the University not presented it to us as part of its regular budget? If it's to continue automation, why isn't it part of its regular budget. That means it is already under way - library acquisitions and replacement.

We already know that the University is asking us for more than a million dollars because it is in violation of the fire code - because it does not maintain adequate maintenance.

We have not been given an adequate

budget. And the reason I rise on this particular bill is this is the library. This is the heart and soul of the University. Without this kind of money, it cannot exist. Our students cannot learn.

We cannot present ourselves, whether in undergraduate education or in organized research, where we see millions and millions and millions of dollars in grant, in our organized program, one of the finest in the country, despite the administration of the University, based on the talent and hard work of the faculty and students at the University . . . we have to appropriate \$250,000. That is not small money for any individual, but in terms of the University budget, this is practically nothing. They can appropriate tens of thousands, hundreds of thousands, for their new administrative hierarchy, but they cannot fund the library.

I repeat again, the sooner that administration and that kind of attitude is removed from this State, the sooner the people of this State, as taxpayers, the sooner the students of this State and the people who have goodwill toward the University will be better off."

Representative Dods then rose and asked if the previous speaker would yield to a question, and when Representative Abercrombie answered in the affirmative, he asked:

"At the beginning of your speech you mentioned that this will be the last bill you would speak on. Is that for the session?"

Representative Abercrombie replied:

"Mr. Speaker, that obviously deserves an answer. I'm afraid not. As usual, I let my good intentions get ahead of the necessities of legislative life."

The Chair then remarked:

"While you were afraid not, we were deathly afraid not also."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2473-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIBRARY SERVICES AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII, MANOA CAMPUS", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ushijima, for the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 70-78) recommending that H.B. No.

2370-78 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Abercrombie and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2370-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CENTER FOR LABOR EDUCATION AND RESEARCH AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Ushijima and Uechi, for the Committees on Higher Education and Agriculture, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 71-78) recommending that H.B. No. 1801-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Inaba and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1801-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR AN ALTERNATIVE CROPS RESEARCH PROGRAM", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Ushijima and Toguchi, for the Committees on Higher Education and Ocean and Marine Resources, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 72-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2369-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Toguchi and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2369-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE MARINE OPTION PROGRAM", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Shito, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 73-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2266-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Nakamura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2266-78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION

FOR MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS AT DAVID MALO CIRCLE, LAHAINA, MAUI", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Aki, for the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 74-78) recommending that H.B. No. 1840-78 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Aki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 1840-78 be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Campbell.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak in favor of the bill "with no reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii is leading the nation and has been recognized for its excellent work in this field, and I would like to commend the chairman, our own James Aki, for the magnificent job he is doing. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1840-78, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PREVENTION OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION THEREFOR", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Aki, for the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 75-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2157-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Cobb, for the Committee on Energy and Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 79-78) recommending that S.C.R. No. 12 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Cobb, seconded by Representative Yuen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 12, entitled: "REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO EXEMPT THE STATE OF HAWAII FROM THE FEDERAL MANDATORY REQUIREMENT OF CONVERTING NEW AND EXISTING POWER PLANTS TO COAL AND TO PROVIDE THE STATE OF HAWAII WITH RELIEF FROM THE FUEL OIL PENALTY TAX AND OTHER RESTRICTIVE MEASURES", was adopted.

Representative Machida, for the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 80-78) recommending that H.R. No. 24, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Machida moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 24, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Dods.

Representative Sutton then rose and asked for a conflict ruling inasmuch as he is an owner of a hotel.

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict of interest and Representative Sutton was not excused from voting on this measure.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 24, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING REPORTS ON THE TOURIST INDUSTRY RELATED EDUCATION AND JOB TRAINING PROGRAMS PRIOR TO THE ADJOURNMENT OF THE 1978 LEGISLATIVE SESSION", was adopted.

At 11:37 o'clock a.m., on request by Representative Kamalii, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:38 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Cayetano, Larsen and Toguchi.

Representative Machida, for the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 81-78) recommending that H.R. No. 20 be adopted.

Representative Machida moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 20 be adopted, seconded by Representative Dods.

Representative Kamalii then requested that her remarks be entered into the Journal if there were no objections.

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, so ordered.

Representative Kamalii's remarks are as follows:

"Thank you. Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

The Legislature, Mr. Speaker, has watched passively for too long a time while the Mayor and Governor have played brinkmanship with Waikiki, the heart of our visitor industry.

Of the three heavy rains in Waikiki this winter, Waikiki streets have been flooded three times. Local people and visitors are forced to wade, and I mean wade, from street corner to corner. I assure you that no visitors and very few local people distinguish between the City and the State in fixing blame for the flooded streets and their water-logged shoes.

The garbage in the Ala Wai is observed by hundreds of visitors each day; yet, the necessary dredging is stalled.

Representative Carroll and I have shouted for action until our throats are hoarse, yet the Governor and Mayor continue to bicker like old women in the back yard.

The papers carry stories of the impact of deterioration in Miami Beach, yet the Governor and Mayor allow Waikiki to deteriorate, each attempting to hurt their political adversary's career.

This resolution is long overdue. But passing this resolution is not enough. When the results of the requested reports come in, it will be evident to all what this political backbiting has cost Waikiki. Mr. Speaker, when these reports come in, it will be time for this House and the Senate to take action to assume that the damage to Waikiki caused by the inaction of the Governor and Mayor is stopped and reversed.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 20, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU'S DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL PLANNING TO SUBMIT REPORTS ON THE STATUS OF PROJECTS FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF WAIKIKI", was adopted.

Representative Machida, for the majority of the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 82-78) recommending that H.R. No. 26, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Machida, seconded by Representative Dods and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 26, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE HAWAII VISITORS BUREAU AND NEIGHBOR ISLAND TOURISM PROMOTION ORGANIZATIONS TO REPORT ON THEIR PROMOTION AND MARKETING EFFORT TO THE 1978 LEGISLATURE", was adopted.

Representative Cayetano, for the Committee on Energy and Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 83-78) recommending that H.R. No. 69 be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Cayetano, seconded by Representative Takamura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. Representative Ushijima, for the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 88-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2443-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Mizuguchi and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Abercrombie and Kunimura.

"Mr. Speaker, for too long, our women athletes at the University of Hawaii have gone unrecognized."

At this point, Representative Peters interrupted and asked:

"Excuse me, Mr. Speaker, can we have the voting on that motion first before sister talks, please?"

The Chair replied:

"I believe Representative Kamalii is speaking for the adoption of the resolution", and directed Representative Kamalii to continue.

Representative Kamalii continued her remarks, stating:

"Yes, I am. As I stated before, it is a great honor for me to rise and speak in favor of this resolution.

For too long, the women athletes at the University of Hawaii have gone struggling for funds, but without that, they have managed, after several years, to put us on the map, not only here in the State of Hawaii, but nationally, and I am sorry that the entire team can't be down here to accept our appreciation."

Representative Kunimura was recognized and he stated:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. Yes, for too long and for so long, Hawaii has always been known or almost known for congratulating winners and forgetting the losers. I think we should invite the basketball team over here. I am serious, you know. When they are on the top, it seems like we are all for them, but when they lose more than they win, we don't say one word, and I think, you know what? The people on the team would rather have them. . . you know, would rather have a body like this support them -

win, lose, or draw. And let us not be a legislature of only following the leaders, but let us support them whether they win or they lose, and let us give them the full support."

Representative Peters then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"As you know, Mr. Speaker, I have been quite an ardent supporter of volleyball for many years, having the chance to coach and play volleyball for, I would say, maybe about fifteen years. I am personally interested in seeing the program expanded to include male athletes as well, because I know volleyball has played a very important role in my life. I am sure many youngsters throughout the State, having played volleyball, would like to see it as a men's sport as well at the University of Hawaii, and perhaps, the President of the University of Hawaii, and some of us in this process here, can give consideration along those lines.

Thank you very much."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have had the privilege of knowing the Athletic Director, Donnis Thompson, and sitting next to her many times at the Quarterback Club, and she said to me, 'We are going to have a championship team.' I just figured that, you know, she was an optimist and she was talking, making conversation, and I just stuck it in the back of my head and figured, well, Donnis is probably exaggerating.

But here it is. The proof of the pudding is the eating, and it is a magnificent tribute to this wonderful Athletic Director that we are honoring her today, and I certainly hope that everybody will vote for the resolution."

Representative Naito then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution congratulating the members of the volleyball team. I think that for too long in Hawaii have we been calling the members of this volleyball team 'girls'. They are now women, and I am very proud of them."

Representative Garcia then rose on a point of information and stated:

"I don't think too many of our colleagues

know that Representative Henry Peters was at one time a member of the Olympic Volleyball Team for the United States."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 322 was adopted.

Representative Kamalii then introduced the members of the volleyball team, ranked No. 2 nationally, as follows: Coach, Mr. Dave Shoji; Beth McLachlin, "All American" First Team named by "Volleyball Magazine"; Ann Goldenson, Paula Gusman, Bonnie Gouveia, Meg Sullivan, Mary Ann Singleton and Joey Akeo.

Leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Narvaes, Poepoe, Carroll, Caldito, Suwa, Larsen, Peters, Yuen and Ikeda, and Representative Kamalii presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. Representative Takamura then introduced Mrs. Eleanor Florendo and Mrs. Mila S. Medallon, president and secretary, respectively, of the United Group of Home Operators, Inc.

Representative Cayetano presented Mrs. Florendo with a lei and Mrs. Medallon received a lei from Representative Mina, while Representative Takamura presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

At this time, Representative Takamura also introduced Mr. and Mrs. Roger Omalza, who were seated in the gallery. Mr. Omalza is president of the Hawaii State Care Home Association, Inc.

As per the request of Representative Sutton, the following is inserted into the Journal:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to add my remarks on this resolution.

My district has many care homes. They are a place of compassion and great warmth.

We are indeed fortunate in Hawaii to be unique in the high standard of real care that has been and will continue to be given those who need this care.

I salute the honorees."

By unanimous consent, the following resolution (H.R. No. 331) was referred to the Committee on Legislative Management and further action was deferred until tomorrow, February 23, 1978:

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Kunimura, for the Committee on Legislative Management, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 94-78) informing the House that House Resolution Nos. 322 to 329, House Concurrent Resolution Nos. 66 to 68, and House Standing Committee Report Nos. 95-78 to 114-78 have been printed and distributed.

On motion by Representative Kunimura, seconded by Representative Lunasco and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted.

Representative Baker, for the Committee on Public Assistance and Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 95-78) recommending that H.B. No. 2063-78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ushijima moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 2063-78, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Nakamura.

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:12 o'clock p.m., Representative Abercrombie rose to speak against the referral, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the title of the bill is 'A Bill for an Act Making an Appropriation for Social Service Programs Offered Under the Provisions of Title XX of the Federal Social Security Act, as amended'.

In reading the committee report, under 'findings', on the second page, I noticed that the word 'bonanza' is utilized: 'The bonanza of \$9.7 million dollars allotted to Hawaii in fiscal year 1973-74, where Hawaii was able to expend only \$6 million, has turned into a', and I want to emphasize the word again, 'nightmare where programs in the public now face cutbacks in services because of a \$1.6 million deficit for the current fiscal year, and a \$1.5 million for the next. The Department of Social Services and Housing has chosen to resolve this deficit by cutting back on eligibility for child day care services primarily to a client group comprised of low and moderate income working families who currently are not on public assistance'.

Now, in the past, Mr. Speaker,

we have had lengthy discussions, both in the media, on this floor, committee and in other community forums on public assistance and what should be done in respect of public assistance.

Now we are told by your committee that there has been a finding, where the DSSH is concerned, that a bonanza has turned into a nightmare and that there is a deficit which will amount to \$3.1 million in this fiscal year and over the next, and that the people involved are working families who are not on public assistance, in respect of child day care services.

One of the points that has been raised on this floor, over and over again, has been a necessity of providing jobs now. Obviously everyone knows that the child day care centers, in many respects, accommodates working women and/or families to put their children there in order to have a job. If the day care center is not open, how are these people supposed to continue their jobs?

Second paragraph, and I want to quote two of the sentences: 'We find that reasons for the deficit in Title XX lie squarely with the absence of wise planning and adequate investment in staffing, monitoring and evaluation of social service programs on the part of the State' -the State. 'We find a poorly conceived and poorly implemented public planning process. We find a proliferation of rules and regulations which are vague, confusing, and unnecessarily complicated to be interpreted uniformly by administrators, providers, and clients.'

I have scarcely seen, in the time that I have been in this Legislature, a more devastating condemnation of any department in all respects of the services that it provides, the methodology utilized and the fundamental approach to the utilization of services as is contained in that paragraph in the short parts that I have read. It has indicated that since 1973-74, and that is the reason I rise - 1973-74 - this is not something that has been going on only within the past six months, within the last 90 days, it is something that has been found out about by the people who are victimized - the working families who are now victimized by the closing of child day care centers - they found out about it just recently, but the State has been doing this since 1973-74.

Now, why hasn't the State come

up with a plan to rectify these abuses which have been taking place since 1973. This is 1978. This has been going on for five years, according to the committee, and I presume that the committee does not present the report lightly, that the committee means what it says. If that is the case, why should the Legislature, at a time when I have before me a memo to the Finance Committee indicating that once again instructions at the University of Hawaii system are going to be cut from the present budget, while administrative funds continue, while institutional support, the famous oxygen tent that we put out in hopes that the University will activate"

The Chair interrupted, saying:
"Representative Abercrombie . . ."

Representative Abercrombie then said:

"I'm not finished."

The Chair continued, saying:

"The Chair believes that you are going out of the realm of arguing for the passage of this bill on Second Reading by making reference to the University of Hawaii. If you will confine your remarks to the bill, the Chair would appreciate it."

Representative Abercrombie then responded by saying:

"I am confining my remarks, Mr. Speaker, to the referral to the Finance Committee. This bill is being referred to Finance. I am discussing the finances of this State. This bill states that there is going to be some \$3,100,000 in one section, on page three, the 'recommendations'. If the Finance Committee is having recommended to it \$3,100,000 in this bill, it seems to me entirely in order, when we're speaking of finances, that I relate to the finances of the entire Legislature in terms of what's being presented to the committee.

My committee is not responsible for the dereliction of duty on the part of the State either in the University or in the DSSH. Why should this Legislature be called upon to provide a fictional \$3.1 million? It is a fiction. It is a fraud.

We are told, in every instance, by the governor, that there is no money; that there must be cuts. I can even show you where the governor put out one statement in respect of higher education and came back with a different

version when he got back from Manila. I can show you that this has gone on over and over again, and over and over again.

There has never been a discussion on this floor about new taxes, about new revenue, about alternative sources of revenue. Can't get hearings on them. Where are you going to get the \$3.1 million? I'm not going to stand here and go through a proforma exercise of referring this bill to the Finance Committee and not state publicly that this is a fraud. It's a fraud in a tax-paying year. Everybody here knows it's a fraud - \$3.1 million, make it \$30.1 million. What the hell's the difference? Because what's going to happen is they're going to go, under Chapter 37, under the 'allotment', they're going to take whatever money comes in, they're going to ship it out all over depending on who the hell needs what, depending on what particular department has what particular crises to bring up to handle that particular moment. That's how this State is run. And this Legislature is aiding and abetting it.

What I want to see, under these findings, the committee saying back to the governor, you have fouled this State up for five years; fouled it up for five years in your administration; you come down with a plan; you come down with the money. Where's the money gonna come from? Why in God's name should it come out of instruction at the University? Why should it come out of child day care centers for working families? Jesus Christ, what are we doing down here? I don't care about the rest of that you can talk about election years and all the rest of that. I'd rather gag. I'd rather choke before I go in front of the taxpayers that have voted this year than come up with this kind of trash.

You tell me how in the hell we're supposed to go back to the University with all this pious talk about diversified egg and oceanographic industries, and all the rest of this will that comes down from the State administration about what we're going to spend. And then they walk in here and our own committee says a bonanza has turned into a nightmare, that the reason for this lies squarely in the absence of wise planning, adequate investment and staff monitoring evaluation. That means from stem to stern that this thing has not been handled.

Why won't the State administration come down and explain where the hell it's going to get the money, or give us a plan? Why should we take them off the hook? I know what's gonna happen. We're going to pay this \$3.1 million, and at the end of the year, just like last year, some institution, maybe not the University, maybe some other area of government, maybe some other folks down here on the floor have a particular interest in, maybe CETA, SCET, social services, I don't know, wherever it's going to come from, marine resources, agriculture. . . you pick one. Transportation? They're gonna hold the money back all year long. They're going to tell the people the Legislature didn't provide the money, just like Matsuda does all the time when he lies at the University. And then at the end of the fiscal year, they'll yank all of the money off that they've used as a reserve bank, and whatever else they had and they'll pay the bill. That's what's gonna happen. I wish to God, for once, the media, the reporters or someone will report to the taxpayers exactly how this State is run.

When we pass this out of here, it's an allotment. It's a lump sum allotment. We might as well be living back in the 11th Century and give it to Cardinal Richelieu and let them divide it up among the baronage any damn way he pleases. And whether this governor or any other governor, that's still the truth about Chapter 37. But in this instance, it says 73-74. How in the hell can a committee come up and present us with something like this and casually pass on to the Finance Committee \$3.1 million?

I've seen headlines, which one of our senators has done with the energy program, is God damn nearly booted out of the chamber because he suggested the \$3 million investment in our future in energy. An investment. This is to take care of all the stuff we've done wrong. Well, where is it? Why should I have to vote a second passage on to Finance if I think that the \$3.8 million that T.C. Yim has involved in energy is more important. If it comes to a trade-off, why can't I make the governor come up with it? Why should I have to trade-off?

I'm telling the truth here. Maybe my judgments aren't all the same as you people down here. I understand that. We can have the same set of facts and come down to a different

set of conclusions. Okay, that's fair. But this process you know damn well this process I'm talking about is the way it's working. This is a gigantic oxygen tent. That's all it is. And they activate it and they turn it on or they turn it off, depending on who they want to kill. And we're letting it go on. And we let it go on. And we let things like this go on.

We've nothing against the Finance Committee. We can shove stuff at the Finance Committee until it's coming out of their ears. We're doing it in Higher Education. We're going to shove so much crap at the Finance Committee out of Higher Education in the so-called supplemental budget. For God's sake, you could put volleyball teams on the moon for the money we're going to shove at them. And at the same time we're telling them to knock out hundreds of thousands of dollars out of instruction. For God's sake, that's our own kids. It's our own people out of instruction.

I know I'm shouting. Christ, it's my manner. I do it. That's the way I am. Other people do it other ways. I can't help it. But this is a fraud. I'm tired of it. I'm just tired. I'm tired of the lies and all the bull. I will not vote to pass on to Finance, at least in this particular instance. Most instances, fine, you know. I'll pass, you know, some of this stuff we got down here, moving it all along to Finance. God, we'll move it all down there. But in this instance, by God, I'm gonna say no. And I wish to Christ everybody else would say no, because the committee itself points out, and in this instance, if in no other, even if the other things that I've said could be disputed, and you know there's edges on it, and I don't have the whole picture and all the rest of it, at least in this particular instance, there is an absolute, total and complete condemnation by the committee of how the State has gotten us into this kind of position. It is at least fair. It is defensible, my friends. It is defensible for me to make an argument that, in this particular instance, the administration should have come up with the 3.1 million bucks and not us, because if we have to come up with it, it's going to take it from someplace else. Why should we continually fund their mistakes?"

The Chair interrupted, saying:

"Representative Abercrombie."

Representative Abercrombie then asked:

"Is my time up?"

The Chair replied, saying:

"It has exceeded about a minute."

Representative Abercrombie then said:

"Okay. You're right. I've exceeded the time. That's fine. But you know, it's kind of interesting"

Representative Carroll interrupted to "yield my time."

Representative Abercrombie responded by saying:

"That's okay, John, I'll finish up. Thank you. I appreciate that."

But isn't it interesting, on this floor, you know, we try to abide by the rules. In fact, some of the maybe you better give me your time for a minute."

The Chair then said:

"The Chair recognizes Representative Carroll yielding his time."

Representative Abercrombie continued, saying:

"Isn't it interesting, Mr. Speaker, in respect to this bill on this floor, some of the disputes even you and I have had have been over the rules in here. We're trying to live up to what our duties are and how to handle things, and so on. We've had discussions. That's what caucuses are for. We try to do it right. Nobody can come down . . . and we've had arguments about what's right and what's wrong. Christ, the Majority Leader and I go at it every day. I'd get into it with him, except he's bigger than me."

The Chair remarked:

"We try to do right, Representative Abercrombie. We have differences over basic rules according to parliamentary procedure."

Representative Abercrombie continued, stating:

"Exactly. We have had, you know, the most fundamental kinds of disputes with one another on this floor as to how to deal with things, how to approach things, and all the rest of it, that

on occasion has gotten personal because they mean that much to us, but we're still all together and smiling and talking and all of this and we're able to get through it.

Now, the reason I bring that up in respect to this bill, we're trying to do it right. We're trying to deal with these things. We're trying to make the balances. That's what the Finance Committee does every day. That's why we call on the chairman and all that. That's why this bill, in this instance, I'm not going to vote for it, because we're trying to do the right thing.

Why the hell should we constantly have to cover up for this mismanagement in the God damn fumbling of the government, because in the end it reflects on us, and I'm not going to vote for it. Let them try to find the \$3 million in this particular bill, because this, to me, is an absolute condemnation of the way things have been handled and, if anything, it's a duddy. It's a duddy report coming out of a legislative committee in an election year, to fight these things and fight it in a manner that it does. It's a straightforward report. It's got Republican names on it. It's got Democratic names on it. You know, it's bipartisan; the whole routine. It shows a lot of guts and, I think, and I don't even know what the answer is, you know.

You know, if I vote no, I haven't the slightest idea what happens. Let them fish the \$3 million out of every place else they fish it out of. Christ, they'll go get it someplace anyway. They won't put up one building or some damn thing like that. That's what will happen. Let them fish the money out. I would just say no, right now.

Put them on notice that they can't shove us around anymore. Tell them to go cut it someplace else, and figure out where they do it. It'd be interesting to see who they're going to try sieve it off. Why should we continue to push through the Finance Committee some kind of a gigantic ronde le of balancing when it's not a balancing act.

I tell you this. I believe it. Everything. I believe this right down inside my gut. We're stealing from our own, because we're giving the illusion that we're doing something. You should see the stuff we're gonna shove out of Higher Ed. - like everybody's gonna get taken care of. And it's . . .

don't blame me, blame the other guy who put it all in there. I can point with pride. . . no, I'm not gonna point with pride. I'd rather sink in the sand than be associated with this kind of thing.

This committee report says to me, vote no. This committee report says to me, go back to the administration and tell them to come up with something that's gonna correct this situation. Not by report next year. I'm talking about the sheer bucks. You go find the bucks. Like you might want to take it out of the . . . out of the central laboratory facility they're gonna build at Hale Mohalu, for example, that they denied ever having known about. They might try that for openers. They might try all the secret deals that have been caught in this State, in this election year, as to where the bread is going. Maybe you could try it there.

You know, this report is heavy duty. I don't know who wrote it, but they'll probably fire him after I get finished. The Department of Social Services and Housing has chosen to resolve this deficit. In other words, that means there were alternatives available by cutting back in the eligibility for child day care services primarily to a client group comprised of low and moderate income working families who are currently not on public assistance - low and moderate income people who are working for a living, who want a child day care center - and we're saying you can't have it anymore because we screwed it up. Well, I didn't screw it up. I'll tell you that right now, and I'm voting no. I didn't screw it up. Somebody else screwed it up. And that's what this report says. And that somebody else oughta come down here and correct the situation.

I'm damned if somebody's gonna come up in my area and tell me, I can't work because we don't have a child day care center because the State didn't run things right. They ought to make it up. It's okay with me. I don't care. No recriminations. Come up with something. That's fine. Everybody makes mistakes. I'm the first one to say that because I've probably made more mistakes in here than everybody all combined. I've had to eat crow on this floor, change my mind, sign stuff and I stood up and voted another way, and all the rest of it, cause in the caucus, Ron Kondo convinced me of something that I was wrong and I had to change my mind. I've done it. But there's no game in it. I can't vote yes where working families - low and moderate income - are going

to get jobbed out of a child day care center because the State messed up. That's why I'm asking you people to vote no.

I'm sorry that I took more time on this thing, but I'm not sorry that I said the things that I said."

At 12:35 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:40 o'clock p.m., Representative Uwayne rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, may the House Journal reflect the fact that the State committee chairman was 'excused' from signing the committee report?"

The Chair replied:

"I believe the report speaks for itself."

Representative Cayetano then rose to "speak in favor of the bill being referred to Finance", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm going to vote for this referral, and I'm not ashamed to do it, and I want to say why. I agree with much of what the representative from Manoa said, but I think we should not confuse what we can do and what we cannot do. When I say we, I mean we here in this chamber.

The constitution gives the Legislature the duty and power to make appropriations. The executive branch has the duty to execute. Now, if the executive branch has not done its duty, it is not answerable by us, Mr. Speaker. The executive is answerable to the people when election time comes around.

The previous speaker mentioned that he does not know the answer. And that is why I'm voting for the bill, because I, too, do not know what the answer is. I think the committee wrestled with the same problem and their answer was to provide the money in the meantime, because, otherwise, there is no answer; not even a partial one. And for that reason, I am voting for this bill.

I have to say that although I agree in principle with much of what was said and the committee chairman, I see much of this game of over-appropriations. I sit on the Higher Ed. Committee and am also concerned about much of the cuts that he was talking about.

But if you're going to recommend a course of action, you'll have to recommend one that leads to a positive beginning or ending, and voting against this bill is not an answer."

Representative Ushijima, speaking in favor of the referral, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as the vice chairman of this particular committee who had considered the subject matter several days ago, I'd like to point out to the members of this honorable body that the Title XX program encompasses quite a number. Unfortunately, the State of Hawaii has indicated, in the committee report, a shortage of funds and, consequently, certain vital programs, in our own judgment, had to be curtailed.

Mr. Speaker, this bill here appropriates \$3.1 million to support Title XX programs. It is funds to be matched by the federal government. If we did not pass this particular bill, Mr. Speaker, it would be indicative of the legislative intent of curtailing several other programs encompassed by the broad title of Title XX of the Social Security Act.

Mr. Speaker, the Department of Social Services had presented to the committee at its hearing, three alternatives, and these alternatives are outlined on page three of the committee report. So, consequently, Mr. Speaker, I will not delve into each of these various options.

The committee on the other hand, Mr. Speaker, had decided and taken the step that rather than defunct this entire program and accept one of the three recommendations made by the particular department, we should nevertheless fund the sum of \$3.1 million to match these federal funds in support of the Title XX program.

It is unfortunate, Mr. Speaker, that because of the economic situation, the State of Hawaii finds itself today in such a great, tough fiscal restraint. If it were fortunate enough, on the other hand, Mr. Speaker, to have all the sums of money to provide for all of the services the people of Hawaii deserve, it would have been extremely great. But, unfortunately, that's not the case.

Under Title XX, you'll have to take advantage of the fact that this federal support assists people of the State of Hawaii and, as a result, I urge everyone to support this measure because of the fact that this \$3.1 million, as stipulated in the bill, is appropriated to match those particular federal funds.

Thank you very much."

Upon being recognized, Representative Ikeda stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of referring this bill to Finance.

Mr. Speaker, I can't help but agree with much of what the previous speaker has said regarding this bill and its committee report. It seems to be . . . the committee report, at least, seems to be clear mishandling by a department of this program.

But, nevertheless, Mr. Speaker, the alternative of not passing this bill would mean that, according to this committee report, it means cutting back on eligibility of child care services, primarily of the client group comprised of low and moderate income working families who are currently not on public assistance. These people, I think, Mr. Speaker, deserve the help because they're trying to do something about this, rather than rely on State funds to live on. And because of that, and because I feel that child care is very necessary and very important, I feel I must vote in favor of this bill and send it to Finance with the hope that the members of the Committee on Finance will review it carefully and perhaps find funds from other sources, if need be, that may not be as important in order to fund this program and save it.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair then rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the vice chairman of the committee would yield to one or more questions?"

Representative Ushijima replied:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair then asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to know first of all whether the administration has requested this money or supported the bill when they testified on it?"

Representative Ushijima answered:

"Mr. Speaker, the administration has spoken in favor of this particular bill."

Representative Blair then asked:

"I'd like to know if the administration has given any indication of whether or not money would be released if appropriated by the Legislature?"

Representative Ushijima stated:

"Sorry, I missed that question, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair again asked:

"I was wondering if the administration, in their testimony, indicated whether or not they would release any of this money if it is appropriated by this Legislature?"

Representative Ushijima answered:

"Mr. Speaker, no indication to that effect was made."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak in favor of the referral, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that most of us have missed the point. I believe that the gentleman from Manoa missed the point. I would direct to him the committee report, which I am one of the signatories to. We labored over this committee report and we tried to tell this body the truth and we said things that aren't going to sit very well with those that have the administrative responsibilities.

We found that the reason for the deficit in the Title XX lies squarely in the absence of any wise planning and having staff that didn't really know how to do their job. We found a very poorly conceived and poorly implemented public planning process. We found a proliferation of rules and various regulations which were confusing, to say the least. And we found that, again, and I've warned this body many times, that we have gone down the primrose path, following the federal, and this Title XX, and we had a program totally dependent on Title XX and funding by the Congress of the United States, and all of a sudden they pull the rug out from under us.

We're trying to tell this body, and I am sure that when it gets before the committee headed by our own Jack Suwa, that we will re-examine and, at that time, I feel that we can come to this body and show the various answers to what the representative from Manoa has shown.

So, I would urge my colleagues to please refer this to the Finance Committee.

Thank you."

Speaking in favor of the bill,
Representative Stanley stated:

"Probably on this floor, I have the most awful feelings about the necessity of coming to this situation where we need to pass this bill, having been the chairman of the Public Assistance Committee at the time we worked on it, and having come to an agreement with the Department of Social Services and Housing that there would be adequate funds to provide for child care for those families who were not within the welfare system but were the working poor. And it has been very painful for me to learn that the department could not keep that promise that they made to me and the providers of child care, and that they now have to come back and report to us that they have a deficit and that they have other deficits.

This report that's before us, as has been succinctly stated by other speakers, fixes the responsibility where it belongs, in no uncertain terms. But we would be remiss if we did not do all that is within our power to provide for the people who need the services of Title XX programs. We have to assume that responsibility now.

And with this thought in mind, despite the facts presented by others, it seems to me the alternative that is best before us is to move this bill to Finance and to see that the Department of Social Services and Housing executes the intent and the direction of this Legislature with regard to the expenditures of Title XX money.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura, upon being recognized, stated:

"I'd like to speak in favor of this committee report and the attached bill.

Speaker, this House is constructed on a committee system, and if we want to, we can dissolve all the committees or limit their duties and responsibilities and let the Finance Committee, like the old days, take care of everything.

I can understand and appreciate some of the garbage that is coming through the Finance Committee, but that is a historical matter.

We have a fancy title called Finance Committee, but actually it's a committee on garbage, because every crap seems to end up in the Finance Committee. But, we're also very fortunate that we have a strong chairman and strong members and we know our fiscal responsibilities. We will exercise it and report back to this body in the form of a budget.

This is, in my estimation, Mr. Speaker, in the years of experience here, that the committee is exercising its duties and responsibilities and flagging out and showing the Committee on Finance what the priorities are. We don't need this bill, actually, because it's all cranked in. But it behooves me if the committee on human resources does not take its responsibility and provide for this body for consideration what their thoughts are, because the people on the committee, who are not members of the Finance Committee, should at least show us the guiding light.

And again, if we want to, we may turn our backs on these people who are not as yet on the welfare roll, but a strong potential candidate, and if we do not provide this kind of service, one of the parents has to stay home. And as sure as the sun will come up tomorrow morning, they will be applying for some welfare assistance because their income will be jeopardized. Therefore, this is a preventive measure to keep people working. And the whole idea is to get as many people working. And the idea is to get the people to like to work, because we say we don't want people to be on welfare unless it's absolutely necessary. And this measure will at least push us on the way towards that goal.

I, therefore, urge every member in this House to vote this matter aye."

Representative Campbell then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of referring this bill to the Finance Committee.

I know that there's been enough said in favor of this referral, but as one who has signed the committee report, I felt that I should add my voice to that support.

This happens to be one of the kinds of measures with strong support that leaves us with no alternative, and that is the reason that I urge my colleagues to support referring this measure to the Finance Committee.

Thank you."

Representative Narvaes, speaking in favor of the referral, stated:

"I'd like to urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure.

Mr. Speaker, as I sat in committee and listened to the deliberations and participated in the deliberations of this bill that is presently before us to be referred to Finance, there's really three options that the Department of Social Services and Housing have provided.

One of them was to continue the Title XX program without expending additional State funds by confining eligibility to welfare recipients, or confining eligibility to welfare recipients in the reduced number of income eligibles. I couldn't support that. That would have excluded too many working people. We need these services that this bill will provide.

One of the other options was to seek an alternative source of funding for components of the Title XX programs. According to testimony from the Department of Social Services and Housing and the Department of Health, it didn't appear that program shifts would generate sufficient savings to the program deficit. They wouldn't have enough money.

The third alternative would be to terminate participation of the State on the Title XX program; to do away with these services; not provide child care services to anybody. I couldn't support that.

Mr. Speaker, the bill before us appropriates \$3,100,000 to continue these services, particularly child care services for the working mothers and fathers who otherwise would not benefit from these child care services.

Mr. Speaker, therefore I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."

Representative Kunimura then rose on a point of personal privilege and was asked by the Chair to "state your point of personal privilege".

Representative Kunimura then stated:

"I'm deeply aggrieved. It is now six minutes of one. We have a Finance Committee that is going to convene

at 1:30 o'clock p.m. and we're just about the first order of our calendar in consideration of bills. If I am not wrong, the Order of the Day has many more other bills. Then I, therefore, would like to request that if we're not gonna if we're going to be a body of passage of all the kind of resolutions - congratulatory resolutions - waste a hell of a lot of time and then can't get through with our calendar, I'm against debate.

I'd like to request that the Chair consider that we recess until 5:30 this afternoon, let our committee members have their lunch and go on with their business, and then we come back at 5:30."

The Chair replied, stating:

"The Chair is pretty confident that after this bill there would be a minimum of debate on the rest of the bills. Shall we proceed?"

Representative Kunimura then stated:

"The Chair doesn't have to attend committee meetings."

The Chair remarked:

"I fully have in mind the committee meetings that are scheduled, Representative Kunimura."

Representative Abercrombie, upon being recognized, asked:

"I believe under our rules, we can rise a second time?"

The Chair replied:

"That is correct."

Representative Abercrombie then stated:

"Although I am not the movant here, the rules also state that the movant can speak at the end, but I trust that if no one wishes to speak, I'll probably be the last one on this, so we'll be able to get to our committee meetings.

Mr. Speaker, I want to say, in respect of the various points that have been raised by other members of this body on this bill, that as far as I can tell from listening attentively to all of them, that they are correct. They are all right, from the first comment by Representative Cayetano to the last. I cannot find arguments defending it.

If I stated in my address that I didn't

know the answer as such, I did not intend that. My intent was that the answer lies elsewhere than constantly bringing before this body an appropriation bill to make up for what is not being done correctly. If I stated it in terms other than that, I wish to make it abundantly clear now. I take cognizance especially of Representative Cayetano's remark - I didn't know - and I wanted to make that clear. However, the rest of his remarks, I think, were very well taken, and everyone else's - Representative Ikeda and others have put it quite clearly.

My second last point is this, that I will vote no. I assume that the others that have spoken will vote yes, and I assume that this will pass to Finance. I am not voting no out of self-righteousness. I am not voting no as a way of pointing to that no, and I'm putting it in the Journal in case anyone has the slightest inclination to view it otherwise. I'm not voting no as a way of reflecting on everyone who will vote yes; quite the opposite. What I am trying to do, I think, was pointed out, and I don't recall the particular speaker. It may have been Representative Stanley flagging out the problem.

I'm voting no because I believe attention has been brought. And I believe that I did state that the alternative sources of funding were not regarded. I do not believe that when someone says alternative sources of funding were not regarded. I do not believe that when someone says alternative sources of funding that that means only programships. I believe that I did mention the raising of revenues from other sources and not programship. Now, we will have to deal with that sooner or later. The executive must answer for itself, no doubt, but we must also for ourselves, sooner or later, about alternative sources of funding. If this body thinks that it can avoid that for much longer, I think it deludes itself.

And the last point is, it is not an economic situation which is causing this bill to come before this House. It's not so-called fiscal restraints or anything else. The committee states quite clearly, in a bipartisan way, that the reason this bill is before the House is because of mismanagement, etc., not because of economic restraint. I would not like it said that I voted no and the other members voted yes with this as the basis of the vote; namely, to wit, the economic

situation.

I think that in conclusion, then, the now absent member from Kauai's remarks are in order about what the Finance Committee needs to do. I do, however, wish to state once again, reiterate it with emphasis, that alternative sources of funding must be addressed by this body. And unless we do that, we are going to find ourselves more and more, not only with the DSSH, not only in situations in which there has been mismanagement, but in circumstances in which we feel management has been proper, facing deficit situations in the State in respect of funding."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"I'll be brief because the hour is late. I intended to speak before, in fact, in favor of the committee report, although against the process by which it came about. Though it will be reflected as an affirmative vote, I must agree virtually in total with what was said by the representative from the 13th District. But, I would point out that this committee report is, in effect, the symptom of a disease. A disease process we refer to as Chapter 37, that allows that kind of discretion after we go home. But, in effect, the entire exercise of the budget constitutes nothing more than a guide for discretionary spending after this body has adjourned. And until we're willing to face, address and correct that problem, bills, like committee reports, written courageously, like in the Helan dilemma that we've witnessed, will continue to fall upon this Legislature.

Mr. Speaker, that may be part of the solution. I'm not certain. But I think it would tend to address the problem. As yet, we haven't faced it.

Granted, memos have transpired from the Ways and Means chairman and from the Finance Committee chairman, and so this legislation. But this Legislature, as a body, does not overrule the process that allows its will to be thwarted after you have adjourned sine die. Until that is done, Mr. Speaker, the process is going to continue to haunt us. And it's that process that I've been talking about since 1973 that I cannot support. But to vote against this committee report and the courage that it took to write it, I think would be equally wrong. And so, Mr. Speaker, when we move this bill to Finance, I think we have to remember to consider the broader issue of the budgetary process that allowed this situation

to happen in the first place.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker, before I introduce the honoree of this resolution, I'd like to say a few words.

Approximately nineteen years ago, I had the experience of working as a rod man for the Department of Transportation. At that time, Mr. Tottori, who is the honoree of this resolution, enjoyed an excellent reputation not only as an engineer but as a man who was concerned of others. He also happened to be one of my supervisors.

His being awarded the Silver Beaver Award today is good evidence that he's the same kind of man he was nineteen years ago."

The honoree was presented with a lei by Representative Naito on behalf of the members of the House, and a certified copy of the resolution will be mailed to him at a later date.

At 1:06 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:11 o'clock p.m.

A resolution (H.R. No. 342) commemorating the sixteenth anniversary of John Glenn's orbital space flight was jointly offered by Representatives Kihano, Blair, Caldito, Fong, Garcia, Inaba, Kawakami, Kiyabu, Kunimura, Mina, Morioka, Peters, Poepoe, Say, Stanley, Suwa, Takamine, Toguchi, Ushijima, D. Yamada, K. Yamada and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Yuen and carried, H.R. No. 342 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 343) congratulating Miss Roxanna Feliz Crawford on being chosen Miss Maui 1978

was jointly offered by Representatives Ueoka, Abercrombie, Ajifu, Caldito, Campbell, Carroll, Cayetano, Cobb, Dods, Evans, Fong, Garcia, Ikeda, Inaba, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Larsen, Machida, Medeiros, Mina, Morioka, Naito, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Poepoe, Say, Shito, Stanley, Sutton, Takamine, Takamura, Uechi, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. Yamada, K. Yamada, Yuen and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Ueoka, seconded by Representative Caldito and carried, H.R. No. 343 was adopted.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of taking up bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1473:

On motion by Representative Cayetano, seconded by Representative Takamura, H.B. No. 1473, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, in accordance with Article III, Section 16, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, with Representative Baker being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1473 had passed Third Reading at 1:13 o'clock p.m.

The Chair, at this time, made the following announcement:

"The Chair would like to announce that, beginning Friday, if all you committee chairmen would schedule your hearings accordingly, we will begin session at 11:00 o'clock a.m., beginning Friday.

And whenever the calendar is long, if any of you would wish to debate any bills, the Chair would appreciate it if you would inform Representative Yuen, who is the Floor Leader, and in reviewing the requests, the Chair may consider recessing for a second session at 6:00 o'clock p.m."

Representative Abercrombie, on a point of order, asked:

"Where in the rules is it that we must inform the Majority Floor Leader that we wish to debate?"

The Chair replied:

"The Chair suggests that."

Representative Abercrombie, on a point of information, asked:

"Why is the Chair suggesting that?"

The Chair replied:

"So that we could logistically accommodate the hearing schedules for the members who attend the committee hearings."

On a point of personal privilege, Representative Abercrombie stated:

"If you have to . . . if it is suggested that you let the Majority Floor Leader know ahead of time if you wish to debate an issue, it gives the Majority Floor Leader and/or the leadership the opportunity to arrange, shall we say, responses, or to accommodate people who may wish to respond. That may not, in fact, have no reflection on the Majority Floor Leader nor on yourself, Mr. Speaker, but I think that it is improper, in the extreme, to . . ."

The Chair interrupted, stating:

"Representative Abercrombie, may I interject here. The Chair did not mandate that. If any member who wishes not to so reveal, you are perfectly within your right to do so."

Representative Abercrombie then remarked:

"That's clear."

The Chair remarked:

"As clear as I stated."
