The National Anthem was sung by Danny Kaleikini followed by Hawaii Ponoi sung by Yvonne Perry.

The Chair appointed Representatives Bunda, Kamali'i, Levin, Onouye, Pfeil, Souki, Takamine and Tungpalan to escort Reverend Kahawai to the rostrum.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Reverend Kahawai.

No. 1) stating that the Committee on Credentials had examined Governor's Message No. 1 appointing David Ige and Jake Manegdeg, to fill the vacancies created by the resignations of Representatives Arnold Morgado, Jr., and Donna Mercado Kim and recommend ing that David Ige and Jake Manegdeg be seated as members of the House.

carried, the report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted.

At 10:25 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair. At this time, the members of the House and their guests were entertained by Palani Vaughn and the King's Own; Sol Bright; and Miss Hiwa Vaughn.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

The Chair appointed Representatives Apo, Crozier, Honda, Kawakami, Kihano and Marumoto to escort David Y. Ige to the rostrum.

The Chair appointed Representatives Cachola, Graulty, Liu, Nakasato, Pfeil and Yoshimura to escort Jake Manegdeg to the rostrum.

The Chair appointed Representatives Anderson, Blair, Hagino, Isbell, Lindsey, Okamura, Onouye, Say, Tajiri and Takamine to escort the Honorable Chief Justice Herman T.F. Lum to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to David Y. Ige and Jake Manegdeg.

OATH OF OFFICE

The Chair thereupon called the two newly appointed members of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii to remain standing, and the oath of

office was administered by the Honorable Herman T.F. Lum, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii to the following members of the House:

The Chair then appointed Representatives Andrews, Cavasso, Hirono, Kamali'i, Leong, Medeiros, Menor, Metcalf, Souki, and Taniguchi to escort the Honorable Herman T.F. Lum from the rostrum.

The Chair then stated:

"Proceeding with the address this morning, the Chair would like to take this opportunity of recognizing some of our distinguished guests," and proceeded to introduce the following: The Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, and Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi and their son, Donn; the Honorable Cec Heftel; the Honorable John Waihee, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii; the Honorable Dan Akaka and his wife, Millie; the Mayor of the County of Maui, the Honorable Hannibal Tavares; many department heads of the State; Council members of the City and County of Honolulu; the Chairman of OHA, Mr. Kealoha; his wife, Mrs. Carolyn Peters, "the 'speaker' of my house,"; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Drake; also, uncles, aunts, nieces, nephews, and very close friends. The Chair thanked them "for coming and joining us this morning."

The Chair also thanked the loved ones "who are so very close to us, thanking all of you parents, husbands and wives and children in taking the time to join us this morning--we look forward to sharing this day with you and that is why the ceremony-because it is a kind of giving back all the things you have given to us. You made our campaigns and holding office worthwhile because we know we can always look at you and call upon you and you'll always be there. I thank you this morning for joining us.'"

The Chair then addressed the members of the House and their guests, as follows:

"To all of you, good morning and

welcome to the reconvening of the Thirteenth Legislature.

"We convene this Session on a day which marks the memory of a man whose life was dedicated to change, the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. This may be somewhat foretelling, but while we are only fifteen days into the New Year, 1986 is already shaping up to be a year of important changes.

"As John Naisbitt, author of "Megatrends" stated, and I quote: '(in 1986) the Pacific may not be where all the action is, but it will get a lot of it.' More than any other time in our State's history, Hawaii is an exciting place to be as we take steps to make sure our State gets her share of that action.

"And in terms of present growth and revenue, the visitor industry is definitely where the action is. To provide the support that this industry needs on the scale that may be required this Session, the House will consider a hotel room tax. Some of the revenues generated from such a tax could be used to support the facilities which attract visitors to our islands and bring return business.

"By the way, business is expected to be good, as Hawaii enjoys a spin-off from the continued growth in the national economy, we can count on an increase in visitors from the mainland as well as in international travelers, particularly from Japan. And this is very good for Hawaii in another way, as our ties with the nations of the Pacific rim are also strengthened.

"The Pacific rim countries have the world's fastest growing economies. Here in Hawaii, we have realized for a long time the value of personal relationships in doing business with our Pacific and Asian neighbors. Over the years, our State has established sister state/province relationships in Japan, China and the Philippines, just to mention a few.

"In 1986, the House will seek to strengthen these ties through legislation for special exchange programs. We intend to take positive action to learn the language, culture and ways of doing business in the Pacific rim area. To tap into this vital marketplace, we are also requesting the State Office of International Services to develop a foreign trade action plan which would detail the opening of trade offices throughout these areas.

"In general, the international outlook for Hawaii is bright in 1986

and the years ahead, as technology continues to play an even greater role in promoting economic development, foreign trade and investment. As Hawaii makes the transition to this technological/informational economy, education becomes extremely critical. At almost every level, the single most important job requirement is literacy.

"Hawaii is committed to excellence in education. About one-third of the State's public expenditures are for education and education is the single, largest item in the State budget.

"Legislation will be introduced to encourage teaching excellence by establishing a master teacher program in the Department of Education. Outstanding teachers will serve as model teachers and receive recognition for their contribution to improving the quality of learning in our State.

"Enrollment in our colleges and universities reflect a growing number of women in almost every field. We fully realize the important force in the economy and the work place which the working women in Hawaii represent. To encourage as well as increase the educational opportunities available to women, we plan to introduce a pilot project for campus child care service at the Manoa University campus.

"Whether you are a young mother attending classes, a working man or woman, or a senior citizen, you and your family will be affected by what we do this session. And one of the more pervasive issues centers on our State's health care delivery system.

"In 1986, we face some very delicate and uncomfortable questions. During the early part of this decade, health care cost containment became a major issue. Now a second issue has been introduced. It involves a question of ethics. If costs are to be contained, then the use of expensive equipment and surgical procedures may need to be limited. Who decides who gets treatment and who doesn't?

"Last year, in response to this question, twenty-eight states throughout this country passed legislation giving legal validity to the 'living will'. It means that while you are still able to make decisions about your life, you can decide your own medical treatment in the event you should become incapable of making those decisions. In 1986, the House will put these issue before its committees. Cost of health care will continue to be an issue, but in the end, decisions of whether life-sustaining

procedures should be continued or terminated will be left to the indivi-

"In a related move, to balance the rights of individuals in the increasing costs of liability insurance, the State's tort laws will be reviewed and modified.

"While we continue to be fiscally conservative in many of our policies and proposals, we also adhere to more progressive social issues and personal values which are similar to those of Americans nationwide. For example, the continued demand for good governmental services translates legislatively into proposals which maintain our quality of life such as those which increase development of rental units; establish day care and respite care programs for senior citizens; decrease the cost of health care services by reviewing the medical malpractice insurance process; and provide AIDS information and education services to the community and establish a voluntary "workfare" program as well as a prison industry program.

"And all the while we must acknowledge the reality of our situation today. Government simply cannot continue to be everything to everybody. In the '60's and '70's, the federal government sharply increased funds to states and cities who in turn could increase services without increasing taxes. But in 1986, egged on by the Reagan Administration and the possibilities of the Gramm-Rudman Act, the flood of federal dollars has begun to dwindle to a trickle.

"We continue to seek greater efficiency in the delivery of public services and we encourage cooperative efforts between the public and private sector. As a matter of personal conviction, I believe that public and private cooperation is a key to solving some of our present problems as well as providing the basis for future economic growth in our State.

"There is no question that government-business relations in Hawaii has improved. INC. magazine's most recent annual report on the State ranks Hawaii in the upper half of the fifty states in terms of improved business climate. And U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPORT places Honolulu fifth among seventy-four cities nationwide in a 'where business is best' survey. 'From Portland, Maine to Honolulu,' the Report reads, '...America's urban areas are enjoying the prosperity not seen before this decade. Unemployment is falling, jobs are increasing, workers' incomes

are rising, retail sales are up and construction is thriving.

"There is also no question that when government and business are at odds, everyone loses---economic development stagnates; jobs disappear; special interests tear into each other and there is no consensus on what's fair and what isn't. The social and economic fabric of our community begins to unravel.

"To weave a strong economic environment for Hawaii, several proposals will be considered this session. The State Water Code and the identification of the State's primary agricultural land will be a major influence on the economic future development for our State.

"To provide for more favorable conditions for business growth, measures will be introduced that will establish a small business procurement assistance office; provide for tax-free special purpose revenue bonds for established and start-up activities such as those in the film and agricultural industries; authorize the use of two separate workers' compensation policies to cover medical and wage loss benefits and look into the financing system of the unemployment insurance compensation fund.

"Incidentally, one very interesting theory for cultivating fertile soil for growing business developments comes from a Honolulu-born professor of management from the U.C.L.A. Graduate School of Management.

"I had the opportunity of meeting and listening to Dr. Bill Ouchi last week at the East-West Center. The author of the best seller, Theory Z, which looked at Japanese style of corporate management and how it can be applied to this country, has focused now on bringing the lessons of management to the problems of government.

"Dr. Ouchi believes in teamwork and suggests that problems can be resolved by consensus if all sides would agree to get together and talk about their differences. He believes that the only way to modify the adversary-type relationship between government and business is to improve the ability of business to resolve its own disputes. Granted, his theory may not look like reality to those of us embroiled in current attempts at developing solutions. But the idea is refreshing, and in this regard, the winds of change blow favorable in his direction.

"After all, leadership by consensus and teamwork are certainly not new concepts to members of the Legislature. We've learned that to get others to come to our ways of thinking we must be willing to go over to theirs. We also know that in the days to come, our greatest allies will be our understanding, flexibility and compassion. When the issues become too heated, let's try to cool them off in the draft created by open hearts and open minds.

"In thinking about the future this morning, I am reminded of the words of a song from my past. It is a song about balance and change and I quote: '...to everything there is a season and a time to every purpose under heaven.'

"Ladies and gentlemen of the Thirteenth Legislature, our time and purpose are upon us. Let us insure Hawaii's future together.

"Aloha and God bless you."

At this time, Representative Marumoto, on behalf of the Minority, responded as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, distinguished guests, people of Hawaii: 'Aloha Kakakiaka' -- good morning.

"We are once more gathered here to meet in legislative session. We are here to deliberate on the unfinished tasks of the Thirteenth Legislature. And our agenda indeed looms large. We have much work ahead of us before we adjourn 60 days hence.

"Mr. Speaker, the Republican members of the House of Representatives pledge our full support and cooperation in bringing to resolution the pressing problems of today's Hawaii. To this end, we will toil long and hard alongside the Majority. We will be in attendance on our committees. We will be present on the floor of this House. We will offer our ideas, experience, opinions, criticisms, alternatives and amendments. We will speak out when conscience dictates.

"It is critical that we work together because we face monumental problems. We cannot afford to devote ourselves to political rhetoric or to defensive posturing. To do so would be an abrogation of public duty.

"We already know what the crucial issues are. For instance, a year ago I said that our major agricultural industries were in a precarious state. Do we not all agree this is the case?

Nothing has changed. State economic indicators are only cautiously optimistic. Revenues are barely adequate. Employment opportunities are few and far between. We eye the economy with a great deal of trepidation.

"Greg Pai, economist from First Hawaiian Bank, said in a recent speech, 'The situation in Hawaii is...worsened by Hawaii's cost of living... Data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics show that the average intermediate income family of four had the highest overall family budget in the nation. Hawaii families need 26% more per year to live comfortably than the average U.S. urban family.

"Why are these costs so high? In general, the reasons fall into two categories: 'economic' factors peculiar to Hawaii's location in the Pacific; and "institutional" factors due to regulations, laws and political factors. For example, nearly 2/3 of the difference between Hawaiian and mainland budgets were due to higher housing and tax costs, both factors that are amenable to change by political and legislative means."

"Mr. Pai's statement puts the monkey squarely on our backs. Let's get to work to improve our economic environment and business climate. Where shall we start?

"We must increasingly rely on tourism...and bold steps are to be encouraged here by both the public and private arenas. We need action on a convention center and a means of funding same.

"The coming crisis in liability insurance will hit public and private agencies, large and small businesses, with hurricane force. This will further weaken our economy, for without insurance how can hospitals, child care agencies, doctors, pest control companies and other businesses continue to operate? We must sit down together and hammer out solutions.

"The problems of workers' compensation insurance still plague us. We cannot fail to enact more reforms because 'we just passed a bill last session.' We must examine the situation again, Mr. Speaker, and take concerted action.

"Our university and lower education systems deserve sufficient funding and much more attention than they have been getting, for education is the backbone of a strong citizentry as well as of a strong and diversified economy. The difficult job of setting educational priorities and establishing clear lines of authority need to be addressed by those of us sitting here and by those across the hall in the Senate as well.

"The Legislature must see to the needs of our senior citizens, of our young people and their efforts to find affordable housing, and to the protection of Hawaii's land and water for ourselves and for future generations.

"Lastly, and what makes our job more difficult but even more necessary is that there exists a crisis of confidence-in us-in elected officials-and in government. We need to restore the dignity of public service in the executive, legislative and judiciary branches. We must open up governmental processes in order to regain the public's respect. Too many election legalities, too many scandals, too little control of campaign zeal has besmirched our image. We've got to clean up our act.

"As you can see, Mr. Speaker, our problems are many and vast. But let's tackle them. Henry Kaiser said, 'problems are just opportunities in work clothes.' Let us don those 'workclothes' starting tomorrow. We will need to communicate closely with business and labor, with educators, doctors, lawyers, insurers and most importantly, with citizens—with all sectors of the community.

"The Republican members of the House are ready to work with all comers, Mr. Speaker, since we all are in this together. The issues are tough, so we must be too. The time for studies is over. Let us be open. Let us be bold. Let us be innovative.

"Mahalo"

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Kawakami, who on behalf of the Majority, rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, honored guests, family and friends:

"I once again welcome you with pleasure on behalf of the Majority caucus.

"There are many issues pending before the 1986 Legislative Session. We, in the Majority, look at these as challenges.

"The Minority Leader has raised a number of concerns which are only a

few of the challenges before us. As in the past, we welcome input by the Minority and recognize their concerns.

"Another challenge to the Democratic Majority comes from our Federal Government. The New Federalism demands that each state assume greater responsibility for the programs which benefit their citizens. Of particular concern is the impact of the Gramm-Rudman Deficit Reduction Act upon the fiscal health of our State. I predict that we will begin to feel the pinch of this federal mandate this year, and that by 1987 major adjustments will have to be made if we hope to maintain our existing public services. Mr. Speaker, your Majority fully believes that now is the time to plan and start the action which will prepare our State to meet this federal challenge.

"But the greatest challenge will be to positively respond to our statewide community for an improved economic and employment climate, for educational excellence and opportunity, and for enrichment in our overall quality of life.

"We will continue to carry the burden of leadership, Mr. Speaker, set the pace of legislative work, and, be accountable to the people of our State.

"Mr. Speaker, it is my pleasure to report that your Majority members are ready to work, and to proceed with the task of meeting these challenges which are before us.

"Thank you."

At 11:11 o'clock a.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:27 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative M. Ige.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Souki: "There will be a Finance Committee public hearing at 1:30 in Room 306."

Representative Lindsey: "Your Committee on Education will have a briefing this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock and it is a briefing that is not confined just to the members of the Education Committee. Any other members who are interested in participating, you are truly welcome."

Representative Kawakami: "There will be a closed Majority caucus immediately after adjournment in the Majority Caucus Room."

The Chair then made the following announcement:

"The Chair would like to announce that the introduction of bills will commence today at 1:00 p.m."

Representative Okamura then rose and moved that all bills pass First Reading and be referred to printing, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Ikeda rose on a point of information and inquired:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my understanding that the cut-off date for the introduction of bills this year will be the thirteenth legislative day as opposed to the twentieth which has traditionally been the cut-off date in previous years. Is that correct?"

The Chair answered in the affirmative.

Representative Ikeda asked:

"Mr. Speaker, then my question is: We would like to know why."

The Chair replied:

"Very simply, Representative Ikeda, I believe during the last election, the Legislature passed a measure asking the electorate to provide this body with the flexibility of determining the cut-off date for the introduction of bills. It is on that basis that this body has decided to use that flexibility. Certainly, it doesn't make any sense asking them for that flexibility and not using it.

"Secondly, this year, as you know, is a carry-over year. It is not as though there is no bill in the hopper. I can assure you that there are over two thousand bills there.

"All of you have had the first session in which to consider measures to be introduced into this process. It is not as though you are running for election next year. You had your interim work to be done; you knew what was being scheduled for this year; and you had the time to properly plan for those measures to be prepared for introduction this year. So it is on that basis that the deadline has been established.

"You received a memo from my office, I believe, last week. If any of you had concerns, the Chair would have appreciated your bringing it to my attention at that time, but I have no problem responding to your question, Representative Ikeda."

Representative Ikeda thanked the Chair and proceeded to speak against the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in view of your response to my question, first of all, it is true that the electorate has given us the flexibility to change the filing deadline. I agree, and I think that they gave us that discretion to be used wisely. In the case of the Minority, Mr. Speaker, as you well know, we do not have attorneys on board year round, and like all other members of the House and Senate, we do have access to the Legislative Reference Bureau. But that in itself is not adequate staffing.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, even though in a carry-over year there is a pre-filing provision, you are well aware of the fact that it is good only in words, that it does not really take effect as far as the Minority is concerned, and I can speak from personal experience. We know that when we take the bills down, whether it be at 8:00 a.m. on the nose on the first day of the pre-filing, that they do not get numbered. There is no time stamping and there is no indication as

to when the legislation has been submitted, and those bills come out at your pleasure and numbered in the same way. It is pretty well known, at least to us, that the Majority package gets the numbers first and our legislation ends up being considered or numbered somewhere along the line.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, the fact that this is a carry-over year and there may be two thousand bills in the hopper, it is not reason enough to preclude the members of this body from adequate notice as to a change in the deadline for filing bills for introduction. Your memo may have come last week. I frankly did not see it and if it's foul-up on my part, I apologize for that, but that does not change the circumstances of the situation. I think that when the public gave us the discretion to change the filing deadline, they did so with the idea that all members of the Legislature would be taken into consideration and given full consideration as far as their business as members of the Legislature concerns, and that a change in the filing deadline would not be as a discretion of certain leadership.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I feel that what has occurred in terms of setting the filing deadline for bill introduction to the thirteenth legislative day is grossly unfair to the members of this House, particularly those of the Minority caucus. And while I may not have any real disagreement in terms of passing the bills laying on the Clerk's desk on First Reading by one o'clock this afternoon, I will still vote against this motion because of the unfairness of the way this business is being conducted in this House."

Representative Blair rose and stated:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. Is there in fact a motion? I thought that was in the nature of an announcement. If it is, I would like to speak in favor of it because I disagree with everything that she said, but if I am out of order, I'll pass."

The Chair answered:

"You are not out of order. I believe the Chair has not called for the vote on the motion. Please proceed."

Representative Blair continued:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"I think that the change to an earlier cut-off in the second year is one of the best things that we can do both for ourselves as a deliberative body and for the general public. We all are familiar with the difficulty in getting bills to the Finance Committee early enough for the Finance Committee to have meaningful hearings on all of the bills that come under their jurisdiction and by having an earlier cut off, I think we go a long way towards making this body more deliberative and the product of this body being better and, therefore, in the interest of the public.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I applaud the earlier cut-off date, and I am sure once we have a little experience with how it works in practice, and maybe some people will need to get their acts together a little earlier, not during the interim between the two sessions, but once the adjustment period is over, I think we will all realize that this is a very great benefit to us as a deliberative body and to the people of this State and, therefore, I applaud the action that you have taken.

"Thank you."

Representative Kamali'i rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, my question of the Speaker: Were the Minority Leader and the Minority Floor Leader consulted with the early cut-off date?"

The Chair answered:

"I believe they received a memo like everybody else."

Representative Kamali'i continued, stating:

"That's my whole point. I think I heard you say that the Minority in the Senate has consulted with the President of the Senate as to whether they were in concurrence with the early cut-off date and I find that, again, I agree with my Minority Floor Leader that it was unfair not to even assess that we were going to do this.

"I have no opposition to this early cut-off date but I do feel that the Minority was not made aware of it as the processes. We have all agreed in this body that we will work together and I find it a little discerning when our leaders are not informed that this is going to happen in this House, and I hope that maybe on this very second day of the Legislature, that we will not see this kind of action by

the Majority in not informing our leaders of your actions.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Ige rose to speak in support of the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in your earlier conversation with myself, I must say that yourself and Senator Wong should be given some credit into looking at ways to improve how we handle bills here in the Legislature, and I would like to echo the same feelings of Representative Blair in saying that when the timetable comes out, in trying to work out more time for our primary committees in review of their bills, in trying to keep the backlog of just a few days by the Finance Committee to occur, I feel that this House and the Senate will agree to an earlier bill cut-off date, and I would like to say that I do appreciate your leadership in trying to move the date up and looking at ways of improving committee hearings and especially giving backup to our committee chairman who needs to look at and review all of these bills before him.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would gladly go along with the Majority Party if it were not that we do not have continuity in the Minority law offices. Our attorney, this year, came on board late. The whole staff is new. They have to be informed on what is happening, the proper way to put bills in and the whole bit. We also have two colleagues in the Legislature who have not learned the whole process. It is fine to go ahead and make changes, but I believe that we should be brought in and at least consulted so that we, too, will be well informed early enough as to what is happening. I do not argue the point that the community is best served if we go ahead and have less bills and good productive bills and, maybe, a shortness of time. But maybe the time has come that instead of shortening everything, we lengthen and we look at the bills that are coming on board and we go ahead and get a little more quality in the bills that we are getting.

"My grandfather sat as a Representative and we are still working the same time constraints that he worked under, and at that time I believe that they were looking at the budget of

some \$300,000 to \$400,000 and our population was about the same. Today, we are looking at a million people; we are looking at a billion dollar budget; we are looking at concerns in water and everything else. We are having problems that we are going to have to have more time and sit down and really try to come up with things that are going to help our people.

"So, I do wish that we would all get together. We are going to have to work together regardless of whether we are Majority or Minority.

"I thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At 11:40 o'clock a.m., Representative Crozier asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:42 o'clock a.m.

Representative Ikeda, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I can't help but find the Vice Speaker's remarks rather amusing in terms of the efficiency of the operations of this House and, under the circumstances, I guess it will not be too much to expect that, first of all, there will be an elimination of short form bills. I can't help but agree with my colleague from the Windward side that rather than streamline the workings of this House, it certainly will end up being bogged down.

"If, in fact, Mr. Speaker, you and your leadership can get things moving a little bit more efficiently, I would apply it. However, given the fact that I have been here at least twelve years and knowing the way things operate, I doubt it."

The Chair stated:

"You are entitled to your opinion, Representative Ikeda."

Representative Ikeda thanked the Chair.

The Chair said:

"The Chair accepts your apology in your initial observations to this House."

Representative Ikeda replied:

"I did not apologize, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair stated:

"I believe you apologized by way of saying that you did not see the memo and if you had not seen the memo, then you were at fault and you apologize, and I accept your apology."

Representative Ikeda stated:

"Well, if I did not see the memo, it may not have arrived. I am not saying I have it. If I do have it, then you have my apology. If I don't have it, then I do not apologize."

The Chair said:

"I accept your apology. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I take particular issue in the fact that we were given notice about 1-1/2 hours ahead that bills can be introduced today. We have been working very hard but we still were not prepared for this sudden notice.

"The Minority here has a mechanical problem and I think that is why we are a little bit distressed. I understand, with the Majority, bills are supposed to be presented on diskettes and we are in the age of These diskettes are technology. produced by displaywriters and the Minority does not have a displaywriter and we do not have formal access to a displaywriter. So, therefore, we are typing our bills on two antiquated, broken mag card machines and they are not on diskettes unless they come from the Legislative Reference Bureau. This puts us at a real disadvantage when it does come time for committee hearings. So, you can understand our displeasure to find ourselves at such a disadvantage. There is no training for mag cards any longer since these are obsolete machines and there is no servicing for mag card machines. We would very much appreciate a displaywriter to be able to produce our own bills or we would like to have training for our legal secretaries and perhaps one of our year-round staff on the displaywriter.

"So, I speak against the motion, Mr. Speaker, and I hope in the future we can have a lot more consideration.

"Thank you."

Representative Blair rose and stated:

"I am sorry to speak again on this bill but I am fundamentally distressed at the implication that somehow the Majority is making it difficult for the Minority to operate. The Legislative Reference Bureau is there all year round. They are begging for work during the interim. There is plenty of time, there is plenty of opportunity.

"There may be reasons that we can correct some minor things in the relationship, in the training and some other things, but fundamentally, this is a very good resolution. It is a very good idea and I would hate to see the Minority put itself on record as opposing something that is so fundamentally in the interest of this Legislature as a deliberative body and thus in the interest of the general public, and I hope that notwithstanding their temporary feelings of being nipped procedurally or otherwise, that they will, in fact, support this and go on record as supporting the concept which is really going to be very helpful to us in doing our business.

"Thank you."

The Chair then asked the Clerk to read the motion which is as follows:

"All bills reaching the Clerk's desk from 1:00 p.m. today pass First Reading and be referred to printing, seconded by Representative Kawakami."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried by voice vote.

At 11:47 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess for the purpose of receiving House Bills.

FIFTH DAY

Tuesday, January 21, 1986

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1986, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Major Tom Elliot of the Salvation Army, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Cachola, Cavasso, Ikeda and Nakasato who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading of the Journal of the Fourth Day was deferred.

At 10:05 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

JOINT SESSION

Upon reconvening at 10:33 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Cachola, Ikeda and Nakasato and the House of Representatives met in Joint Session with the Senate, pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's address. (Gov. Msg. No. 2)

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Thirteenth Legislature:

Mrs. Carolyn Peters, his wife; the First Lady of the State of Hawaii, Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi. An ilima lei was presented to Mrs. Ariyoshi by Senator Yamasaki, the oldest member in terms of tenure, in behalf of all the members of the Thirteenth Legislature. She was accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Lynn Takemoto; and sons, Todd and Donn.

The Honorable John Waihee, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii; the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Honorable Herman Lum; and brother and sisters of the Governor who were asked to stand and be recognized.

Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, the Honorable James Wakatsuki; Associate Judge, the Honorable Walter Heen; and the Cabinet members of the respective depart-

ments of the State of Hawaii.

The Honorable Tony Kunimura, Mayor of the County of Kauai; the Dean of the Consular Corps, the Honorable William Fisher; Consul General Endo from Japan; the Consul General from the Philippines; Consul General Choy from Korea; other members of the various Consular Corps in Hawaii; and the Honorable Stephen Yamashiro, Chairperson of the Hawaii Council.

The Chair then appointed Senators Kawasaki, Kuroda, and Soares and Representatives M. Ige, Kawakami and Okamura to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Senators Fernandes-Salling, George, A. Kobayashi, McMurdo, Solomon and Young and Representatives Hashimoto, Hirono, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i, Marumoto and Tungpalan then presented Governor Ariyoshi with ilima leis on behalf of the Senate and House of Representatives.

The Speaker presented to the members of the Thirteenth Legislature, and guests, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, stating:

"Members of this Body and members of the general public, please join me in welcoming the Governor of this great State of ours, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session, stating:

"Thank you very much.

"I feel very privileged in this State as I go from place to place to have an opportunity to receive so many leis. But everytime I receive a lei, I feel like that young person, a person who has experienced for the first time a very thrilling experience. A giving of a lei in Hawaii and the thought that comes with it is one of the things that make our State a very different State, a very special State, different from any other place in the world. I want you to know that I truly am very, very grateful.

"My hope is that Hawaii will always be a place where we will retain the very special things that take place in our community.

"This morning, I thank you very much for the lovely garlands of flowers but especially the thought that came with it.

"Mahalo."

Governor Ariyoshi then delivered his State-of-the-State Address to the Joint Session, stating:

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, distinguished guests, and my fellow citizens:

"In the summer of 1787 -- a hundred and ninety-nine years ago -- a remarkable document was created in the City of Philadelphia -- the Constitution of the United States. Thinking it up and writing it down was perhaps the most creative political act in history. And just over twenty-five years ago, our own State came into being with a similar document.

"Our State Constitution's Preamble says:

'We, the people of Hawaii...reserve the right to control our destiny, to nurture the integrity of our people and culture, and to preserve the quality of life that we desire.'

"And in Article Five, the Constitution says:

'...The Governor shall, at the beginning of each session...give to the legislature information concerning the affairs of the State, and recommend to its consideration such measures as the governor shall deem expedient.'

"For nearly half the life of our State, I have obeyed this mandate each January. This morning I appear before you to recommend -- for the last time -- what I deem not only expedient, but also what I think is the right thing for us to do.

"The details of what our Administration is proposing this year are in the written Message that will be delivered to each of you. I shall touch upon them in my remarks, but will do so in less detail than in earlier years.

"I want to invite you now to step back with me and take a look at the broader picture.

"Let us look back beyond the past year, beyond my time as Governor, even beyond the past century. For we are the inheritors not only of what was achieved in 1985; we are the inheritors of the entire past. Abraham Lincoln said that we cannot

escape history. It is from the past that we can get a sense of our future potential -- as a State, an Island economy, an Island society.

"I take this approach in my final State-of-the-State Address because I am convinced that all of us -- even in the midst of solving the everyday problems of life, even in the midst of surviving and raising a family -- all of us must keep in mind each day the special nature of this place we call home -- this place which history has prepared for us.

"If you drive down Kapiolani Boulevard during the evening rush hour, you might easily think that you are on Wilshire Boulevard in Los Angeles. For something remarkable has taken place here in the past forty years. The intricate machinery of a complex consumer society has been put together here in our small Islands. We gether here in our small Islands. We inwountains that rise up from the floor of the vast Pacific. And we realize more and more that there's not much room here!

"The straight-line distance between Kaena Point and Makapuu Point is only 44 miles. And the longest dimension of what we call the Big Island is only 93 miles. There is no place else in the world quite like these fragile Islands. Today they support a resident population of over a million people and welcome five million visitors a year. To make this place work, to make it habitable for future generations as well as for ourselves, we cannot afford to forget that our Island State has limits. On a vast continent, mistakes can be made in the use of land and water. In our Islands, the same mistakes can be fatal. Living together here in the middle of the sea, we need a richer sense of community than is found elsewhere.

"The ancient Hawaiian society -- a society that had existed for a thousand years before Captain Cook came ashore at the mouth of the Waimea River on Kauai -- had such a sense of community. That Polynesian society emphasized ohana, a connectedness, a sharing of resources. Things were not perfect, of course. The common people were controlled by strict laws. The kapu system governed a great portion of everyone's And capital punishment was often used in support of that system. But the Hawaiian people were selfsufficient. They provided their own food supply. They were culturally They were culturally rich and socially stable. Their world was in balance.

"Two hundred and eight years ago, when Captain Cook swung open the door to the Sandwich Islands -- as he called them -- everything changed. He and those who followed him brought a new and strange world to Hawaii, and these Islands would never be the same again. Along with a new religion, they brought the energetic mercantile traditions of Europe and America. And we are still living today with the effects of Cook's arrival.

"During the middle of the 19th century, the people of our Islands experienced innovation and confusion, success and failure, and political turmoil. And they faced a basic question:

'How can we survive as part of the modern world?'

"Today, we in Hawaii are still facing the same question.

"The early solution was to survive on the basis of successive single economies. At first it was sandal-wood, and when that ran out, it was whaling, then ranching, then sugar.

"By the turn of the century Hawaii's new political, economic, and social structure was well established. It was in the year 1901 that James Dole borrowed the money to plant his first pineapple field out near Wahiawa.

"The structure was pretty simple. After Annexation, the plantation economy was based on sugar, and later pineapple. Politics and social status were dominated by the "Big Five" and their families. Old Hawaiian traditions had faded into the background, and the tiny seaport of Honolulu was the center of business and trade.

"This was another time of apparent social stability and economic consolidation. But the benefits came at a high price.

"The vast majority of Islanders had little political freedom -- and little opportunity for economic or social mobility. A handful of people in power made the decisions and reaped the rewards. And that's the way it was for fifty years.

"At the end of World War II came the next big change. I was privileged to help in a modest way in contributing to that change. Had it not come, I would not be standing here today.

"When Jack Burns urged me to run for the Territorial Legislature back in 1954, it was with the conviction that we could change things for Hawaii's people. With our party gaining in strength, there was a chance not merely to change the political players in the game, but also to bring new opportunities to more people; to build a more decent and equitable society. Indeed, if we took office and did not do these things, we would be guilty of exactly what we were complaining about.

"So there it was: a chance to make democracy a reality; a chance for people to realize their best potential in getting a job and getting ahead; a chance for almost everybody to contribute to the well-being of our Islands. We knew that it would not be easy. There are many reasons why people do not get ahead in life at the same rate -- why some are more successful than others. But if we could make everyone feel at home here -- if we could make the government fair -- then we knew we would be on the right track. And for more than 30 years, that's the track we've been on.

"No one person, no one administration, and no one political party can take all the credit for the constructive evolution of these years. Once it got started, it gained its own momentum, and the legislative accomplishments between 1954 and the mid-1970's were remarkable.

"In addition to establishing the efficient structure of the State Government itself, the Legislature passed bills for tax reform; for critically important land-use reform; for greatly increased support for education at all levels; and for increased home rule for the Counties. It also passed better laws to benefit our working people.

"Ralph Waldo Emerson once wrote that, 'the height of the pinnacle is determined by the breadth of the base.' These were the years, when, working together, we broadened the base of Hawaiian life.

"As I came into office as your Governor, my fundamental aim was to continue this opening-up process. In my Inaugural Address in 1974, I put it this way:

'Whatever the challenge, we will at least try. I would rather try and err honestly than be faulted for failing to meet a challenge. To all those who would join in our endeavors, I want you to dare, to be imaginative, to be

creative.' But I also said this in the same address: 'In this Administration, we will speak of our efforts and our successes. But we will also speak of our disappointments and setbacks.'

"As in all endeavors, there have been disappointments and setbacks. Some stand out more clearly than others in my mind:

"We are today nowhere near as active a place for international trade as we have wanted to become.

"The fact that H-3 has not yet been built is a disappointment to this Administration -- and to thousands of commuters, as well.

"We have worked for years to establish a general aviation airport on Oahu, but it still eludes us.

"We have built new correctional facilities in each County in the effort to foster rehabilitation. However, with an inmate population that has grown from 300 to more than 1,800 in the last 12 years, we are hard-pressed just to find room for all these offenders.

"Yet over the years there have been many achievements along with the setbacks. Before I touch on them, however, let me say that nobody knows better than I that the achievements have been made by working with the Legislature, not against it.

"As I look out across this Chamber, I see my political friends and colleagues of a lifetime. As the issues have come and gone, you have been with me in some and against me on others — but we have remained colleagues. There are 76 of you. You represent your own areas — and each area has its own needs. Yet you work in the end as a whole. Only through the consent of a majority in each House can a bill become law. It is in the Legislature that the tensions between the needs of the individual and the needs of the whole community are addressed and resolved.

"When that great Democratic President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, was campaigning for his first re-election exactly fifty years ago, he went home to vote in Hyde Park -- a little town on the Hudson River in New York. On the night before the election, he spoke to his neighbors from the front porch of his house, and he said this:

'We Americans have had to put up

with a good many things in the course of our history. But the only rule we have ever put up with is the rule of the majority. And that is the only rule we will ever put up with. If we spell the word with a small 'd,' we are all democrats.'

"Here then are some of the accomplishments that, working together, we have achieved in the past few years in Hawaii:

ALTERNATE ENERGY. We have today a worldwide reputation as a leading center of research, development and use of renewable energy resources. Our pioneering work will be proven even more important whenever our oil supply is cut off for any reason — or when the oil finally dwindles away entirely.

DIVERSIFIED AGRICULTURE. Its growth has been incredible. In ten years, the value of Hawaii's diversified ag products has tripled to more than two hundred million dollars a year. The State's leadership in developing agricultural parks, in supporting research, financing, marketing, and export promotions, has contributed significantly to this growth.

AQUACULTURE. Although we have had some setbacks, aquaculture has come in one decade from being just a dream to being one of our State's fastest-growing and most profitable industries. Today, we have 47 aquafarms, and 18 more are on the drawing boards.

HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS. By the end of 1986 we will have made more awards of Hawaiian home lands in the past 12 years than were made in all of the prior Administrations, beginning with Wallace Rider Farrington's Administration back in the 1920's. And the numbers just given to me this morning indicate that by the end of this year we will have exceeded more than 1½ times the awards that have been made during the prior Administration. The thousand lots distributed in 1985 alone exceeds by far the distribution for any earlier year — and an additional fifteen hundred lots will be offered during this fiscal year.

FRESH WATER SUPPLIES. Like our land, our supplies of fresh water are limited. We have given the highest priority to our search for new water sources, and we have had considerable success. In the future, it is clear that we shall have to turn to the sea and our coastal waters for our drinking water. We are pre-

paring for that. We have done something equally important by conserving the water resources we do have. Some years ago there was a risk of over-pumping the Pearl Harbor aquifer as a short-term solution to increased demand. Your government would not allow the most valuable aquifer on Oahu to be endangered in such a way.

IMPROVEMENTS IN EDUCATION. This Administration has been committed irrevocably to quality in education. Sixty-two per cent of the discretionary money of our State General Fund goes to the Department of Education and the University of Hawaii. We are also committed to the goal that every classroom session—at every level of learning—will attain the highest possible standards. The amount we spend on education is certainly important. But how we spend it—and what improvements in quality we get—are issues of equal importance. We want to make sure that every dollar we spend firmly supports the learning process itself.

SUPPORT FOR TOURISM. In 1975, we set up the State Tourism Office thus beginning a decade of unqualified support -- both direct and indirect -- for our leading industry. We have helped the Hawaii Visitors Bureau expand its capabilities. We have helped increase the number of foreign visitors to Hawaii -- and they add impressively to the total number of tourists. In the past year, we welcomed close to five million visitors.

FACILITIES. We have been constantly improving the physical facilities of the State -- the infrastructure that makes life easier for everybody.

There is a new campus for Kauai Community College.

The Fort Ruger campus of Kapiolani Community College has also been built.

We renovated and consolidated the colleges in Hilo and made major improvements throughout the University system.

H-2 is complete today.

There are new hospitals in Hilo and Kona, and others elsewhere have been extensively improved.

We established a brand new harbor at Barbers Point, and made major improvements to commercial and recreational harbors across the State. We have built gymnasiums and new classrooms and libraries, and improved our airports. Our Honolulu International Airport is one of the finest in the world.

NEW STATE PARKS. Since 1974, we have added 8,000 acres to our parks, spending almost one hundred million dollars to secure these priceless lands for our present and future generations.

GOVERNMENT FINANCE. Due to our firm fiscal policy, this Administration has never presided over a state deficit. Federal budget policies of the 1980's meant very difficult times for every State in the Nation. Most States had to increase taxes or make massive expenditure cuts including layoffs, or both. In Hawaii, we have not increased general fund taxes. We were even able to give rebates to our taxpayers. There have been no significant layoffs of civil service workers. We have always stayed within the spending ceiling set by our State Constitution. I share your pride in these accomplishments.

JOBS AND ECONOMY. When I became Governor in 1974, Hawaii's unemployment rate was well above the national average. Since then, it has generally been below that average. Even in the 1980's when our nation suffered its worst recession since the Great Depression, Hawaii's unemployment rate was several percentage points below that of the country as a whole. And this has occurred in a State with a population growth rate significantly higher than those of other States.

Complementing our economic growth, our training programs have produced a quality labor force. Hawaii's workers have taken full advantage of the opportunities available -- and have contributed in this way to our low rate of unemployment.

NEW INDUSTRIES. New industries in Hawaii rarely become major ones overnight. Sugar took many years, and tourism took time to reach its present success. But for both of these someone began the work. In the past twelve years, we have either begun work on new industries, or nurtured along some seedlings. Diversified agriculture, biotechnology, aquaculture, film production, and energy resources development have all sprouted and are growing nicely. Even astronomy is now a growth industry in Hawaii, which has become a world leader in this field.

This process of seeding an economic forest should not be undertaken sporadically. It needs to be an ongoing process. In the future, we should continue to foster the development of our ocean resources and of high technology appropriate to Hawaii.

"In looking at what we have done, and at the new things we can do in the future, it becomes clear that our citizens have more options than ever before. And where once there may have been, as my predecessor put it, 'a subtle sense of inferiority' in our people, we have tried to overcome that, so that all might have the confidence to succeed. The job is not complete, but we are on the right track.

"There is a unifying thread that runs through this list of achievements. The word is 'improvement.' Our Hawaii State Plan encourages each person to strive to improve the conditions of his or her own life. We have wanted to help people help themselves. Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, who ran the wartime Pacific Fleet from his headquarters at Makalapa, once said:

'If you need a helping hand, you can always find one right there at the end of your arm.'

"There are, of course, those who say that we might have accomplished more. I agree. But no one is prouder of what we have accomplished than I am. And no one is clearer about what yet needs to be done.

"Our Administration will bring many issues before you. Let me list just four of them now:

First, right down to our last day in office, industrial diversification and economic growth will be at the top of our list -- just as it will be for you this Session. Each of us will be taking action and making decisions on this issue.

We will be counseled by some that our decisions must be to do whatever is necessary to meet today's problems. But let me emphasize that we cannot afford to look simply at the short term. We must always be aware of what impact today's decisions will have on tomorrow's Hawaii.

Economic development does not have to mean that we abandon all restraint. Indeed, in a small Island State such as ours, economic development means we cannot abandon restraint. If we are to control our own destinies, if

we are to leave a richer legacy for future generations, we must exercise responsible control and use common sense and the wisdom we have gained through our own experiences, to regulate wisely land use, water, waste, and our limited resources. Our desire to control our own destinies is realized through what I would call 'collective self-discipline.' If we don't achieve it, these valuable resources will be squandered -- and the heritage we leave will be a sad one.

For example, I was disappointed that the Federal government wanted to sell Fort DeRussy to help pay for its operational expenses. What would be gained in the Federal treasury is nothing compared to what would be lost in Hawaii. And for the same reason, I am concerned about the City and County of Honolulu's apparent interest in selling some of its lands for a single year's budget needs.

Let us make decisions that will give us the best use of the resources we have -- for today and for the future.

My second issue: In past years, we have become quite adept at marketing Hawaii as a place to visit. Now we must turn these selling skills to making Hawaii more adept at marketing our expanding list of products and services. In addition to agricultural products, we should increase the export of our high-level professional skills, and sophisticated manufactured items. There is much more that we can do.

My third issue: Down to our last day in office, we shall continue to urge participation and leadership in the affairs of the dynamic Pacific Basin.

If you take a globe of the earth and hold it in your hands so that you are looking down directly on Pitcairn Island, you will notice something surprising as you look around the edge of that globe. Except for a sliver of Mexico, you cannot see any continental land at all! All you can see is the vast Pacific -- dotted with tiny islands. Viewed from this perspective, the Pacific seems to cover half the earth!

Well, this is our ocean! Not in the legal sense, but it is our ocean in the sense that it presents enormous opportunities to Hawaii.

Over the past few years, the people of Hawaii have become more and more aware of what is happening in the

Pacific. There are significant developments in trade, science, and technology. Because of historic and cultural ties to many parts of this vast region, we have a unique mixture of Asian, Polynesian, and Western traditions. Yet to play our larger and rightful role in the region, we must now go beyond being simply a multi-cultural society. We need to become even more international. We need to make a greater effort to speak the languages of the Pacific region, and to supply the goods and services needed by the people of this immense territory.

Even though specific opportunities may not be immediately clear, our Administration will urge expanded Pacific interchange, through organizations like the Pacific Islands Conference, the East-West Center, the Pacific Basin Development Council, and our own non-profit corporation formed last year, PICHTR — the Pacific International Center for High Technology Research. The future of these organizations is bright, and we must offer them continuous support. Hawaii has a head start over other parts of our country in perceiving the potentials of the "New Pacific." We must retain that lead.

My fourth issue: Down to our last in office, we shall continue to stay in touch with the human side of things -- particularly as we work to give our young people the best start in life.

Our responsibility begins with their education. I have indicated that we spend great sums of money on education. How we allocate that money will continue to be critical. Ours is a good system today. More students are learning more than ever. Yet we can do even better. The link between the student and teacher remains pivotal. We must provide new forms of support for the classroom teachers who desire to do an ever better job of teaching. We must also be certain that our schools can open practical doors of opportunity to the working world as well as to the world of higher education.

Our University of Hawaii is a source of learning and a beacon of hope for our young citizens. Even as it trains a student for a specific vocation, it also invites that person to consider the broader spectrum of human experience. At the University, our young people are challenged by history's noblest men and women who have contributed in wonderful ways to our civilization. Our University invites our youth to explore

the depths of the human mind and heart, as well as the mysteries of our vast oceans and the infinity of outer space. They must be well prepared to lead Hawaii in this New Pacific Age.

But it is not only in formal education that we have this responsibility to our young people. It also extends to the media, to the business world, and indeed to the very way that we conduct our own lives each day.

If we are responsible, our young people will come to appreciate the past -- to appreciate, for example, the immigrant experience that began centuries ago with the original voyages of unknown Polynesian pioneers. Hokule'a's Voyages of Rediscovery, having proved the navigational skills of the distant past, have been an outstanding example of the non-formal educational process.

If we are responsible, our young people will come to understand a citizen's right to constructively criticize his or her community -- and also the obligation to pitch in with time and talent and energy on a specific community effort.

If we are responsible, and if we are enthusiastic about our future, then our children will be, too.

"Abraham Lincoln said this about children:

'A child is a person who is going to carry on what you have started. You may adopt all the policies you please, but how they are carried out depends on the children. They will assume control of your cities, states, and nations. They will move in and take over your churches, schools, universities, and corporations. The fate of humanity is in their hands.'

"I realize that this is a formal legislative occasion, but I trust that as I near the end of this address, you will grant me the time to make a few personal reflections about this job that I have held for so long -- and about the process of which it is a part.

"Over the years, hundreds -thousands -- of people have come to me complaining about our political process.

They say that ...

- -- it involves too much argument...
- -- it moves too slowly...

- -- it interferes too much in their lives...
 - -- it doesn't do enough...
 - -- it tries to do too much!

"These perceptions are not altogether inaccurate, but I think they may arise because many people do not understand the basic nature of the kind of government we are living under.

"Unlike the workings of the private sector of our society, which searches always for a clear, immediate, and hopefully profitable final result, the democratic process never quite arrives at the final result. The give and take of the political system creates a kind of uncertainty. To get the benefits of the freedom it confers, we must live with contributions and criticisms from a thousand sources. And we are always asking the important question:

'Shall we change things or shall we leave things as they are?'

"By contrast, from a dictator or tyrant we would always get a clear, quick answer -- but we couldn't do anything about it if it wasn't the answer we wanted.

"As a public servant, how does one get anything done at all in the midst of so many conflicting ideas? Well, I'll tell you. Our next Governor -- whoever he or she may be -- may follow a different path, of course, but this has been my way:

"When people come to me with a complaint or a proposal, I have been willing to listen carefully. I have always asked questions so their aim or their problem becomes clear to me. I have tried to consider the needs of all who might be affected by what they propose — to think of the whole, rather than just the part.

"I have tried to respect the opinions of others, even when they have collided directly with my own. As you know, I have tended to stand firm especially in unpopular decisions, when I have felt that such decisions would clearly benefit the State. In working toward any decision, I have always been more impressed by what I see as the value of an idea than by the the number of people supporting it. And finally, I have always tried in this process to envision the future as well as remember the past.

"There is, however, a stabilizing factor in the midst of all this dynamic

give and take. I have found that most people are good at heart. Most people want to do the right thing — when they can define what it is. And being citizens of Hawaii has helped them to define it, for here we have a political process unique in all the world.

"We have the powerful drive of free enterprise.

"We have the fairness of democracy.

"And we have the tempering, humane note of the Aloha spirit. No other State has this special spirit. And though it has been severely tested at times, it has never been extinguished. It is alive today, just as it was back in 1854 when Kamehameha the Fourth ascended the throne of the Kingdom of Hawaii and said this:

'To be kind and generous to the foreigner, to trust and confide in him, is no new thing in the history of our race. I therefore say to the foreigner that he is welcome. But the duties that we owe to each other are reciprocal.'

"Thus Hawaii began in generosity, and my feeling -- after spending over half my life in public service in my native State -- is that Hawaii will continue in generosity. For it is generosity that helps create a sense of community and of shared opportunity. We must continue to create this sense of shared opportunity -- as newcomers arrive, as new ideas have their impact, and as the past recedes beyond memory.

"If indeed we can find a little time each day to actually do what it says in our Constitution — to control our destiny, to nurture the integrity of our people, to preserve the quality of life that we desire — then all will be well in the Aloha State.

"Blessed by Divine Providence and a bountiful nature, we shall have fashioned a decent and durable society -- a society that can perhaps exert a modest influence in calming the awful winds of fury that blow each day across so many places in this world.

"We will be a <u>useful</u> example -- the symbol and the <u>reality</u> of a community that is dynamic and humane -- a place of peace and progress, a place of harmony and hope.

"Mahalo and Aloha."

Senate President Richard Wong then

rose and stated:

"I want to thank you on behalf of the members of the Thirteenth State Legislature of the State of Hawaii for appearing before us today and delivering the State-of-the-State.

"I think what you have offered us is a challenge for a most interesting session. It is hoped that over the course of the next weeks that we can work with you and your Administration to achieve some of the goals that you have set for us.

"I do want to take this moment, Governor, to make these remarks: I think today is a very 'landmark' day. This is the last time that you will be giving your State-of-the-State message to us, and I am certain that this is a time of great emotion for you and our First Lady as it is for all of

"I'm sure I express the feelings of all the Senators and Representatives present in this hall that we have the utmost respect and aloha for you.

"Governor, Godspeed and may the good Lord bless you and yours.

"If there being no further business by the members of this Body, I hereby wish to take this opportunity to adjourn this Session."

At 11:25 o'clock a.m., the Joint Session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

SIXTH DAY

Wednesday, January 22, 1986

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1986, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Vice Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Dr. W.C. Garland, Pastor of the First Southern Baptist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Cavasso, Peters, Tam and Yoshimura, who were excused.

I hope that this won't be a setback in the space program. I think that would be an unwanted disaster because I know Lt. Col. Onizuka would only want it to go on.

"I hope and pray that the families of all the individuals who were lost in today's space flight will find peace. I know there is a special place for all of them in Heaven and we will never forget each and every one.

"Thank you for allowing me to share these words on this floor today."

Representative Ikeda rose to speak in favor of the concurrent resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this morning's tragedy has left us all saddened beyond words. We are fortunate to have met Lt. Col. Ellison Onizuka when he returned home triumphant after his first voyage into outer space. He touched us all with his humility and warmth and the memory of Hawaii's own astronaut will live forever in our hearts.

"We extend our deepest condolences to the Onizuka family and to the loved ones of all who perished on the space shuttle Challenger.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.C.R. No. 24 was adopted by a rising vote.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Hashimoto and carried, H.R. No. 48 was adopted.

Representative Say then rose and stated:

"It is a pleasure this morning to welcome two of our fellow colleagues from the Province of Alberta. I was very fortunate, along with Representative Hashimoto, to be invited by this wonderful Province, the Province of Alberta, to look into some trade missions with the State of Hawaii. It was during the week of January 3rd to 10th, and it was a very, very exciting mission that Representative Hashimoto and myself got involved with the with along Alu organization.

"As the resolution states, Mr. Speaker, we have two very well

educated, well rounded, well traveled government officials here from the Province of Alberta and I would like to introduce them at this time."

Representative Say then introduced Mr. Ken Broadfoot, Assistant Deputy Minister of Economic Development from the Province of Alberta; Mr. Bob Hunter, Director of International Trade "who was our escort in this trade mission of Alberta"; Mrs. Winona Rubin, Chief Executive Officer of Alu Like; and Mr. Van Horn Diamond, Director of Economic Development.

Floral leis were presented to Mr. Broadfoot by Representative Tungpalan; to Mr. Hunter by Representative Hirono; to Mrs. Rubin by Representative Yoshimura and to Mr. Diamond by Representative Hashimoto. Certified copies of the resolution were presented to the honorees by Representative Marumoto and Representative Liu presented Mr. Broadfoot with a Certificate of Recognition.

Representative Say continued, saying:

"I think all of you here realize that Alu Like has, under the direction and guidance of its leadership, made available many federally-funded programs accessible to our native Hawaiians. This one effort is one among many fine examples of our commitment as far as what Alu Like is trying to do in improving the economic opportunities of our native Hawaiians."

Mr. Broadfoot then presented the Chair with a gift from Alberta, Canada.

The Chair responded:

"In behalf of Speaker Henry Peters, I just want to say that he does appreciate your gift of aloha. Thank you very much."

A resolution (H.R. No. 49) honoring Mr. William Oku, Jr. for distinguished service to the Department of Social Services and Housing was jointly offered by Representatives Okamura, Tom, Anderson, Andrews, Bunda, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Honda, D. Ige, M. Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Lardizabal, Leong, Levin, Lindsey, Manegdeg, Menor, Metcalf, Nakata, Oshiro, Say, Shito, Shon, Souki, Tam, Taniguchi, Tungpalan and Yoshimura.

On motion by Representative Oka-

mura, seconded by Representative Tom and carried, H.R. No. 49 was adopted.

Representative Okamura rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we all remember the famous words of President John Kennedy: 'Ask not what your country can do for you; ask what you can do for your country,' but so few of us have diligently and persistently followed Kennedy's challenge. We have before us today one public servant whose record and colleagues' recommendations demonstrate that he indeed has taken President Kennedy's challenge and has made Hawaii a better place to live because of it.

"Mr. Oku does not feed the hungry, he does not care for any indigent children, nor does he fly dangerous missions for the Air Force. He does not hold one of those positions which we traditionally recognize and praise. Nevertheless, his work as a prison administrator is as crucial to the welfare of our society as any of these. Despite the glamourless nature of Mr. Oku's position, his competence, devotion and sensitivity have all distinguished him among citizens. After a craft shop burning and attempted burglary, vandalism and contamination of drinking water at the Kulani Correctional Facility on the Big Island, the State called on Mr. William Oku to lead the cleanup. The shakedown produced marijuana, pills, illegal credit cards and 113 weapons. In the months following the takeover, Mr. Oku transformed Kulani into a secure and effectively managed prison. Beyond these actions, Mr. Oku proceeded to lead inmate workers to renovate all six inmate dormitories. The prison kitchen was re-roofed and the administration building is undergoing major renovation. Mr. Oku also revitalized the cattle ranch by opening up new pastures and by improving the quality of the grass land. He helped expand the vegetable farm and restored a long neglected plum orchard and improvement to the pig-

"In 1975, Mr. Oku became the first administrator of the Halawa Correctional Facility. In 1980, he was given the task of transforming Halawa into a high security facility. Not only did he make the change, but he developed Halawa into what the Corrections Division administrator describes as 'one of the best maximum security facilities in the country.'

"In addition to his professional

competence, Mr. Oku is a warm and personable human being as demonstrated by his relationship with his fellow workers and his success as a husband and father. As his secretary, Gerry, has said: 'Mr. Oku has a something special that gains loyalty. He is straightforward and gives each one of us individual attention. He has an open-door policy, and he is fair.'

"Until very recently, Mr. Oku served double duty as administrator at Halawa and acting administrator at Kulani with one pay. He gets the job done under the most trying circumstances. He has asked what he could do for his country and his answer has made our State a more secure place to live. As one of his staff says of Mr. Oku: 'He is indeed a special breed.'

"We are very proud to have him with us today and we agree that he has brought honor to Hawaii as the recipient of the Federal Executive of 1985."

Representative Okamura then introduced Mr. William Oku to the members of the House and audience. Accompanying Mr. Oku were his wife, Stella; his sons, Bill, Jr., Daryl, Alan and his wife Priscilla; his sister and brother-in-law, Pauline and Bernard Wendekier; Ted Sakai, administrator of the Corrections Division of the DSSH; and Franklin Sunn, Director of the Department of Social Services and Housing.

Representative Okamura then asked a group of employees from the Department of Social Services and Housing and Halawa Prison who were seated in the gallery to stand and be recog-

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hirono, Tungpalan, Marumoto, Leong, Kawakami, Kamali'i, Ikeda, Hashimoto and Tom, while a certified copy of the resolution was presented to Mr. Oku by Representative Okamura.

Representative Tom then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to note that the honoree resides in our district in Kaneohe and I think that is why we have no crimes in Kaneohe."

A resolution (H.R. No. 61) supporting the efforts of Jimmy F. Enocencio, a decorated combat veteran of Vietnam, who will attempt a "Lone Soldier - Freedom March", was jointly offered by Representatives Crozier, Graulty, D. Ige, Jones, Lardizabal, Leong, Manegdeg, Menor, Nakasato, Shito, Souki, Tajiri and Yoshimura.

On motion by Representative Crozier, seconded by Representative Graulty and carried, H.R. No. 61 was adopted.

Representative Crozier then rose and stated:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to say a few words about Jimmy Enocencio and the purpose of his 'Lone Soldier March.'

"I met Jimmy about a month ago -we were at the spa together, you
know, I was trying to get in shape -to get to look like you, Mr. Speaker.
You are my dream. But anyway, I
met Jimmy over there and we sat
down and we chatted and he told me
of what he was trying to do. He is
trying to bring more awareness to the
people of America about the plight of
the Vietnam -- not only the Vietnam
war veterans -- but all war veterans.

"Jimmy will plan to leave in the spring on March 3rd and start off in San Francisco and hike and hitchhike across the nation all the way to the East Coast and finally reaching Washington, D.C.

"As he goes through the different cities and states, he will be meeting up with veterans and veteran groups, taking pictures and documenting his trip.

"He has received a lot of support from different individuals and companies to help him on his journey. Some of the people who have come to his aid already are Mike Reed from Snapshot Photo for his camera equipment; for his clothing and his pack, -- this mission is going to take over 6 months, Mr. Speaker, probably 9 months -- Jerry Tanner from Sunbird Trading Company; the printing will be done by Jack Steinfield from Professional Images; his legal assistance will come from Tommy Kalakakui; and even his plane tickets were picked up by Mr. John Henry Felix. Some of you may remember that name. Anyway, a lot of people are getting involved in this cause.

"The reason for this cause is that the Vietnam war took place in a very difficult and confusing time in our history. This is the time of the hippy movement, -- a lot of love, peace, drugs -- this was a time of college unrest -- Kent State -- it was a time also of the Civil Rights Movement, this was the peak of Martin Luther King's time. All that took place while the Vietnam war was going

"The men who went to the war were not treated the same way as our other warriors have been. They didn't have the parades down Kalakaua Boulevard before they left. They didn't have the parades down Kalakaua Boulevard when they returned.

"Most of them went one by one. When they got there, they spent one year; when they came back, they came back right into the life of the community. They didn't have a chance to be looked upon as heroes. A lot of them were not looked upon as heroes. Our nation was divided over that issue. Whatever side people took, they believed they were on the right side, and our warriors, -- some of them paid the price -- they couldn't make the adjustment when they came back. A lot of our warriors did come back and a lot of them made the adjustment.

"Right here in our Body today we have men who went to Vietnam: Bob Bunda, Rey Graulty, Mits Shito, and Eloise Tungpalan's husband also went; in fact, she was already the wife of the husband. There are many of us who have gone.

"So, through all of that when the guys came back, they were able to make the adjustments. A lot of them have not. You throw in the chemicals of drug while they were over there—that was a big way to escape the problem of Vietnam was to do drugs—when they got back to America they couldn't readjust. Look at our streets today. I would venture to say that one out of every seven or one out of eight is probably a Vietnam veteran who couldn't make the adjustment.

"But Jimmy wants to go across the nation to film all of this, and let the people know the tragedy of war does not only take place on the battlefield; the tragedy of war takes place after the war is long over. The Vietnam war is over for about 14 or 15 years, but the tragedies are still around us.

"I would like for this Body to wish Jimmy well on his venture and give him the moral support that he needs as he makes this mission across the United States." At this time, Representative Crozier introduced the honoree who was asked to stand and be recognized. Accompanying the honoree is his wife, Carolyn, and children, James, Ceronda, Gina-Marie, Orion-Independence and Tiara Antoinette who were also asked to stand and be recognized.

A pink carnation lei was presented to the honoree by Representative Tungpalan and a certified copy of the resolution was presented by Representative Crozier.

Representative Crozier also remarked that, "Mr. Enocencio will be leaving his family behind, and as Eloise can remember, a long time ago, it was quite difficult to be left behind while the husband is away at war; but in this case Jimmy will be walking across the nation."

At 11:33 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "to allow us the privilege of extending our personal best wishes and aloha to our honoree, this morning."

"Mr. Speaker, I am a little confused. All resolutions that are laying on the Clerk's desk are referred to printing -- is that correct?"

The Chair answered:

"Not First Reading. That is correct."

Representative Marumoto continued:

"I am still on a point of information but I would like to explain that I did introduce a resolution yesterday and it has not been printed so I was a little confused as to whether it will be referred today to printing, and whether it will be sent to committee."

The Chair replied:

"Representative Marumoto, the Chair feels that your resolution will be referred to printing."

Representative Marumoto said:

"I was distressed that it was not

printed and available on the floor today in that it was a timely resolution. It was entitled: 'Requesting President Ferdinand Marcos to step down from the presidency of the Philippines.'"

The Chair said:

"Representative Marumoto, you stood on a point of information; the Chair has answered you properly. That resolution has been referred to printing. Do you have any other questions for myself?"

Representative Marumoto rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I feel that we did not have a large deal of printing to do last night, and I felt that if I introduced a resolution vesterday and a very short one, merely two pages, that it should have been available to the members this morning during session. We are facing a one week recess and. . .

At this point, Representative Kawakami interrupted and said:

"Mr. Speaker, I question the point of personal privilege in a sense that the Minority Leader should be very much aware of the procedures in this kind of resolution. If it were a congratulatory resolution, we probably would take action on the floor, but considering the nature of her resolution, it probably would be referred to a committee for hearing."

The Chair replied:

"The Chair supports our Majority Leader. Representative Marumoto, for what purpose do you rise?"

Representative Marumoto answered:

"I'm still on a point of personal privilege. I did not ask for an action to be taken on the floor. I do expect this resolution to be referred to a committee. . .

The Chair interrupted:

"Representative Marumoto, the Majority Leader made it very clear that resolutions will be referred to printing and I think you understand that from previous practice before it is referred to any committee."

Representative Marumoto answered:

"I do understand that all resolutions go to printing. . .

The Chair interrupted:

"Then very good, Representative Marumoto. For what purpose do you rise?"

Representative Marumoto answered:

"I am personally aggrieved that my resolution was not available on the floor of this House today since I introduced it. . .

The Chair interrupted:

"Representative Marumoto, the Chair has already ruled that your resolution will be referred to printing. Now, had you have done it two or three days earlier, it would have been probably much more timely. It is unfortunate that you took the very last minute to take action on your resolution."

Representative Marumoto said:

"Mr. Speaker, we are faced with a one week recess and I did not want my resolution to come out after one week."

The Chair said:

"Representative Marumoto, the Chair needs to make it very clear that it was not our fault in not getting that resolution to us earlier. I think that was your responsibility and, therefore, I would request that you take your proper seating and we shall proceed with the order of the day."

Thursday, February 20, 1986

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1986, convened at 11:10 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

THIRD READING

No. 1685-86, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACQUIRED IMMUNE DEFICIENCY SYNDROME", passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes, with Representatives Jones, Leong, Nakasato, Pfeil, Tajiri, Takamine and Tungpalan being excused.

H.B. No. 1686-86, HD1:

No. 1686-86, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACQUIRED IMMUNE DEFICIENCY SYNDROME", passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes, to 1 no, with Representative Cavasso voting no and Representatives Jones, Leong, Nakasato, Pfeil, Tajiri, Takamine and Tungpalan being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1685-86 and 1686-86 had passed Third Reading at 11:38 o'clock a.m.

H.B. No. 1142, HD1:

Representative Bunda moved that H.B. No. 1142, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Taniguchi.

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This is a bill to regulate smoking in the office workplace. This bill is intended to encourage employers to accommodate the preferences of both smokers and nonsmokers in reasonable ways.

"It is expected that the enforcement procedures under this law would give every opportunity to the employer to comply with the law without the imposition of fines or other sanctions.

"At least 10 states have laws regulating smoking in the workplace and dozens of cities including San Francisco have ordinances similar to the bill before us this morning.

"Hawaii has ample precedent for passage of laws designed to protect the general public's health and welfare. Recent examples are the seat belt and child restraint laws.

"I think most of us are aware of the health issues surrounding secondhand smoke which is the smoke that nonsmokers are exposed to when they are in an environment with smokers; and of course, one of the prime locations for breathing this type of secondhand smoke is in the workplace where people spend the majority of their day.

"Among healthy adults, the most common symptoms arising from exposure to secondhand smoke or passive smoking are eye irritation, headaches, nasal symptoms and

cough. Exposure to passive smoking precipitates or aggravates allergic attacks in persons with respiratory allergies and exacerbates allergic symptoms such as eye irritation, nasal symptom, headaches, cough, wheezing, sore throats and hoarseness. The list of health concerns only increase with people who have bronchial asthma and other respiratory illnesses.

"This bill is almost identical to the smoking in the workplace ordinance passed by San Francisco about two years ago. I spoke at some length with the person who is in charge of enforcing San Francisco's ordinance and he told me that he spends about 20% of his time now enforcing this particular ordinance because people in San Francisco, the employers and employees, have adjusted to the fact that this requirement exists.

"Even in the beginning when their ordinance was new, he said that he had received fewer complaints from small businesses than from large corporations who wondered how they could comply with this ordinance. He had never had to impose the \$500 dollar fine that is authorized under the San Francisco ordinance, nor does he think he will ever have to impose that particular sanction. And the reason is that their entire enforcement emphasis is on providing the employer every opportunity to comply; they work with all the parties involved to reach accommodation. I expect that to occur in Hawaii should this bill be enacted.

"I urge my colleagues to vote 'yes' on this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As a nonsmoker, and I have been for a number of years, I even voted against the seat belt law, and I think that it is ridiculous that we keep saying we initiated that bill so this one here should take precedent because that one is there.

"It bothers me that we keep making laws for people, Mr. Speaker. When I went to the hearing, and it was a very emotional bill, they even said that smoking is as bad as very hard drugs, heroin and so on.

"When I decided to stop smoking, I had no withdrawals, it didn't bother me that much. I made up my mind because it bothered me. If I don't like to sit down next to someone

smoking, I move; or if it bothers me enough, I may ask them to quit smoking or to move. I think we're adults and I think we can work that out amongst ourselves.

"But we keep making laws upon laws to tell people what they can and can't do. Soon we will be telling them 'you can go to the bathroom now, drop your quarter in' because other states are doing it. We did it at one time because other states did it and we had to cancel it.

"But it keeps bothering me, Mr. Speaker, that everybody says 'such and such a state has it so it's very good for Hawaii, and we're going to be the forerunners and nobody has been fined because that's a good way to do it'; nobody wants to be fined. I wear my seat belts because it's going to cost me fifteen bucks if I don't. I don't think it's a law that I want to go ahead and have on the books and I really don't like doing it. But I do it because somebody says it's for my safety.

"I have to worry about my safety and about my family's. I don't think that the government have to do it. And it's about time we all have to take responsibility for ourselves and for our families, not for government to do it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Ikeda rose and requested the Chair's ruling on a potential conflict.

The Chair directed Representative Ikeda to state her conflict.

Representative Ikeda stated:

"I'm allergic to smoke."

The Chair replied, "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1142, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Shito, Medeiros, Anderson and Kamali'i voting no, and Representatives Jones, Leong, Nakasato, Pfeil, Tajiri, Takamine and Tungpalan being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1142 had passed Third Reading at 11:45 o'clock a.m.

The lottery dream offers odds of winning that are worse than the odds of their being hit by lightning. What we learned from history, what we haven't learned from history, historically, gambling attracts corrupt people. Other states suffered from racketeers, have thieves and under table payoffs. Studies show that lotteries return the least amount of gambled money back to winners. At the same time, tax revenues gained are minimal.

"We must keep Hawaii clean. Often in life, as in government, we are tempted to do something wrong in order to accomplish good. Better education and human service programs are good things, but we cannot fund them with money we get by trapping the poor.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 12:42 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:45 o'clock p.m.

Representative Tom, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 152-86) recommending that H.B. No. 1961-86, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hemmings rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It may come as no surprise to you that I rise to speak against this motion and against this supplemental budget.

"Mr. Speaker, colleagues, as you know, a citizens' panel, the Judiciary, and even the state administration are not ultimately responsible for the laws concerning collecting, budgeting, and spending taxpayers' money. We, here in this room and in the Senate, are held accountable. It is not only our business but it is our duty to find out where and how the money is being spent. In my opinion, it is presumptuous that the Judiciary comes in with a supplemental budget request in view of the fact that abuses of their existing resources have been exposed, documented and corroborated. It is our job to put a stop to this, not to aid and abet it.

"In this particular instance, by using internal information from the Judiciary obtained last summer, my colleagues were able to identify \$465,524 allegedly to be spent on canine K-nine corps, expensive cars,

video and communications equipment, and high tech weapons. It is no secret. The Chief Justice has wisely said that this money is not to be spent, and yet, it is not accounted for in the supplemental budget.

"There are many other questions regarding the financing of the Judiciary's Sheriff's Office that we, of the as legislators, are going to be held accountable for. They are not going to be held accountable for it -- we These questions have to be answered openly and honestly in this forum. Questions like: Why is the Judiciary allowed to procure equipment in excess of four thousand bid ceiling without seeking bids? This was done with cars and video equipment, among other things. In the case of the cars, we have identified the fact that the cars were purchased for less than the budget requested.

"Where is the saved money?

"We know that the single biggest expense that the taxpayers paid for is the service of public employees. It has been documented and corroborated that public employees in the Judiciary have been using taxpayers' time and resources for political purposes. If these. . .

At this point, Representative Okamura rose on a point of order and said:

"I believe that the previous speaker is out of order, that his comments are not germane to the bill at hand."

The Chair said:

"Representative Hemmings, we have the supplemental budget, 1961-86. I am on page 2, and I must agree with our floor leader. What item are you on?"

Representative Hemmings answered:

"I'm talking about the supplemental budget funding of one point some odd million dollars to supplement the existing budget of the Judiciary and they are very germane."

The Chair asked:

"Can you show me on page 2 where you were referring. . .I am sorry, I am lost."

Representative Hemmings respond-

"I know you are lost, Mr. Speaker, as many people are on this issue and

that's what I am trying to clear up. They had a grant in their budget last year and I am addressing the supplemental budget request to add to their budget without accounting for the money that they have already misspent. It is very germane and very pertinent to the budget that we find out, as legislators, where and how they have abused the taxpayers' money. I am talking specifically to the budget and specifically to the budget and specifically to the money that they are asking for as it relates to the money they already have."

The Chair said:

"Representative Hemmings, we are on the supplemental budget and not on the budget that was passed two years ago, so can you help me clarify that?"

Representative Hemmings said:

"I was here last year, Mr. Speaker, and we passed the budget last year. It's 46-million plus dollars. As far as I am concerned, there's millions of dollars of slush fund and unaccounted for money here. . .

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Unfortunately, Representative Hemmings, we are on the supplemental budget and we are not here from last year, and I do not see the issues that you raised before us."

Representative Hemmings then said:

"Mr. Speaker, point of inquiry. . .

Directed by the Chair to "state your point," Representative Hemmings asked:

"What is this supplemental budget for?"

The Chair answered:

"The supplemental budget is before us; it is on page 2. . .

Representative Hemmings interrupted and asked:

"What is the word supplemental... what is the supplemental budget for, Mr. Speaker?"

The Chair answered:

"The supplemental budget is on page 2 and it is before us."

Representative Hemmings interrupted and said:

"It is a supplemental budget for last year's budget, Mr. Speaker. . .

At this point, Representative Liu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of inquiry."

Directed by the Chair to "state your point," Representative Liu said:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, if I may direct the question to Representative Hemmings. . .

The Chair said:

"You can direct the question to me and if I find it appropriate, I will refer it to the Representative."

Representative Liu thanked the Chair and said:

"My query to the Representative who represents Waialae Kahala is whether or not his comments are directed for lines 12 and 13 of page 2, that section being deleted, \$13,576,111?"

Representative Hemmings answered:

"In District Courts operating budget. . .

The Chair interrupted and asked Representative Hemmings, "will you kindly answer that question?"

Representative Hemmings answered:

"According to this document, yes."

Representative Liu thanked the Chair.

Representative Hemmings then asked:

"Mr. Speaker, may I proceed with discussing the budget in an open and honest manner?"

At this point, Representative Graulty asked for a recess and at 12:51 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:53 o'clock p.m., the Chair recognized Representative Hemmings and asked him to "please proceed."

Representative Hemmings stated:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

"I left off regarding the unaccounting of the Judiciary budget regarding resources of personnel. At the employees that were being used for other purposes in their work, these employees were spending their time working on public business, it might be that there would be no need for funding increased positions in the Judiciary and Sheriff's Office.

"The height of arrogance came late December when after all the adverse publicity, the Undersheriff was in the loading dock area of the Judiciary cooking a pig. I was called about it and it seemed in unto itself not necessarily a problem. But we subsequently learned that the smoke from the pig permeated several floors of the Judiciary building, causing numerous employees to be sent home with pay. Again, taxpayers paid for an abuse; possibly the most expensive pig cooked in Hawaiian history.

"We also know that it has been publicly documented knowledge that thousands of tickets have been adjusted or fixed by operatives of the Judiciary. We've heard all the rhetoric of ticket fixing; we know the facts are that many of the tickets fixed are done so with no legitimate legal or ethical justification, the amounts to the losses of hundreds of thousands of dollars or more in revenues in the Jud budget.

"I wish I could say this was my opinion but we all know it is fact. It was further documented by an internal audit of the Judiciary in which Judge Richard Lum said 'serious and obvious defects either by design or by mismanagement, or by malfeasance.' Lum's memo goes on to describe discrepancies.

"How ironic that the Attorney General's Office spent thousands of dollars to prosecute two bureaucrats for fixing a handful of tickets on computer while the Assistant Administrative Director of the Courts and his friends have been fixing thousands of tickets every year.

"Mr. Speaker, colleagues, I could go on asking questions after questions after questions after questions after questions after questions, but really, these inquiries should be asked in open and honest committee hearing. After finding out the facts and exposing the financial abuses, we just may find out that the Judiciary doesn't need a supplemental budget after all. With further scrutiny, we can, I am sure, identify additional savings for the taxpayers.

"Colleagues, I can look you all in the eye and I can safely say that this is not a problem -- this is really an opportunity. And, it is not something to hide from. We had an opportunity to demonstrate to those people of Hawaii who elected us that we are going to have a government that is accountable for how their tax dollars are spent. I urge you to put aside our political differences and search your conscience on this issue. If we vote no on this bill and kill it now, we will be sending a strong signal to the people who elected us that we are going to spend their money wisely and not permit it to be abused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my feelings are to move this bill up to Finance right now would be a sham and an insult to the taxpayers of our state. Secondly, because the hearing was a blatant attempt to deny elected officials their responsibility. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and said:

"Representative Jones, the Chair would like to state a point here. The hearings really has nothing to do with the supplemental budget that is before us. What page are you referring to?"

Representative Jones answered:

"I'll yield on that one. I'll continue on the budget."

The Chair said:

"Then it is not a yield, it is a point of order by the Speaker. . .by the Chair to please be germane in your comments before this House."

Representative Jones said, "I will."

The Chair thanked Representative Jones.

Representative Jones continued:

"Thank you.

"Your elected officials, in the process of trying to understand this budget, were denied questions that were very germane to the expenditures that were raised in the public's eye. For example, why has the Jud budget consistently exceeded the ceiling? Why, for the three days

taxpayer-paid trip for the thirteen sheriffs and employees allowed at the Sheraton Molokai? What about the unauthorized checking account with the name 'Office of the Sheriff' on it? Why were cars purchased without the legal bidding process taking place? Why does an agency need money, an agency that guards the courtrooms need money for the test canine unit, five police packaged vehicles and Uzi submachine guns?

"These questions concerning this budget and this budget item were not allowed in that hearing. And it's because of that that I feel for us to pass this bill up to Finance, we are saying we have abrogated our legislative oversight responsibility in the Jud Committee. And it is on that basis and on the basis that I believe we probably violated the spirit of sunshine, that I strongly encourage my colleagues to vote no on this bill.

"Thank you."

At 12:58 o'clock p.m., Representative Medeiros asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:04 o'clock p.m.

Representative Kamali'i rose to speak in favor of House Bill 1961-86, stating:

"I am going to vote aye on this measure because I am a member of Finance. I have not had the privilege of seeing some of the documents that my colleagues are referring to. I hope by the time we have a hearing in Finance that those documents would be forthcoming. I also hope that the Chief Justice's committee will finish their investigation and that also will be forthcoming to the Finance Committee.

"These are very serious allegations that have been made and if they are true, then I also agree with my colleagues that no supplementary budget is needed. However, I will wait until this bill comes to Finance.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that Representative Kamali'i's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

On motion by Representative Tom, seconded by Representative Metcalf

and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1961-86, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Marumoto and Pfeil voting no.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Lardizabal requested waiver of the 48-hour notice for hearing on House Bill 2046-86, HD 1, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Lardizabal: "I would like to announce at this time that there will be a public hearing in Room 310, at 3:00 o'clock today, on 2046-86 on the convention center complex, and both Committees on Tourism and Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, please be present."

Representative Bunda: "Your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce will be having a hearing on Monday, 1:30 p.m., Room 328. Decision-making to follow."

Representative Graulty: "Your Committee on Human Services will be having a informational briefing tomorrow from Dr. Daniel Craig of the Office of Senator Inouye on the impact of Gramm-Rudman on the human services area. Also, there was a leftover item on this morning's agenda and the Committee will continue to hear testimony on House Bill 2242-86, HD 1, relating to the medicaid fraud control unit tomorrow morning at 11:00 o'clock in the same room."

Representative Isbell: "I would like to announce that I visited with Representative Joe Leong and he is doing very well in the hospital. He will be released on Sunday and will be absent for another two weeks following that after which the doctor will allow him to come back. But he has expressed his fondest aloha to all of you. Thank you very much for signing the card; he thought it was beautiful and he appreciates your remembrances very much."

Representative D. Ige: "Your Committee on Education will be having a public hearing this afternoon in Room 310 at 1:30. Decision-making to follow if time permits."

Representative Souki: "Your Committee on Finance will be holding a public hearing at 2:00 today. Decison-making to follow."

Representative Shito: "I would like to ask the members of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee, before they depart for home tonight, to check with me. We have a few more committee reports to be signed."

The Chair then said:

"The Chair would like to reiterate to make yourselves available for the signing of committee reports this evening."

Representative Isbell: "On this past Monday, there was an Aloha Run and the announcer there and Carole Kai suggested that this Friday be a memoration of that commemoration and that everybody is supposed to wear their shirts. But I didn't think I would look too good in an aloha shirt like that so I've asked Representative Menor if he would wear my shirt, and if all those who were in the run would please stand up, and I'll stay standing since I was in it and finished, and at least let you know that we did this on behalf of the House."

The Chair asked:

"Was that stand. . .those who stand finished or all those who participated?"

Representative Isbell said:

"No, they've got to have finished."

The Chair then asked the members to rise, if there were no objections.

Representative Menor then rose and said:

"Mr. Speaker, as you can see, I am wearing an outfit that is kind of out of the ordinary. It's actually a T-shirt from the Aloha Fun Run. And I would like to make a brief announcement to the members that I wear this with a great deal of pride because of the fact that, as you know, the House had challenged the Senate in that race and I believe that our overall times were much better than the Senate which, of course, demonstrates once again that the House is a much better body than the Senate -- at least for this year.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair said:

"Representative Menor, it is my responsibility to maybe make a correction that there was really no formal challenge. It was a proposal by the House which was turned down by the Senate."

The Chair said:

"The Majority has no objections -- I believe you are in order."

Representative Liu thanked the Chair and said:

"I would like to record my no vote, assuming that this bill does come through, on House Bill 1767-86."

The Chair "so ordered."

Representative Liu thanked the Chair.

At 1:12 o'clock p.m., Representative Kiyabu asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

ORDER OF THE DAY

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering resolutions out of order.

No. 88) extending congratulations to Punahou School on its meritorious selection by the 1984-85 Exemplary Private School Recognition Project was jointly offered by Representatives Kamali'i, Taniguchi, Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Blair, Bunda, Cachola, Cavasso, Crozier, Graulty, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Honda, D. Ige, M. Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Lardizabal, Levin, Lindsey, Liu, Manegdeg, Marumoto, Medeiros, Metcalf, Nakata, Okamura, Oshiro, Pfeil, Say, Shito, Shon, Souki, Tajiri, Takamine, Tom, Tungpalan, Yoshimura and Peters.

On motion by Representative Kamali'i, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried, H.R. No. 88 was adopted.

Representative Kamali'i then rose and stated:

"I'm very proud to rise to speak in favor of this resolution honoring Punahou.

"Mr. Speaker, several days ago, one of the T.V. stations conducted an informal poll to determine whether our children attended public or private schools. Although left unstated, there was an implied disapproval of elected officials who did not send their children to public schools.

"This award from the United States Department of Education recognizing Punahou and Iolani as exemplary private schools should provide some perspective to the silent debate about educational alternatives. The qualities which we were judged by the federal Department of Education were the same criteria we should apply and want from any school: 1. academic performance standards; 2. A broad representation of ethnic and economic groups and 3. The active involvement and inclusion of both parents and students in the life of the campus. At its best, learning is a family and community activity, a way to grow together, not apart.

"Education is expensive not only for

the private but for the public school as well. If there is a discrepancy between private and public schools then, regardless of what family traditions we may follow, or what personal expectations we may have, then our support for education should only be strengthened. The discrepancy, if it exists, is not to the credit or the blame of the students.

"Punahou students and graduates, myself, Fred Hemmings and Mike Liu and others, were and are no different from our friends who attended public schools. But there may have been a difference in the support which our schools received.

"Frankly, Mr. Speaker, our public school teachers deserve significant pay raises. Smaller classes, more incentives and greater rewards for caring about their students as individuals, just as clearly, we and all the other parents of this state are to give more time, attention and support to our public schools, and greater cooperation among public, private and governmental agencies should be recurring. Yes, education is expensive. But the highest price we can pay as a society is to deprive ourselves of an educated citizenry.

"Perhaps, Mr. Speaker, as a beginning we could initiate recognizing exemplary public schools. Today, though, as I was in high school, I am a cheerleader from Punahou, and to Mr. McPhee and the many others who have worked so hard in contributing so significantly to the excellence which is Punahou, 'yeah team.'

"Mahalo."

Representative Hemmings then rose and remarked:

"I am very proud of this body, this morning, passing these two resolutions in recognition of these two fine schools and also private education in general.

"Our goal should be good education, no matter what the source, and the private school of these islands have done an excellent job.

"On a personal note, I think these schools have a tremendous social conscience. I was born and raised and grew up in the Kaimuki area and my father worked two jobs to supply his six children with an education. He made many personal sacrifices. I am proud to say that Punahou contributes much to the community by providing scholarships, one of which

I was a recipient of, to help children get through this school.

"The bottom line for private education is the same as the bottom line for public education, and that is to benefit and educate our children, and I think the passage of these two resolutions this morning recognizes not only these two fine schools, but all private schools in this islands. They are doing much to make the youths of Hawaii educated and better citizens for the future.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to indicate that we are very honored to have Dr. McPhee here representing Punahou for all of the work that he has done.

"When I started at Punahou, Mr. McPhee was just starting at Punahou. And I just want to indicate that not in honor of the occasion, but by pure coincidence, this is the same jacket that I wore on the night of my graduation fifteen years ago, without the patch, and that Dr. McPhee looks just as young now as he did then.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, specifically the one referring to Iolani School, stating:

"It was twenty years ago that I came to Hawaii and not knowing anything about Hawaii whatsoever, my choices were Leilehua High School or Iolani. I chose Leilehua because they had girls. My parents chose Iolani. In retrospect, I think their decision was more meritorious than I thought at the time. So, as a consequence, we channelled our energies at Iolani into other areas, like painting the gymnasium with green shamrocks on St. Patrick's Day or breaking into the boathouse to steal Punahou's oars, depositing firecrackers in the dean's office on graduation day; but fortunately, for Iolani they now have girls and I understand that it's a much better school as a consequence of that.

"Looking back on it, though, the thing that I really recall about Iolani is one particular teacher named Harold Keebles who was my English professor, and I think probably more than anyone else outside my immediate family, he had a tremendous impact

on my life, and consequently, I owe a great debt to the school as the place where people like Mr. Keebles could continue to teach well into their sixties when I think most schools would have retired someone of that age, notwithstanding the fact that he was still an excellent teacher. And I think it's in some of these areas that schools like Iolani can show us how we can best use our human resources, and I very much would like to thank David Kuhns although he was on sabbatical and didn't get to re-primand me for any of my trans-gressions that year. I thank him very much and all of the people who have made Iolani School such a fine institution.

"Thank you."

Representative Menor then spoke in favor of both resolutions, stating:

"I know I speak for Representative Blair when we say that we really appreciate being able to speak on behalf of these resolutions not only because one of the honorees happens to be the headmaster of the school that we both attended, but also to demonstrate the fact that Republicans are not the only individuals who have attended private schools in the past.

"In any event, in terms of the resolution on Iolani School, as all of you know Iolani has gained for itself a reputation for educational excellence and there is no question that reputation, that well-earned reputation, is directly attributable to the leadership and work of Headmaster Kuhn on behalf of the students of Iolani.

"As a former graduate, I can attest to the fact that Headmaster Kuhn always demanded from his students intellectual exemplary discipline, behavior and exhorted us to strive for the highest academic standards. I know that at that young age, there were times when I questioned the relevance of that educational experience; but as I've looked back over the years, I have come to recognize the fact that that education really has had a tremendous impact and shaping influence in my own career, and to that extent I consider myself a beneficiary of the educational experience at Iolani.

"I would also like to point out to this body that Representative Blair and myself are not the only individuals who have graduated from Iolani who are now sitting on this House floor today. Our assistant clerk, Charles Tomisato, was also a graduate of Iolani, and although I won't say what particular year that was in, but I am sure in that regard he also is very strongly in support of this resolution.

"So, in closing, I really do appreciate the adoption by this body of these resolutions today.

"Thank you."

At this time, Representative Kamali'i asked the honorees to stand and be recognized. An orchid lei was presented to each of the honorees by Representative Kamali'i and a certified copy of the Resolution was presented to Dr. McPhee by Representative Taniguchi and to Headmaster Kuhn by Representative Blair.

At 11:34 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair "in order for the members to extend their best wishes to our honorees this morning, and mostly to thank them for the lives that they touched, not only to the children that are presently going to their schools, but to members that are presently here in this body."
